been translated: "adversity, affliction, bad, calamity, displeasure, distress, wrong etc." Solomon is not necessarily speaking of a sin, for everything in the context would argue to the contrary. Rather he is saying that some things do not fit well in the equation of earthly life. Notice that our writer said that this "evil" was coming down from the ruler, with no specific position of ruling being given. He is saying that rulers sometimes get

things out of place, so that folly is sometimes set in great dignity. Our word "folly" means: "silliness"; the Hebrew word comes from a word that means: "to do foolishly; to make a fool; play the fool or turn into foolishness." We do not have to look very far to see things that have no merit whatsoever being praised more greatly than the things that are vitally important and essential to life itself. Millions of dollars are being spent to

produce things that are not only without value, but are actually detrimental to human society, yet people "buy them up", as if they were more precious than gold!

Now our writer says that this kind of thing is an "error which proceedeth from the ruler". I believe in government, especially if we could have a government "of the people, by the people, and for the people", which we have had in times past, and do have now to an extent. I do not believe in rebelling against authority that God has ordained, but I do believe that those in authority are responsible before God to rule justly. Notice that Solomon, who is himself a king, says that

the ruler is sometimes the fountainhead of the folly that is being produced. When I say "folly", of course I am not thinking about only one area in which folly is praised as being superior, but I am thinking about various areas of governments, churches and also families in which folly is the "King on the throne". It is not wrong to have clean fun or entertainment, but our idea of what is "clean" has changed drastically in the last few decades! Our writer sees folly in settings of great dignity, while some who are rich, and evidently also wise, sit in places of no honor from the masses. Servants have been elevated to positions of honor, riding in royalty,

while princes are walking as if they have no horses to ride. The whole picture here is that of things being turned around and placed out of order. Do I need to say more, or do you get the picture? By J. Briggs King, Evangelist, Rainsville, AL (678) 451-0921

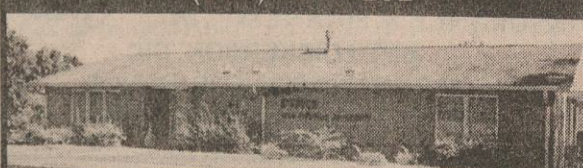

He raised a big garden each year, had fruit trees nearby, a little cabin on Rutledge Salem Road where he and Noonan lived.

His mail carriers always wanted to stop and talk with Grandpa. They enjoyed talking with

him and he loved sharing whatever was in season with them. He'd have parched peanuts, turnips and greens, collards, watermelons, etc. He loved to share this with his mail carrier (and Chester and me.)

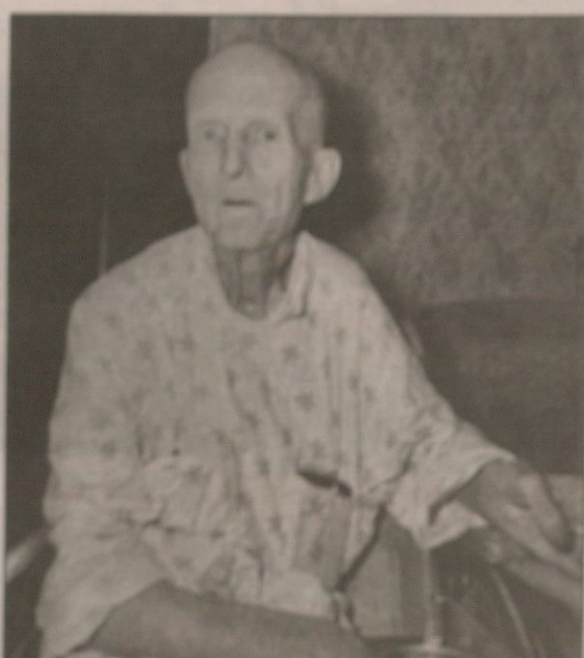
Grandpa was a great coon hunter. Everyone wanted to go coon hunting with him. He could climb a tree, shake the coon out and everyone got to enjoy a good fight. After Mom and Dad married Dad became a coon hunter. He said my grandpa was the best. They didn't have to stand looking up the tree, wishfully. Up Grandpa would go! It wasn't bad at all. I can't say any of us liked it. That was our first and last time to eat opossum but my grandpa relished the opossum. I don't guess he ever got to eat opossum again because he was well in years when this happened. It was in the late 1930's.

