Voter Information for the Upcoming General Election

The Circuit Clerk's Office would like to remind everyone who has questions about the upcoming General Election in November to contact us at 423-7026. It's critical for you to get accurate information, and there has been lots of misinformation in the media. The COVID-19 pandemic prompted several changes to state election laws. You will be receiving a postcard from the Mississippi Sectary of State's office soon with information about some of the changes and important dates related to the November 3rd General Elec-

Absentee voting is now underway, as it begun September 21st 2020. On Election day the polls will be open as normal. We encourage everyone who is able to vote at your polling place on election day in person. Myself and the Election commissioners have a plan in place to make it as safe as possible for everyone to vote in person at the polls. This plan includes a poll worker at each polling place who's only responsibility will be to disin-

fect and help maintain CDC guidelines. Also, many forms of PPE will be available, as well as hand sanitizers, shields, vinyl covering for surfaces, UV disinfectants, social distancing information, and many other tools. Stylus pens will be used at the polling place to ensure pens are not shared, and voters do not have to touch the voting machines with their hands.

For those who may need to vote Absentee you can do that now by coming to the Clerk's office in person to complete the entire absentee process, or if you meet the requirements you may request/vote absentee by mail. If you believe you will need to vote by absentee please do not wait till the last minute. If you have access to Facebook; go to Josh McNatt Tishomingo County Circuit Clerk, then view the videos about absentee infor-

age or older; (2) A registered voter who is temporarily residing outside the county; (3) A registered voter who is temporarily or permanently physically disabled; and or; (4) A registered voter who is the parent, spouse or dependent of a temporarily or permanently physically disabled person who is hospitalized outside the county or more than 50 miles away from his/her residence and will be with that person on Election Day. (5) All registered voters who are members of the Armed Services, their spouses, dependents, and overseas citizens who fall under the Uniformed and Overseas Citizens Absentee Voting Act (UO-

Mail in absentee applications and ballot en-

velopes must be notarized except for a registered voter who is physically disabled, either permanently or temporarily, and UOCAVA voters. The disabled voter's application and ballot envelope must be witnessed and signed by a person 18 years of age or older. All absentee ballots requested by mail must be sent by mail to the voter, and they must be returned by mail to the clerk's office. No absentee ballots may be hand deliv-

One recent change to absentee voting laws is related to the absentee voting criteria for those with a temporary disability, which is an eligible excuse for mail-in absentee voting. This now includes, but is not limited to, those who are under a physi-

He was an old man when he wrote the book. He was a first cousin to Jesus. His mother was a sister to the Virgin Mary. So I'm sure he knew Jesus and who He really was. John was the first and last of Jesus' Apostles. I know our in dept study will be interesting.

After the S.S. lesson we have an hour's break. (That's when I eat breakfast). Then Angie listens to her pastor, Bro. Jason Reed, First Baptist at Booneville, and I listen and worship with my pastor, Bro. Rusty Fair. I'll have to say it is not as meaningful to me as sitting in a pew with all my sisters and brothers, but it sustains and keeps me on

the right track, hopefully. I really know why my daughter comes every Sunday. If she were not here it would be a temptation for me to get in the car and go to church. I've been known to disobey, but with her here? I don't dare get up and go.

When I started to

write today I was just going to say thank you for your encouragement to me for writing abut the normal life of a country girl during the Great Depression and a few winter catastrophes at that time. I didn't realize how poor people were. We had plenty to eat and enough to wear. All my friends were in the same boat together. We had time to visit, share our food, and wear home-made clothes.

This epidemic comparison the to and thirties? I don't have words to explain. Both were and are unreal. To me, this is much worse. Freedom is what has made America the envy of the world. For the last few months fear and restrictions have dominated our freedom. I feel like an old recluse sometimes. I'm not supposed to "love on" my great-grands and I feel I need the hugs as much, maybe more, than they do.

Thank you J. C. Grimes for your comment when I taught at Boggs Chapel and later at Paden I had your niece Carolyn and nephew Phillip. If I recall in your story last week you are the only one left of your family siblings. That's also true with me. There was one boy, and six girls. As I was writing I remembered that my sister Hilda Gay Page Holman was buried forty-five years ago today. She was next to the baby and the first of the six girls to go. I still miss her. My brother, George Robert Page, Jr. was killed in an 18-wheeler accident. He was younger than I.

In closing I will share another item of interest to the youth of today. We had a water bucket and dipper on a small, tall table. We all drank from this water bucket during the day. Students (always two) went to Everett Floyd's and drew the water from a well. We didn't drink from the dipper. Everyone had his own glass and kept it on a shelf. A large student was designated as the "dipper." He filled our glasses. On hot days, two or three gallons were needed. We were not wasteful. Bringing the water was not necessarily a treat. They hurried back.

Enjoy these autumn days and watch for the yellow butterflies.

I have a special poetry book with many of my favorite poems and special authors. Each year I pull this book out and read all these poems written about autumn. It was a special gift from a former student, Kirby McRae. Thanks for spreading joy. You remembered.

"The COVID-19 demicrepresents the test medical and Lic health challenge decades,"said Amy ter, Director of the

Office of Tobacco Control for the Mississippi State Department of Health. "Scientists are still learning about the disease, but we know that smoking weakens the immune system, which makes it harder for your body to fight disease. If you continue to smoke, you also have a greater risk for respiratory infections."

More than 16 million Americans are living with a disease caused by smoking. For every person who dies because of smoking, at least 30 people live with a serious smoking-related illness. Smoking causes cancer, heart disease, stroke, lung diseases, diabetes, and chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD), which includes emphysema and chronic

Smoking also for increases risk tuberculosis, certain eye diseases, and problems of the immune system, including rheumatoid

arthritis. And for those with heart or lung disease caused by smoking, you may be at higher risk of having severe illness from COVID-19.

"Tobacco use remains the number one cause of preventable disease and death in the U.S.," said Jenniffer Palmer Director of the Mississippi Tobacco-Free Coalition of Prentiss and Tishomingo Counties. "Tobacco kills more than 480,000 people per year and sadly that's still more than COVID-19. You have to protect yourself from COVID-19. but if you need help quitting smoking, we have free tools."

Initiative Measure No. 65, Should Mississippi allow qualified patients with debilitating medical conditions, as certified by Mississippi licensed physicians, to use medical marijuana?

Legislative Budget Office Fiscal Analysis for Initiative 65:

The overall cost to Mississippi for the first year is estimated to be \$11,068,150. The anticipated expenses for the first year to implement a medical marijuana program is \$24,068,150 (Plants - seeds to Sale: \$5,000,000; Licensing, Monitoring, Inspection: \$16,220,150; and Cost to Collect Revenue: \$2,848,000). The anticipated revenue is \$13,000,000 (User ID Cards: \$2,500,000; Cofmercial Licenses: \$500,000 and sales fee at 7 percent: \$10,000,000).

The anticipated expenses for years following the first for a medical marijuana program is \$15,338,000 (Plants - seeds to Sale: \$5,000,000; Licensing, Monitoring, Inspection: \$8,756,000; and Cost to Collect Revenue: \$1,582,000). The anticipated revenue is \$26,000,000 (User ID Cards: \$5,000,000; Commercial Licenses: \$1,000,000 and sales fee at 7 percent: \$20,000,000). The overall annual revenue is anticipated to be \$10,662,000, all of which must be used to support the state marijuana program.
