The Tishomingo County Sheriff's Office announces that Felix Gonzalo Perez-Carrillo has been extradited back to Tishomingo County from Crittenden County Jail in West Memphis, Arkansas, where he was being held on arrests warrants from the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Office. Investigators state that evidence at the scene suggests that this was a violent attack on the victim and family.

Felix Gonzalo Perez-Carrillo, 28-year old, Hispanic male of 400 5th Street Iuka, MS was officially charged with burglary of dwelling

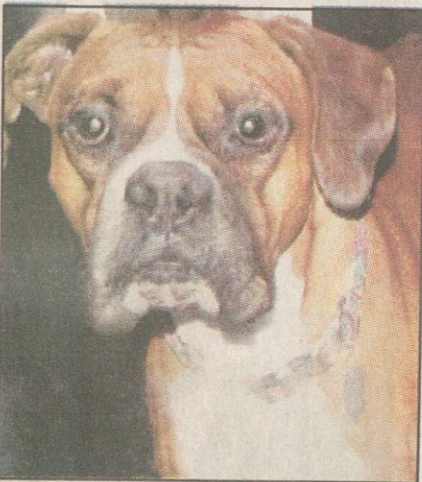
and aggravated assault with extreme indifference to human life. Perez-Carrillo's bond was set by the Tishomingo County Court at \$250,000.

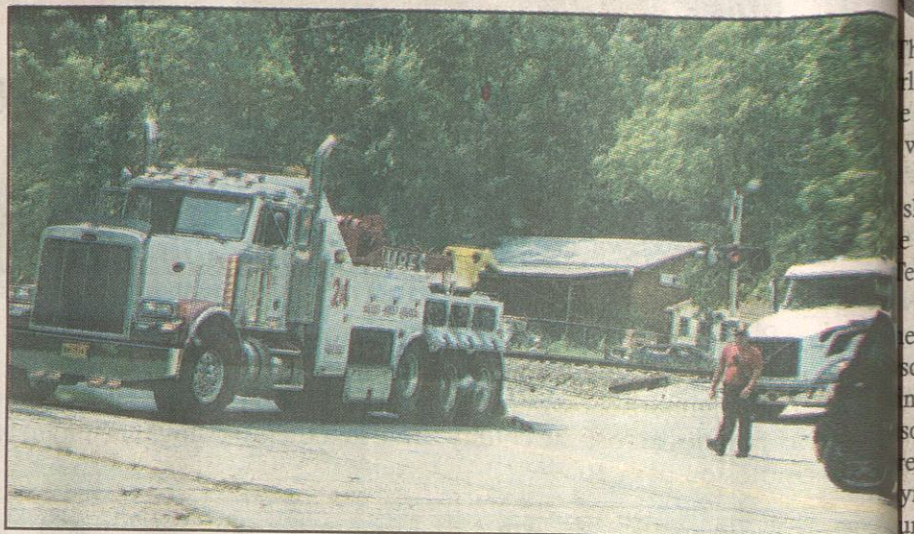

## Tishomingo County Community Coalition Launches New Initiative to Decrease Opioid Overdose Deaths in Tishomingo County

Organization Received \$52,486 to Implement Data-Driven Approaches to Prevent Opioid Use Disorders and Overdose

Tishomingo County Community Coalition recently received funding from the Mississippi Public Health Institute (MSPHI) to launch an effort to prevent opioid use disorders and overdose death in Tishomingo County. The grant will be used to hire prevention staff, conduct a county-wide survey and educate local businesses about opioid use and overdose prevention.

The project is a part of a statewide effort led by MSPHI and the Mississippi State Department of Health (MSDH). MSPHI and MSDH received funding from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) to

spearhead the Overdose Death to Action (OD2A) initiative in Mississippi. The three-year program aims to strengthen opioid overdose prevention measures by collecting and sharing informative data with a wide range of state partners working together to combat the opioid epidemic in the state.

The Coalition is committed to all stages of recovery but also to preventing youth from ever starting. Use of illegal substances. In the state of Mississippi in 2018, there were 76.8 opioid prescriptions prescribed to 100 persons. In Tishomingo County the number was much higher with 133.7 per 100 persons.

