## Iuka Resident "J.E." Hudson Dies at 101 Years of Age

One of Tishomingo County's oldest citizens has passed away at the age of one hundred and one years old, 2 months and 15 days.

James Edward "J.E." Hudson, a native of Iuka, MS passed away on Monday, September 7, 2020 at his residence. He was an ancestor to some of the settling families of the Coleman Park and was a good, loving man who lived a full life, making many friends along the way. He was a member at Campground United Methodist Church where he was known for his song leading abilities. From 1900 on J.E. Homesteaded his land to the point he was almost self sufficient and could sustain himself through his ability to hunt, deer hunt, and trap fish. He had a love for Bluegrass Music and enjoyed traveling and wide to attend Bluegrass Festivals. He was a World War II United States Army Veteran and served as the Grand Marshal of the 2018 Veteran's Parade in Iuka. J.E. also loved and cherished his time with his family and friends.



I'm grateful to Commissioner Tindell and everyone who has worked diligently on this effort."

Newly appointed Public Safety Commissioner Sean Tindell said, "We are committed to reducing the lines at our Driver Service Bureaus. Shortly after taking office, we identified several redundancies in our processes related to renewals of driver's licenses and firearm permits. We have worked diligently to

remove these redundancies, resulting in reduced processing times for customers."

The Mississippi Department of Public Safety is excited to offer the "Skip the Line" program to our customers. The program includes several new components to reduce customer wait times.

- Online Appointment System: Effective September 14, 2020, customers can schedule an appointment at the location of their choice in the Troop K (Gulf Coast) and Troop C (Jackson Metro) Regions. This feature will be available statewide on October 1, 2020. All appointments will be given priority service over walk-in customers.

- Skip the Line Cam: Customers can view the lines at all major Driver License stations prior to arriving by visiting <https://www.driverservicebureau.dps.ms.gov/live-feeds>. This feature will be avail-

able at all troop locations on October 1, 2020.

- Online/Mail-in Renewal: Firearm permit renewals will be made immediately, all permit renewals applications are online at <http://driverservicebureau.ms.gov/Firearm>. This program will mitigate the need to stand in line and the cost of a fingerprint for a permit renewal.

- Removal of Schedule: Effective October 1, 2020, a new firearm permit will be available every week.

When you turn the corner in her back yard, your eyes open in wonder at the myriad colors of plants and art so craftily displayed in beds, pots, and hanging from shepherd hooks and trees. This secret garden is a sight to behold for those who are privileged to see it. Mrs. Dooley was happy to accept a gift card from IUKA Wal-Mart.



### The "Gestalt Gardener"

Love getting stumped by plant identification questions, but sometimes driven around the internet, occasionally left and dry.

If I can't immediately find a photo from experience, I just scratch my head and get down to research; if uploading to my phone's plant app doesn't pan out, I make educated guesses from the internet or browse through plant books. My resort is a back-and-forth email avalanche with a flummoxing horticulture flummoxing another is a favorite time.

But now we're all pumpped on a plant name that came from folks who collect antique glassware. As so far found only a reference to a series of obscure American-made glass objects from the mid-1700s, and in an old newspaper ad from the '70s that listed, among other things, "greenhouse plants, dahlies, camelias, lilies, and a large assortment of garden plants..."

Sure, we know that dahlias was misspelled. What the heck are dahlias? Neither my hort garden history nor I can unearth anything like that, anywhere. We figure it was a

common plant's long-ago folk name. After all, this was just when plants were first being given standardized names by a guy named Linnaeus, when hostias were also called funkias.

Course, this doesn't make it any easier for modern plants. For decades I've enjoyed Granny's late summer-blooming red spider lilies, knowing full well that Aunt Mamie called them hurricane lilies; they're also known as resurrection, magic, or equinox lilies. Or even naked ladies, which is what I call the related, bigger pink summer blooming species.

There are several members of this tribe, all known in Latin as Lycoris (thanks, Linnaeus); the big, summer flowering pink one is *L. squamigera*, the smaller fall red one is *L. radiata*. Whatever. I mean, by 1854, when the first three bulbs were introduced into North Carolina by a seafaring botanist, the Japanese already had over a thousand local names for the same red flower.

