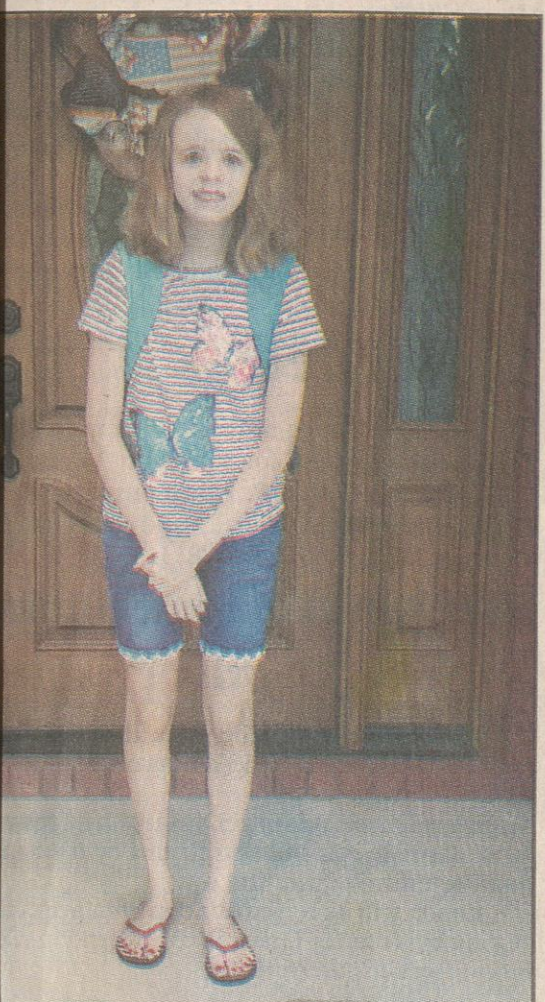

I Remember

Today I'm sharing a little history of the Boggs Chapel School. This has come from earlier stories many years ago.

Ila Tucker Trimm had an article in the Tishomingo County News/Vidette several years ago. I know I have had the clipping in some of my scraps, but I could not locate it. I called one of my former students who lives in Gallatin, TN. I was almost sure he would have the clipping. He did, made me a copy of the article, and sent it to me. Thanks Claude Denton Humber.

Digress: Claude Denton has sent me several books as well as CD's from Bobby Denton a 37 year Senator from Alabama who returned to his first love, picking and singing-mostly hymns after retirement.

Boggs Chapel

Mrs. Trimm was raised by her parents George and Mary Tucker in the Boggs Chapel community. She had contacted many (now gone) and I believe the history is fairly correct

In the early 1900, the Earnest Ligon family moved from Russellville, AL to the Boggs Chapel area. He lived about a mile from the school and was its first teacher. The Dawson's had lived in this area many years before. He sold his land to the Johnsons who had been uprooted by the building of the Pickwick Dam. The Johnsons had two daughters and a son. The daughters married an Allen House and a Milton Scruggs.

There was a Pace school with a large attendance. This school closed and the students went to Bethlehem and Boggs Chapel. They probably had school in the churches until the schools could be built. Boggs Chapel was a two room building.

Mr. Earnest Ligon was the first teacher. Others were: Miss Scott, Miss Williams, Dixie Massey, Bonnie Bickerstaff, Ollie Selby, Ruth Massey, Flora Wynn Humber, Lester Browning, Kern Belue, Alver Belue, Oadia Humber, Olene Rickard, Ila Tucker Trimm, who taught from 1938-1943. Ila had perfect attendance for these five years.

It was during this time that the schools went from 5 months to 8 months. Also, during this time students began receiving free textbooks. "What a relief for parents."

Teachers following Miss Ila in 1943 were Miss Beatrice Joslin, Audie House, Ruth Dawson, Jean Deaton Luttrell and Bonnie Sue Crane Williams. Ruth Dawson taught more years in succession than anyone from 1945- 1952. Bonnie Sue Crane Williams was



teaching the year the school closed.

"It would be impossible to name all the students, but Miss Lessie Humber Deaton was in one of the first classes. Other family names were: Owens, Ligon, Twitty, Massey, Fredrick, Rutherford, Searcy, Luttrell, Tucker, Bryant, Epps, Belue, Cadle, Borden, Anglin, Dawson, Strickland, Buchanan, Puckett, Deaton, House, Scruggs, Hill, McKee, Cox, Meeks, Floyd, South, Moore, Turner, McVay, Flanagan, Davis, Pannell, Henderson."

I began my second year teaching at Boggs Chapel at age 20, in 1945, and taught until 1952. I did my directed teaching under Dr. Falls and a Dr. Wilson. We did lots of projects. We built bird houses, we built the bread mold (spores) experiment, remember polio was rampant at this time? We did shadows showing how the earth rotated around the sun. Dr. Falls would keep my students spell-bound when he came. He didn't observe me teaching, except I would complete whatever I was teaching when he came in. Then I would recognize him and he just loved to share with my students from first through eighth grade.

I started not to take my directed teaching courses (6 hours) because I taught in a one-teacher school. The one-teacher schools were almost non-existent by then. I didn't know how the professors would grade me in this situation.