MSDH will collect emergency department data on suspected overdoses and overdose deaths

and implement innovative surveillance activities to support interventions. MSPHI will disseminate this data to community partners and stakeholders and will then provide subject matter expertise to assist in the establishment of local interventions.

Mississippi is one of 47 states to receive funding from the CDC for the OD2A initiative. This initiative supports efforts by state, territorial, county, and city health departments to obtain comprehensive and high quality data on overdose morbidity and mortality. With this data, health departments, other government agencies, and partners can inform prevention and response efforts that range from strengthening prescription drug monitoring programs to improving

partnerships with law enforcement and first responders.

According to recent CDC data, rates involving overdose deaths involving opioids decreased by 4 percent and 13.5 percent respectively. However, that death rate increased by 10 percent from 2017 to 2018. Mississippi's drug death rate slightly from 2018 based on data from the United Health Services America's Rankings, and MSDH shows that more than half of drug deaths in Mississippi are caused by prescription opioids, fentanyl, and heroin.

chronic diseases," according to Juquila Madkin, Nutrition Specialist with the Mississippi State University Extension Service. "We know that being active and eating healthier can reduce the risk of chronic disease and can also help people who already have chronic conditions like high blood pressure and diabetes manage those better."

The Walk-a-Weigh Program will begin Au-

gust 3 and will be conducted on Facebook. Each week a class will be presented via Facebook Live or posted as a recorded program. Throughout each week there will be tips, recipes, challenges, and other fun activities posted to the Facebook Group. Classes will meet weekly through September 11. They will be led by various Extension Agents in the Northeast Region.

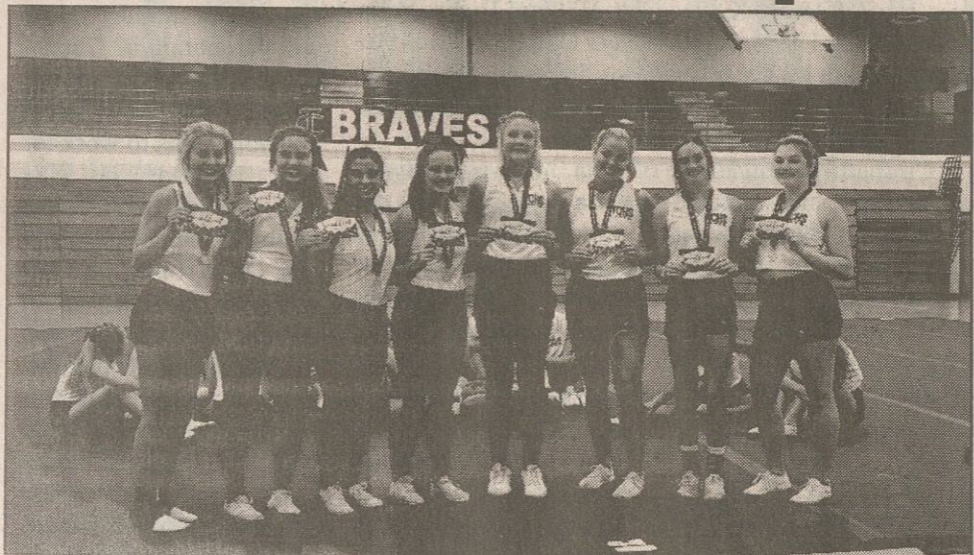


## TCHS Cheerleaders Camp

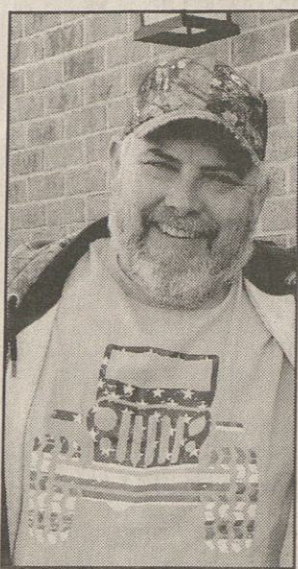

Yet by some strange process it seems that at least some of this "bread" comes back to us, much like the matter of sowing and reaping. The truth being taught is that we should not be afraid of

losing what "bread" we have, so that we fail to "cast it upon the waters". The "waters" here are likely another way of saying that our good words and works should be broadcast in a wide range effort to reach as many others as possible. It is interesting to sometimes hear people say things that we have said to them perhaps years ago, but the fruit from those efforts may not have

come in for many days, weeks or years.