Now spread over the entire South, often found around abandoned old house sites, it is one of our most treasured late summer blooms. Its clump of striped monkey grass-like leaves comes up in



the fall and dies down in late winter, and the flower stalks appear, completely leafless, after a good rain in August or September. And squirrels and voles won't touch the bulbs.

By the way, the best time to dig and transplant them is when they are blooming, when you know where they are, just when their roots are just starting to grow but before leaves appear. With permission, of course. Replant immediately, don't let them dry out.

To confuse things a bit more, in addition to the common red one, I grow a nearly white one with blushes of apricot pink, a rich golden yellow one, and a rosy pink one with pale lavender blue streaks. If you want to see some of these variations, go online to plantdelights.com and type in the search-box Lycoris; you'll find pale yellow, rusty orange, peach, coral, rose pink, and bicolor or peppermint kinds including white or pink with red stripes, and even red or pink with blue tips.

There's a fellow close to Jackson who grows and sells big bulbs of the red ones through the Mississippi Market Bulletin, a Department of Agriculture and Commerce publication that offers all sorts of hardy locally-grown herb plants, daylilies, elephant ears, gladiolus, cannas, mums, iris, and fig and pomegranate shrubs, catalpa trees, and much more. It's online.

Meanwhile, if anyone has jacony plants, or knows where I can find one, I'd sure like a start for my garden.



### Wicker Marks 75th Anniversary of Victory Over Japan

*World War II Adversary Has Become a Valued Partner by Senator Roger Wicker*

Carl and Gayle Long tied the knot in 1939 in the pastor's study at Tupelo's First Baptist Church. Carl was a salesman who supplied grocery stores, and Gayle taught in a local school. Two years into their marriage, Pearl Harbor changed everything. Like so many young Americans of that generation, Carl answered the call of duty and left behind the love of his life to serve his country. What followed were years of service, sacrifice, and prayer.

The Longs made it through the war and had one child, Gayle, who became my wife. Their surviving letters record Carl's service on the *USS Monrovia*, the bloody Battles of Tarawa and Okinawa, the terror of kamikazes taking aim at American ships, and the hardships of a young couple living through mankind's deadliest conflict. Theirs is the story of countless Americans who gave so much to defend our country in World War II.

### America Turned an Enemy Into a Friend

September 2 marked the 75th anniversary of the American victory over Japan, when Japanese officials surrendered on the deck of the *USS Missouri* in Tokyo Bay. Present at that ceremony were military leaders, dignitaries from around the world, and General Douglas MacArthur, who would lead the occupation of Japan. But noteworthy were the Americans who could not be there - the 405,399 men who died in the war and the 670,846 who were wounded. With the signing of the terms of surrender, hostilities came to an end. The United States had become a superpower, and the world had changed significantly.

History books are filled with examples of victors taking revenge on the people they conquered, but the United States set a different example after World War II. One of General MacArthur's first acts following Japan's surrender was to prohibit Allied personnel from assaulting Japanese people or eating scarce Japanese food. Japan was allowed to keep its emperor as a symbolic leader. America helped rebuild Japan from the wreckage of war and installed a new constitution that transformed Japan into a modern democracy. Our presence and aid helped prevent communism from taking root in the country, and our two countries even forged a bond over baseball, America's pastime.

## Words From The Wisest King Before Jesus (part 80)

Ecclesiastes is a very interesting book, chiefly because it is very practical in its information about life on earth, both how it is lived and how it should be lived. I have often thought that many people "live a lifetime" without ever learning much about "how to live a lifetime". Most Bible scholars whom I have read believe that Solomon certainly wrote the book of Ecclesiastes, which is what I believe, but even with the wisdom that he has given in this book, he too had a problem of failing to apply to his own life what he knew and taught others. The last chapter of Ecclesiastes is a fitting close for the book, for it majors on what things will be like toward the end of this life. Most of us have heard the little quote: "If I had known I would have lived this long, I would have

taken better care of myself when I was young". All of us who have live to older age could likely feel some regret for our failure to take care of our bodies better when we were young.

