## The Northeast Regional Library Open for Curbside Service

The Northeast Regional Library is pleased to announce the start of our curbside service. Beginning on Monday, May 18, we will begin offering curbside delivery at each branch according to the schedule below. You will be able to call and let us know that you are waiting in the parking lot and our staff will bring your requested materials to you. In order to keep everyone involved safe, we ask that you open the trunk of your car or your backseat door to allow staff to put your items in that all parties involved avoid any direct contact. The following is the curbside service for Tishomingo County branches: Iuka, Belmont, and Tishomingo: Monday, Wednesday: 1:00 – 5:00 and Tishomingo: Monday, Wednesday: 12:00 p.m. – 5:00 p.m. Materials may be requested by phone or online. If you haven't done so, now is a great time to set up your online account on our website: [www.tishomingo.lib.ms.us](http://www.tishomingo.lib.ms.us), which lets you view the materials available at branches of NERL. From your account, you will be able to place items on hold and renew materials. You will need

your library card number and PIN (the last 4 digits of your library card). If you require assistance placing online holds, feel free to call your local branch or email NERL at [dee@nereg.lib.ms.us](mailto:dee@nereg.lib.ms.us). For those patrons unable to leave their homes or uncomfortable with the thought of even curbside delivery, we will be also gauging interest in home delivery of books, whether through the mail or through drop-off services. If you are interested in taking advantage of either of these services, please call your local branch and let them know. The pandemic has been a hardship on every one of the communities NERL serves. We are diligently working on plans that will allow us to once again welcome patrons inside, but safety for our staff and our

public is our most important concern. We do not yet have a date when we might be able to re-open, but we promise that we will return as soon as conditions allow it. When we once again open our doors, there will be new, strict rules in place to help protect everyone involved. For example, there will be limits on the number of people allowed in our buildings at once as well as a limit on the number of computers available to use. All items checked out will also undergo a two-week quarantine period in between uses. Even though these steps will look different from what you are used to seeing in library services, we look forward to seeing you again soon under our "new normal."

## Car Chase Ends in Crash in the Burnsville Area

On Saturday night, May 16th, a car chase ensued between the Mississippi Highway Patrol and an individual who refused to stop for law enforcement. The pursuit began in Alcorn County at approximately 10:03 p.m. and ended in Tishomingo County according to Sergeant Marvin N. Baird of the MHP. The driver was identified as Steven Haston, 32, of Vincemont, AL. The vehicle in question, a 2016 Ford Mustang, matched

the description of one being driven by a possible missing person; when troopers attempted to stop the driver for a wellness check in the Corinth area, Haston fled on US Highway 72. The chase ended in Burnsville when the vehicle came to a stop after crashing into a pole. Haston was transported to NMMC in Iuka for observation after the crash. This incident is still under investigation by the MHP.

## Iuka Businessman, Paul Morris, Dies

Paul Edward Morris, 68, of Tishomingo, MS, died Tuesday, May 12, 2020, at Midwestern Regional Medical Center in Zion, IL. Paul was a member of the Iuka Church of Christ and was the founder and former owner of Town and Country Furniture in Iuka.



A true Southern gentleman, he was a craftsman, woodworker, and furniture designer, and was the current owner and operator of Paul's Woodworks. He was on the Board of Directors of 21st Century Global Missions. Paul loved photography and cars, and was the Vice-President of the Northeast Mississippi Car Club. He also loved football and the Pittsburgh Steelers. He is survived by his wife, Pam P. Morris of Tishomingo; one son, Paul Daniel Morris of Booneville; four sisters, Betty Mitchell of Iuka, Joann Thorn (Peanut) of Iuka, Linda Nelson of Tishomingo, and Sharon Bostick (Gary) of Tishomingo; his mother-in-law, Ruemell Palmer of Booneville; a sister-in-law, Pat Green (Ricky) of Booneville; and a host of nieces and nephews. He was preceded in

