The Tishomingo County School Senior and Junior Census is scheduling a drive for the Census to improve the perage for Tishomingo County. The students will have a tent at Brooks Grocery, and Wiggly, Sunday September 27th from 1:00-4:00 pm.

If you have not completed Census report, they will be to help you by going on or calling a toll free number register for the 2020 Census. They are also asking for all in-

Homecoming Parade Planned for TCHS Students in Burnsville

The TCHS Homecoming has organized a parade for the 2020 Homecoming. The parade will be held September 28th at 6:00 p.m. in Burnsville along the Industrial Park Road heading north to the beginning of the road at Hwy 72 East. Industrial Park Road will be closed thru traffic at 5 p.m. by Burnsville officials. Burnsville and Burnsville Volunteer

Fire Department will be assisting.

Due to COVID 19, only high school students will be participating in the parade. The number one priority is the safety of all TCHS students and participants, and all rules have been established by TCHS Administration with this goal in mind.

The Circuit Clerk's Office would like to remind everyone who has questions about the upcoming General Election in November to contact us at 423-7026. It's critical for you to get accurate information, and there has been lots of misinformation in the media. The COVID-19 pandemic prompted several changes to state election laws. You will be receiving a postcard from the Mississippi Secretary of State's office soon with information about some of the changes and important dates related to the November 3rd General Election.

Absentee voting is now underway, as it begun September 21st 2020. On Election day the polls will be open as normal. We encourage everyone who is able to vote at your polling place on election day in person. Myself and the Election commissioners have a plan in place to make it as safe as possible for everyone to vote in person at the polls. This plan includes a poll worker at each polling place who's only responsibility will be to disin-

fect and help maintain CDC guidelines. Also, many forms of PPE will be available, as well as hand sanitizers, shields, vinyl covering for surfaces, UV disinfectants, social distancing information, and many other tools. Stylus pens will be used at the polling place to ensure pens are not shared, and voters do not have to touch the voting machines with their hands.

For those who may need to vote Absentee you can do that now by coming to the Clerk's office in person to complete the entire absentee process, or if you meet the requirements you may request/vote absentee by mail. If you believe you will need to vote by absentee please do not wait till the last minute. If you have access to Facebook; go to Josh McNatt Tishomingo County Circuit Clerk, then view the videos about absentee information.

Only five groups are allowed to vote absentee by mail. These are the five groups: (1) A registered voter who is 65 years of

age or older; (2) A registered voter who is temporarily residing outside the county; (3) A registered voter who is temporarily or permanently physically disabled; and or; (4) A registered voter who is the parent, spouse or dependent of a temporarily or permanently physically disabled person who is hospitalized outside the county or more than 50 miles away from his/her residence and will be with that person on Election Day. (5) All registered voters who are members of the Armed Services, their spouses, dependents, and overseas citizens who fall under the Uniformed and Overseas Citizens Absentee Voting Act (UOCAVA).

Mail in absentee applications and ballot en-

velopes must be notarized except for a registered voter who is physically disabled, either permanently or temporarily, and UOCAVA voters. The disabled voter's application and ballot envelope must be witnessed and signed by a person 18 years of age or older. All absentee ballots requested by mail must be sent by mail to the voter, and they must be returned by mail to the clerk's office. No absentee ballots may be hand delivered.

One recent change to absentee voting laws is related to the absentee voting criteria for those with a temporary disability, which is an eligible excuse for mail-in absentee voting. This now includes, but is not limited to, those who are under a physi-

cian-imposed quarantine or those who are under a dependent's quarantine, due to COVID-19. So, these individuals would be considered temporarily disabled for absentee voting purposes. Many individuals of the age of 65 have been encouraged to vote by mail, which is the only reason they are not disabled. If you are temporarily or permanently disabled, you will be required to have your application and ballot notarized. One reason we encourage those who need to vote by absentee is to do so at the Clerk's office the last day to vote by absentee at the Clerk's office is