Ecclesiastes 12:4 continues with information about the problems of old age: "And the doors shall be shut in the streets, when the sound of the grinding is low, and he shall rise up at the voice of the bird, and all the daughters of musick shall be brought low." There are varied ideas on exactly what Solomon meant by some of his statements in verses 3-5 of chapter 12. It seems, as some good expositors has said, that Solomon is describing the problems that come with older age. So, we have the matter of mouths (doors) that are shut in the streets, meaning perhaps less opening of the

mouth by some older people because of missing teeth, especially in a day when there were no "store bought teeth", as some call them. The sound of the "grinding", or eating of food is low, because of an inability to chew well through problems of the teeth. Then we have the matter of sleep, when one rises up at the least little noise, like the voice of the bird, because he is not sleeping very soundly. It may seem a bit morbid for Solomon to write about these things, or for some of us to comment on what he has written, but another view of this matter could be that some of us who have experiences some of the disadvantages of older age are trying to arouse younger people to do what they can while young, for the ability to do it will diminish as age advances! The musicians

and their instruments do not sound out very loudly to those who are hard of hearing, which is what Solomon seems to be saying in the last part of our verse. Not only does the actual sound seem lower in volume, but the words are often harder to understand as age advances. There is no real reason to "cry the blues" when these things begin happening, for there may be some help for various aids to seeing, hearing or eating. There is a need to be grateful for the ability we do have to enjoy the good things of life, and there is a need to preserve whatever ability we have left to enjoy eating, hearing, seeing or working with our hands and bodies.

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

## The Floyd Family History

J. C. Floyd is a direct descendent of John Floyd of Chester County, South Carolina and his son Reuben who married Mary Jordan and were a healthy plantation owner in South Carolina. Reuben and Mary's son John Floyd married Margaret Mayo and according to land records, by 1845 John and Margaret had acquired in Old Tishomingo County. Over a period of years they increased their land holdings and were influential citizens in the county. Their son Richard Floyd married Susan Jane Harris in 1857. He farmed at Cartersville located between Midway and South Crossroads. Richard was killed in the Civil War at the age of 25 in 1865. The young couple had two children born in Tishomingo County, John Franklin (Frank) born December 18, 1859 and Mary Emmaline "Mollie" Floyd born March 13, 1862. She married J. G. Farris and died in 1941 and is buried at Mt. Zion Cemetery in Cole, Missouri. John Franklin (Frank) married Rachel Perry and led his life as a farmer, merchant and landowner in Tishomingo County, a licensed school teacher. He gave the land which Crossroads Baptist Church and Cemetery located and was a deacon in the church. Frank



J.C. Floyd & his wife, Vivian Mae (Hart) Floyd. They have 5 children who all live in Millington, TN. Joan, Anthony, Billy, Casey (deceased) & Janet

and Rachel are the grandparents of J. C. Floyd who is celebrating his 101<sup>st</sup> birthday this week. Frank and Rachel had ten children and J. C.'s father was Richard Perry Floyd (the first born of Frank and Rachel). Their other children were Sarah Alice Jane, Robert Edward, Mary Emmaline, Rachel Leora, John Franklin, Jr., William Alfred, Blanche Inez and Allen Elias. Mary Emmaline Floyd married James Harve Gober. She died in Salt Lake City, Utah in 1964 and is buried at Little Rock. Blanche Inez Floyd Smith Counce survived all

of her siblings and died in 1994 at 98 and is buried at South Crossroads with her parents.

The old Frank Floyd home place was built in 1901 and its 80 acres are located near South Crossroads on the Old Bailey and Turner Road, now County Road 127 and is owned by Frank's grandson, J. C. Floyd (who we honor today).

The above information on the Floyd family was taken from the Tishomingo County History and Families Book and was submitted by Bonnie Gober Crocker, granddaughter of Mary Emmaline Floyd Gober.