death by his parents, Commer and Gladys Gresham Morris; and a sister, Deloris Lee. Cutshall Funeral Home of Iuka, MS was entrusted with arrangements. A private family service was held Tuesday, May 19, at Maud Cemetery, officiated by Lance Foster. Interment followed in Maud Cemetery. narrative by Deputy Jamie Reynolds, Brian was traveling west on his motorcycle on CR 246 when a pickup, driven by Billy Phillips, turned left into his driveway, and the motorcycle struck the pickup in the right rear side and wheel. The motorcycle then slide to a stop in left lane and the pickup traveled on into the driveway. The driver of the motorcycle was thrown into the grass off the right side of the roadway.

Mobile Pantry Food Distribution will take place on May 26th 2020 from 10 a.m. to 12 noon at 1701 Paul Edmondson Drive in Iuka. A photo ID or other proof of residency is required for service. The mobile pantry is open and free to all residents of Tishomingo County who qualify for SNAP benefits (Food Stamps), Home Energy Assistance, Supplement Security Income (ISS), Public Housing, Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF), Medicare/Medicaid, or those willing to complete and sign a Self-Declaration of Income Statement showing total household income is below the poverty level. No more than 3 households per car; and no Walk-up's, only vehicle traffic is allowed.

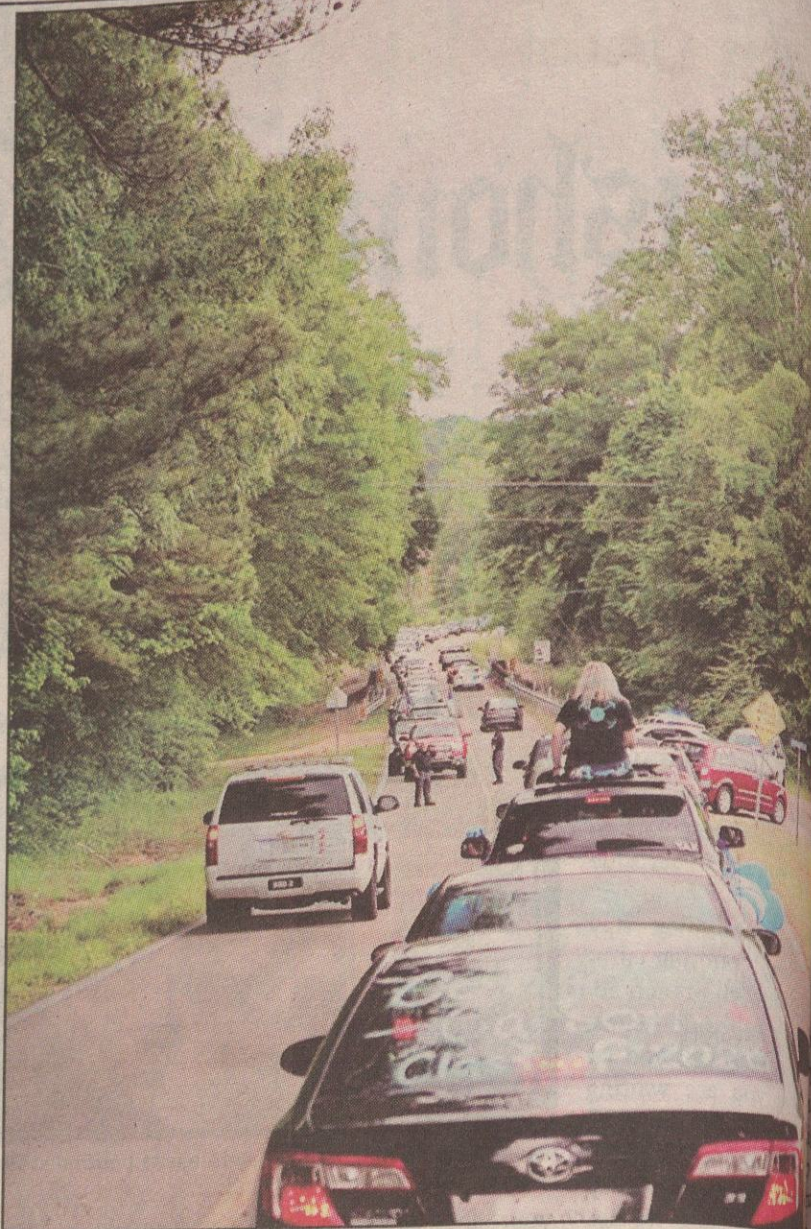


Debbie Truesdale

## Mississippi Lottery Corporation Announces April Transfer to the State

JACKSON, MISS--Yesterday, the Mississippi Lottery Corporation (MLC) completed its April transfer of \$9,709,843.36 in net proceeds to the Lottery Proceeds Fund in the Mississippi State Treasury. This brings the total amount deposited to the state to more than \$47.2 million since launch on November 25, 2019.

