Major Drug Bust at Tishomingo County Residence, 4 Arrested

A major drug bust took place in Tishomingo County on Monday, February 10th sending four individuals to jail for various drug related charges.

Deputies from the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Office stopped Daniel Smith, 47, of Belmont on County Road 6 in Belmont for a traffic violation. During the stop deputies found some alleged methamphetamine on Smith. He resided at a house that has been under investigation for drug trafficking in Belmont.

The Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department, the Mississippi Bureau of Narcotics, and the Belmont Police Department have been working a case at a residence at 145, County Road 14 over the past few months in regards to large amounts of methamphetamine being distributed from the residence.

A search warrant was issued

due to the investigation and deputies, agents, and officers went to the residence and served the warrant to Michelle Garner, 49 of Belmont.

During the search the officers found alleged methamphetamine, and numerous containers with chemicals mixed together that are used to manufacture alleged methamphetamine. There were several guns throughout the house and alleged drug paraphernalia was found in almost every room. More alleged methamphetamine was found in the shop adjoining the residence. Approximately a 1/4 of a pound of alleged methamphetamine was recovered in all from the residence.

Danielle Smith, 26, of Red Bay and Nathaniel Green, 33,

Belmont Woman Charged with Murder in Baldwin

A Belmont woman was arrested in Lee County for the murder of a Baldwin woman, according to authorities.

Shawnie Young, 47, of Belmont was arrested on Tuesday, February 11th and charged with murder in the first degree.

The victim was identified as Pamela Britt 63, of Clayton St. in Baldwin. Details of the crime were not available at press time. Our records show that Young was arrested in Tishomingo County in April of 2016 on charges of possession of methamphetamine.



Tishomingo County Man Sentenced in Sexual Battery Case

On February 6th 2020, Circuit Court Judge Paul S. Funderburk sentenced Roy Steven Roberts, 64, of Golden to serve 12 years in a state prison without the possibility of parole. Roberts, a former minister, was indicted by a Tishomingo County Grand Jury in September of 2017 for one count of fondling and one count of sexual battery; both the charges involved a minor.

The trial wrapped up quickly after Roberts pled guilty just before the jury selection was completed last month. The sentencing was delayed for around two weeks after Roberts became unconscious during the court proceedings. Prosecutors had recommended that Roberts receive an 8 year sentence but Judge Funderburk handed down a harsher sentence on

Thursday of last week.

The Tishomingo County Sheriff's Office began their investigation into this case in May 2017, investigators and Child Protective Services began working together and were able to find enough evidence to bring the case before a Grand Jury. Roberts was arrested in Athens Texas in October of 2017, he had moved to TX with his wife prior to the Grand Jury's inquiry.

Northeast Receives Apple Distinguished School Designation

BOONEVILLE Northeast Mississippi Community College has received an Apple Distinguished School designation for its innovative approach to providing students with top of the line technology and a mobile learning environment that not only encompasses in-classroom instruction but also entire college experience.

College officials presented the award to Northeast employees at a celebration event in the Wright Room on the second floor of the Student Union on Wednesday, January 8.

Being identified as an Apple Distinguished School sends a strong message that Northeast Mississippi Community College is serious about meeting the student and is about when students leave Northeast, they are competing not only on a national level but on a global level as well," Northeast president Mickey G. Ford. "This is a lot for our students, our faculty and our staff."

Apple Distinguished Schools are not only inspiring in the classroom but challenge instructors to collaborate and think using innovative technology with the best results of accomplishments. Northeast exemplifies all the work that the administration, faculty and staff have done to provide a quality learning in the classroom," said Northeast history instructor Dowlin. "It provides a level of learning and engagement amongst students with today's technology to meet the demands of today's workforce."

Northeast is no stranger to innovation on the local, national or international level when it comes to innovation in education with faculty and staff members presenting at conferences around the world on what the two community colleges in Booneville, Mississippi, are doing.

One of the keys to the college's success is its ability to remove the barriers that stood in the way of students achieving their educational aspirations. Northeast joins an elite list of educational institutions with the Apple Distinguished Schools designation. Just 470 schools in

35 countries around the world have been named Apple Distinguished Schools and only a handful of those are higher educational institutions.

"With us being just one of eight higher education institutions in the entire world, that is a big honor for Northeast," said Northeast instructional technology specialist Jeffrey Powell. "We are very proud to have that. We hope to see more increases in student success and more innovation in the classroom where students are developing their own projects and classwork."

