Computer Access Now Available at Local Libraries

Beginning Monday, August 10, several branches of the Northeast Regional Library begin offering public access computer use to patrons by appointment. Branches where service will be available are Burnsville, Burnsville, Corinth, and Ripley.

In order to continue to safeguard the safety of staff and patrons, the following computer use will be in effect:

Only one user will be allowed in the building at a time. Computer use is for educational, personal research and business purposes only. Gaming and watching videos will not be allowed at this time so that as many patrons as possible may be accommodated each day.

Computer use will have a one-hour limit.

Computer users will be directed to enter the computer use area from a designated entrance to avoid contact with staff providing curbside delivery, copying and faxing services.

In accordance with the Governor's state-wide mask mandate, all users will be required to wear facial coverings or masks in order to use a computer.

Tishomingo County School District Announces Plans for Reopening Schools Next Week

The Tishomingo County School District is excited and ready to welcome back staff and students for the 2020-2021 school year. Many things will be different for schools this year, but the district is excited to get the year started and to see students once again. As the situation continuously evolves with COVID-19, the district asks that families make sure they check the district's website (www.tcsk12.com) for updates regularly. Also, schools will use Remind accounts and SchoolStatus, which are communication programs the district uses, to send important information to students, parents, and staff.

Due to Governor Tate Reeves' Executive Order 1517, masks must be worn while on any school campus. Therefore, the district has revised its COVID-19 policies to reflect the new requirement. "The district was ready for this change and has 2 cloth masks ready for each student and staff member when they arrive. Students may also wear masks or facial coverings from home if they meet dress code standards. Students must wear masks/facial coverings on the school bus, so parents should make sure students are wearing one when they load the bus each day," stated superintendent Christie Holly. "Although we will be wearing masks, the district will still practice social distancing as much as possible throughout the day. Families will sit together on buses, we will have staggered class changes and dismissal times, and we will space out at in public areas on campus." The district has videos from each school on its website showing how procedures will change for students. "Our administrators and teachers have been working so hard to get things ready for our students. We hope the videos put many fears at ease and answer questions that parents may have about the school day," said Holly.

The Mississippi State Board of Education passed a policy on August 6th that allows districts who have delayed their school year to reduce student days to 170 days rather than the mandated 180 days. Faculty will still be required to work 187 days. Due to this flexibility, the district has revised its calendar to reflect a shorter year for its students. Students will still begin on Thursday, August 20th. However, the new end date for students will be May 21, 2021. The district advises parents to view the new calendar on its website because some additional student days have changed during the year.

Also, the state board re-

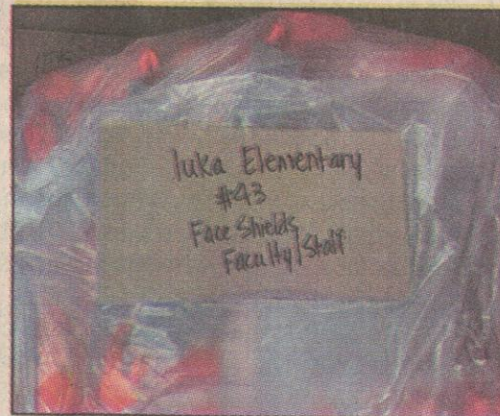
cently passed a new attendance policy for schools to use during the COVID-19 pandemic. "The district is offering two different models of learning - traditional and distance learning. Our schedule will have traditional students reporting to school on Mondays through Thursdays with Fridays being distance learning days. Teachers will work with traditional students who may have internet connectivity issues or device issues on Fridays. However, traditional students or their parents will be contacted by teachers each Friday for attendance. If contact cannot be made, the student will be counted absent. Likewise, if assignments are not completed according to policy and by the deadlines given on Friday, students will be counted as absent. Parents need to read our new policy on our district website and reach out to us with any questions they may have," Holly stated. "Virtual students will be required to log in to their required program and complete assignments by a designated time on Monday through Thursday. On Fridays, virtual students must come to school. They will report at 8:30 a.m. and take tests and receive help from teachers as needed. Our numbers will be much smaller on that day and allow for more social distancing." Schools will have grab-and-go meals for virtual students each day and for traditional students on Friday for pick up if needed. The district will post times for pick up on its website and social media accounts.

