Tishomingo County has have tested positive for COV-ID-19.

> The numbers which are available online show Tishomingo County as having 83 cases as of July 5th and one death. This number includes those affected from the beginning of the outbreak and while an increase in the number of cases is shown it is important to remember that many individuals have recovered without major complications.

The death reported in Tishovorkers and elected officials mingo County occurred several weeks ago according to Tishomingo County Coroner Mack Wilemon, the individual was a 90 year old man in the south end of the county who had many other health problems which were made worse by the virus.

Social distancing, frequent hand washing, and protective masks are necessary precautions recommended to help prevent the spread of the virus. Selfquarantine is also necessary if you are waiting on test results for coronavirus.

the Life of Tishomingo Man

On Friday, July 3rd 2020 at approximately 3:57 p.m. the Mississippi Highway Patrol responded to a fatal traffic crash on MS 25 in Tishomingo County. Robert J. Foster, 50 of Tishomingo was pronounced dead on the scene of the three vehicle ac-

The wreck occurred south of Tishomingo around a 1/4 of a mile from the Natchez Trace Bridge on Highway 25 according to Deputy Coroner James Rich. A 2015 Ford pickup driven by Danny R. Hester, 59, of Tuscumbia, AL was traveling northbound on MS Highway 25. A 2015 Buick Verano was following behind Hester, driven by Hunter C. Musgrave, 20, of Dennis, MS. Robert J. Foster was driving a 1998 Jeep SUV traveling southbound on Highway 25 and entered into the northbound lane colliding with the Ford pickup. After impact, the Buick Verano collided with the rear of Ford pickup. Foster received fatal injuries during the



crash and was pronounced lead on scene. Family members of Foster believe that a malfunction of the vehicle may have occurred causing him to swerve into the oncoming traffic. See obit on page 4.

Any elected official or county employee who is tested for the COVID 19 virus will not be allowed to return to work until results are received. If the results are positive the individual will not be allowed to return to work until after a 14 day quarantine beginning on the date which the positive test results are received.

These ers think we can just run right over pick up their dogs/cats (I have been on numerous occasions to, "come my dog right now"): We don't have elter and we are not animal control ve just can't come immediately to pick he dogs. We have to share our dogs h other rescues in order to find great hes for them. This can take days or weeks so we need the communihelp to keep the dogs safe and secure I we can get them. Rescues here in south are covered over and there is reason for this. When you get a pet a life long commitment just like our dren. Do you leave your children outside? Or do you send them out door to roam the neighborhood to get by a car or hurt in some other way? gs/cats are like children, or should be our children. They are not throw-

aways. God did not create them to be abused and neglected.

Then there is the problem of not spaying or neutering. Not everyone thinks your "Princess" is the cutest dog/ cat ever and wants one of her babies. We daily get calls stating, "I kept my dog/cat up but.....". NO ONE WANTS YOUR PUPPIES/KITTIES!! Or they may take your babies because puppies and kittens are so cute and the abuse/neglect cycle begins again.

We have a low cost spay/neuter program in Tishomingo County to help you with the cost of having your dog/cat fixed. Contact us and we will be more than happy to send you the information

and it is easy to do. It is illegal to have a dog outside without adequate shelter, food and water. This is a State of Mississippi law and EVERYONE must abide by this, even the City of Iuka. We are looking and watching for this because it is so dangerous to animals especially in the summertime. Those of you who live in the south half of the county have Chiefs of Police who actively enforce the animal laws. They do and will ticket you for not complying with the laws. If you want the laws followed in the northern half contact your Chief of Police, your Mayor and the Sheriff. We need these laws enforced here, also.

If you see something, say something. You can call the rescue at 662.660.3366.

When we get injured animals we have them vetted so they are well again. We do not put animals down unless it is impossible to give them a quality life. We have saved many lives!! For the first six months of 2020, I am so proud to say that we have helped 226 dogs, puppies, cats and kittens. This many in just six months!! We have vetted these animals or maybe just transported them to other rescues but they have come through our rescue. We have spent \$8,194.74 in vetting only. Tishomingo County, you are to be praised for providing all the donations in order for us to accomplish this!! You are the best!! You continuously donate monies, dog food and other needed items.




Fireworks in Cherokee



Tishomingo County Community Coalition Launches New Initiative to Decrease Opio Overdose Deaths in Tishomingo County

Organization Received \$52,486 to Implement Data-Driven Approaches to Prevent Opioid Use Disorders and Overdose

Tishomingo County Community Coalition recently received funding from the Mississippi Public Health Institute (MS-PHI) to launch an effort to prevent opioid use disorders and overdose death in Tishomingo County. The grant will be used to hire prevention staff, conduct a county-wide survey and educate local businesses about opioid use and overdose prevention.