"We are pleased to be able continue to raise funds to benefit Mississippi's roads, bridges and education," said MLC President Tom Shaheen. "Yesterday, the Mississippi Department of Transportation (MDOT) announced the awarding of initial paving contracts using lottery dollars. It is exciting to play a part in these developments that will benefit Mississippians!"

In accordance with the Alyce G. Clarke Lottery Law, the MLC is required to transfer net proceeds within 20 days following the close of each calendar month.

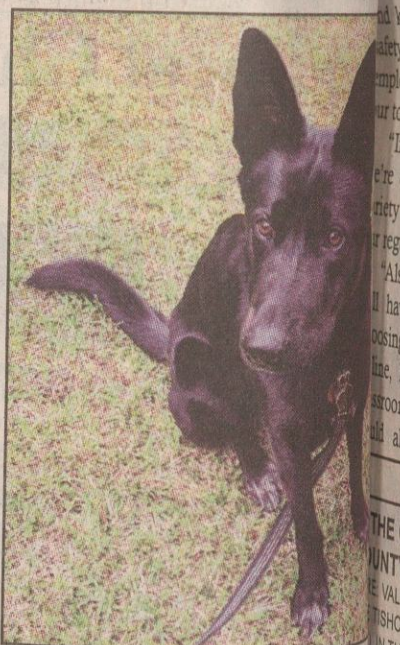

NEVILLE, that students and parents may have about the transmission of COVID-19."

Ford said the possibility of beginning the semester earlier in August in order to finish the week before Thanksgiving is being studied by members of his cabinet.

"We're hearing there could be another spike in cases of the virus toward the end of the year," Ford said. "Typically, we've closed the week of Thanksgiving and we come back for only a week or two before we go on Christmas break."

"We believe we can save our students from another sudden transition from face-to-face to online classes if we start the semester earlier in order to eliminate those last two weeks before the Christmas holidays."

"We would also consider beginning the spring semester in late January or early February order to wrap it up by mid May."

Ford also indicated the college's five dormitories and the cafeteria would be open this fall, however, guidelines issued by the Governor's Office closer to the beginning of August would have to be observed.

As far as athletics are concerned, a decision by the Mississippi Association of Community Colleges will likely come sometime in July.

"We're cautiously optimistic," Ford said. "We have a lot of work to do between now and August, but if the numbers continue to improve and we have the green light from Governor Reeves, we'll be ready."