Under the guidance of the "oNE Northeast" initiative, the college challenged itself to meet four criteria that served as barriers of entry for students. Those criteria were: 1) lower textbook costs, 2) engage students, 3) improve communication and 4) prepare students for the workforce with the latest technology.

In the process of meeting those criteria, many of the college's faculty have foregone the traditional textbook and worked to create their own textbooks with Open Educational Resources (OER) and in doing so, Northeast Mississippi Community College has saved students almost \$6 million in textbook costs.

"Besides the decrease in textbook costs, we have also seen an increase in student success -- that's the number of As, Bs and Cs in class -- over the last four years," said Northeast vice president of instruction Dr. Michelle Baragona.

not pay anything for textbooks," Ford said. "We have gone from an instructor-centered classroom to a student-centered classroom. They are able to work hands-on in groups or individually. We had one College Algebra class that went to a 100-percent success rate. That is saying a lot. That is a difficult class."

Northeast redesigned its freshmen orientation to better suit student needs and give them a more interactive advising experience through the introduction of the Student Success Center in Wright Hall; the college has improved communication with students on a day-to-day basis.

While changing the culture of education, Northeast has infused technology throughout all areas of campus life as well such as housing, records, classrooms and athletics.

"We are going to continue to improve in the classroom and focus on student engagement and the student activities that occur in class, so they are not just passively sitting in class but are actively engaging in the class," Baragona said.

In applying for the Apple Distinguished Schools designation, Northeast was asked to not only fill out an invitation-only application but to develop its own multi-touch book to highlight everything the college has done to engage the students.

"The book not only shows the learning that is in the classroom but it talks about our athletics and how they are using the iPad," Baragona said. "Athletics is going to be one of the next big areas that we focus on concerning Apple and is what we are doing in athletics with the iPad and technology."

"Students are now starting to matriculate to four-year universities and coming back to tell us, 'We didn't know how good we had it at Northeast.' Now, they are in a situation where they have textbook costs that are over \$1,000 a semester."

Nonetheless, while many colleges and universities concentrate on just changing the way faculty view technology in the classroom, Northeast took on a more comprehensive approach and changed the culture of the college to incorporate technology throughout the entire scope of the college experience.

Some of the ways that Northeast has changed the culture of learning at the higher education level includes a flipped classroom pedagogy, digitized workflows and freeing employees from desktop computers in office spaces.

"You can actually get an associate's degree in General Studies and

Grant to Provide Programming for Special Needs Children

FLORENCE, AL — The Anderson College of Nursing and Health Professions at the University of North Alabama received a \$3,000 grant from the Alabama Lifespan Network for the development and maintenance of the Children's Respite Program. The program is a program of the United Cerebral Palsy of Huntsville and Tennessee Valley. The program is open to parents of special children, and their children, to a monthly respite during the fall and winter months.

The first event is set for 7 p.m. Friday, Feb. 14, at the Baptist Campus Center on the UNA campus. Iuka Pilot and TCHS Anchor Clubs Team Up To Promote Brain Safety

Approximately 40% of all bicycle-related deaths are due to head injuries. Three-fourths of all bicycle-related head injuries occur among children ages 14 and under. Many children do not protect their heads because they don't have access to quality, affordable safety helmets.

The Iuka Pilot Club and TCHS Anchor Club will kick-off a week-long helmet safety event at Iuka Elementary School on Tuesday, February 18. Students will participate in a penny war Tuesday through Monday. The classroom collecting the most money will receive safety helmets in an effort to reduce head-related injuries while riding bikes, skateboards, hover boards, etc.

At the kick-off, TCHS Anchor members will present a puppet show encouraging brain safety. During the week, grades K through 2nd grade will participate in a safety helmet coloring contest. Grades 3 and 4 will participate in a t-shirt design contest.

On Monday, February 24, there will be a grand finale assembly to announce the winners of the coloring contest, the t-shirt design contest, and the class to receive the safety helmets.

