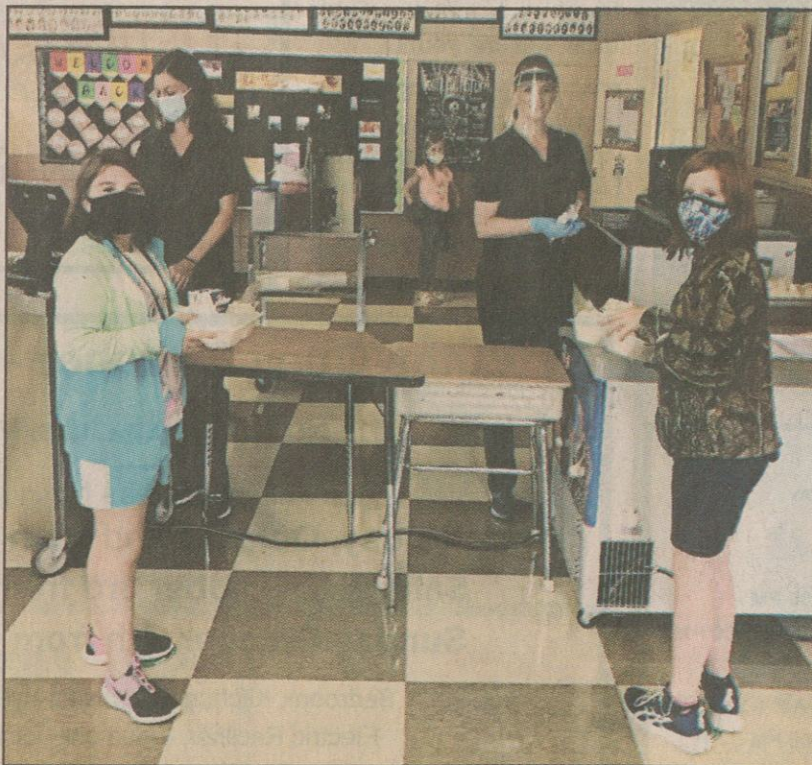

Tishomingo County Republicans Elected New Leadership

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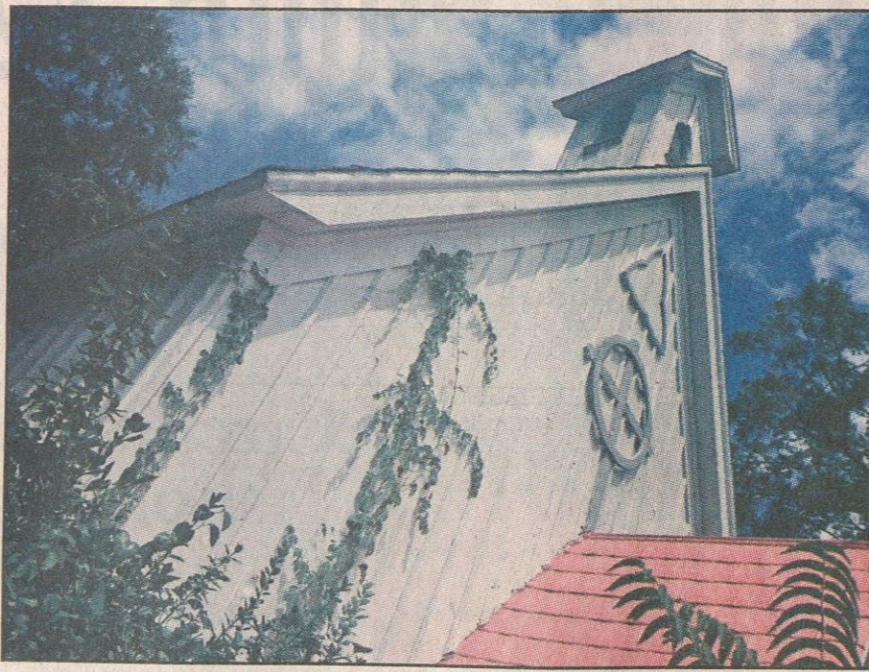
The Little Church Needs T L C

Governor Reeves Announced Updated COVID-19 Mandates

JACKSON — On Monday Governor Tate Reeves announced that he is extending the social distancing measures under the Safe Return order with a few amendments relaxing restrictions as Mississippi flattens the curve on new COVID-19 cases.