On August 20th, traditional students will report to their campus at regular times. The district and schools ask that parents allow for extra time for drop offs since many new procedures will be in place. Virtual students will be contacted by teachers with instructions for the 20th. Traditional students will learn about new procedures, online learning, and other important protocols on Thursday. Kindergarten students will have a different procedure on Thursday to allow a parent to accompany them to a designated area

on campus for pictures and a "meet your teacher" time. This information will be shared with parents by each school through its school video or social media accounts.

On August 21st, traditional students will stay at home and complete virtual assignments. Teachers will make contact with them or their parents to verify attendance. Virtual students will report to their schools at 8:30 a.m. The district will allow one parent to attend with virtual students on Friday, August 21st, to see the processes of student arrival as well as procedures used for virtual learning. "We want parents of virtual students to see expectations, procedures, and routines from teachers in order to make sure they understand what virtual learning will be like," stated Holly. "We want to see how things go on Thursday with all of our new procedures at each campus as well as how virtual learning will go with our students on Friday. These two days will help us see what is working well and what may need to be changed to be more effective."

The district posts information on its website regularly and updates documents as they change. "We want to be transparent with our communities and families about our preparations and processes. COVID-19 has changed many things, but it hasn't changed how much we love our kids. It hasn't changed our dedication to their education. It hasn't changed our commitment to safety. If anything, COVID-19 has made our commitment to these ideals stronger. We encourage parents to contact us with their concerns and questions, and we will work with them as we tackle this pandemic together," stated Holly.

NEMCC PREPARED FOR POSITIVE COVID-19 CASES

BOONEVILLE, Miss - Before in-person classes began on campus at Northeast Mississippi Community College Monday, August 3, a tremendous amount of work was done to formulate plans to deal with the inevitability that sooner or later, there would be cases of the COVID-19 virus on campus.

"While we felt it was important to get our students back on campus and in the classroom, we knew there would be cases," Northeast president Dr. Ricky G. Ford said.

"We worked really hard during the summer to develop plans that are in compliance with all CDC guidelines to handle those instances as they arise, so we are working through our plan."

Each morning starting at 6 a.m., students and employees respond to an automated screening form to determine if they are clear to come to class/campus or if they need to self-isolate. Responses to the screening form are monitored and students and employees who respond that they have symptoms of, exposure to, or diagnosis of COVID-19 will receive a follow-up phone call to confirm results and check-up on the health and well-being of the student or employee.

As a precaution, if a student from a specific class or group of students tests positive, the college will quarantine the entire group of students as well as the instructor/coach. Instruction and further communication with those students and faculty/staff members will be conducted virtually for a period of two weeks.

If a dorm student needs to self-isolate, separate rooms are available for those quarantine needs. Meals will be delivered.

Currently, only two positive cases of COVID-19 have been identified at Northeast since the beginning of in-person classes Monday, August 3.

Digging Now for Easier Times Later

If I can get the little dog from next door to keep helping me dig my garden, I'll be better prepared for fall.

Luckily there isn't a lot to dig. My cottage garden is jam-packed with small specimen trees, evergreen and flowering shrubs, roses, foliage and flowering bulbs, perennial flowers and herbs, and large pots of mixed stuff. Oh, and the water garden, and decks and walks and all that. It's a busy looking space.

Over the years I have pared down the areas for planting fussy annuals to just three fairly small spots, which if added together make up maybe a total of twenty-five square feet. This is where every Spring I set out heat-tolerant Summer flowers, herbs, and vegetables, and replace them in the Autumn with Winter-hardy annuals.

