

Major Drug Bust at **Tishomingo County** Residence, 4 Arrested

place in Tishomingo County on Monday, February 10th sending four individuals to jail for various drug related charges.

Deputies from the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Office stopped Daniel Smith, 47, of Belmont on County Road 6 in Belmont for a traffic violation. During the stop deputies found some alleged methamphetamine on Smith. He resided at a house that has been under investigation for drug trafficking in Bel-

The Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department, the Mississippi Bureau of Narcotics, and the Belmont Police Department have been working a case at a residence at 145, County Road 14 over the past few months in regards to large amounts of methamphetamine being distributed from the resi-

A search warrant was issued

A major drug bust took due to the investigation and deputies, agents, and officers went to the residence and served the warrant to Michelle Garner, 49 of Belmont.

During the search the officers found alleged methamphetamine, and numerous containers with chemicals mixed together that are used to manufacture alleged methamphetamine. There were several guns throughout the house and alleged drug paraphernalia was found in almost every room. More alleged methamphetamine was found in the shop adjoining the residence. Approximately a 1/4 of a pound of alleged methamphetamine was recovered in all from the residence.

Belmont Woman Charged with Murder in Baldwyn

A Belmont woman was arrested in Lee County for the murder of a Baldwyn woman, according to authorities.

Shawnie Young, 47, of Belmont was arrested on Tuesday, February 11th and charged with murder in the first degree.

The victim was identified as Pamela Britt 63, of Clayton St. in Baldwyn. Details of the crime were not available at press time. Our records show that Young was arrested in Tishomingo County in



April of 2016 on charges of possession of methamphetamine

Tishomingo County Man Sentenced in Sexual Battery Case

On February 6th 2020, Circuit Court Judge Paul S. Funderburk sentenced Roy Steven Roberts, 64, of Golden to serve 12 years in a state prison without the possibility of parole. Roberts, a former minister, was indicted by a Tishomingo County Grand Jury in September of 2017 for one count of fondling and one count of sexual battery; both the charges involved a

The trial wrapped up quickly after Roberts pled guilty just before the jury selection was completed last month. The sentencing was delayed for around two weeks after Roberts became unconscious during the court proceedings. Prosecutors had recommended that Roberts receive an 8 year sentence but Judge Funderburk handed down a harsher sentence on

The Tishomingo County Sheriff's Office began their investigation into this case in May 2017, investigators and Child Protective Services began working together and were able to find enough evidence to bring the case before a Grand Jury. Roberts was arrested in Athens Texas in October of 2017, he had moved to TX with his wife prior to the Grand Jury's inquiry

Northeast Officially Christens "Field Of Dreams" With Ribbon Cutting Ceremony

BOONEVILLE, Miss. - Four years of planning, research and construction has finally paid off for the Northeast Mississippi Community College baseball and softball programs with the opening of the "Field of Dreams."

Northeast held an official dedication ceremony for the complex on Saturday, February 1. The brand-new, multi-million dollar facility will serve as the first on-campus home for the baseball and softball teams in school his-

Both baseball and softball utilized a longstanding partnership with Booneville City Park to play their home games at Harold T. White Field and David Carnell Memorial Field, respectively.

"Somebody asked me 'What do you want to do?' when I became president," said Northeast president Dr. Ricky Ford. "I immediately said I want us to have a baseball (and softball) field. We have never owned a baseball or softball field that we can call our own.

"Now we can say we have our own and it is the best in the country without a doubt. We're looking forward to our softball and baseball teams performing and winning."

More than 500 people flocked to the City of Hospitality for this historic event, which included free hats, t-shirts and concession stand food compliments of the Northeast Development Foundation.

Athletic director Kent Farris, chairman of the

The multi-million dollar venue houses locker rooms for both the baseball and softball programs, a state-of-the-art pressbox, the only video boards in the Mississippi Association of Community and Junior Colleges for baseball and softball, all turf fields in addition to an indoor hitting facility for both teams.

Northeast board of trustees Jack Ramsey and Patrick Eaton, who is the executive director of the development foundation, joined Ford in speaking at the ribbon cutting.

"This project started out as the "Field of Dreams," but today it is Northeast's field of reality," said Farris. "God has been so good to us. We've got numerous players, managers, student trainers and statisticians that have all represented Northeast in a first class manner over the years. Because of the way that they represented Northeast, this dream that you see today was made possible."

"This Dreams" has been a dream for many years," Ramsey said. "I've had the privilege of being on this board for 35 years and

I would say for at least 35 years we've wanted baseball and softball fields. Finally this dream has come

"As our "Field of Dreams" capital gifts campaign slogan stated, 'If you build it, they will come," said Eaton. "By the blessings of the Lord, we were able to build this state-of-the-art facility."

