IDEA Presents Jaybird Holiday Market and the 3rd Annual Veterans Day Parade in Iuka this Saturday



State Votes for New Flag and Medical Marijuana, Local Run-Off Election to be Held

The U.S. General Election was held Tuesday, November 3rd; as of Wednesday morning the presidential race is still undecided.

A special election was held in Tishomingo County to fill the position of Justice Court Judge - North District. The race was held between 7 candidates, the majority winners were Seth Adams and Ricky Cornelison who will face each other in a runoff election to be held on November 24th.

Cindy Hyde-Smith won her position for the Senate and Trent Kelly received the majority of the vote for 1st Congressional District. The Supreme Court District 3 (Northern) Position 3 is unofficial at the time of press.

Election measures unique to the state of Mississippi included the design of a new state flag which passed with overwhelming approval. The installation of a program for medical marijuana also received enough support to pass in the state. A resolution to amend the way our state-wide officials are elected by majority vote also passed.

Positions for districts 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5 were on the ballot and all candidates ran uncontested. The winners were District 1, James Pete Walker; District 2, Beverly Ragan; District 3, Sherry Wingo Gwatney; District 4, Chasity George; and District 5, Nancy Collier.

Tishomingo County held an election for Tishomingo County Special School Board District trustees for District 1 and 5; the candidates in these races ran uncontested. Michael Puckett was elected for District 1 and Stacy Stepp was elected for District 5.

Of the 12828 individuals registered to vote in Tishomingo County 9104 people turned out to the polls in the county to cast a ballot, meaning that 70.97% of voters let their voice be heard in this election. Tishomingo County Master Gardeners Greenhouse Construction Nears Completion

IUKA – Within weeks Tishomingo County Master Gardeners who are working to construct a greenhouse expect the project to be fully functional.
The concrete floor was poured early in the year, but work was halted by the onset of the coronavirus pandemic, when Mississippi State University canceled in-person activities at the Extension Service in March.
However, over the past several weeks the construction group, which includes Charles Hardwick, David Day and Ed Senn – has been at work framing, enclosing and putting the roof on the greenhouse.
“It’s designed to have aisles inside, with plants along the outer walls and down the center,” Hardwick said during a recent work session. “We’re trying to get things set up before the cold weather sets in.”
Once the greenhouse is completed, about 200 more plants are ready to go inside to be cared for over the winter and available for sale in the Tishomingo County Master Gardeners annual plant sale.
Those plants came from the home of the late Ed Patterson, one of the county’s first master gardener training graduates, the Mississippi Master Gardener Volunteer of the Year in 2017 and a dedicated supporter of the county’s projects.
“Tom had started a lot

of plants for next year’s plant sale after this year’s sale was canceled because of the coronavirus,” said Tishomingo County Master Gardener Coordinator and extension agent Zach Yow. “The greenhouse was always a dream of his, and we picked up several truck beds full of different varieties from his house. There were even a few indoor plants that we put in the office for people to enjoy.”

The several dozen members of Tishomingo County Master Gardeners will handle upkeep and routine tasks to maintain the greenhouse and plants, as well as bringing their own varieties from home to expand offerings for the plant sale, Yow said.

Though master gardener in-person meetings and classes have been interrupted, Mississippi State and the local extension

office resumed offering classes and training by Zoom interactions and recorded videos several months ago.

Also look for information about upcoming master gardener classes which are expected to resume next spring.

In-person interactions are still limited at the extension office, but Yow and other staff members are there every day to respond to any needs and calls people in the county have. (662) 423-7016.





Words From The Wisest King Before Jesus (part 86)

We are coming close to the end of the last chapter of Ecclesiastes, and I have enjoyed writing from this short book written, as many of us believe, by King Solomon. In his closing remarks of the last chapter, Solomon writes in Ecclesiastes 12:12: "And further, by these, my son, be admonished: of making many books there is no end; and much study is weariness of the flesh." I know that I have not studied many subjects nearly as much as some, yet I have sought to study the Book that is the basis of the ministry that God has given me. I admire those who have written

commentaries and other books on the Book of all books, the Bible. I also have a great respect for those whom God used to write the words of Scripture. Solomon was the wisest king the world has ever known, yet that wise king came to the end of life having made some very unwise decisions about the worship of false gods (I Kings 11:1-8). It is hard to imagine that a man whom God did use

in many great way, not only in what he has written, but also in being the man responsible for the building of the temple of God in Jerusalem. This man is to be honored for what he did and for what he wrote, but he failed in latter years to follow his own admonition!

Our verse above begins with an admonition from Solomon concerning the "making of many books", which

Solomon indicates is an endless pursuit. The idea seems to be that one could simply write "forever", so to speak, on all kinds of topics, yet the whole story would likely never be told. It seems that Solomon loved to write, as well as to gather together the writings of others. I am not at all in the same "class" as Solomon, but I do love to write. I also love to read what others have written, for that is one way of "picking the brains" of those before us and around us. But then Solomon said something else that many people may not have taken the opportu-

nity to learn, for he said, "Much study is a weariness of the flesh". I think that being "brain tired" is likely more draining, perhaps even physically, than some physical labor. Oh, mental exercise does not necessarily make our muscles sore, but it does make our thinking faculties tired. When Solomon said that much study is a weariness of the flesh, he meant more than just a "physical workout", rather it seems he was saying that we get "burned out" mentally sometimes by so much study. Most of us who speak by teaching, preaching or otherwise have learned that we be-

come exhausted when we do mental and vocal work for several hours. The "weariness of the flesh" statement is not likely meant necessarily to curtail our studies or our displays of what we have studied, rather it seems to be an admonition to all of us that we will become weary through much mental exertion. So, in order to keep doing what we must do, we have to have "mental breaks" from our work in order to keep going at it and to do a descent job at what we may actually love very much. By J. 

