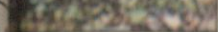

Shiloh National Military Park to Begin Phased Reopening

SHILOH, TN - Following guidance from the White House, Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), and state and local public health authorities, Shiloh National Military Park is increasing recreational access and services. The National Park Service (NPS) is working service-wide with federal, state, and local public health authorities to closely monitor the COVID-19 pandemic and using a phased approach to increase access on a park-by-park basis.

Beginning this Friday, May 29, 2020, Shiloh National Military Park will reopen access to the:

Visitor Center parking area.

Restroom in the parking area.

Picnic area and restroom.

In addition, the following spaces continue to be available:

Shiloh Battlefield, Corinth Battlefield, National Cemetery, Shiloh Indian Mounds National Historic Landmark, trails, tour roads, and the Corinth Contraband Camp.

With public health in mind, the following facilities remain closed at this time:

Visitor Center and the Corinth Interpretive Center

"The health and safety of our visitors, employees, volunteers, and partners continues to be paramount. At Shiloh, our operational approach is to examine each facility function and

service provided to ensure those operations comply with current public health guidance, and will regularly monitored," said Acting Superintendent Randy Martin. "We continue to work closely with the NPS Office of Public Health using CDC guidance to ensure public areas and workspaces are safe and clean for visitors, employees, partners, and volunteers."

While these areas are accessible for visitors to enjoy, a return to full operations will continue to be phased and services may be limited. When recreating follow local area health orders, practice Leave No Trace principles, avoid crowding and avoid high-risk outdoor activities.

Wyatt's World

Em ARKANSAS GOVERNOR Asa Hutchinson early April questioned the effectiveness of a shelter-in-place order. He said, "The question is, 'Are you accomplishing anything by doing that order?'"

On all the website scoreboards rating states on their COVID-19 response, Arkansas was consistently the bottom with "F" ratings.

Yet Arkansas is doing much better than its neighbors with far fewer COVID-19 deaths per residents.

Arkansas is not the exception. Seven other states never issued shelter-in-place orders. These states are experiencing half the death rate of the states that did shut down.

There are millions of factors that can skew the results. But it is significant nonetheless.

Most people think astrophysicists understand everything about the universe. Not true. They understand a tiny fraction. Ninety-five percent of the universe is composed of dark matter and dark energy. What? We have no earthly idea.

Likewise, we probably understand, at best, a tiny fraction about the world of viruses, 380 billion which inhabit the average human body.

The entire world is engaged in a global experiment. The experts are guessing and disagreeing on one another.

The scientific method involves making a hypothesis and then testing the results. If the results disprove the hypothesis, then maybe the hypothesis is wrong.

Hypothesis: If we don't shelter at home, more people will die. Result: Fewer people died, the hypothesis was not anticipated. Conclusion: The hypothesis was flawed.

I finally got my teeth cleaned at my periodontist (And finally managed to get a haircut, too.)

My periodontist deals in the world of germs. He told him his thoughts on sheltering at home. He said that it would weaken our immune systems and make us more vulnerable to infections later on. Your immune system is like a muscle, he said, if you don't exercise it, it weakens.

I asked another doctor friend about sheltering at home. He's one of the smartest guys I know. He thought it was a good idea.

There's no way you're not going to get infected with the virus, he said, but social distancing will reduce the number of particles you contract, giving your body time to fend it off and develop resistance. He called it inoculation. The thing to avoid is the big crowd, an infected individual right in your face. That's the danger.

In the old days, smallpox was such a killer that people would intentionally infect themselves in a small way. It was a crude form of self-vaccination. That's what's happening now throughout the world. People are trying to develop resistance to avoid getting infected.

We know this, death rates are dropping in Italy, Spain and throughout Europe. Something is helping the virus. Maybe isolation, maybe better medical care, maybe something else.

RUSSIA AND BRAZIL are seeing skyrocketing infection rates, but the death rate is a tiny fraction of what Spain and Italy experienced. Hypothesis: The virus is mutating and becoming less deadly. Maybe.

Grocery store sales are up 30 percent. We're at least half, maybe 95 percent, of those infected with the virus have no symptoms. The virus can be on metal and plastic. The virus is everywhere. Grocery stores.

Hypothesis: Grocery store workers must be infected by COVID-19 at a very high rate. But they're not.

The United Food and Commercial Workers union representing 900,000 grocery store workers reported 30 deaths. That's 33 deaths per million compared to the national COVID-19 death average of 288 per million. Working at a grocery store makes you safer. What are we to conclude from this?

The state of Tennessee tested 5,000 people for COVID-19. One-third tested positive. Ninety percent of those infected had no symptoms. We can conclude from this?

A reader emailed me chastising me for not listening to the experts. "Would you operate on your tumor," he asked?

In fact, I am an expert. I am an expert with 46 years experience. I know nothing myself. I rely on the reports of others. The reports show that the experts disagree in unknown territory. It's a big science experiment in unknown territory. It's a big science experiment.