Continuing to work with state and national health experts on a data-driven, measured strategy to limit transmission, Governor Reeves has extended the Safe Return order until Wednesday, September 30 at 5:00 p.m.

Under the amended Safe Return order, group gathering limitations are now at no more than 10 indoors or 50 outdoors

when social distancing is not possible. Groups are able to socialize in groups of no more than 25 or 100 outdoors.

Maximum capacity has also been increased to 75% for retail businesses, restaurants, gyms, and seated dinners at halls and conference centers. Party sizes at restaurants are now limited to 10 people per table, and can be open 24 hours a day.

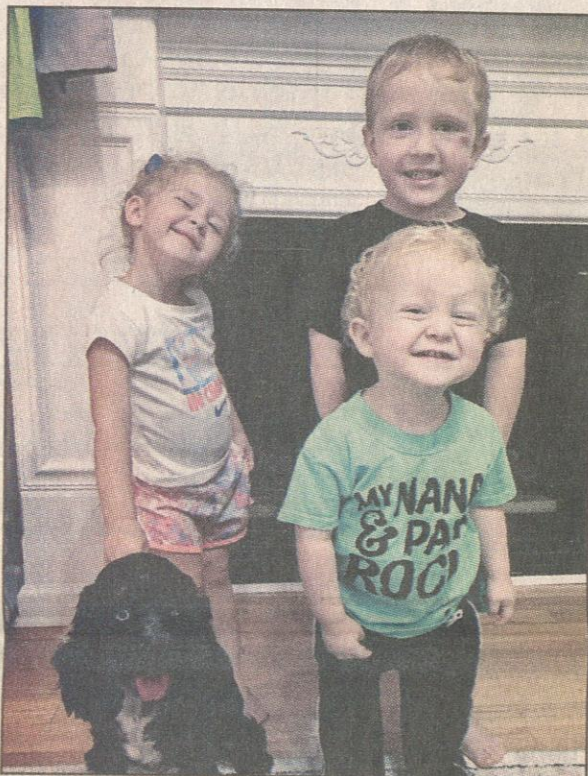
The change comes as the nation is facing challenges like never before. "Covid, riots, and left wing extremists are trying to destroy our great nation. The Democrat party has moved so far to the left

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Legendary Labor Day Events

This article, which appeared in newspapers throughout Alabama on Labor Day, was our own, L. O. Bishop, just over the line! We need to share it with our readers and thank Steve Flowers for his permission.

Steve Flowers

Labor Day was celebrated on Monday September 7th. In bygone days it was the benchmark for campaign season. Historically, Labor Day barbecues were where political campaigns had their roots. Up stew and barbecued were devoured while listening to politicians trying to bring home the prize.

The most legendary Labor Day Barbeques have been held in the Northwest corner of the state of Alabama. There were two monumental, legendary, barbeque events in that neck of the woods that were a go to event for aging and veteran politicians, both locally and wide.

The Terry Family Reunion is in the Loosier community of Lawrence County. This is where the Terry family originated. Actually, a good many of the folks that have kinship or ties to the Terry family. Many of the folks in Lawrence County are kin to each other through the large family.

Every serious candidate for governor or major office made the barbeque. It lasted many days. Some would arrive in helicopters, which drew attention. Legendary icons like Big Jim Folsom, George Wallace, Maxey, Albert Brewer, Howell Heflin attended every year.

Another Labor Day barbeque was held in that area, which was just as important if not quite as wide open as the Terry Event. The legendary L. O. Bishop of Colbert County was known for having a Labor Day barbeque bash. His event was big, but more selective. L.O. was and has been for 60 years a leader of the Alabama Farmers Federation. He would invite the Alfa backed candidates. His barbeque was known as the best in the state.

Bishop and Howell Heflin were best friends. Heflin became the best of the Alabama farmer. Judge Heflin became chairman of the Senate Culture Committee. He did a yeoman's job for Alabama Agriculture.

Senator Heflin was from Colbert County. He was renowned for being a lawyer, storyteller and judge. Being from west Alabama, he was the event of his best friend L. O. Bishop and Terry Family Reunion year. He not only attended the events, he stayed all day, grazed and barbeque.