We are also admonished by Solomon in Ecclesiastes to give a portion of what we have to others, even to seven or eight, because we do not know what evil may come upon the earth and to us personally. The idea here seems to be that we should be as generous toward as many others as we can, because we may be in a similar spot someday and need the help of even those whom we have helped. Please be mindful of the fact that God does not expect us to "trow our money to the wind" but helping every drug addict or drunkard who asks

for "a couple of dollars to buy some milk", for the money given to such people will not likely go for milk! It is not right for any of us to deprive our own families in order to help those who are unwilling to help themselves. Yes, there will be some exceptions to this rule, for some of those people who have had problems with drugs or alcohol will turn from the habits and seek to do well. We have to weigh every situation and then pray to our Father for wisdom. The main lesson Solomon is giving is that we should not be selfish, or suppose that everyone who needs help is a bum. More-

over, it is true that not all people have the same advantages in life, for some come from backgrounds of poverty, or ill health, and have not had a good opportunity to "get ahead in life". Compassion is the thing that we need to learn, so that we do not "sit high on our pedestals, while neglecting those who really need and deserve help. ## What to do when the hydrangeas stop flowering by July?

### Reider Rushing

I write a lot about the generation family men who influenced my gardening approach, but I haven't given enough props to my dad's mom, a prime club flower judge who killed an appreciation for gardening for ideals. Her books on blue ribbons were proof of attention to detail and gardening by group rules can be so off.

But she also had some unusual shrubs in her Comb garden, many of which used to be more widely known but gradually fell out of favor. One thing she has emphasized is that it's good to have dependable summer flowering shrubs for when other plants were too hard to tend in our suffocating humidity.

What was raised with many familiar ones, including roses, crape myrtles, hydrangeas, and uber-fragrant geranias whose scent, drawn from Mam-maw's stubbornly airconditioned house, would make us kids nearly swoon on sultry summer nights. Still turns me a bit

She also had several different althaea, a below-hardy hibiscus often called rose of Sharon because native to the biblical times of Sharon. One was white with a splash of pink, one was deep rose pink, the other was lilac purple. I used to catch bumblebees on the old flowers.

As a child I learned that her Abelia was the shrub for butterflies and hummingbirds; I don't know of another that has many pollinators. Abelia

has clusters of white or pink flowers and can be pruned hard to keep it in bounds (it flowers on new growth); it has several smaller hybrids with variegated or golden leaves, and a Chinese species with much larger flower clusters. All are tough enough to grow unassisted in cemeteries.

Her butterfly bush (Buddleia) was as good an attractor as any, but I was taught to regularly break off faded flower stems to kick-start new flowering growth.

I wish highly-touted summer-flowering hydrangeas lived up to their hype, but even Endless Summer, which flowers nearly all summer up north and in England, shuts down in the heat and drought of our torrid summers; to get them to rebloom, water – a lot. Or grow in containers like most of us do Chinese hibiscus, where they get regular feeding and watering.

Another great potted flowering shrub in my grandmother's South Mississippi garden was the old-fashioned but freeze-sensitive "yesterday, today, and tomorrow" (Brunfelsia). Its flat flowers open as deep violet but gradually fade over three days to lavender and then white, so it always has some of each. You can gamble on it in central and north Mississippi by planting in light shade in a protected corner away from harsh winter winds. Ditto for the unusual red bottlebrush shrub which can freeze in the northern third of the state if we ever have a normal winter.

Had it been available decades ago I'm sure my grandmother would have

cherished a large shrubby Little Gem magnolia, which flowers nonstop up until a freeze in the fall. And I might have shared a rooted leaf pad from my summer-flowering prickly pear cactus; my favorite is a cold hardy thornless species.

