common plant's longago folk name. After all, this was just when plants were first being given standardized names by a guy named Linnaeus, when hostas were also called funkias.

Course, this doesn't make it any easier for modern plants. For I've enjoyed decades Granny's late summerblooming red spider lilies, knowing full well that Aunt Mamie called them hurricane lilies; they're also known as equinox lilies. Or even naked ladies, which is what I call the related, bigger pink summer blooming species. There are several members of this tribe, all known in Latin as Lycoris (thanks, Linnaeus); the big, summer flowering pink one is L. squamigera, the smaller fall red one is L. radiata. Whatever. I mean, by 1854, when the first three bulbs were introduced into North Carolina by a seafaring botanist, the Japanese already had over a thousand local names for the same red flower. Now spread over the entire South, often found around abandoned old house sites, it is one of our most treasured late summer blooms. Its clump of striped monkey grass-We figure it was a like leaves comes up in



the fall and dies down in late winter, and the flower stalks appear, completely leafless, after a good rain in August or September. And squirrels and voles won't touch the bulbs.

Carl and Gayle Long tied the knot in 1939 in the pastor's study at Tupelo's First Baptist Church. Carl was a salesman who supplied grocery stores, and Gayle taught in a local school. Two years into their marriage, Pearl Harbor changed everything. Like so many young Americans of that generation, Carl answered the call of duty and left behind the love of his life to serve his country. What followed were years of service, sacrifice, and prayer.

The Longs made it through the war and had one child, Gayle, who became my wife. Their surviving letters record Carl's service on the USS Monrovia, the bloody Battles of Tarawa and Okinawa, the terror of kamikazes taking aim at American ships, and the hardships of a young couple living through mankind's deadliest conflict. Theirs is the story of countless Americans who gave so much to defend our country in World War II.

There's a fellow close to Jackson who grows and sells big bulbs of the red ones through the Mississippi Market Bulletin, a Department Agriculture of and Commerce publication that offers all sorts of hardy locally-grown herb plants, daylilies, elephant ears, gladiolus, cannas, mums, iris, and fig and shrubs, pomegranate catalpa trees, and much more. It's online.

Meanwhile, if anyone has jacony plants, or knows where I can find one, I'd sure like a start for my garden.

#### America Turned an Enemy Into a Friend

September 2 marked the 75th anniversary of the American victory over Japan, when Japanese officials surrendered on the deck of the USS Missouri in Tokyo Bay. Present at that ceremony were military leaders, dignitaries from around the world, and General Douglas MacArthur, who would lead the occupation of Japan. But noteworthy were the Americans who could not be there - the 405,399 men who died in the war and the 670,846 who were wounded. With the signing of the terms of surrender, hostilities came to an end. The United States had become a superpower, and the world had changed significantly.

History books are filled with examples of victors taking revenge on the people they conquered, but the United States set a different example after World War II. One of General MacArthur's first acts following Japan's surrender was to prohibit Allied personnel from assaulting Japanese people or eating scarce Japanese food. Japan was allowed to keep its emperor as a symbolic leader. America helped rebuild Japan from the wreckage of war and installed a new constitution that transformed Japan into a modern democracy. Our presence and aid helped prevent communism from taking root in the country, and our two countries even forged a bond over baseball, America's pastime.







### Words From The Wisest King Before Jesus (part 80)

Ecclesiastes is a very interesting book, chiefly because it is very practical in its information about life on earth, both how it is lived and how it should be lived. I have often thought that many people "live a lifetime" without ever learning much about "how to live a lifetime". Most Bible scholars whom I have read believe that Solomon certainly wrote the book of Ecclesiastes, which is what I believe, but even with the wisdom that he has given in this book, he too had a problem of failing to apply to his own life what he knew and taught others. The last chapter of Ecclesiastes is a fitting close for the book, for it majors on what things will be like toward the end of this life. Most of us have heard the little quote: "If I had known I would have lived this long, I would have

taken better care of myself when I was young". All of us who have live to older age could likely feel some regret for our failure to take care of our bodies better when were were young.

Ecclesiastes 12:4 continues with information about the problems of old age: "And the doors shall be shut in the streets, when the sound of the grinding is low, and he shall rise up at the voice of the bird, and all the daughters of musick shall be brought low." There are varied ideas on exactly what Solomon meant by some of his statements in verses 3-5 of chapter 12. It seems, as some good expositors has said, that Solomon is describing the problems that come with older age. So, we have the matter of mouths (doors) that are shut in the streets, meaning perhaps less opening of the

mouth by some older people because of missing teeth, especially in a day when there were no "store bought teeth", as some call them. The sound of the "grinding", or eating of food is low, because of an inability to chew well through problems of the teeth. Then we have the matter of sleep, when one rises up at the least little noise, like the voice of the bird, because he is not sleeping very soundly. It may seem a bit morbid for Solomon to write about these things, or for some of us to comment on what he has written, but another view of this matter could be that some of us who have experiences some of the disadvantages of older age are trying to arouse younger people to do what they can while young, for the abilility to do it will diminish as age advances! The musicians

and their instruments do not sound out very loudly to those who are hard of hearing, which is what Solomon seems to be saying in the last part of our verse. Not only does the actual sound seem lower in volume, but the words are often harder to understand as age advances. There is no real reason to "cry the blues" when these things begin happening, for there may be some help for various aids to seeing, hearing or eating. There is a need to be grateful for the ability we do have to enjoy the good things of life, and there is a need to preserve whatever ability we have left to enjoy eating, hearing, seeing or working with our hands and bodies
