Leroy Dean Named Grand Marshall of Iuka Christmas Parade 2020

Leroy just celebrated his 90th Birthday. He was born on Nov. 7, 1930 to parents Marshall Major Dean and George Ann Bishop Dean. He graduated from Central Grammar School, Iuka High School in 1950, NEMCC in 1952. He then served in the U.S. Army 1952-1954 in Germany during the Korean conflict. After serving his country, he graduated from Florence State College (UNA) in 1956. Mr. Dean started his career with Weaver Pants corp (McGregor) 1956-1959; W.M. Kellogg construction at Counce, TN and Cherokee, AL 1959-1962 then continued his career with USS Agri-Chemical from

1962-1986. He retired in 1986.

Leroy served as an Iuka Alderman from 1977-1997 (5 terms) with much dedication to our great city. He is a member of Iuka United Methodist Church. Some of his past community involvement was Director of Headstart program, treasurer for the first re-enactment Battle of Iuka and treasurer of Iuka Heritage Day for many years, a past Jaycees Director, American Legion, TCDF, past President of Vertagreen Credit Union and past Director and President of Muscle Shoals Chapter of Credit Unions.

After retirement, he has spent many happy hours with his best buddy Sarge and watching reruns of Gunsmoke. Leroy

ICC Football Player Arrested For Burglary

On November 14, 2020, the Belmont Police Department was patrolling through the area of Golden. A Belmont Police Officer stopped to speak with a black male walking down Hwy. 366. The individual, Collins Jerome Woods III, informed the officer that he was out jogging. The officer recognized Woods as a student of Itawamba Community College (ICC) as well as a player for the football team, due to the officer being a former Campus Police Officer. The officer later noticed that the Golden Mini-Mart had been broken into.

Belmont Police Officers as well as deputies for the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Office

responded to the area in attempt to locate the individual. Contact was made by law enforcement to the ICC campus where faculty was able to locate Woods on campus and had him to return to Tishomingo County. Once in Tishomingo County the individual admitted to deputies to attempting to burglarize the convenience store.

Due to the jurisdiction constraints, the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Office took over the investigation and transported Woods to the Tishomingo County Jail where he was officially charged by investigators for the sheriff's office.

Collins Jerome Woods III, 20-year-old,

charged with burglary of a commercial building. Wood's bond was set by the Tishomingo County Justice Court at five thousand dollars (\$5,000).

NMHS Upgrades Wired Wireless Networks to Enhance COVID-19 Care

IUKA, Miss.—North Mississippi Health Services recently upgraded the wired and wireless networks at all six of its community hospitals to enhance care for COVID-19 and other patients, thanks to CARES Act Provider Relief Funds from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.

North Mississippi Health Services includes North Mississippi Medical Center in Tupelo and community hospitals in Amory, Eupora, Iuka, Pontotoc and West Point, Mississippi, and Hamilton, Alabama. "All of our community hospitals have now been updated to state-of-the-art equipment," said Benton Kilman, M.D., NMHS interim chief information officer. "This upgrade advances our ability to deliver high quality audio video communication, improving the experience for both COVID-19 patients, as well as all other patients we serve."

The project, which totaled more than \$2.5 million, will enable the community hospitals to:

Reduce the use of personal protective equipment (PPE). When it is not necessary for the nurse to enter a COVID-19 patient's room, he or she can communicate via video with the patient from the nurses' desk or hallway. This limits the use of PPE which has been in short supply during the pandemic. Both the patient and the nurse have a robust audio-video experience.

Provide specialty consultation. Patients who are less acutely ill with COVID-19 can remain at community hospitals rather than being transferred to NMHC in Tupelo. The doctors caring for them can consult through video telehealth with specialists (such as pulmonologists, cardiologists, nephrologists and others).

Enhance the quality and dependability of ER-to-ER video consultation. This technology will enhance collaboration

among providers in Tupelo and community hospitals to improve access to health care providers throughout our region and avoid unnecessary transports.

Provide routine rounding. Hospitalists at NMHC hospitals can make virtual rounds on COVID-19 patients to enhance access to physicians where and when needed. Provide specialty consultation into the nursing homes. To limit exposure of nursing home residents to COVID-19 and other transmissible illnesses, patients can have video visits with their health care provider.