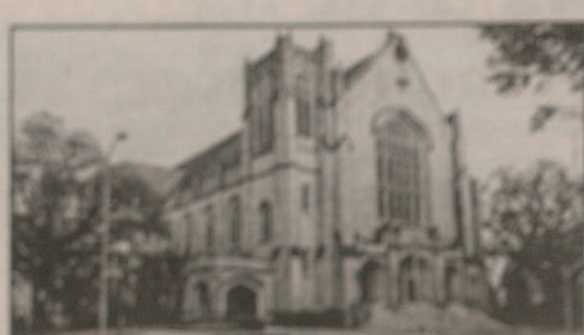
# Wyatt's World

Mississippi is a land of mild winters and long hot summers. Then there is October and April. October is dry and wonderful, but the leaves are falling which gives me a bit of wishfulness. April has the horrible tornadoes, but these are soon followed by an outrageous bursting of new life and gorgeous blue days. Jackson is full of big buildings, some beautiful, some simply functional. But by far, the most beautiful buildings throughout the metro area are our churches. And they are on almost every street corner. It's hard to deny that faith is the fundamental cornerstone of life in Jackson, Mississippi. We are the most religious people in the nation. Nothing is more precious than faith. What good is it to gain the whole world and lose your soul? It is faith which has built our city, our state, our country, indeed, the glorious prosperity we see everywhere in the world. Yes, we have problems. Innumerable minor problems and some pretty big ones. Even epidemics. Does God cause epidemics? No doubt he has the power. He caused plagues in Egypt until Pharaoh let the chosen people free. But God is good, merciful and just. There is plenty of evil in the world caused by unseen forces that we will never comprehend. As Paul said in Ephesians 6:12, "For we wrestle not against flesh and blood, but against principalities, against powers, against the rulers of the darkness of this world, against spiritual wickedness."

in high places." If anyone is to blame, it is us. We fall short in our obedience and our faith. We want to know what only God knows. Indeed, we want to play God, to be God. That is not our place in the universal order. As we go through our most recent crisis, one involving a microscopic virus, it seems to me many of us are forgetting our place in the world. It is though we refuse to accept illness and death as a fundamental part of our existence on earth. The average age of death for COVID-19 victims is 80 years old. Not only is this average life expectancy in the United States, it is an age that we see in the Bible, in Psalm 90. "The days of our years are threescore and ten. And if by reason of strength they be fourscore years, yet it is their strength in labor and sorrow, for it is soon cut off, and we fly away." I am 61 and will soon be 62. My father died of a heart attack at 65. Maybe I will live to be 80, maybe not. That is not my call. As Jesus said, "Every hair on your head is numbered" and worrying won't add "a single hour to your life."

I do know this, as I age, I will die of something. Heart attacks run in my family, so that's a safe bet. Or it could be cancer. Simple pneumonia has long been a deadly killer of the elderly. Every male, if he lives long enough, will get prostate cancer. Human aorta bulge a little bit every year. Live long enough, your aorta is guaranteed to burst. God has planned our obsolescence. For me, that's okay. I'm good with that. There it is, not a single thought or feeling that I have felt



that every other human hasn't thought or felt. We are part of a great body of humanity that goes on forever. That should be enough immortality for anyone. For Christians, there is even more, a promise of a perfected, resurrected body impervious to disease and imperfection. Hard for me to imagine, but I believe. That faith brings me peace. So excuse me if I am untroubled by COVID-19 as I admire the stunning beauty of a Mississippi April day. As a dutiful citizen of the republic, I will don my mask in the grocery store and wash my hands. We have a responsibility to be good stewards. But I don't think for one micro second that I am controlling this process. We ain't dying. Spring is a time of rebirth. There are billions of

young, healthy, vibrant human souls walking the surface of this globe. They are full of energy, ready to embrace life. They have strong healthy immune systems and are chomping at the bit to live their lives. We old people can't hold them back forever, even if we could. And we shouldn't. It is their world now. And what a beautiful thing that is to behold. I read somewhere that fear is prayer to the devil. We can't live in fear. That is not living. That is a living death. Today COVID-19 deaths were the lowest in a month in the U.S. and the world. So wear new masks. Our immune systems, designed by God, know better how to fight this thing than we do. This will all soon pass, as will these precious beautiful April days. The sun will continue to shine.