Though not technically woody bushes, I still consider large perennial lantanas and ornamental grasses as

flowering shrubs. But even if those failed, I still have colorful glass bottle trees to give me summer shrub color.

Main thing is, my garden club grandmother proved that we can enjoy more than a double handful of dependable shrubs that flower into the Dog Days to keep spirits up - without having to actually go outside and fuss with them.

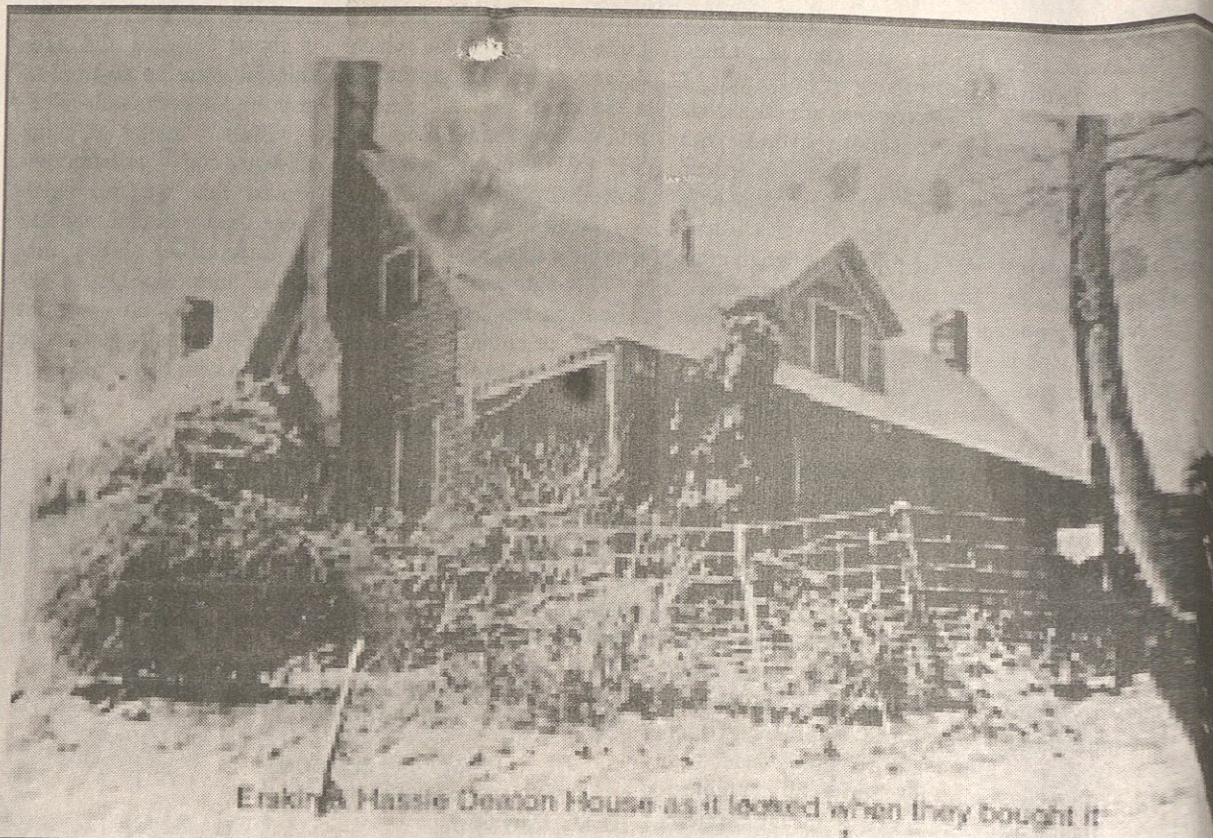

## Legislative Report State Retires Flag

Weeks of June 22 and 2020

Lawmakers at the Capitol have had an extremely busy last two weeks. After many hours working in conference committees to finalize the state budget and other bills, legislators completed their regular session on Thursday, July 2. The Legislature could not meet back in October or before if needed as laid out in House Concurrent Resolution 69, which ended session and allowed for more flexible deadlines for COVID-19 related legislation.