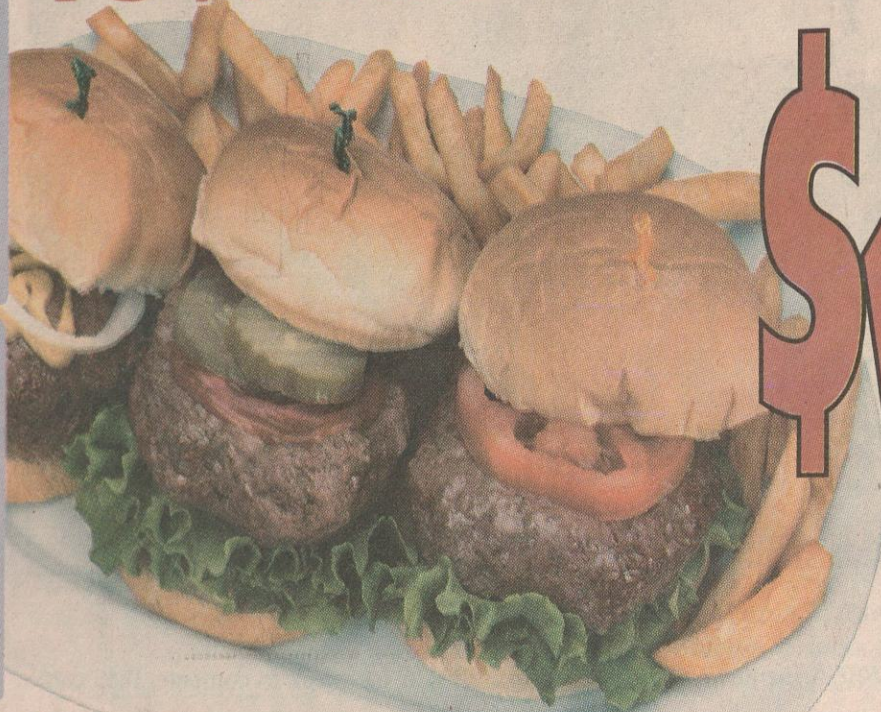

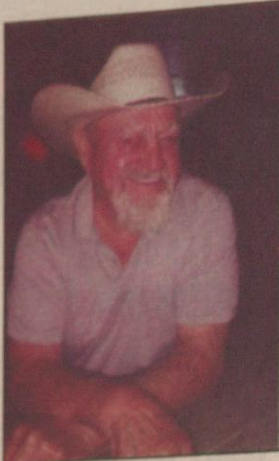
James Owen Crider

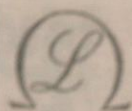

Taking EQIP Application
through March 6 for 2020

JACKSON, MS, January 31, 2020 — sippi's USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) State Conservationist Kurt Readus announced the statewide deadline for the first application period of fiscal year 2020 Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) funding. While all general EQIP as well as some special initiatives can apply year-round, this application deadline for Mississippi agricultural producers and landowners wish to be considered for EQIP technical and assistance in the first ranking period should be March 6, 2020.

"The Environmental Quality Incentives Program offers producers a variety of options to conserve resources on their properties," said Mississippi State Conservationist, Kurt Readus. "This conservation investment helps to improve environmental health and the economy of Mississippi's communities."

NRCS conservationists work with producers to assess the conservation needs on their land to identify source concerns and opportunities, help determine objectives, and recommend solutions.

EQIP was initially established under the 1985 Farm Bill and reauthorized in the 2018 Farm Bill. Assistance is available to help producers develop and plan and implement conservation practices to improve water quantity and quality, build healthier soil, grazing and forest lands, conserve energy, enhance organic operations, establish or improve wildlife habitat and achieve other environmental benefits on cropland and pasture, forestland, and associated agricultural lands including farmsteads.

Popular practices include those that increase efficient use of agricultural water, manure, and storage systems, such as waste storage structures, health improvement, such as cover crops and pasture improvement, such as prescribed grazing, watering systems; forest improvement, such as stand improvement; and habitat improvement, such as early successional habitat management.

Interested producers can apply at their local Service Center by submitting a Conservation Practice Application (NRCS-CPA-1200).

Recently, NRCS reminded historically underserved producers approved for funding through EQIP to receive a portion of conservation practice funding in advance of the practice implementation.

A historically underserved producer is defined as one of the below:

Beginning Farmer or Rancher – is new to farming or ranching, or, has operated a farm or ranch for less than 10-consecutive years.

Socially Disadvantaged Farmer or Rancher – is a member of a group whose members have been subjected to racial or ethnic prejudice because of their membership of that group without regard to their individual qualities.

Veteran Farmer or Rancher – has served in the armed forces and has not operated a farm or ranch for less than 10-consecutive years, or first obtained veteran status during the war years.

Limited Resource Farmer or Rancher – has a household income at or below the national poverty level. Eligibility can be determined by using this online tool.

Under the advance payment option, such as designs and job sheets and are ready to begin the practices. Advance payments provide a portion of the financial assistance available for each practice. Payments must be expended for conservation practice within 90 days of receipt, and practices must be completed as agreed to in an EQIP plan of operation. Producers also may opt to have NRCS pay the cost of vendors directly.