## Words From The Wisest King Before Jesus (part 66)

It is interesting that the material in these articles, taken from the Book of Ecclesiastes in the Bible and written well over two thousand years ago, still fits modern day situations. The reason for this is that human nature has not basically changed since the fall of Adam. Sin, or even simple folly, may have "changed clothes", but the character of each is still the same. The basic morality of the Bible is the

same in both testaments, although there are laws etc. in the Old Testament that do not necessarily apply to us today, yet we can still learn from those laws. Some people want to discard the Old Testament, at least in the sense of never referring to it, but Romans 15:4 says, "For whatsoever things were written aforetime were written for our learning, that we through patience and hope of the Scriptures might

have hope." Paul wrote this before much of the New Testament was written, and long before its books were accepted by many churches as being God's Word. I am convinced that all 66 books of the Bible are the inspired Word of God, thus I study through the entire Bible on a continual basis.

I gave the information above, because I think we need to understand that human nature has been doing its own thing since the fall of Adam, at least until salvation comes and changes those who receive Christ. Of course, there are many people who are not Christians that still accept the Bible as God's Word, although they have not yet acted on its command to receive Jesus Christ. Ecclesiastes 10:8 continues with some good information that any person in any age can use: "He that diggeth a pit shall fall into it; and whose breaketh an hedge, a serpent shall bite him." One might wonder if Solomon is simply speaking about everyday things that one might do to "spruce up around his place", but it seems there may be more in this verse than that. Pits were often dug as traps for animals, or even sometimes for men, so Solomon may be indicating that one

can fall into the pit that he has dug for someone else. Moreover, the person who "cleaves wood", or anything else, will be endangered by the act. Perhaps there is both a nature and a figurative meaning here, as the context seems to say more, especially when we consider verses 10-11: "If the iron be blunt, and he do not whet the edge, then must he put to more strength: but wisdom is profitable to direct. Surely the serpent will bite without enchantment; and a babbling is no better." Now we see Solomon showing us that he does have more in mind than just natural efforts of work. Dull tools require more effort in using them, and wisdom is also a means of "sharpening" the mental side of life. Then we see that the biting serpent is compared to a "babbling", who is just as dangerous as a poisonous snake. The word "babbling" is also translated: "evil speech, a wedge". So men sometimes drive wedges between others by "babbling", or "evil speech". Some things do not need to be said!

President Sharon Harrell went over the UDC Magazine May program, *MANHATTAN A Southern Sympathizing City*, by Corinne M. Hoch, Historian General.

Manhattan was loyal to the South and was anti-Lincoln mainly because the South was the source of around \$200 million a year to their economy. They feared what the possibility of war would do to their economy.

In 1860 a number of wealthy Southerners made Manhattan their summer home. Manhattan benefited greatly from Southern tourism.

The panic of 1857 affected the North more than the South. Cotton from the South helped steady the World Trade Market. Manhattan became the center of the ready-made cotton clothing industry.

The location of imports and exports became New York's greatest income source for the Government. Annual income was \$65 Million and tariffs on imports were \$24 million.

The South depended on loans from New York banks to see them they trying times such as low market prices and the time it took to ship products.

Cotton was sent to New England Mills to weave into cloth and sent back to New York. The South was paying high tariffs, handling fees and insurance charges to the North. The South was losing \$1.40 on \$1.00.

Manhattan Business Owners and Bankers asked Congress to make peace with the South, they valued and wanted to keep the Southern Trade. The War caused Manhattan to go into financial depression. Many businesses were closed and the Southerners were unable to pay their debts and about 20,000 workers lost their jobs. Manhattan's economy bounced back due to the Government War Spending and items once sent to New Orleans now came to Manhattan. New York also became major exporters of Petroleum. The wartime boom benefited the owners but not the regular workers. This led to workers rioting, drunkenness, thievery and murder. Those who could, fled for their lives, and after 4 days over 50 buildings were burnt, 119 people died and thousands were injured.
