
Traffic Stop Leads To Out Of State Felony Arrest

On January 10th, 2020, Tishomingo County Sheriff's deputies conducted a traffic stop in the town of Tishomingo for careless driving. During the traffic stop, the passenger gave the deputies a false name and the deputies verified the correct name, it was discovered that the passenger had outstanding felony arrest warrants from Franklin County, Alabama for

failing to register - sex offender. At this time, deputies immediately detained and arrested the passenger for the arrest warrant and also for providing false information at the time of the stop to the deputies. The passenger was then transported to the Tishomingo County Jail.

Jimmy Wojtanowski, 36-year-old, white male of Red Bay, Alabama was officially

served with his outstanding arrested warrant for failing to register - sex offender. Wojtanowski also had a "hold" placed on him by the Franklin County Sheriff's Office in Russellville, Alabama and the Alabama Department of Corrections (ADOC).

Fed Ex Scam Alert

A Fed Ex scam has been reported, if you did not place an order with Fed Ex and did not sign up to receive any updates on the status of your deliveries; do not respond to anything that you receive to your device or computer.

The Tishomingo County Sheriff's Office has been made aware of a scam involving a "smishing" / or "phishing" at-

tempt using Fed Ex Mobile Tracking. This "smishing" / "phishing" scam can if successful clone your device without authorization. Federal Express has been made aware of this threat due to this threat and others, has been circling around via email, text, and social media for some time.

Major Drug Investigation Leads to Multiple Arrests in Dennis

On January 15th, Tishomingo County Sheriff's deputies and investigators conducted a search with a warrant of a residence located on County Road 23 in Dennis. The search was conducted due to an ongoing drug investigation involving large amounts of alleged methamphetamine being sold in the area in the past few weeks.

During the course of the investigation deputies have been monitoring the residence and vehicles that come and go. When the search took place several individuals were arrested, some alleged methamphetamine was found and some bags of counterfeit controlled substances were also located. It is believed that the counterfeit substances were being sold as alleged methamphetamine.

While law enforcement was conducting the search, several different individuals continued pulling up to the residence and they were detained as they pulled onto the property. Some of these individuals were also arrested. Below are the names which are being released at this time. More arrests are forthcoming.

Dion Edward Joseph, 43-year-old, white male, of Dennis, Mississippi was officially charged with the felony possession of a controlled substance (methamphetamine) and the felony possession of a counterfeit substance w/intent to sell. Joseph remains in the custody of the Tishomingo County Jail awaiting bond to be set on his charges. Joseph is also on probation with the Alabama

Department of Corrections (ADOC) for previous felony convictions and has a "hold" placed on him by the state of Alabama and the ADOC.

Jerry Shane Creekmore, 43-year-old, white male, of Vina, Alabama, was arrested on a felony probation violation out of the state of Alabama. Creekmore remains in the custody of the Tishomingo County Jail due to a "hold" being placed on him by the state of Alabama and the Alabama Department of Corrections (ADOC).



Investigation Leads to Felony Arrest

On January 9, 2020, the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Office conducted an investigation and deputies along with investigators, received permission to search a residence located on Hwy. 365 North in the Burnsville area. During the search of the residence, multiple subjects were located in the home and were detained.

A vehicle was found in the carport of the residence which had been reported stolen out of McNairy County, Tennessee. A rifle was also found in a closet and one of the detained subjects, Dennis Earl Simpson claimed

ownership, Simpson was later identified as a Convicted Felon.

It was discovered that Simpson was also involved in the possession of the stolen vehicle found at the residence.

Dennis Earl Simpson, 55-year-old, white male of Iuka, Mississippi was officially charged with the felony possession of weapon by a felon and the possession of stolen property. Simpson's bond was set by the Tishomingo County Justice Court at \$5,000. Simpson also has a "hold" placed on him by the MDOC, due to currently being on probation.

Words From The Wisest King Before Jesus (part 50)

We have been looking at the Book of Ecclesiastes, written by King Solomon, as many believe, for some time, so we will continue with Ecclesiastes 8:15: "Then I commended mirth, because a man hath no better thing under the sun, than to eat, and to drink, and to be merry: for that shall abide with him of his labour the days of his life, which God giveth him under the sun." We have finally arrived at a verse that will likely sound good to some people, but it may not be saying exactly what they suppose. I have heard the expression: "eat, drink and be merry, for tomorrow we

die" many times in my 76 years, but those who have said it were not usually thinking about spiritual matters or eternal matters. What did Solomon mean when he said these words? This is a question that deserves an answer, so I will make an attempt to answer it. First, we must understand that Solomon is writing about life on the earth, about the way things are presently. In his commen-

dation of mirth (which means pleasure), he is not necessarily speaking of sinful pleasure. In speaking about drinking and being merry, Solomon is not necessarily speaking about drunkenness, or even drinking strong drink, nor is he necessarily speaking about merriment in a sinful way. After all, we can eat, drink and have a merry time in doing what is right, so there is no justification here

for wild parties involving drunkenness and debauchery. It is good to enjoy fine food and drink with a cheerful heart. In fact, I think that most of us enjoy good food and drink, but that does not mean that we have to eat to excess or drink intoxicating beverages.

Now we come to another part of our verse, where Solomon says, "...for that will abide with him of his labour the days of his life, which God giveth him under the sun." The matter of enjoying the good things of life will live with us all of our days and will help us even to enjoy our labors to a great degree. Life

on earth is too short for us to go through it without any enjoyment, yet I partly understand the position of those who have had health problems all of their lives, or others who have had family problems. I said that I "partly understand" such people, for I certainly cannot fully understand them, since I may not have had the same problems as they. I have been learning that we should not tell others that we know how they feel, when, in fact, we do not know how they feel. Solomon's encouragement to men is that they should enjoy whatever they can enjoy, as long as it does not displease God, for the good times

will be remembered a lifetime. Notice Solomon mentions the days of our life as a gift from God, and should always keep them in our minds. I say that most of us who are older sometimes wonder about how much life we may, or may not have left. At age 76 I wonder about this quite a bit, yet I am not worried about it, for I am going to take Solomon's admonition and whatever in life I have enjoyed, while I am to be willing to give up what cannot be enjoyed.

During one such storytelling event, she shared about the time when the mailman (yes, that was the official title circa 1925) delivered tasty chocolate treat samples to all the mailboxes in the area. At a time when parents felt it safe to allow their children to run and play between the houses in the country, Eunice and her "partner-in-crime-niece" Jewel Page Edmondson (deceased) asked several other home owners if they could have their sample chocolates. Since most of these neighbors were also relatives, they were delighted to see the happy faces of children who rarely got store-bought candy and consented to share. Little did the two preschoolers know that the chocolate treats were a new version of Ex-lax that the company was test marketing! As Eunice shared the story, there was a twinkle in her bright blue eyes as she described the "moving" experience as the two little girls tried to get back to their homes!





What Happened to the Apostrophe in Holt's Spur

Edwin Gray of Holt's Spur (located about 10 miles south of Tishomingo on Highway 1) was a bustling community of three sawmills. Some sawmills in Illinois Central was built through the community in 1908 and the first run was a senger coach. "Dude" along with a load of logs. Tishomingo frequently brought logs to Holt's Spur by way to Corinth. Up to five logs were loaded on the spur which brought out of the Creek bottom.

We thank Mr. Holt for bringing to the attention the correct name of the tiny community. We hope this will not be forgotten in the future. The name has shortened to Holt Spur which is found in many books and news reports today.

It was good to meet this young man whom I had not seen since he was a young boy. We talked of Martha (who since then has passed away.)
