AN OPEN LETTER TO BURNSVILLE WATER CUSTOMERS

The Burnsville water treatment plant needed some major repairs and painting. We secured a Community Development Block Grant to pay for most of it. Our engineer contacted the original manufacturer of the plant, and they sent a person to inspect it and provide a list of parts that needed replacement. The manufacturer provided the parts on the original list, but after the plant was dismantled an additional part had to be special ordered. This has caused a delay in getting the treatment plant back in operation.

Because the treatment plant had to be taken out of service and dismantled to replace the parts, the manufacturer provided a temporary treatment setup that was installed and is now being used to treat the water. Unfortunately, the temporary treatment setup is not performing as well as we would like. The Town's water crew is working overtime performing additional filter backwashing and flushing to try to provide customers with clean water. Even with the extra effort of the water crew, at times discolored water is getting into the system. The water has the proper amount of chlorine in it and is safe even though it may be discolored at times.

We understand and share our customers' frustration, but it is important to note that this is only temporary. We hope to receive the final part within the next few days and get the treatment plant back together and operational by the end of December. In the meantime, we will continue to make the extra effort to provide clean water.

We would like to ask our customers to please have patience and bear with us through this endeavor of improving our water system and future improvements.

This was a little song
we sang when I was a
little girl. It came to me
last night I may not have
it exactly correct, but nine-
ty-years is a long time to
remember and I have no
copies.

I'm sure our Christmas
celebration this Christmas
Day will be somewhat
similar to those in the late
1920's and 1930's.

We usually had a little
program at Cripple Deer
School on the last Friday
evening before school
was out for the Christmas
holidays. Most of the gifts
were home-made articles.
Store bought presents
were coloring books, pen-
cils, a new tablet, candy
canes and popcorn balls
and peanut candy.

For several days before
Christmas Mom would
pop corn (which we had
raised) and we who were
old enough would string
the popcorn to be used
as Christmas tree deco-
rations along with white
paper angels and colored
paper ornaments. We also
gathered holly berries and

strung them for deco-
rations. All these were just
waiting for the tree.

On the day before
Christmas Eve Dad
would hitch up his Ca-
dillac pair of mules, take
Mom's want list, go over
to Grandpa Will and Mae
Page's and pick up their
want list, and on to Uncle
George and Ida Dawson's
for their list and head on
to Tishomingo.

He did his shopping at
Gardner's in the Highland
Community, McRae's and
the grocery store which
became Nash's. Then
back home to deliver. I
don't recall anyone go-
ing with him but Uncle
Olen Page or John Dee
Dawson may have gone.
They were grown. I was
too interested in what
would be in those boxes
that were quickly put un-
der the beds. There were
no closets in our house but
the odor of oranges and
apples was so obvious that
we knew we were going to
get fruit. We also usually
got lemon and peppermint
stick candy along with
chocolate drops.

On Christmas Eve
Dad would take one or
two of us older children
with him to the woods to
search for the prettiest tree
we could find. It had to be
a small tree because our
room could not accommo-
date a large tree.

When we got back to
the house everyone was so
excited and it smelled so
good.

A bucket was waiting
with rocks, sand, and wa-
ter. We only got to keep
the tree through Christ-
mas Day. It was fire haz-
ard with an open fire.

Everyone got busy
bringing the decorations
they had made and with
the assistance of Mom,
as I remember, it was the
most beautiful tree we had
ever had. Same every year.

Digress. A few years
ago (probably more than
fifty years. Lo!) I took
Angie to the Luttrell farm
and we started walking.
We had cut three trees
before we found one that
suited us. This was the end
of our tree hunting. Since
then I have been satisfied
to use the tinfoil tree that
was bought in 1962. The
wear and tear of putting it
up and down has damaged



the original beauty but
with more than fifty years
of collectible ornaments it
is beautiful.

Santa Claus brought
rag-dolls with a little ward-
robe of clothes; Grandpa
Luttrell made doll beds
from wood and barbed-
wire holders. We also en-
joyed the Sears Roebuck
catalogue. We cut out pic-
tures and made a family.
We set it up in a shoe box
when available. Not used
to store-bought things, a
new pencil, tablet, crayons
and coloring books were
priceless.