Over the course of two weeks, representatives introduced conference reports, which are to be adopted by both houses before being sent to the governor. Because these bills had been discussed and amended throughout the entire session, most conference reports passed with little debate.

Several COVID-19 bills were taken up and passed. The bills addressed a variety of topics related to the pandemic: distance learning K-12 public schools (Senate Bill 3044), the Mississippi Back-to-Business Liability Assurance (Senate Bill 3049), additional money from Broadband Availability Grant Program Fund

to the Mississippi Department of Education (House Bill 1797), and appropriations to the Department of Employment Security (House Bill 1795) are a few examples of these bills.

Upon resuming business in June and while working to finish the session, lawmakers began discussing how to remove the current Mississippi state flag. The flag was chosen in 1894 by the Legislature and bore a Confederate battle emblem. Because it was so late in the session, a resolution calling for a suspension of the rules voted on by a two-thirds majority was required to introduce a bill that would remove the flag.

After weeks of discussion and mounting pressure from both citizens and organizations, House Concurrent Resolution 79 was introduced on Saturday, June 27. After passionate floor debate and a bipartisan effort, HCR 79 passed the House by a vote of 84-25, and subsequently was passed by the Senate. On Sunday, June 28, House Bill 1796 was introduced removing the current flag and establishing a commission to create a new flag. The commission will be comprised of nine members chosen



by the Governor, Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House. The flag chosen by the commission will then be placed on the ballot in November for citizens to approve. HB 1796 passed the House by a vote of 92-23, passed the Senate by a vote of 37-14 and was signed into law by Governor Tate Reeves on Tuesday, June 30.

On Wednesday, July 1, a ceremony was held to retire the 1894 state flag. Legislators, staff, members of the media and visitors watched as the flags at the Capitol were raised and then lowered for the last time. Members of the Mississippi National Guard and the Mississippi Highway Patrol Honor Guard presented the flags to Speaker Philip Gunn, Lieutenant Governor Delbert Hosemann and Mississippi Department of Archives and History Director Katie Blount. Speaker Gunn, Lt. Governor Hosemann and Director Blount then escorted the flags to the Museum of Mississippi History and the Mississippi Civil Rights Museum.

This breaks the school record for most MACJC Academic All-State recipients. The previous mark of 40 was originally set during the 2016-17 campaign and was matched just one year ago.

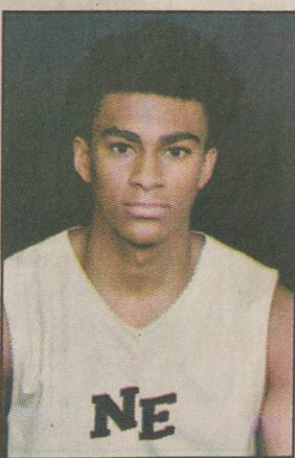
"We are very excited about the outstanding number of student-athletes that received recognition," said Northeast athletic

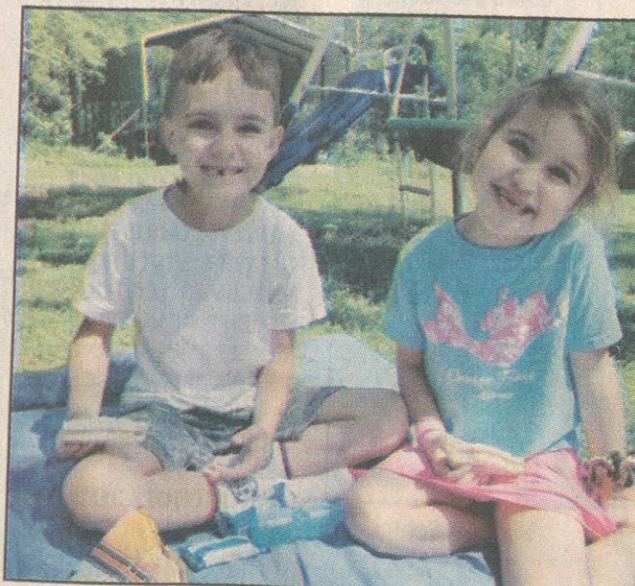