The Graceland School experiences just wouldn't be complete without one more story. This story gave us all a wake-up call. It just might be helpful to teachers and mothers who are to be responsible for children on field trips.

In fifth grade we five teachers with the approval of Miss Dean, our principal, planned the fifth grade students' trip for the year.

We chose the Indian Cemetery beside the MS River in south Memphis, the Pink Palace, and a big restaurant for a late lunch.

Name tags were worn to identify the teachers of each child. The room mothers were assigned five children to be responsible each time we got on

and off the buses. The teachers were not to be bothered with counting heads, but to discipline their class if there was a need. As I recall, there were no problems.

Our first stop was the Chuckalina, (not sure the spelling) burial grounds. We went through an underground pathway and observed the burials. There were all the stone objects buried with each one: a stone-bowl, knives and cups, etc. It was completely annihilated but there was no doubt, they believed in a here-after.

We boarded up and headed for the Pink Palace. One needed all day to tour here, but we had a time schedule to meet. No one was ready to leave, but if you have never been

there, it would be worth a trip to Memphis. So much history.

Loading up again, with room mothers counting heads, we headed to our last destination, a big restaurant expecting three or four bus loads of fifth graders (about 150 students, five teachers, and a room mother for each five students, about 30.)

Everyone was hungry and after refreshing up, we were seated. I don't remember if we had a blessing or not. Probably didn't.

The food was not your typical hamburger, but of course this was an educational trip. I remember what I ate! An avocado salad. It was my first and last.

This was our last stop

and not to far from Graceland. We loaded up with the usual "head counting."

When we got back to Graceland one of my students, Tom Oberhoff, was missing! I don't recall which room mother he belonged to. I just knew he belonged to me, and I panicked. Mrs. Harrison, our school secretary carried me to the office. We called the restaurant and there was Tom. He had not called to tell us he had missed the bus. We sent for him and soon the excitement was over. Believe it or not, this teacher was so glad to see the little independent Tom.

Tom was a world traveler but his independence kept him from following common-sense rules:

"Stay with your group and room mother at all time or let her know where you are."

Everyone was happy to see Tom. Had Tom been captured (he was a good looker) the outcome probably would have been like the story, "Ransom for Red Chief." In a few days his captors would be offering a big reward if his parents would take him back. Lol!

Tom was smart. Well traveled. (I let him miss class and go to the World's Fair in New York.) He felt no remorse for giving all of us a shock. He could "woo you" with those big pretty eyes and shrugging shoulders.

I figure Tom has made it big. I wonder as I do with many others. Inci-

The defense would remain stout in the sec-

ond quarter paced by Defensive Lineman Jackson Stuart who had nine tackles and five for losses on the evening including a sack and a forced fumble. Chase Hopkins would add eight tackles as well as lead the team in Kickoff and Punt Return yardage for the evening. A special teams sack by Joshua Moore gave the Braves another short field and Counce would add another rushing touchdown. Duckett would punch it in again from seven yards out to end the first half scoring as the Braves took a 34 to zero lead into halftime.

The second half, with the game securely in hand, the Braves elected to get all of the Seniors who wanted a rushing carry an opportunity to do so. The Braves would go on to add two more rushing touchdowns with the reserves in the ballgame as Triston Stanford had a five yard rushing touchdown and Seth Stidham had a 70-yard rushing touchdown. This was behind the reserve Offensive Line of Cade Bishop, Caleb Bonds, Shea Harwell, McKinley Davis, Alex Turner, Caleb Curtis, Matthew Horton, and Gage Tackett. With the reserve Defensive unit in the game, Freshmen Layton Monroe and Houston Richardson paced their efforts with four tackles each.

Coach Russo talked about the game, the sea-

son, and what is next for the Braves. "Wow. What a wonderful way to cap off the season. A victory, a shutout, every Brave that was dressed out got playing time, and every Senior that wanted to carry the Football did so. I want to first thank the 14 outgoing Seniors. They have been through some mess in their four years as a Brave Football Player. I am happy they got to be sent out on a high note like this. We thank them for buying in and laying a very solid foundation to our new Program. We made some big strides this Season. We improved in the Win Column, we cut down Defensive points per game from 38.3 in 2019 to 24.3 in 2020, we ramped up the Offensive Production from 13.3 points per game in 2019 to 26.3 in 2020, and we only missed the MHSAA Playoffs by one Touchdown. There is a ton to build upon there. On Monday at 1:19 p.m. the 2021 Team will be born and we will shift our focus to finishing strong in the classroom this Semester, implementing our new Character Battalion system, and focus on becoming bigger, faster, stronger in Coach Nunley's Off-season Strength and Conditioning Program." The Braves finish the abbreviated 2020 Season at (3-6) and are set to begin Spring Training in April of 2021.