We moved into our
new house when I was
two years old where I lived
until I married. Dad and
Mom loved each other
and they loved and pro-
vided the best they could
for all seven of us kids.
We were certainly fed well
because nearly everything
we ate, we had raised.
Sometimes hickory-nuts
and chestnuts were found
in the woods.

Chocolate, coffee, sug-
ar and flour were bought.
Irish and sweet potatoes,
peanuts, corn, pears,
beans, greens and onions
were raised. Tomatoes and
peaches and black berries
were canned.

Sometimes at Christ-
mas we had cheese, also
English walnuts for the
cake. I didn't eat cheese
and he always tried to
bring a small amount of
stick baloney. It tasted so
good.

Merry Christmas to
each of you. Stay safe
and remember why we
celebrate Christmas. It's
a great time to remember
and thank God for being
so good to America.

Jim Riley Commits to Mississippi State Football


Iuka, Miss. — Tisho-





AN ORDINANCE TO ABOLISH MUNICIPAL ELECTION COMMISSION AND TO ESTABLISH THE CITY'S INTENT TO ENTER INTO AN AGREEMENT WITH TISHOMINGO COUNTY TO HAVE THE COUNTY ELECTION COMMISSIONERS CONDUCT MUNICIPAL ELECTIONS AND OTHER FUNCTIONS PERFORMED BY MUNICIPAL ELECTION COMMISSIONERS FOR THE BENEFIT OF THE EFFICIENCY AND CONFORMITY OF ELECTIONS AND TO ABOLISH THE ELECTION COMMISSIONERS

WHEREAS, pursuant to Mississippi Code Section 23-15-221, the City of Iuka, Mississippi has appointed municipal election commissioners as provided for therein; and

WHEREAS, the City of Iuka, despite having an established election commission with appointed commissioners, was authorized by law to contract with the Tishomingo County Election Commission to handle many, if not all, aspects of municipal elections; and

WHEREAS, on July 1, 2017, an Amendment to Mississippi Code Section 23-15-221 became effective, which mandated that any municipality desiring to avail itself of the provisions of the Mississippi Election Code (*i.e.*, use the county election commission) regarding the duties of municipal election commissioners shall adopt an ordinance declaring its intention to enter into an agreement with the municipality's county to have the county election commissioners conduct municipal elections and other functions that are performed by municipal election commissioners for the benefit of the efficiency and conformity of elections; and

WHEREAS, this Amendment has been interpreted by the Attorney General's office to compel all municipalities that wish to use their respective county election commission in conducting elections, to adopt an Ordinance stating their intention to solely use the services of the county election commission, and if the municipalities fail to do so, then the municipalities shall be required to conduct all municipal election functions on their own with no ability to enter into a contract with their county election commission for assistance with any aspect of a municipal election; and

WHEREAS, the City Board understand the City of Iuka need for the services of the Tishomingo County Election Commission for municipal elections, and therefore finds that entering into a Contract with Tishomingo County to have the Tishomingo County Election Commission conduct municipal elections and other functions that are performed by municipal election commissioners will benefit the City, and all of its citizens, by making the elections more efficient and in conformity with all other cities throughout the County.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY BOARD OF THE CITY OF IUKA, MISSISSIPPI, as follows:

SECTION 1. Chapter _____, Article _____, Section _____ is hereby created and titled "Abolish municipal election commissioners in the City of Iuka and authorize county election commissioners to conduct the municipal election commissioners' duties" and is to read as follows:

SECTION 2. Section _____ shall be added to the Code of Ordinances and shall read as follows:

It is the City Board's intent and desire to abolish the City of Iuka's Municipal Election Commission and authorize the Tishomingo County Election Commissioners to conduct the municipal election commissioner's duties. By adoption of this Ordinance, it is the City's intent to enter into an Agreement for Services with Tishomingo County to have the Tishomingo County Election Commission conduct municipal elections and other functions that are performed by municipal election commissioners, which will benefit the City, and all of its citizens, by making the elections more efficient and in conformity with all other cities throughout the County. As a result of this Ordinance, all current members of the municipal election commission are removed.