Celebrating 50th Anniversary

63 years ago the members of the Thursday Club of Iuka (also known as the Thursday Study Club) observed the organization's 50th anniversary on Thursday afternoon, Sept. 12th 1957 with a tea at the home of Mrs. John Henry Allen. The club paid tribute to Mrs. T. M. McDonald, seated, only living charter member of the club. Mrs. R. J. Brown, left, and Mrs. Annie Matthews of Memphis, right, long-time members of the club gave a most interesting skit on earliest meetings and how the club changed through the years. The celebration was co-hosted by Mrs. L. F. Carmichael, and assisted by Mrs. Harris Carmichael. Mrs. Sam Kimberly was president of the club and she welcomed new member, Mrs. Warren Sheets. Mrs. R. E. Wesson led the club in prayer after which Mrs. Harry Rhine presented the program. Club guests were Mrs. J. L. Goyer and Mrs. Mary Bostick.

(The home of Mrs. Allen is located on Quitman Street in Iuka and recently sustained damage by a fire, the beautiful brick home has been brought back to its glory by its present owner.

Mrs. T. M. (Lyla Merrill) McDonald lived in the beautiful historical home that was torn down after her death. The Iuka Middle School gymnasium now stands where the pre Civil War home stood. There are very few photos of Mrs. McDonald. She was one of Iuka's most loved citizens. She wrote the history of Iuka in the 1930's which was published in The Vidette during the town's centennial anniversary.

This trip is made by truck from the Lester Skinner flocks that are tended by a number of farmers who are cooperating with him in the production of high quality eggs. In the picture, ground are Mr. Skinner, left, and Herbert Enlow, right. The truck is driver Leon (Sonny) Mock. Mr. Skinner with Mr. Enlow and a number of other county farmers started their egg production last year and have increased the size and numbers of their flocks. In October of this year a \$1,000,000.00 annual egg sale will be sold from Tishomingo County.

Many Tishomingo County farmers are turning back from the loss of cotton lands fast into chicken production from chickens. There are now 52 farmer houses of layers with flocks ranging in size from 8,500 hens. Largest independent producer of chickens and Mrs. Travis Cain in the Valley Community northeast of Belmont. They now have 8,500 4,000 now laying and 4,500 that will be in production the middle of August. The Cains were formerly in the production of broilers but when the market and became weak in that field they changed to

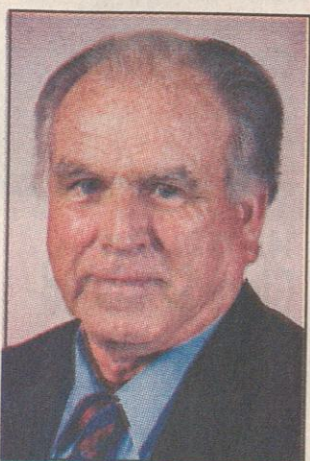

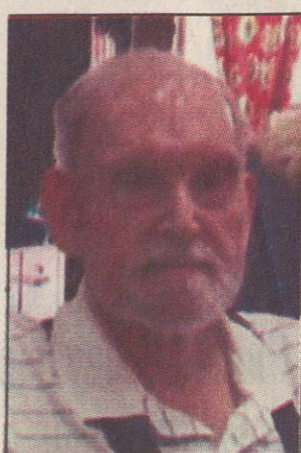

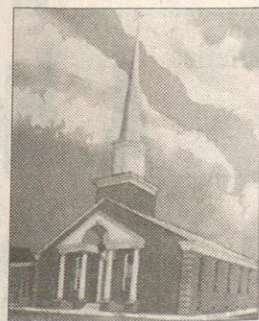

Words From The Wisest King Before Jesus (part 81)

Fear is a terrible thing, at least in almost all areas of life, but a healthy fear of God is a wonderful thing, the foundation of which is one of the main reasons for the writing of the Bible. Solomon is closing his book of Ecclesiastes with some seemingly morbid thought on aging, yet these admonitions are actually not as "morbid" as one might think, for Solomon is only calling on mankind to face reality. I think that we have come to a time in history that too many people are trying to live in a dream world, but that is what we might expect when much of

what people see is actually only a dream world. Many children have problems making the distinction between fantasy and reality, thus we sometimes hear of strange things that some young people, or older people, do, because they are living in a world of fantasy. Solomon has made an effort to "burst that bubble" of the dream world with a strong dose of reality medicine!