Judge loved to eat. He really loved barbeque. He could tell he liked to eat from his large round belly. He considered himself a connoisseur of barbeque. In fact, he ate the state every year. He would plan his menu so that he could have his favorite barbeque in every corner of the state. When he would finish eating a plate of ribs, he would wipe his lips, sigh, wipe his face with his handkerchief and say, "That's mighty fine barbeque, it's almost as good as Q's"

It may be hard for some of you to believe, but after World War II and throughout the 1960's organized labor was king in Alabama, unlike today where most of our large industries are not unionized. During that 20-year period (1946-1966), Alabama was the most unionized state in the South by far. In fact, every major employer in the State of Alabama was a union shop.

Beginning in Northwest Alabama, the Reynolds Aluminum Plant in Sheffield and Florence was union. The Tennessee Valley workers throughout North Alabama were all union. The paper mill and Goodrich Tire Plant in Tuscaloosa were union.

The largest employer in Gadsden, the Goodyear Tire Factory, was union.

The Lee County Tire Manufacturing Plant was union. The military base employees at Ft. Rucker in the wiregrass were union.

The largest employer in Mobile was the state docks. Guess what, Folks? All those workers belong to the union.

The largest employer in Birmingham, as well as the largest employer in the State of Alabama, were the steel mills and U.S. Steel. You guessed it – the steel workers were all unionized. In fact, the Steel Workers Union in Birmingham was the largest in the nation.

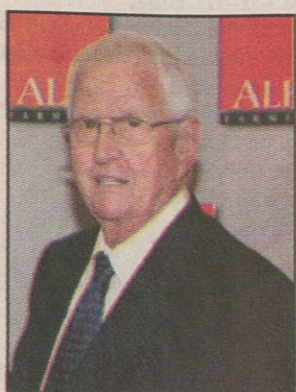

had at J. E. Hudson's funeral, who passed away last week at the age of 101.

The story of James Edward Hudson starts about a mile from here at Campground Methodist Church on a hot day in June of 1919.

Milton and Florence Hudson gave birth to their son "J.E.". He was a buncious child, always in motion, and earned the nickname of "no good Hudson" for his colorful antics and playful spirit.

Growing up he was energetic. Never one to stay inside and being in a classroom didn't come naturally to him. In school, he would often "NEGOTIATE" with his younger sister Irene to do his

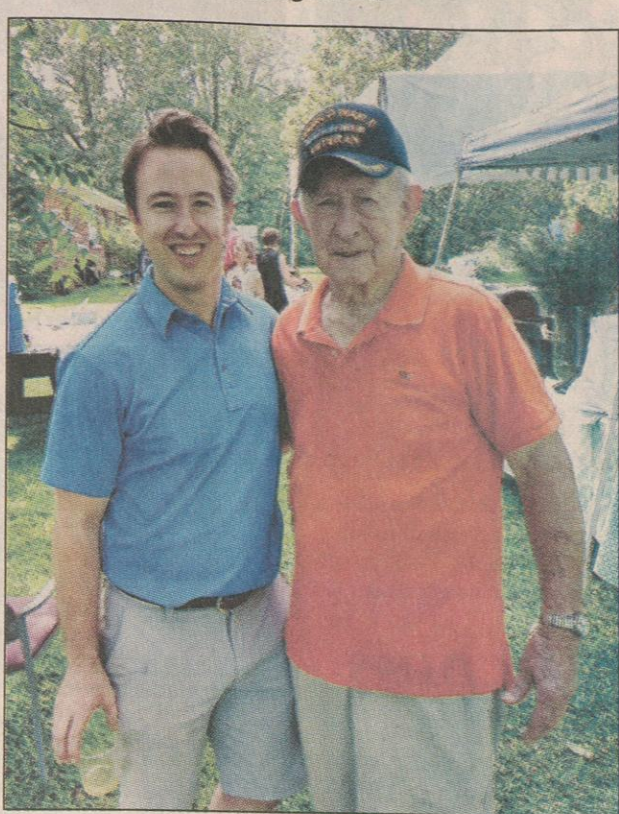
homework for him, because as he saw it, he did better things to do in the world. An avid basketball player, he often remarked that he would go to Ball, and sometimes play school". He probably wouldn't have gone to school at all, if he didn't have to play on the team.