Both squads competed in intrasquad scrimmages that lasted approximately 45 minutes as well. Eli Eakes had the highlight of the day for baseball with a three-run home run in the third inning of its head-tohead matchup.

The softball version of the Tigers did not hit any homers, but Anna Beth Lucius, Alexis McGreger, Anna Claire Stahl and Katelin Senter all had extra base hits during their controlled scrimmage.

A full afternoon of activities wrapped up with a special first pitch mingle presentation featuring former University of Mississippi (Ole Miss) All-Southeastern Conference (SEC) standout and assistant coach Keith Kessinger.

bragged Kessinger about the entire complex, which includes an indoor hitting and pitching building, fieldhouse complete with locker rooms for both teams and two-story pressbox, during his keynote

"I don't know if you can say enough about this facility," Kessinger said. "I'd been fortunate enough to come over a few times and see it under construction. But to see

the finished product is really special.

"This is going to be such a huge deal for the baseball and softball programs to help them get kids on campus. You don't have to worry as much about the weather with the turf field, which will help continue player development."

Northeast softball will host the first games in the new stadium on Saturday, February 8 against Jackson State (Tenn.) Community College while the baseball team welcomes both Calhoun (Ala.) 35 countries around the world have been named Schools and only a handful of those are higher educational institutions.

one of eight higher education institutions in the entire world, that is a big honor for Northeast," said Northeast instructional technology specialist Jeffrey Powell. "We are very proud to have that. We hope to see more increases in student success and more innovation in the classroom where students are developing their own projects and classwork."

Under the guidance of the "oNE Northeast" initiative, the college challenged itself to meet four criteria that served as barriers of entry for students. Those criteria were: 1) lower textbook costs, 2) engage students, 3) improve communication and 4) prepare students for the workforce with the latest technology.

In the process of meeting those criteria, many of the college's faculty have foregone the traditional textbook and worked to create their own textbooks with Open Educational Resources (OER) and in doing so, Northeast Mississippi Community College has saved students almost \$6 million in textbook costs.

"Besides the decrease in textbook costs, we have also seen an increase in student success - that's the number of As, Bs and Cs in class - over the last four years," said Northeast vice president of instruction Dr. Michelle Baragona.

"Students are now starting to matriculate to four-year Distinguished universities and coming back to tell us, 'We didn't know how good we had it at Northeast.' Now, they "With us being just are in a situation where they have textbook costs that are over \$1,000 a se-

Nonetheless, while many colleges and universities concentrate on just changing the way faculty view technology in the classroom, Northeast took on a more comprehensive approach and changed the culture of the college to incorporate technology throughout the entire scope of the college expe-

Some of the ways that Northeast has changed the culture of learning at the higher education level includes a flipped classroom pedagogy, digitized workflows and freeing employees from desktop computers in office spaces.

"You can actually get an associate's degree in General Studies and

not pay anything for textbooks," Ford said. "We have gone from an instructor-centered classroom to a student-centered classroom. They are able to work hands-on in groups or individually. We had one College Algebra class that went to a 100-percent success rate. That is saying a lot. That is a difficult

Northeast redesigned its freshmen orientation to better suit student needs and give them a more interactive advising experience through the introduction of the Student Success Center in Wright Hall; the college has improved communication with students on a day-to-day basis.

While changing the culture of education, Northeast has infused technology throughout all areas of campus life as well such as housing, records, classrooms and athletics.

"We are going to continue to improve in the classroom and focus on student engagement and the student activities that occur in class, so they are not just passively sitting in class but are actively engaging in the class, Baragona said.

In applying for the Apple Distinguished Schools designation, Northeast was asked to not only fill out an invitation-only application but to develop its own multi-touch book to highlight everything the college has done to engage the students.

'The book not only shows the learning that is in the classroom but it talks about our athletics and how they are using the iPad," Baragona said. "Athletics is going to be one of the next big areas that we focus on concerning Apple and is what we are doing in athletics with the iPad and technology."



Approximately 40% of all bicycle-related deaths are due to head injuries. Three-fourths of all bicycle-related head injuries occur among children ages 14 and under. Many children do not protect their heads because they don't have access to quality, affordable safety helmets.

The Iuka Pilot Club and TCHS Anchor Club will kick-off a week-long helmet safety event at luka Elementary School on Tuesday, February 18. Students will participate in a penny war Tuesday through Monday. The classroom collecting the most money will receive safety helmets in an effort to reduce head-related injuries while riding bikes, skateboards, hover boards, etc.





Our writer says that the hearts of men may be full of evil and sin while they live, but then they all finally die!