Grandpa Brack Luttrell lived a great, colorful life, a loyal friend, histo-



rian, husband, father, daddy, papa and neighbor.

A tribute I'll always cherish was told to my mother by their mail carrier (Bill Curtis) "Your dad is the best read patron on Iuka Route 1."

Thank God for the memories of my sweet grandpa. I learned lots about life at his knees.

Children loved him and never visited without leaving with something,

usually, copper pennies. He wanted to give you enough to rattle in your pocket.

Love grew in and around the little cabin on Rutledge Salem Road. Those who stopped to visit were blessed and left with a better attitude towards life. May the memories of this humble man never die and be emulated by his posterity. It will make a better America.

the great destroyers of our immune system. Fear, shutdowns and economic collapse is the worse possible way to fight this virus. It will lead to higher suicide rates, higher drug overdoses, higher divorce rates, more domestic violence and more overall deaths than COVID-19 could cause by itself. The point of the shutdown was to "flatten the curve," not to eradicate the virus, which is impossible. By flattening the curve, we spread the deaths out over a longer period, thus insuring our hospital aren't overloaded. We have achieved that goal. There are no shortages of ventilators. Our hospitals have plenty of beds. We never had to use any of the temporary emergency hospitals erected in hotbed areas. The reason for the shutdown no longer exists. We have now learned that the COVID-19 virus is much less fatal than we thought. It is not Ebola, it is more like a bad flu. It's infection fatality rate, still being determined, is something on the order of one fatality per 350 infections compared to one out of 1,000 for the flu. It's a noxious killer, but manageable. So far, according to the CDC, the COVID-19 vi-

rus has killed one American out 8,554. The average age of a COVID-19 victim is 80 years old - which also happens to be the average age of life expectancy. This is because everyone's immune system declines with age, just like every other part of your body. Older people also die of pneumonia, common colds, the flu and hundreds of other causes. Yet we do not shut down the economy because of this. Just today, CNN reports that 370 workers at the Triumph Foods pork plant in Buchanan County, Missouri tested positive for Covid-19. Not a single one had any symptoms. A virus that causes no symptoms or minor symptoms in 95 percent of the people it infects is not a killer virus. Further, it would be completely impossible to contain a virus such as that. If COVID-19 were a killer virus, grocery store workers would be dropping like flies since the grocery stores have been busier than ever. Yet this has not happened. COVID-19 death and infection rates for grocery store workers are no higher than the national averages. If COVID-19 were a killer virus, the Swedes would be dropping like flies, since Swe-

den did not shut down. Yet Sweden is doing just fine and fatalities are dropping sharply like all the other European countries which are two or three weeks ahead of the U.S. The epidemic experts got us into the shutdown game. We believed the experts. But come to find out, the experts have been wildly wrong. They predicted 2.4 million American deaths. That's a big miss. In reality, there is a huge amount we don't know about viruses, epidemics and the immune system. Blind trust in the experts is misguided. Every human body has 500 trillion viruses in it at any given point in time, including 75 percent of the known species that infect humans. We all have four different coronaviruses in us right now - HKU1, NL63, OC43, 229E. Science discovers dozens of new human viruses every decade. Our immune system is at constant war and does a mighty good job at keeping these invaders at bay - until we get old, then we die. Viral tests are unreliable when properly vetted by the FDA. Current tests were rushed through. Many of these tests are picking up viral particles from other coronavi-

rus already in our bodies. Inaccuracy abounds. Positive infections will continue to increase simply as a function of skyrocketing testing. It is the fatalities that matter, and they are dropping rapidly. Using the CDC's total all-cause mortality stats, the total death rate in the U.S. so far this year is about the same as the five-year average. It will take years, to understand what has

really happened. In the meantime, we have lives to live and an economy to rebuild. Never in history have healthy people been quarantined. It massively violates our Bill of Rights and probably won't stand up to judicial review. Before we leave a suffocating debt burden to our children, let's regain our confidence, overcome our hypochondria and get back to living normal lives.

War II"

Our family of seven boys and three girls were born and raised in Tishomingo County, Mississippi. I am Jerrell the youngest child and the only surviving member of our family. I have wrote about my brother Ersell for this submission.