Things changed for him when in [1942?], he answered the call of his country to serve in the Second World War. The first thing that changed was his name. Always known by initials he was asked that they stood for and not knowing fully, on the spot determined that he would now be known officially as "James Edward", sure if that's what his parents intended, but as

he did so many times, he loved his own path and went out to war. He served proudly for the United States Army in the Pacific theatre. As he was experiencing the thrills of war far parts of the world making the transition

adulthood, something else changed. A letter arrived, from a young man who had heard about his deployment from brother Dow. A striking brunette named Lutie

Romine, she wanted to show her support for the young soldier. As their correspondence became more frequent they started to love story that would live for over 70 years. They had 4 beautiful children: Bonnie, Barney, Jerry and

Neil. They were inseparable and shared the type of love we can all hope to have. They knew how to needle and tease each other too but never out of line and always in good spirit.

Papa loved to laugh, especially with his [beloved] Mae. Humor was a big part of who he was. Always quick with a joke, he kept his wit into the end of his life, remarking to his friend Goldie a few weeks ago that "if I don't get to this dying soon, everyone up in heaven is going to think I went the other way".

He believed in hard work and loved the land he called home. He found serenity in the outdoors and spent his life appreciating and cultivating the world around him. A masterful fisherman and hunter, he was a good shot. At 89 years old he could still hit a rabbit 30 yards away, even though some people say it was actually the household cat, we're going to give him the benefit of the doubt.

He had unshakeable faith. He spent his life following the gospel, in word and in deed, and built the foundation of the church that he loved and that we are standing in front of today. Even in his late nineties he would make the hilly walk here on Sun-

days to worship and sing out the day's hymn for the congregation to follow.

He loved his family, the love his life Mae, his children, grandchildren, great grandchildren, cousins and friends. And we all loved him. To us, he was larger than life, a hero who showed us warmth, taught us how to be good to others, look people in the eye and mean what you say. We were lucky to have him for as long as we did. His goal was to make it to 100, which he accomplished and then took a victory lap just to show off. But the miracle of Papa's life wasn't in living long, but living right. He was a symbol of strength, a man of integrity and kindness that could connect with people from all walks of life. He had a contagious enthusiasm for living that made you want to be near him.

He hated to leave us, because he didn't want to miss out on anything and we hated to see him go because of all he meant to everyone of us. But through our grief and tears we can be comforted knowing that he will have a welcoming committee in heaven a mile wide and it fills my heart to think of him and Mama laughing together again, smiling down on us like they always did and always will.

I Remember

Fall is in the air. The pretty yellow butterflies are rushing across my yard because they know Florida is a long flight from Mississippi. If they were to stop at every yard, cold weather would interfere with a successful voyage.

Isn't it ironic that butterflies listen to the urging of nature, (God) and obey better than God's crowing creation listens? Man.

I was looking for something in an old scrap book and ran across just what I needed for this story. There was a letter and a story from Claude Denton and his wife, Paula. I read the article, "The School Whipping" sent to me in 2005. I picked up the phone and called for permission to include it in my next article. Permission granted, so here goes in his own words:

"The School Whipping"

By Claude Denton

This incident which happened in my first year of school (probably just studying the primer) at Bogg's Chapel, a one room school, has been discussed and recounted by many that were present that day. This is my story, the memory of one of the characters in the "play".

There was only one pencil sharpener, which was on the wall by the blackboard. It was well used and I had heard from others that some children didn't know the proper way to sharpen a pencil and this had caused wear and tear on our one and only pencil sharpener.

The morning of the incident I saw Leon Henderson, my classmate who later was with me in high school, using the sharpener in what I thought was an improper manner. After confronting him with this, it seems we had an argument and maybe a scuffle, which was noticed by Miss Joslin, the teacher. Her

comment was, "Do you know what most teachers would do to little boys that fight? They would whip them!" My answer was, "They wouldn't whip me." My age was probably five or six at the time. The above statement seems to have caused the following results: Miss Joslin told Leon and me to go to our seats. Whether or not she told us she would deal with the matter later I don't recall. At recess she told us to go outside and get switches. This is when my older brother John, who was probably thirteen years old, said, "There is no use for them to get switches, because you are not going to whip them!" We were persuaded to go on and select the switches, which we did, and returned to the classroom, where Miss Joslin proceeded to start my whipping with a lick or two. At this time, the whipping was interrupted by my older brother, who came up and grabbed the switch. They went around and around and the switch was broken. Immediately afterwards John told my sister Gladys, who was probably 11 years old, "Get your books, we are all going home." At this time Miss Joslin ran to the front door and got into a defensive position, in front of the door with arms out stretched. Then John directed us to go out the back door and we all went home. After we left, the story from Walter Puckett is that one student stood up and asked, "Will there be any school tomorrow?"