NMHS' Information Technology Services staff has worked on an unprecedented timeline to complete the upgrades and installation of video devices in a record two months. The last hospital upgrade was completed Sept. 30. Nurses and physicians are now being trained in the use of the telehealth technology. "We are excited

to implement this technology in our hospitals to benefit our community," said Kathy Patrick, NMHS Iuka chief nursing officer. "We foresee that this technology will be able to support small community hospitals and receive consultations from specialists that they were at a disadvantage to have. Some patients have to travel to a hospital, which is easier on them and their families."

While the technology is geared toward COVID-19 patients, it will benefit as well as other patients. This technology at our community hospitals can receive consultations with specialists as if they were in the hospital. Dr. Kilman said, "It has been wonderful to see the excitement in the community knowing that they are able to improve their care through this technology."

CONSERVATION CORNER

White-tailed Deer

White-tailed deer are the most interesting and sought after animals in North America and Mississippi.

Depending on where you are located in the Magnolia State, deer usually breed between December 10 and February 4. Does normally breed only once per year; however, they may come into "heat" 3 to 4 times a year beginning in December and ending in February. The periods of "heat" last about 24 to 36 hours and occur about 28 days apart. A doe may have from 1 to 3 fawns per year, depending on her physical condition; about half the does in Mississippi produce 2 fawns per year. Does in Mississippi do not breed

until they are 1.5 years old. Many people believe that old does do not breed, but they do breed and produce young as long as they live.

Bucks do not come in "heat," but rather enter "rut." Rut consists of sparring, spreading of sign (rubs, scrapes, etc.), courtship, and breeding.

Sparring begins after bucks lose their velvet. Most bucks are fairly tolerant of each other during sparring. Sparring serves to establish which bucks in an area are dominant. Body and antler size are good indicators of a buck's social dominance. Bucks communicate with other deer during rut through various visual and scent signals. "Rubs" are trunks or stems of trees or

bushes that bucks rub bark off with their antlers and head. Glands in the head leave scent on the rub. "Scrapes" consist of broken limbs 3 to 6 feet above ground, with a small depression pawed in the soil underneath on which the buck urinates. Bucks return often to scrapes to freshen their scent. A buck often locates the scent of a doe in "heat" near a scrape and will follow her with his nose to the ground while making a grunting sound. Bucks will also urinate on their inner leg glands to signal other deer. Rubs, scrapes, and urinating on the tarsal glands all serve to assert a buck's social dominance and to locate does.

During courtship, bucks become loners. Also, during courtship, tolerance among bucks disappears and fierce fights between bucks occur. Unless a doe is in "heat," she will run from a buck. Although all bucks court, only dominant bucks breed with does.

Peak fawning times in Mississippi occur between June 22 and July 22. Fawns remain hidden near their birthplace for roughly 2 weeks, but by the time the fawn is 1 month old it will begin to follow its mother. Fawns will nurse until they are 3 to 5 months.

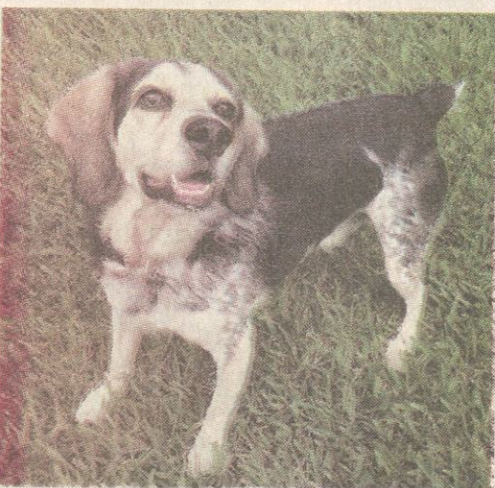
Bucks take no part in raising the fawns. A fawn will lose its spotted coat at 4 months. Male fawns follow their mother for about 1 year; female fawns follow for about 2 years.

Deer in Mississippi feed mostly during the late afternoon and night. Generally, they spend the day bedded down in cover resting. An adult deer requires about 8 to 10 pounds of food per day, and about 2 to 3 quarts of water per day (depending on the type of food eaten).

Kit-houses are acceptable, but original designs are encouraged. The construction should be 100% edible. We allow entries in both the youth and adult categories."

Prizes for the contest will include \$50 for a youth winner (aged 0-17), \$100 for an adult winner (18+), and another \$100 for a people's choice winner, determined by Facebook voting.