The project is a part of a statewide effort led by MSPHI and the Mississippi State Department of Health (MSDH). MS-PHI and MSDH received funding from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) to

spearhead the Overdose and implement innova-Data to Action (OD2A) initiative in Mississippi. The three-year program MSPHI will disseminate aims to strengthen opioid this data to community sures by collecting and sharing informative data with a wide range of state partners working together to combat the opioid epidemic in the state.

The Coalition is committed to all stages of recovery but also to preventing youth from ever starting to use illegal substances. In the state of Mississippi in 2018, there were 76.8 opiod prescriptions prescribed to 100 persons. In Tishomingo County the number was much higher with 133.7 per 100 persons.

MSDH will collect emergency department data on suspected overdoses and overdose deaths

tive surveillance activities to support interventions. partners and stakeholders and will then provide subject matter expertise to assist in the establishment of local interventions.

Mississippi is one of 47 states to receive funding from the CDC for the OD2A initiative. This initiative supports efforts by state, territorial, county, and city health departments to obtain comprehensive and high quality data on overdose morbidity and mortality. With this data, health departments, other government agencies, and partners can inform prevention and response efforts that range from strengthening prescription drug monitoring programs to improving







has clusters of white or pink cherished a large shrubby flowers and can be pruned hard to keep it in bounds (it flowers on new growth); it has several smaller hybrids with variegated or golden leaves, and a Chinese species with much larger flower clusters. All are tough enough to grow unassisted in cemeteries.

Her butterfly (Buddleia) was as good an attractor as any, but I was taught to regularly break off faded flower stems to kickstart new flowering growth.

I wish highly-touted summer-flowering hydrangeas lived up to their hype, but even Endless Summer, which flowers nearly all summer up north and in England, shuts down in the heat and drought of our torrid summers; to get them to rebloom, water - a lot. Or grow in containers like most of us do Chinese hibiscus, where they get regular feeding and watering.

Another great potted flowering shrub in my grandmother's South Mississippi garden was the old-fashioned but freezesensitive "yesterday, today, and tomorrow" (Brunfelsia). Its flat flowers open as deep violet but gradually fade over three days to lavender and then white, so it always has some of each. You can gamble on it in central and north Mississippi by planting in light shade in a protected corner away from harsh winter winds. Ditto for the unusual red bottlebrush shrub which can freeze in the northern third of the state if we ever have a normal winter.

Had it been available decades ago I'm sure my grandmother would have

flowering shrubs. But even if those failed, I still have Little Gem magnolia, which colorful glass bottle trees to flowers nonstop up until a freeze in the fall. And I give me summer shrub color. might have shared a rooted leaf pad from my summer-

flowering prickly pear cactus; my favorite is a cold hardy thornless species. Though not technically woody bushes, I still consider to keep spirits up - without large perennial lantanas having to actually go outside and ornamental grasses as and fuss with them.

Main thing is, my garden club grandmother proved that we can enjoy more than a double handful of dependable shrubs that flower into the Dog Days



Upon resuming business in June and while working to finish the session, lawmakers began discussing how to remove the current Mississippi state flag. The flag was chosen in 1894 by the Legislature and bore a Confederate battle emblem. Because it was so late in the session, a resolution calling for a suspension of the rules voted on by a two-thirds majority was required to introduce a bill that would remove the flag.

After weeks of discussion and mounting pressure from both citizens and organizations, House Concurrent Resoarents orts passed with little lution 79 was introduced on Saturday, June 27. After passionate floor debate and a bipartisan effort, HCR 79 passed the House by a vote of 84-25, and subsequently was passed by the Senate. On Sunday, June 28, House Bill 1796 was introduced removing the current flag and establishing a commission to create a new flag. The commission will be comprised of nine members chosen



by the Governor, Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House. The flag chosen by the commission will then be placed on the ballot in November for citizens to approve. HB 1796 passed the House by a vote of 92-23, passed the Senate by a vote of 37-14 and was signed into law by Governor Tate Reeves on Tuesday, June 30.

On Wednesday, July 1, a ceremony was held to retire the 1894 state Legislators, staff, members of the media and visitors watched as the flags at the Capitol were raised and then lowered for the last time. Members of the Mississippi National Guard and the Mississippi Highway Patrol Honor Guard presented the flags to Speaker Philip Gunn, Lieutenant Governor Delbert Hosemann and Mississippi Department of Archives and History Director Katie Blount. Speaker Gunn, Lt. Governor Hosemann and Director Blount then escorted the flags to the Museum of Mississippi History and the Mississippi Civil Rights Museum.