Pursuant to Mississippi Code Section 23-15-221, the Tishomingo County Election Commissioners shall conduct all of the duties of the municipal election commissioners including, but not limited to:

Canvass the results of bond elections in a municipality;
Canvass the returns of special and general elections for mayor and councilmen and within five (5) days after any special or general election, deliver to each person receiving the highest number of votes a certificate of election;

Certify to the Secretary of State the name or names of the person or persons elected at special and general elections within ten (10) days after any special or general election;

Revise the primary poll books for municipalities at the time and in the manner and in accordance with the laws now fixed and in force for revising poll books, except they shall not remove from the poll book any person who is qualified to participate in primary elections;

Print the poll books that are to be used in municipal elections;

Print and distribute the "official ballots";

Perform the duties of poll managers in the event there is only one (1) election precinct in the municipality;

Perform any of the duties required of the municipal executive committee pursuant to Section 23-15-239 if the municipal executive committee has entered into a written agreement with the municipal clerk or the municipal or county election commission that gives such authorization;

Determine whether each party candidate in the municipal general election is a qualified elector of the municipality, and of the ward if the office sought is a ward office, whether each candidate either meets all other qualifications to hold the office he or she is seeking or presents absolute proof that he or she will, subject to no contingencies, meet all qualifications on or before the date of the general or special election at which he or she could be elected to office, and whether any candidate has been convicted of any felony in a court of this state, or has been convicted on or after December 8, 1992, of any offense in another state which is a felony under the laws of this state, or has been convicted of any felony in a federal court on or after December 8, 1992;

Declare each candidate elected without opposition, if the candidate meets all the qualifications to hold the office as determined pursuant to a review by the commission in accordance with the provisions of paragraph (i) of this subsection (3);

Canvass the returns for municipal elections received from all voting precincts and within ten (10) days after the election, deliver to each person receiving the highest number of votes a certificate of election. If it shall appear that any two (2) or more of the candidates receiving the highest number of votes shall have received an equal number of votes, the election shall be decided by the toss of a coin or by lot, fairly and publicly drawn by the election commissioners;

Transmit the statement provided in Section 23-15-611 to the Secretary of State certifying the name or names of the person or persons elected at municipal elections, and such person or persons shall be issued commissions by the Governor;

Receiving the filed document by any person desiring to contest the qualifications of another person who has qualified pursuant to the provisions of Section 23-15-361 as a candidate for municipal office elected on the date designated by law for regular municipal elections that specifically sets forth the grounds of the challenge no later than thirty-one (31) days after the date of the first primary election set forth in Section 23-15-309; and

Perform all other duties with respect to the municipal election prescribed by law.

SECTION 3. Any and all ordinances or parts thereof in conflict or inconsistent with any of the terms and provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed to such extent as they are so in conflict or inconsistent.

SECTION 4. It is hereby declared to be the intention of the City Board that the actions, paragraphs, clauses and phrases of this ordinance, when adopted, are severable, and if any sections, paragraphs, clauses, sentences or provisions of this ordinance as adopted shall be declared unconstitutional or otherwise invalid, same shall not affect any of the remaining sections, paragraphs, clauses and phrases of this ordinance.

SECTION 5. This Ordinance shall take effect in the manner prescribed by law.

SECTION 6. That upon adoption, the City Clerk shall cause this Ordinance to be recorded in the Book of Ordinances of the City of Iuka, Mississippi, and published in the manner prescribed by law.

SECTION 7. The provisions of this Ordinance may be included and incorporated in the Code of Ordinances of the City of Iuka, Mississippi, as an addition thereto, and appropriately renumbered to conform to the uniform numbering system of the Code.

The work was hard on Wednesday nights but Danny, Jim, Jimmy, Billy Ray and Butch kept the

presses rolling. I remember never a dull moment with this crew! When the presses broke down, it was midnight or more before you got hot off the press. I remember the door would be open and people would be in the alley from the Church to pick up the hot off the press. That was 49