The contest, sponsored by Piggly Wiggly / Hardware of Iuka, is being held completely online this year. Entrants are asked to send their photos to TAC either on their Facebook page or by email to tishcoarts@gmail.com by December 26th. I Remember

Sitting here reading the comic Dennis the Menis reminded me of an incident that happened to my nephew Sgt. Major Retired Marine Jimmy C. Page in his Class of ROTC Cadets at Wynn, Arkansas. A letter was turned in to Sgt. Maj. The class was ready to start but Sgt. Maj. opened the letter, stood facing the class and read the message silently without any fan-fair. When he had finished reading, he turned and walked to the chalk board and began writing: "Sgt. Maj. is a weakling, mama's baby, look at his shoes, etc." The class was so quiet as he wrote. About half way through the letter one of the cadets said, "I didn't misspell that word!" Sgt. Maj. turned and said, "I'll deal with you later." The unknown culprit confessed.

I bet he spells all his words correctly next time by the time he gets through with the laps. I didn't ask Jimmy what the punishment was but I'm sure there was one.

Jimmy had lost his dad in an eighteen wheeler accident when he was nine. He entered the Marines when he graduated high school at Harrisburg, AR. He was a Drill Sgt. for several years. He had suffered the same treatment as the Marines were and he felt sorry for these young soldiers who had never worn these leather boots. They marched all day but he never let them know he was so sorry for them. He was a Dr. Jeckel and Mr. Hyde type of guy. When he got home to his wife and three little boys he could be a loving husband and loving dad.

Jimmy retired two years ago after teaching ROTC about 15 years. The faculty encouraged him "Don't retire! You have made our discipline problems, your problems. We hardly ever have classroom problems anymore."

He retired anyway.

That incident reminded me of one I had with a 9th grade class of big, robust football athletes. I had left my classroom one day and when I got back my desk, books, and desk drawers were covered with pencil dust. A big mess if I ever saw one. I asked who ever did this to come clean it up. No response. A big mess.

I tried to act calm although I was infuriated! I said, "If I had been cheap enough to make such a mess? I would be man enough to confess to the act!" No response. I turned and left the room. It was deathly quiet, I went to the office and told Mr. Strickland (R.C.) our principal what had happened and we walked back to my room in silence.

He inspected the mess. "This sure is a mess," he said in his slow, calm manner. He talked to the class on discipline and encouraged whoever did this as a joke, to come clean and admit it. No one moved.

He said, "Well, boys, beginning today instead of going to football practice, meet me at the gym." He turned to leave the room. In the back of the room, rose one of my Betas and said, "Mr. Strickland, I can't let my class suffer for something I did. I made the mess. (Emptying the pencil-sharpener dust.) I did it for a joke. I'm sorry, Mrs. Dawson, I knew better." I couldn't believe he would do such a thing.

"Let's go." Mr. Strickland carried him the office and in a few minutes they



came back with cleaning cloths, vacuum cleaner and he started cleaning. I stood and watched at first but was so sorry for him doing this which was not like him, I was helping clean. So were some of the boys. When everything was cleaned and back to normal we got on with the lesson.

Later this prankster who was an honor student and a great athlete became my Beta President. Upon graduating college he coached for several years and then became a principal until he retired. Today he fondly remembers me and I love him, too.

Sometimes, it's hard for teachers to keep their cool, but a lifetime friend is made if one can and does.

Oh, the student every day for three weeks went up and down the hall and emptied pencil sharpeners. He'd run in and out to get to class on time. It was like clockwork. Before the three weeks were up, smiles from he and the teachers became spontaneous but never again did he find any enjoyment in emptying pencil sharpeners. "A lesson practiced is a lesson learned."

The Life of Hershel Wade

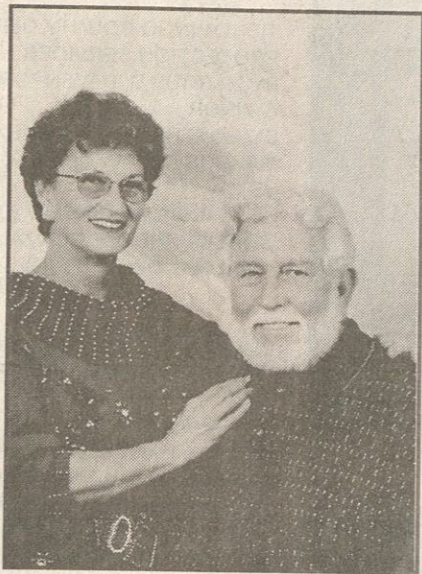

My brother, Hershel Wayne Wade, was born October 10, 1937, in the Holt's Spur Community of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, to William Hubert Hershel Wade and Bula Mae (Hatcher) Wade. He passed from this life November 17, 2020, at the Med Trauma Center in Memphis, after a tragic automobile accident. All of Hershel's family would like to express their gratitude to the doctors and nurses at the Med for their kindness to him and the way that they kept him comfortable after the accident.