I try to look for value-added stuff that has extra attributes such as being long blooming, extra pretty, pollinator friendly, good for cutting for vases, or just interesting or historic or something. Hard-to-find heirlooms or brand-new tidbits worth trying out fit in there, and all the better if some have edible parts.

This summer's squash didn't do well, and possums got my tomatoes, but peppers, zinnias, cleome, "Blackie" sweet potato and three kinds of basil are all still doing fine. But I'm thinking ahead of stuff that will be extra nice come fall. Broccoli and my favorite Tuscan Blue kale come to mind, along with violas, snapdragons, pansies, and curly parsley, all which need to be planted in the next month or so to get going great with enough time for it to mature before Autumn's first cold snaps.

So, rather than wait 'til the last minute to pull one thing and start another, I'm creating a gradual segue by working up a little dirt in between other fading and bedraggled summer flowers now, being careful to not disturb roots of growing stuff, and trying to not work up too much sweat. By digging a little here and there now, and covering it with mulch, it'll be ready to plant when my mood and finding new plants at the garden center coincide.

Which is where the neighbor's little part-Dachshund dog, a digger by nature, comes in. I appreciate the help but every time I turn fresh dirt over, I come back to find holes big enough to hide bowling balls in, and all the dirt scattered across the walks. Can't blame the puppy; as I told the neighbors, if I was a dog, I'd dig there, too.

I guess it's getting me back for not having to deal with armadillos, squirrels, voles, or moles like so many other gardeners. But I've learned to cut pieces of chicken wire that fit over the beds; the flowers poke up through but the dog can't. This also works for bulbs where chipmunks and squirrels are a problem. For cats I stick sharp little punji sticks in between the flowers, which so far have been deterrent enough to keep finicky felines at bay.

This is a good month to at least start getting ready to set out Autumn and Winter stuff. Garden centers are kinda low on plants, but the wholesale nurseries I have visited are geared up to ship fall plants out very soon. While I'm more lazy grasshopper than industrious ant, and it isn't fun or pleasant digging right now, I'm already getting holes ready in between summer stuff. And in the weeks to come - and yes, it'll be September in a blink of the eye - I'll be ready.

Anybody need a flower bed dug? I know a diggy dog...

Words From The Wisest King Before Jesus (part 77)

King Solomon gave some wise counsel to young men in Ecclesiastes 11:9-10: "Rejoice, O young man, in thy youth; and let thy heart cheer thee in the days of thy youth, and walk in the ways of thine heart, and in the sight of thine eyes: but know thou, that for all these things God will bring thee into judgment. Therefore remove sorrow from thy heart, and put away evil from thy flesh: for childhood and youth are vanity." It is not wrong for either young or old to enjoy life in the right way, but when either plans to direct his life by his own compass, he is headed for an encounter with the judgment of God! Some have thought that Solomon, in these verses, was saying that young people should rejoice in the ways of their own hearts and follow their

own plans, but the context, as well as the entire book of Ecclesiastes, argues to the contrary. Jeremiah 10:23 will help us on this point: "O LORD, I know that the way of man is not in himself: it is not in man that walketh to direct his steps." Someone has well said, "The best commentary on the Bible is the Bible". This does not mean that men or women have not written some good commentaries on the Bible, but the idea is that the Bible itself has the best commentary on what may be said in a different part of the Bible. Jeremiah is telling us that man does not know how to direct his own steps, therefore he needs the direction of God and His Word. The right way for man to walk is not encased in his own brain, rather he needs the outside help of God!