NRCS provides leadership in a partnership effort to conserve, maintain, and improve our natural resources. More information on NRCS conservation programs can be found at <https://www.farmers.gov/>.

In our verses, Solo-
mon is saying that ev-
erybody faces one par-
ticular thing, namely
death. If we under-
stand his words in that
framework, it will not
be too hard to get the
meaning of what our

writer is saying. When
he says "all things come
alike to all", he is not
saying that there is nev-
er any difference is what
every individual experi-
ences or receives in life.
Rather he is saying that
when it comes to our
exit from this world,
death comes alike to all.
Even this does not mean
that all die the same
way, with the same pain

etc., rather it means that
nobody escapes death;
it will come "likewise"
to all. (Of course those
who are saved and are
on earth at the coming
of Christ in the air will
escape physical death,
as I Corinthians 15:51-

anyone to tell you that
death is no longer an en-
emy, for Scripture says it
is! Our writer says that
the hearts of men may
be full of evil and sin
while they live, but then
they all finally die!

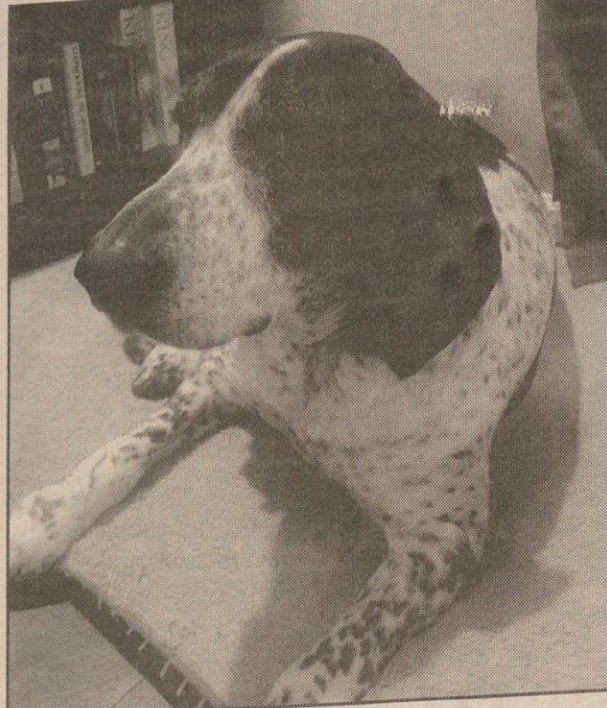

If you receive these type of calls, you should report those directly to the Social Security Administration using their online report portal at <https://secure.ssa.gov/ipff/home> or by calling 1-800-269-0271.

You may also report scam calls to the Public Service Commission by using the No-Call app for smartphones. The app helps people immediately report calls to the PSC from their cell phones. It can be found by searching "PSC No-Call" in the App Store for Apple devices or Google Play for Android devices. 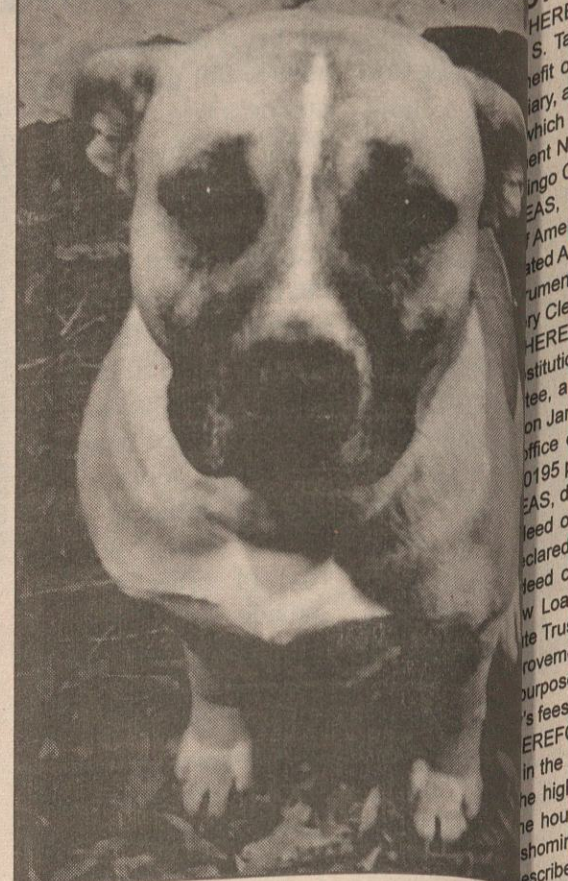