Ersell Jerome McNutt was born in 1915 at Dennis, Miss. Two events helped him survive World War II. The first event took place at the beginning of his junior year at Mississippi State University. In his first two years he took the initial course in ROTC (Reserve Officer Training Corps). But he was denied taking advanced ROTC because he had flat feet. Therefore he was denied the opportunity to be an officer. I was told that there were a greater percentage of Officers with the rank Lieutenant who were killed in battles with the Germans than any other category. The second event took place while he was assigned to the headquarters segment of the 100 Infantry Division. This Division was in a tough battle with the Germans in France. More men were needed persons on the front line of battle. A roster of men was quickly listed for immediate transfer to the front. Ersell was on that list. But before the commanding general signed this list he drew a line through Ersell's name. Ersell had been cutting the hair of the General. Ersell learned the barbering trade by cutting the hair of all of his boys plus several neighbors.

After the war Ersell

attended the annual meetings of the BBB—ie Banding Bastards of Bastogne. Ersell was a mild mannered red headed person with maturity that manifested itself even while he was a senior at Belmont, Mississippi High School. Our mother was a widow and Ersell as a High School boy had to take over the operation of our large farm near Dennis, Miss. After he graduated from High School he attended an extra year in order to take typing and short hand. Our older brothers had left home so seek their living doing things other than farming. Some wicked men stole our farm and Ersell and my mother traveled all over Tishomingo County trying to find a place for us to live. Land owners would rather have the plague as to have a widow woman with a house full

of children. Out of the kindness of his heart, Dr. Joe Wheeler let us move on his large farm across Bear Creek. He had two other families living on this farm but he let us move into a vacant building. Ersell and the rest of us did not think that it was a great sin to work. We paid Dr. Wheeler three bales of cotton and over 100 bushels of corn. We also shared hay and peanuts. Our mother had a 4th grade education but had a PhD in determination. She wanted us to get an education. Ersell hauled logs to build us a house on the large farm of our cousin Charlie Byrum near Tishomingo. Dr. Wheeler begged us to stay on his farm. He said, "you have paid me more rent than I have gotten off this farm in five years."

Ersell was a Summa Cum Laude graduate of Miss State University and

I do not think he ever purchased a text book. After the war Cornell University and Miss State offered him a full scholarship leading to a PhD degree but he wanted to get married and settle down. He married Inez Quillen and they had three daughters. Ellen has PhD and was a college professor. Myra was a teacher. Patricia developed a corporation that had offices in eight major cities. Ersell died in 2005 and was buried by his wife in the Cumberland Presbyterian Church in Maude, Alabama.

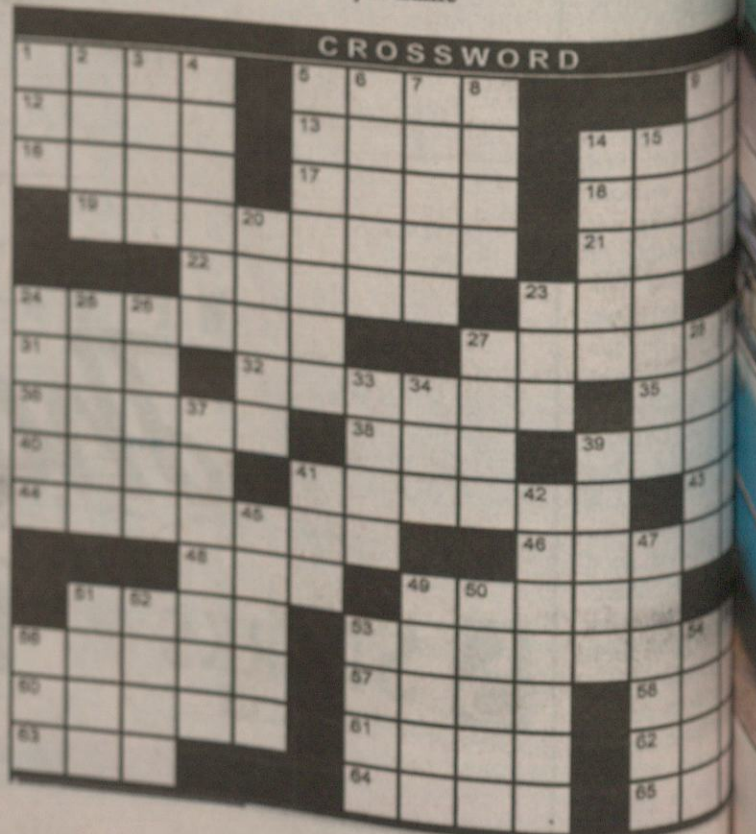