So let's observe and not be biased. Let's use the scientific method and learn.

choice" if we would seek to learn as much as we can from this book, as well as from the rest of the Bible. The speech of mankind has been a problem since the fall of Adam, for even Adam himself used words to blame Eve for his sin! Solomon tells us that wise men speak with grace. The Hebrew word for "gracious" means: "kindness, favor, pleasant, precious". Yes, there are times

that we must speak in a straightforward manner, but even then we do not really have to be unkind. Most of us would like to be considered at least somewhat wise in at least some things, so if we display wisdom in our speech, we will speak graciously. It is the fool whose lips swallow up the fool himself. The guarding of the tongue is perhaps the hardest job a man, even a believer,

can do (James 3:2-12). When the fool opens his mouth, he begins his speech with the foolishness that is in his heart, and those words end in calamity and folly.

The fool pours out words, but he does not know what is coming, or when it is coming, so he needs to keep his mouth shut. (Some "prophecy preachers" have been about this foolish, for I have heard predictions about the coming of Jesus, with dates, or approximate dates, set for the occasion, but they do not know! There is too much Scripture that can be plainly understood for any of us to go off

on tangents and guesses!) If we look closely at what the Bible says, even Jesus did not know the time of His coming back, at least not when He was on earth. (I am not off my subject, for I am writing about the words of those who are foolish.) Mark 13:32 gives Jesus' words on His coming back: "But of that day and hour knoweth no man, no, not the angels which are in heaven, neither the Son, but the Father." Jesus said that only the Father knew the day of His second coming to earth. Jesus likely knows now, since He is back in heaven. My point is that we have

many people giving the words of foolishness and selling books that contain their words as to when Jesus will come back to earth. Those people are fitting into the pattern that we have in our verses above, for they do not know when Jesus will come again. There is even a rambling about the present time in our world and the virus, but there is no biblical teaching that points out this virus. The Bible does say that things will get worse toward the end of time, but we have no way of putting a time frame on this.

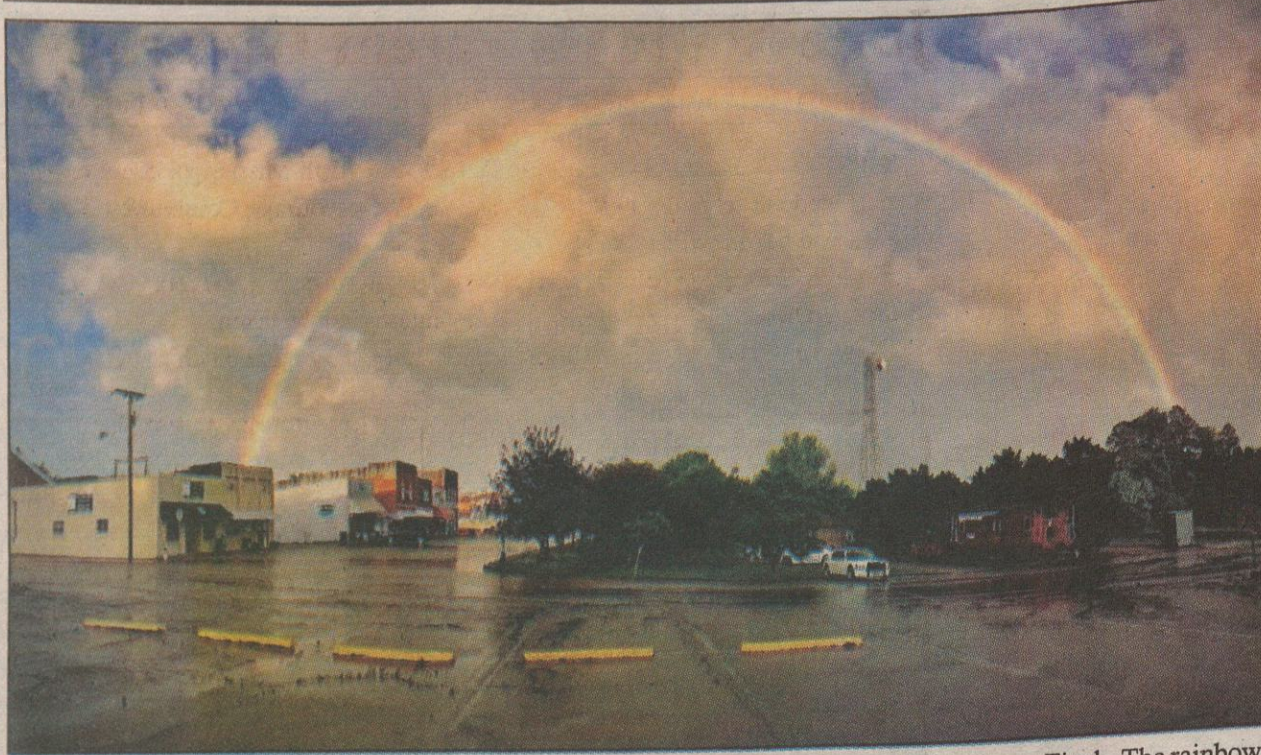