Hershel Wade led a full life during his time on this earth. Except for a brief time spent as a preschooler in Benton, Kentucky, where our father was helping build dams, Hershel grew up in the Holt's Spur Community and attended high school at Rowland Mills, Sardis, and Gravel Hill where our mother was a teacher. One special blessing that occurred recently was Hershel's 83rd birthday last month which was highlighted by a two-week visit from their son DeWayne, of La Porte, Texas. The family made many wonderful memories during this close time

spent together.

It has been a pleasure for Hershel and Pat to worship with the Burnsville church of Christ where they were welcomed with open arms and loved, which meant so much to them. The church lifted them up throughout the years with prayers, hospital visits, and rich friendships.

Hershel was preceded in death by two of his children, Diana and Darryl; his parents, stepparents, and in-laws; his grandparents (Will and Martha Wade and John and Jennie Hatcher); his sister-in-law Jackie; his brother-in-law, Ray Potts; and several cousins.

Lessons On Life From The Prophet Isaiah (Part 1)

Isaiah is one of the most interesting and informative books in the Bible according to my thinking. All kinds of subject are covered in Isaiah, but I will not seek to cover the whole book. I will choose certain chapters or verses that seem to be pertinent to our times, plus a few, perhaps, that may not relate as much to our times. All of the Bible was written under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, but some parts of the Bible are more interesting, and even more applicable to our era than others. I have chosen to begin with Isaiah chapter one, but I will likely skip some chapters and verses for the sake of brevity.

In Isaiah 1:1-2, we read: "The vision of Isaiah the son of Amoz, which he saw concerning Judah and Jerusalem in the days of Uzziah, Jotham, Ahaz, and Hezekiah, kings of Judah. Hear, O heavens, and give ear of earth; for the LORD hath spoken, I have nourished and brought up children, and they have rebelled against Me." The first verse gives us the name of the writer and his father. It also tells us that Isaiah wrote about Judah and Jerusalem during the days of certain kings. Then we come to a verse that speaks volumes concerning God and His people, Israel. First, we see that God says He has nourished and brought up children. It is the obligation of fathers to feed, protect and teach their children, so God is a good Father to the nation of Israel, whom He has in mind, for they are His children. He has not only nourished Israel, but He

has molded them and cared for them and needs. Now we see the sad note in the verse, for God has brought up children against Him. He has all that He has given them, they have rebelled against Him in their position of rebellion.

Proverbs 22:6 says something about training children: "Train the child in the way he should go; and when he is old, he will not depart from it." As a young man, I used to use that verse to say that children were out right if they were not trained right, but as I grew older, I saw the verse in light of the fact that I changed my mind. I believe that Proverbs is a good, general principle, but it has a meaning that all children are trained right and turn out right. In light of God's promise in Isaiah 1:2, Notice that God has nourished and brought up children, and they have rebelled against Him. I came to the conclusion many years ago that if God has brought up children, name them, whom He has brought up rightly, yet they rebelled against Him, then it just could be that parents in our day are not training up children correctly, yet some children just rebel against the training they have received. UDC Continues to Meet by Phone

United Daughters of the Confederacy, John Marshall Stone Chapter 394 is still meeting by phone due to the COVID virus. It seems as the numbers are still rising and our meeting place is not available.

Our November program on "Civil War Medicine" Books by H.H. Cunningham was recommended to read. Generally, Civil War doctors underwent two years of medical school, though some pursued more education. Medicine in the United States was woefully behind Europe. Harvard Medical School did not even own a single stethoscope or microscope until after the war. Most Civil War surgeons had never treated a gunshot wound and many had never performed surgery, etc. for the most part, the Civil War doctor (as understaffed, under qualified, and under-supplied as he was) did the best he could, muddling through the so-called "medical middle ages." Some 10,000 surgeons served in the Union army and about 4,000 served in the Confederate. Medical knowledge of the 1860s had not yet encompassed the use of sterile dressings, antiseptic surgery, and the recognition of the importance of sanitation and hygiene. As a result, thousands died from diseases such as typhoid or dysentery.