I really was surprised. They were happy to come to my school.

When we all went back to MS State in the spring for our class certification Dr. Fall said to the class, "I saw more learning going on in a little one-

teacher school than I saw anywhere in the state."

I was so proud. I knew he was talking about Ruth Dawson because I was the only teacher teaching in a one-teacher school. I was so proud I had decided to take this class so I could graduate in the spring of 1953. I no longer felt inferior to the teachers from the larger schools. God has blessed me for staying at this little school until the four students graduated in 1952. I graduated when they did and went to the larger schools.

Today as I look back on more than 40 years teaching I believe there are advantages to both systems, and I'm proud of my tenure at Boggs Chapel School.

I will close by sharing a silly stupid thing I did. Some of the students would knock on the door and when I opened the door they would jump at me and say "Boo!"

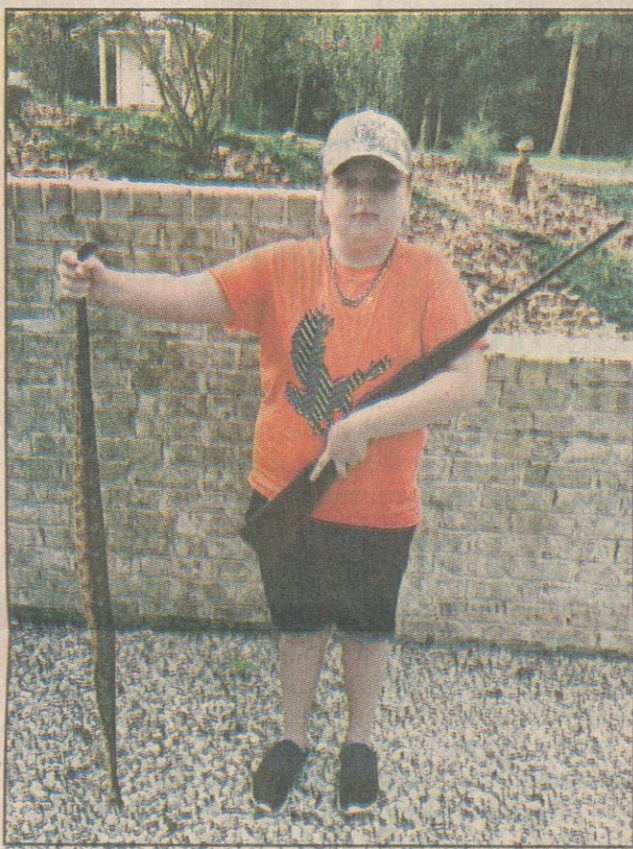
One day a knock came and I had a smart idea of stopping these bothersome tricks. I quietly went to answer. I opened the door, quickly jumped and said "BOOOO!" it scared the young man nearly to death and "Oh!

How embarrassed I was!" I never did that again. I learned to just laugh at these antics and revel in the fact that these students were not afraid to have fun at their teachers expense.

Later, I will write about some of the things we did that still stands out in my memory. I got to wear several different badges. I was the teacher, the doctor, the principal, the nurse, the judge, the referee, the coach, the custodian, and a special ball player. I was part of the team.

We had so much fun. I was young enough to be part of the team that chose me.

Every year nearly, I'd lose an eighth grader. The first year I lost three: Jean Deaton Luttrell, Helen Hill Rogers, Jerry House. The following year Eva Mae Strickland, Gladys Ruth Humber Wright. The last year I taught there, 1951-1952, I lost 4. Freeman Floyde, Earlene House Messner, Claude Denton Humber, and Verlene Scruggs. When this group graduated, I did, too. Two of these are still living and keep in touch with me. What a blessing. They remember.



Big, Bad Snake!