Solomon is saying that

a young man can rejoice in his youth and let his own heart cheer him. He can walk in the ways of his own heart and the sight of his own eyes, but God will bring all of his thoughts and actions to judgment, therefore the wisest thing a young man, or an old one, can do is to bring his thoughts to God's Word and put them under the microscope of Scripture to find the flaws in them, for there will be flaws in the human thinking. Not one of us can say that our thinking would be right, apart from the direction of God's Word and His Spirit. The world's prob-

lems today all stem from wrong thinking and wrong actions of men. No, this does not mean that no one ever thinks anything good, but it does mean that all of our thoughts need to be checked out by God's truth. Solomon made a wise and helpful statement when he said that a young man could remove sorrow from his heart and put away evil from his heart, if he would refrain from following his own ways and thoughts. Then he makes a statement that could startle some people, for he said that childhood and youth are vanity, meaning "empty". The idea is that

the child left to himself will bring his mother to shame, as Proverbs 25:15 says. The idea is that children need to be molded by wiser parents and teachers; this is why we educate

children. Because many never get around to heeding Solomon's words, we have much chaos in our youth today.

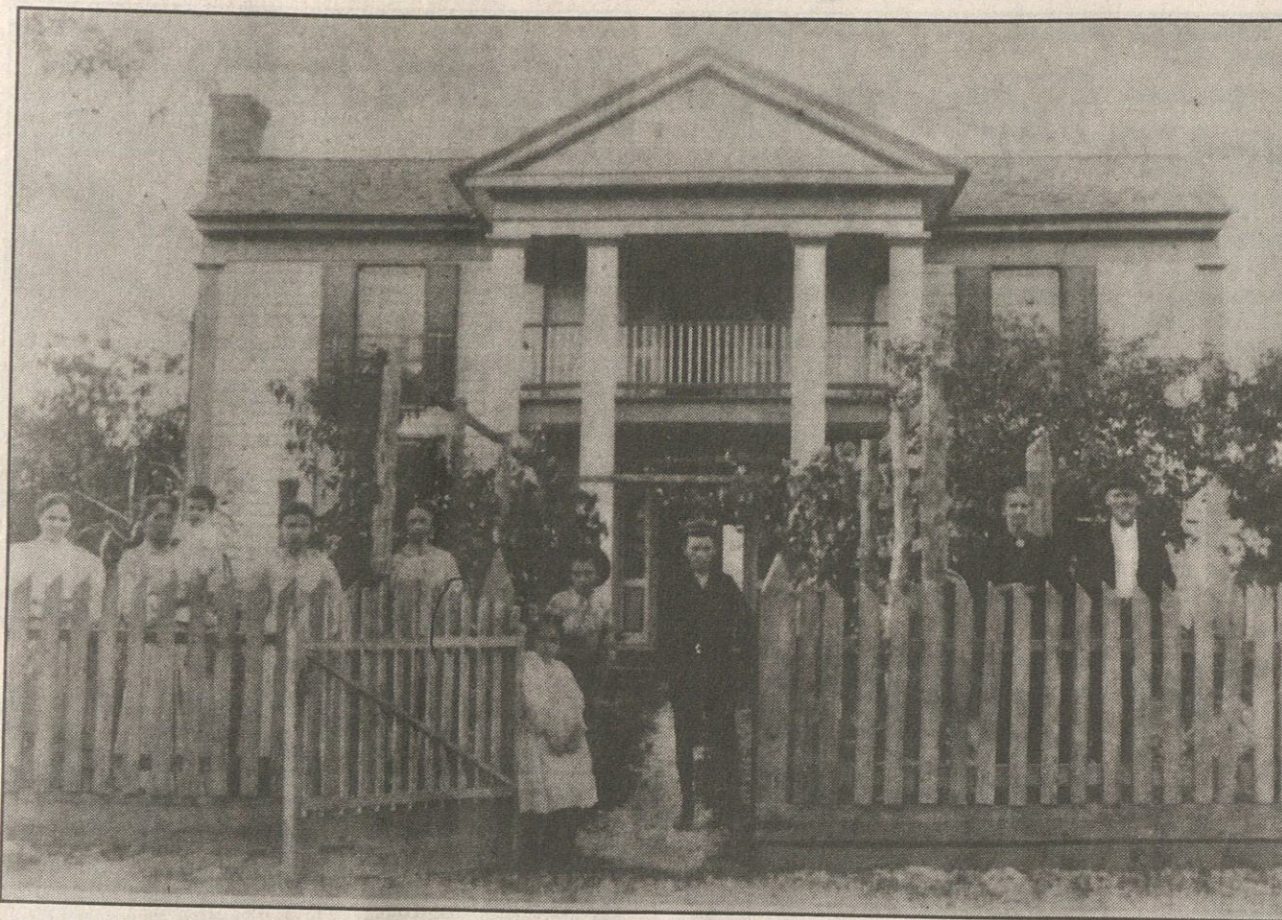

Biography written by Thomas Randolph Smith

Thomas Randolph Smith lived to be 97 years old and lived with his granddaughter, Blanche Bayliss Daugherty in Iuka, in his later years. At one time he went to Alexandria, LA to live with his daughter. While there he wrote the following biography about his life which appeared in the "Edwards Heirs" a publication about the heirs of Capt. John Glazier and Elizabeth Edwards buried near Winnsboro, SC.

Children of Thomas Randolph Smith and Amy Millsaps were: Aulenia married L. R. Robinson; Elizabeth E. married R. G. Bayliss; Lou Anna, married B. C. Adams; James T. married Mary Archer; Henry Etta married Furney Adams.

BIOGRAPHY

I was born on October 21, 1832, near Villa Rica Co., Georgia, but when about two years of age, my parents moved to Cass Co., now Bartow County. Here my father, Hugh Smith, was drowned in the Etowah River a few years later.

Shortly after my fa-

