United Way of Northeast Mississippi Awards Over \$1.6 Million To Local Nonprofits in Northeast Mississippi Tishomingo County Organizations Receive Grants

United Way of Northeast Mississippi (United Way) has announced its commitment to investing in Academic Success, Family Stability and Wellness and Family Wellness within the region. At a recent meeting, the United Way board of directors approved just under \$1.6 million to 58 nonprofit organizations for the 2020-2021 funding cycle. An additional \$5,895 was designated by donors to organizations not receiving grant funding. These grant awards are the culmination of a year-long process of moving from the Community Impact

model of funding for United Way.

Local community organizations were among those to receive grant money from United Way. These are the nonprofits to receive funding in Tishomingo County. The 4-H of Tishomingo County for Academic Success-\$5,000; the Boys & Girls Club of Iuka for Academic Success \$12,000; the Tishomingo County Community Coalition, for Family Stability \$20,000; and the Tishomingo County Community Coalition for Health \$16,744.

"Our community has been

instrumental in creating this new model every step of the way," said Mary Ann Plasencia, Director of Community Impact at United Way. That process began with a series of Community Conversations, during which United Way asked people across each of their seven counties and from varying social backgrounds to describe the most pressing issues in their communities. "What we found is that in every community, the problems people were seeing were

the same," said Plasencia. United Way took the results of those conversations and convened a panel of experts in education, health and family stability to decide what strategies would best address the issues the community saw as most significant. Those resulting strategies guided United Way volunteers in choosing the programs that would create the greatest impact on those issues and within the region as a whole. "I was really impressed with how seriously the volunteers took this process," said Hilary Hamblin, owner of Momentum Consulting, who served as the Community Impact chair for United Way. "We all knew that every organization applying for United Way funding is doing great work in our community, but we also wanted to be sure we are investing donors' dollars in the programs that can achieve the most results and are most in line with United Way's values. Everyone very carefully evaluated each application and seriously deliberated each recommendation to be sure we were doing the right thing." The Community Impact volunteers reviewed applications from 64 applying organizations and scored them according to a rubric that factored in how closely those programs aligned with United Way's strategies, as well as the organization's plan to measure outcome data and report those outcomes back to United Way.

"We took care to ensure that the Community Impact committee represented each county we serve and that there were experts in education, health and family stability as well. We also included individuals from a wide variety of backgrounds to be sure our region was well-represented," said Plasencia.

After the Community Impact committee reviewed each applying program, a smaller group met to make funding recommendations that were then adopted by the United Way board. "The decisions that the Community Impact cabinet made were tough," said Plasencia. "There are agencies that will receive less funding than they did in the past,

but then there are others that will see a big increase in their funding. The cabinet really wanted to see that those agencies that are aligned with our strategies and can make a big impact on the issue they are addressing had the funding to do that." All of the applicant agencies were notified of their grant awards during a series of meetings with United Way representatives. All organizations that have received grants will be required to begin collecting data on their outcomes in April 2020 and report that data every six months over the two-year grant cycle. Each organization will receive the same grant amount

in 2021, provided the funding is available. "We want our community to see the way in this process," said Melinda Tidwell, president of United Way Northeast Mississippi. "This is the community's decision, and we are excited to show exactly how our investments are making an impact in a more sustainable way."

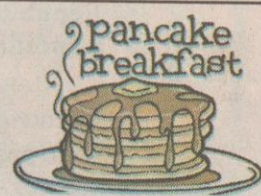

Mississippi Senate Approves Legislation Shoring Up Quality of Early Learning Collaboratives

son, Miss. — A new law is being passed that will improve the quality of early learning collaboratives (ELCs) in the state.

established in 2010, ELCs are grants to localities to set up, support, and expand early childhood programs for 3- and 4-year-olds. For the 2020 school year, the legislature provided \$10 million for ELCs in 10 counties, which serve 3,000 students.

broad support to the program this year. Bill 2286, introduced by Senator Brice, would require the use of an "evidence-based curriculum"

demonstrating a significant effect on improving student outcomes. The legislation also would require individualized professional development plans for teachers and teacher assistants, and would raise the per pupil state appropriation to \$2,500 for a full-day program.

"When our children are engaged in high-quality pre-K programs, they are more likely to be Kindergarten-ready, and successful later in their educational careers. Expanding access to pre-K is one of the most important investments we can make in our children's futures—and in the future of our State," Lieutenant Governor Delbert Hosemann said.