This is how I recall the incident that seems to have been an exciting event at Bogg's Chapel School.

Miss Joslin was the aunt of Country Music singer and entertainer, Tammy Wynette. She did not finish out the school term and was replaced by Audie House, a resident of the com-



munity.

That afternoon Miss Joslin told Mr. Claude Humber that she had whipped Claude Denton. He answered her with, "I guess he needed it." School continued the next day as usual.

I went to school in a Model A. I believe that was what it was called. At one time it had had a rumble seat. Chester had removed the seat and put a dog coop instead.

It had on "on" and "off" switch for gas under the dash. Naturally, cars don't run without gas unless you have an "electric car."

When school was out all the children that lived on my short route would load into my A model. They loved to ride even though it was about 1/4 mile to their houses. Sometime after everyone got loaded it wouldn't crank.

Braves Show Resilience Against Urchins

Iuka, Miss. --- On Friday, September 11, 2020 the Braves hosted 2A power East Union on a night where Seniors from Football, Band, Cheer, Dance, Mascot, and Cross Country were honored as well as all branches of our Nation's Armed Forces. The Braves found themselves in an early 14 to 0 deficit, but fought all the way back to within three points in the fourth quarter, only to fall a little short.

The Urchins wasted no time as they took the opening kickoff 95-yards for the Touchdown. On the very next possession, an Urchin Linebacker took an Interception back to the endzone to put the visitors up 14 to 0. Head Coach Richard Russo had this to say of the slow start, "We did not have the typical first game hiccups in our first game, unfortunately it appears as though we saved them for East Union. However, I am so, so proud of all 59 players,

Coaches, and everyone in attendance Friday Night. No one gave up. We showed extreme resilience and perseverance and fought until the bitter end with relentless effort. That is what I expect from a Brave team from here on out." The Braves would answer the second score with a 40-yard Gavin Crocker rushing strike and Scott Robinson would add the extra point.

The second quarter would be quite a seesaw battle as both teams would score 14 points apiece. The Braves did it through an aerial attack as Junior Quarterback Blake Counce connected with Senior Wide Receiver Justin Glidewell twice for scoring strikes. One from 44-yards out and another from three yards out. The Urchins did their damage mostly on the ground behind Senior Tailback Colton Plunk, who is considered one of the best in the state in smaller classifications.

At the intermission, the Urchins led the Braves 28 to 21.

The second half the Braves made some vital halftime adjustments and had a much stronger defensive effort led by Linebackers Tyriek Duckett, Jake Russell, and Defensive Lineman Jackson Stuart who all paced the Wrecking Crew Defense with tackles and tackles for loss. In the final frame, Robinson would add a 28-yard Field Goal out of the hold of Charlie McAnally and the snap of Jim Riley. Counce would go on to connect with Duckett for a 73-yard touchdown pass and then with Ashton Dilworth for the two-point conversion to bring the Braves within three points. The Braves Defense would go on to force a three and out and get the ball near midfield with a chance to tie or take the lead in the fourth quarter, but were stalled by penalties and lost yardage plays.

Russo added, "I thought our Offense led by Coach Hathorn and Blake Counce really clicked tonight. We put up 32 points on a very tough and well coached Urchin Defense. The Offense showed balance with 192 yards rushing and 193 yards passing and even outgained the Urchins on the night. We as a team, cannot spot anyone 14 points, much less a team that is capable of reaching the 2A state championship game. Giving up 28 points on Defense is not our standard and we will get the little mistakes and errors fixed as well as special teams mistakes. We can build upon this heart and effort and perseverance, we just have to fix the technique issues and be more coachable." The Braves are back in action this Friday at 6A Lewisburg in DeSoto County.

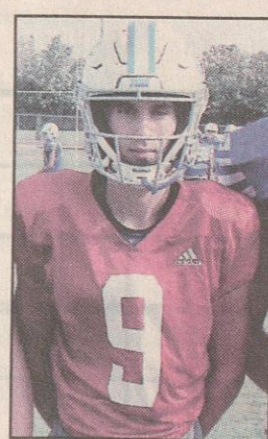
We have been so busy here at IMS, and we are almost to the middle of the 9 weeks already!