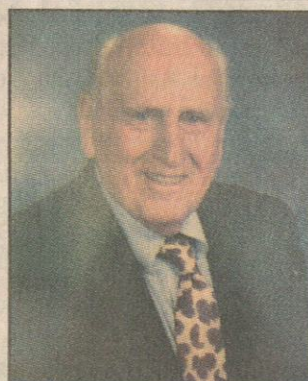

Paul Whitlock is Elected Angus Delegate to 137th Annual Meeting

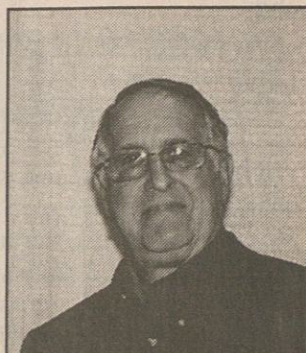

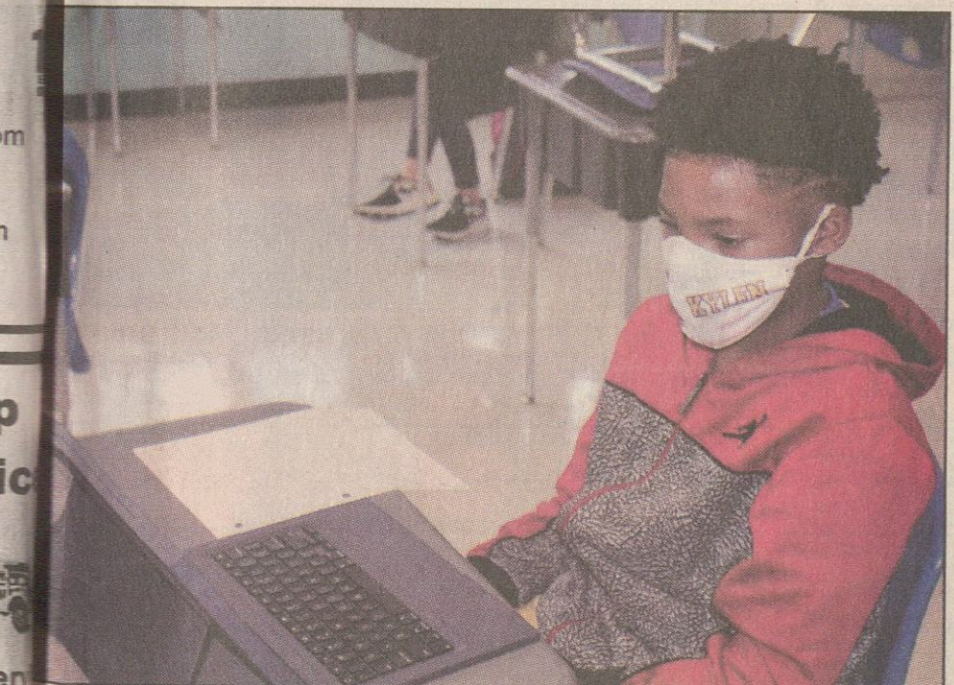

NAMES NEMCC AS ONE OF THE BEST COLLEGES FOR TRANSFER GPA

ONEVILLE Northeast Mississippi Community College is being the top community college in its students for workforce and now the Institute of Higher Learning in Mississippi have the Booneville-based as one of the top community colleges in the preparing its students at public four-year universities in Mississippi.

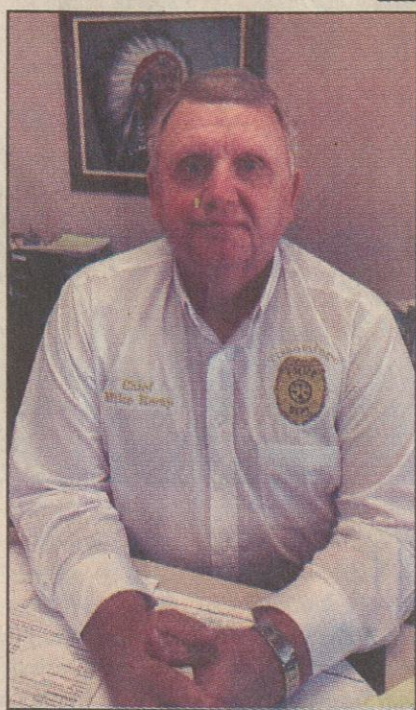

Where is this house?

It's on North Pearl Street in Iuka, MS. It was the home of James H. Dunahoo and Dollie Ann McMasters Dunahoo.

Built between 1900 and 1910, this home was built by the owner, James H. Dunahoo. His occupation being that of a carpenter, he also helped build other structures in the Iuka area, specifically the Iuka Pentecostal Church.

James (or Jimmy as he was known) was the son of James and Elizabeth Dunahoo who

came from Tennessee. He married Dollie Ann McMasters in 1892 in Tishomingo County. Dollie was a school teacher and also was appointed as Postmistress of Burnsville in 1889.

This home holds a special place in my heart as this was the home where my parents (Cecil & Lillian McMasters Phifer) and I lived until my mother's death in 1958. Aunt Dollie was Mother's aunt (Mother's father was David McMasters, brother to Dollie). As many of the day, the home was divided down the middle

with a hallway. We lived on the right and Aunt Dollie lived on the left. I never knew Uncle Jimmy as he died in 1943. They had no children. She had a pump organ that she taught me to play "I'll Fly Away" on and she had a big old trunk that held many of her gifts from her students. It has an upstairs and I loved to pilfer up there. My friends, Diane Cutshall (Biddle) and Gene Johnson (who lived across the street) played many hours in this house and yard. There was (and still is) a flower house where the

plants were stored in the winter. There used to be a barn there too but has been since torn down.

Aunt Jewel McMasters told me that several of the family that lived in the county (North Crossroads area) who were sick stayed there because it was near the doctor. Aunt Dollie died in 1962 and the house was sold.

Dollie was the daughter of Alexander Uriah McMasters and Sarah Adelaine Dozen Cole. I'll write more on the McMasters and Cole families later.

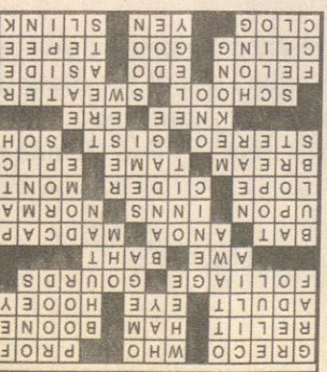