ther's death my uncle, John G. Yarborough, came and took me to Benton County, Alabama. We made the journey on horseback and were on the road three days. While in Alabama, I attended my first school; my only book being Webster's Blue Back Speller.

After staying with my uncle for three years, my mother came and took me back to the old home in Georgia. When we arrived home, the Indians were leaving our section of the state and, although I had lived among them all

my life, I was badly frightened at the sight of them in their war paint and hid for several hours behind an old stump.

At the age of eleven, I went to work as a water boy for a bridge gang on the old Western Atlantic Railroad, which ran from Atlanta to Dalton, Georgia and worked here until eighteen years old, receiving eight dollars per month and my board. I was working for Edward Denmead of Baltimore, Maryland, building a bridge across the Chattahoochee River, near Atlanta, when I decided to go to East Port, Mississippi to work on the farm of Jeremiah Millsaps, who had married my oldest sister. Arrived there in December, 1850, and on December 23, 1852, I married Amy Louhane Millsaps, youngest sister of Jeremiah Millsaps.

In 1862, I joined Company B, composed of men from Tishomingo County, Mississippi, under Capt. John F. Doan and put into 4th Alabama Cavalry un-

der Col. Johnston. Took part in a number of battles and was wounded and taken prisoner on December, 23, 1864, during Hood's retreat from Franklin, Tennessee. After staying in hospital at Huntsville, Alabama for three weeks, was sent to Camp Chase, Ohio where I was held prisoner until June 13, 1865, when I took the oath of allegiance and was discharged.

On my arrival home, I went to work for the Memphis and Charleston, now Southern Railroad, and worked for them until 1909.

Was made Master Mason at Town Creek, Alabama, Lodge 361, in 1869; demitted to Iuka, Mississippi, Lodge 94 in 1883. My membership is still there and I have been a mason longer than any other member of said lodge.

In one writing he said he lived at Gravel Hill, MS which we now call Oldham. His son, James T. (Uncle Bud) lived at Oldham and raised his family there.

I asked for #13, because I consider it my lucky number. I didn't know it, but the desire for prayer had been posted the day before and all 16 had been chosen in a few seconds. Nevertheless, I am still going to pray for Kin-dra's #13, and all number 13's in our area. I'll post a #13 on the fridge so it will get my attention several times each day.