Ecclesiastes 12:5 says, "And when they shall be afraid of that which is high, and fears shall be in the way, and the almond tree shall flourish, and the grasshopper shall be a bur-

den, and desire shall fail: because man goeth to his long home, and the mourners go about the streets." I have never been a "dare devil", when it comes to high places. Yes, I used to jump off of a bank that was 25 to 30 feet high into a pool of water below, but I would not do that at age 76! I remember climbing up a ladder more than twenty feet to paint the side of my two

story house, but I live in a single story house now, and I am not real fond of climbing too high on ladders. Fear of doing things that one used to do at a younger age is the norm for older people. The body is not as vibrant, as flexible or as strong as it was in younger years. So, it is wise to face facts and avoid risking what is seemingly out of one's range of abil-

ity to do! Some thing that the "almond tree flourishing" speaks of the graying of the hair in older age, and this sounds right, since the "figure of speech" used here offers no explanation. The burden of the grasshopper may speak of the inability to cope with pests, or the inability to get around like a grasshopper. (You are free to give you own explanation.) The matter of the failing of desire is not too hard to figure out for most of us who have been on earth for multiple decades! Some things that are so thrilling when one is young may hold not grip on the life of an older per-

son. This does not mean that older people have to give up all recreation or pleasure in living, but it does mean that they may have to curtail some things. I used to walk four miles every day, seven days a week. I did this for about 45 years, with 25 years without missing a day, but I finally had to miss because of a health situation. No I walk only three miles a day, usually six days a week. I have made some adjustments, but I have not stopped doing this one thing that I love to do, and more than that, need to do. So, don't quit, but perhaps only slow down!

The work shall include, but not BE limited to, construction of a 4,250 track foot industrial park railroad spur in accordance with Norfolk Southern Railroad drawings and specifications, reconstruction of two timber crossings, replacement/reconstruction of one concrete crossing, replacing a 96" CMP storm sewer under three spur tracks, replacing approximately 2,000 cross-ties on an approximately 10 mile stretch of the Yellow Creek Access Railroad, and other ancillary items. This description is intended to show the general nature of the work; actual work items shall be as defined in the contract documents.

Each bid submitted must be marked on the outside "RAILROAD CONSTRUCTION AND IMPROVEMENTS, YELLOW CREEK STATE INLAND PORT". Any bid in excess of \$50,000 must contain on the outside of the envelope the contractor's current certificate of responsibility number, and no bid shall be opened or considered unless this number appears on the outside of the envelope or unless a statement is included on the outside of the envelope indicating that the bid enclosed does not exceed \$50,000.

In the letting of public contracts, preference shall be given to resident contractors, and a nonresident bidder domiciled in a state having laws granting preference to local contractors shall be awarded Mississippi public contracts only on the same basis as the nonresident bidder's state awards contracts to Mississippi contractors bidding under similar circumstances; and resident contractors actually domiciled in Mississippi, be they corporate, individuals, or partnerships, are to be granted preference over nonresidents in awarding of contracts in the same manner and to the same extent as provided by the laws of the state of domicile of the nonresident. When a nonresident contractor submits a bid for a public project, he shall attach thereto a copy of his resident state's current law pertaining to such state's treatment of nonresident contractors. Any bid submitted by a nonresident contractor which does not include the nonresident contractor's current state law shall be rejected and not considered for award.

A satisfactory Bid Bond executed by the Bidder and an accepted Surety, a certified check, or bank draft payable to the Yellow Creek State Inland Port, on negotiable U.S. Government Bonds (at par value), shall be submitted with each bid in an amount equal to five percent (5%) of the total bid.