The bill now heads to the House of Representatives for consideration.

Shiloh Park to Celebrate 150th Anniversary

SHILOH, Tennessee - National Military Park will commemorate the 150th anniversary of the battle by offering a variety of real-time hikes, interactive programs, and demonstrations, a book exhibit, a book signing, and a vintage baseball game.

The Shiloh battle anniversary activities from through April 8, 2020, and we invite everyone to come out and remember the battle and the men who fought in 1862," said Park Superintendent Martin.

Visitors will lead all access car tours from April 8, on a variety of subjects, from battle overviews to specific locations of the tours. Interested participants should meet at the appointed times, and are urged to wear appropriate clothing and footwear. The weather and visitors attending more than one hike are urged to have food and water available. Insect repellent and sunscreen is recommended.

On Saturday, April 4, the park will once again feature a vintage baseball game. The Tennessee Association of Vintners Ball returns for a year to play a doubleheader and open their first game will

begin at 11:00 am and feature the 2019 Sulphur Dell Tournament Champions, Nashville Maroons versus the Highland Rim Distillers. The second game will commence around 1:30 pm and feature the Stones River Scouts taking on the Quicksteps of Spring Hill. The games will take place at Duncan Field, Tour Stop #4, and will be played according to the 1864 rule book. Everyone is invited to bring lawn chairs, blankets, and picnic baskets to see "America's Pastime" played as the soldiers played it in the 1860s.

On Saturday, April 4, and Sunday, April 5, the park will present artillery firing demonstrations for the public. The Shiloh Cannon Crew in period uniforms, will demonstrate the duties of Civil War cannons. Visitors will learn about the implements and projectiles they used, and the proper loading and firing procedures of the field artillery in the Civil War.

Cannon firing demonstrations will take place on Saturday at 10:00 am, 11:30 am, 1:00 pm, and 3:00 pm, and Sunday, at 11:00 am, 1:00 pm, and 2:30 pm. The demonstrations will take place across the street from the park's visitor center.

On Saturday and Sunday, the U.S. Naval Landing Party living historians will present an exhibit on the Navy during the Civil War. Naval reenactors in period uniforms will display and demonstrate the equipment of the navy in the mid-19th century. The exhibit will be set up on the front lawn of the Visitor Center and be open from 9:00 am - 4:00 pm.

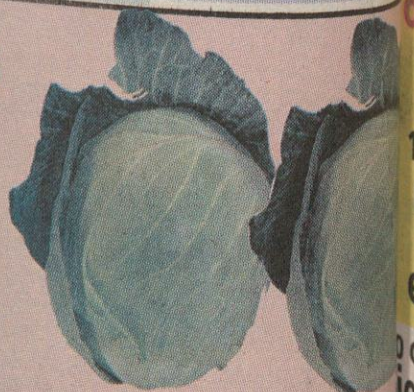

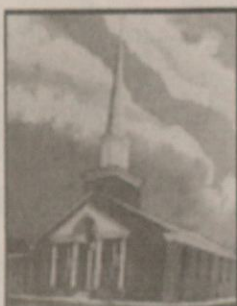

"Aunt Nan" Worked for Hardcastle Family in Margerum

Aunt Nan told this story to the Hardcastle family about her life: The war between the States had ended and the slaves were freed. The Northern soldiers came walking through, headed home. Black people with no place to go joined in behind them. One black woman was pregnant and delivered two baby girls beside the road and abandoned them. One baby got run over by a wagon wheel, crushing its head. The other baby, which was Nan, was still living when a white family came along and found it.

The white family took her in and raised her. They taught her to read and write, and how to play the piano. But they let her believe she was a slave. She was fifteen years old when The Master got her pregnant. The Master's wife blamed Nan and got mad at her. Nan fled to another plantation, and they took her in and let her work there. It was here that she learned she wasn't a slave. She had her bi-racial child there. She later married Buck Ricks and had a son.

When Nan got older, Mr. Hardcastle built her a cabin and told her that it was her home, of her very own, for as long as she lived. He later built a larger home and went to get her to move into it. Nan started crying, holding her apron up over her face. Mr. Hardcastle asked her what was wrong, that he thought she'd be happy with the bigger house. She told him "But Mr. Hardcastle, you told me this little cabin was mine and I could stay here 'til I die." Nan stayed in the little cabin.