The deadliest thing that faced the Civil War soldier was disease. For every soldier who died in

battle, two died of disease. In particular, intestinal complaints such as dysentery and diarrhea claimed many lives. In fact, diarrhea and dysentery alone claimed more men than did battle wounds. The Civil War soldier also faced outbreaks of measles, small pox, malaria, pneumonia, or camp itch. Soldiers were exposed to malaria when camping in damp areas which were conducive to breeding mosquitoes, while camp itch was caused by insects or a skin disease. In brief, the high incidence of disease was caused by inadequate physical examination of recruits; ignorance; the rural origin of my soldiers; neglect of camp hygiene; insects and vermin; exposure; lack of clothing and shoes; poor food and water. Troops from rural areas were crowded together for the first time with large numbers of other individuals and got diseases they had no immunity to. Neglect of camp hygiene was a common problem as well. Ignorance of camp sanitation and scanty knowledge about how disease was carried were major factors. Both Armies faced problems with mosquitoes and lice. Exposure turned many a cold into a case of pneumonia, and complicated other ailments. Pneumonia was the third leading killer disease of the war, after typhoid and dysentery. Lack of shoes and proper clothing further complicated the problem, especially in

the Confederacy. Also the diet of the soldiers was a problem. Disease was particularly rampant in the prisoner-of-war camps, whose conditions were generally worse than the army camps.

For bowel complaints, open bowels were treated with a plug of opium. Closed bowels were treated with the infamous "blue mass"... a mixture of mercury and chalk. For scurvy, doctors prescribed green vegetables. Respiratory problems, such as pneumonia and bronchitis were treated with dosing of opium or sometimes quinine and mustard plasters. Sometimes bleeding was also used. Malaria could be treated with quinine, or sometimes even turpentine if quinine was not available. Camp itch could be treated by riding the body of the pests or with poke-root solution. Whiskey and other forms of alcohol also were used to treat wounds and disease... though of questionable medical value, whiskey did relieve some pain. Most medicines were manufactured in the north; southerners had to run the Union blockade in order to gain access to them. On occasion, vital medicines were smuggled into the South, sewn into the petticoats of ladies sympathetic to the Southern cause. The South also had some manufacturing capabilities and worked with herbal remedies. However, many of the Southern medical supplies came from captured

Union stores.

Doctors often took over houses, churches, schools, even barns for hospitals. The field hospital was located near the front lines -- sometimes only a mile behind the lines. Battlefield casualties made up a much smaller number of deaths during the war.

Bloody fingers often were used as probes. Bloody knives were used as scalpels. Doctors operated in pus stained coats. Everything about Civil War surgery was septic. Surgical fevers and gangrene were constant threats. One witness described surgery as such: "we surgeons and their assistants, stripped to the waist and bespattered with blood, stood around, some holding the poor fellows while others, armed with long, bloody knives and saws, cut and sawed away with frightful rapidity, throwing the mangled limbs on a pile nearby as soon as removed." The Civil War "sawbones" was doing the best he could. Sadly, the medical field was not yet capable of dealing with the disease and the massive injuries caused by war.

H.H. Cunningham's Doctors in Gray remains the definitive work on the medical history of the Confederate army. Cunningham paints as complete a picture as possible of the daunting task facing those in charge of caring for the war's wounded and sick. They performed heroically.

Comforting Weeknight Meal, Baked Chicken and Dumplings

"I came up with this; it came out pretty good!"



Baked Chicken and Dumplings

What You Need

4-5 large chicken breasts, boneless
1 stick butter, plus 4 tbsp
1 1/2 c self-rising flour
1 1/2 c milk
1/2 c sour cream
3 c chicken broth
1 can cream of celery soup
1/2 tsp savory (rosemary or thyme may be used)
Salt and pepper to taste

Directions

• Place chicken, 4 tbsp butter, salt and pepper in a large stock pot. Cover with water, at least 2 in. over the chicken.
• Cover and bring to a boil over high heat.
• Reduce heat to simmer and boil chicken until tender, about 30 to 45 min.

• When chicken is done remove from broth and cool. Shred into small pieces.
• Preheat oven to 375 F.
• Melt 1 stick butter and pour into a large bowl.
• Spread chicken on top of butter.
• In a separate bowl, whisk together milk, sour cream, and chicken broth. Carefully pour over top of chicken, scraping the bottom of the pot.
• In the same bowl, whisk together cream of celery soup, sour cream and savory. Carefully pour this mixture over top of chicken.
• Bake for 30-40 min or until brown.
• Let cool for about 15 min. Sprinkle the remaining 1 c chicken broth over the top.
• Let stand for about 5 min. The broth has "soaked" into the dumplings.