Bids will only be accepted from Bidders who are listed on the Plan Holders list, signifying that they have purchased a set of documents.

Bids may be held for up to 60 days from the date of opening for review of bids and qualifications of bidders prior to Contract award. The Yellow Creek State Inland Port reserves the right to reject any or all bids or to waive any informalities in the bidding.

Braves Fall in Valiant Effort at 6A Lewisburg Friday Night

Olive Branch, Miss. --- On Friday, September 18, the Braves made the long trek to DeSoto County to take on the homesteading 6A Lewisburg Patriots. The Braves clawed their way to a 21 to 14 halftime lead, before ultimately falling short 31 to 41.

The Braves opening drive started with promise as they moved the ball deep into Patriot territory before ultimately surrendering an interception. The defense would force the Patriots to earn their first score as the Patriots had to convert on several third downs and even one fourth down before eventually finding the end zone to go up seven to zero.

The second quarter would be a barrage of passing from the Braves led by Junior Quarterback Blake Counce, who set career highs in both passing and rushing. The Braves would take a halftime lead into the locker room 21 to 14.

The second half saw the tough, physical running of the Patriots of offense seem to overwhelm the Braves Defense. Lewisburg would put up 27 points as their final Point After Touchdown Attempt was blocked by Riley. The Braves defensive efforts were paced by Tyriek Duckett with 20 total tackles, two for loss, and four quarterback hurries. Jake Russell added 17 total tackles to the cause as well as Jordan Kelley with 12 total stops. Special Teams were highlighted by Senior Kicker and Punter Scott Robinson as he had five touchbacks on the night, was four for four on PATs, and one for one

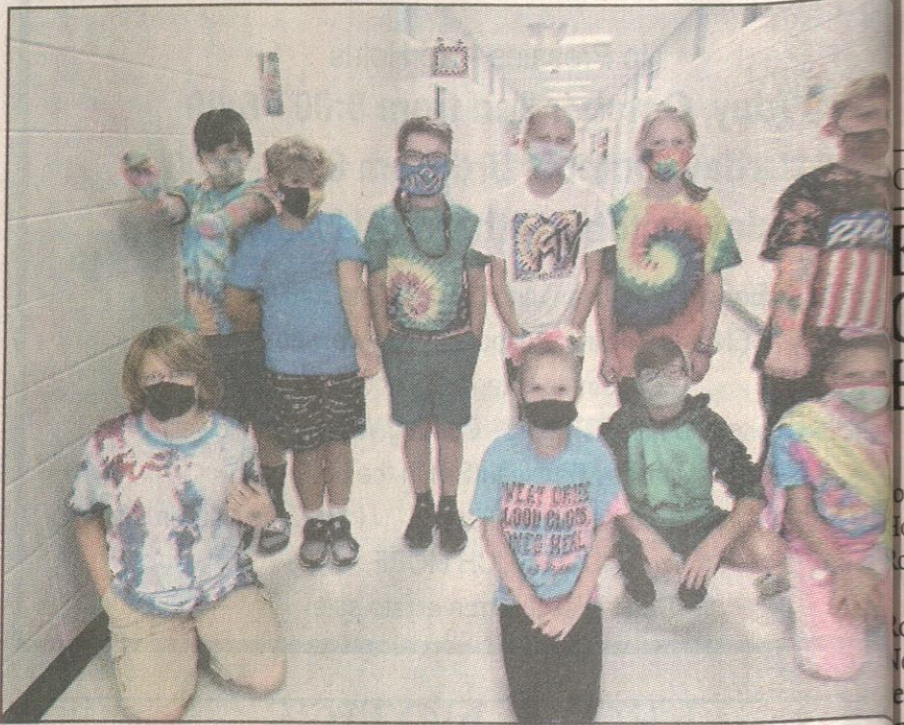
on Field Goals. Snappers Shea Harwell and Jim Riley had excellent nights of work.
