COVID-19 Still Prevalent in the Area

The impact of COVID-19 s been felt in our area durg the global pandemic. The st positive case in Tishomingo ounty occurred in late March this year.

Tishomingo County has had 62 cases of COVID 19 durg 2020 according to the MS epartment of Health; 52 indiduals have died in this county one. 101 patients of long term re facilities reportedly con-

tracted the virus and of those 26 have died.

Hospitals in the surrounding areas are overwhelmed with more patients than COVID unit beds available.

Likewise the Tishomingo County School district closed schools before the Christmas holiday due to the high number of cases in the system. The situation remains dire and the need for caution among residents continues into the New Year.

LOCAL Thursday, December Recently "Christmas Star" was Seen Saturn and Jupiter Converged in the

an end-of-year treat while viewing what has become known popularly as the "Christmas Star." It was an especially vibrant planetary conjunction easily visible in the evening sky over a two week period as the bright planets Jupiter and Saturn came together, culminating on the night of Dec. 21st.

In 1610, Italian astronomer Galileo Galilei pointed his telescope to the night sky, discovering the four moons of Jupiter - Io, Europa, Ganymede, and Callisto. In that same year, Galileo also discovered a strange oval surrounding Saturn, which later observations determined to be its rings. These discoveries changed how people understood the far reaches of our solar system.

Thirteen years later, in 1623, the solar system's two giant planets, Jupiter and Saturn, traveled together across the sky. Jupiter caught up to and passed Saturn, in an astronomical event known as a "Great Conjunction."


"You can imagine the solar system to be a racetrack, with each of

Skywatchers enjoyed the planets as a runner in their own lane and the Earth toward the center of the stadium," said Henry Throop, astronomer in the Planetary Science Division at NASA Headquarters in Washington. "From our vantage point, we were able to see Jupiter on the inside lane, approaching Saturn all month and finally overtaking it on December 21."

The planets regularly appear to pass each other in the solar system, with the positions of Jupiter and Saturn being aligned in the sky about once every 20 years.

What makes this year's spectacle so rare, then? It's been nearly 400 years since the planets passed this close to each other in the sky, and nearly 800 years since the alignment of Saturn and Jupiter occurred at night, allowing nearly everyone around the world to witness this "great conjunction."

On the 21st, the two planets appeared so close that a pinkie finger at arm's length easily covered both planets in the sky. The planets were easy to see with the unaided eye by looking toward the

southwest just after sunset. From our vantage point on Earth the huge gas giants appeared very close together, but they remained hundreds of millions of miles apart in space. The conjunction happened on the same day as the winter solstice, the timing however is merely a coincidence, based on the orbits of the planets and the tilt of the Earth.

The adage that "hindsight is 2020" usually is pretty apropos; but, looking back, how about changing it to "let's put 2020 in hindsight" and say g'bye to a weird year?


This is my 40th annual year-end summary, in which I customarily admit some of my failures and foibles - of which there are plenty - and offer hopes for a better next year.

Wasn't all bad, of course. I certainly can't complain, what with so many frustrated and hurting people suffering terrible pains and losses. All I lost, other than a dearly loved horticulture and travel friend who passed away last month, was a few dozen cancelled lectures around the country, along with all the international flower shows that I usually report on. And eleven months apart from my sweetheart who's been cooped up in our home in England.

On the upside, I became a grandfather for the first time - welcome, little Alice Jeanne, a 12thgeneration American Rushing! I rescued and rehabbed some baby possums, and, after years of serious lobbying, managed to get the approving attention of the flag commission members who thoughtfully winnowed thousands of wonderful proposals to finally select a proud new pennant that includes our beautiful state flower!

On the garden side, after over a decade of planting summer gardens and then abandoning them to months of traveling overseas, 2020 provided a perfect opportunity to try my hand at actually maintaining summer and fall plantings. Some of it worked, some not so well, a stark reminder that I'm a better horticultural expert than actual gardener.

In my eagerness out way too many flower and vegetable plants which, other than jalapenos and burgundy okra, produced poorly. Too much fertilizer, judging from the massive sweet



potato vines with nothing but skinny little orange strings underground. I managed to make some passable fried green tomatoes before the bugs and blights and squirrels got the rest. And I harvested some decent birdhouse gourds.

The giant zinnias, from seed simply scatted atop bare dirt, were magnificent all summer and fall; I covered them a couple of cold nights last month to get another few weeks of big cut flowers for my little cabin.

The cabbage, broccoli, kale, and other cole crops I planted this fall got devastated twice by night raiding rodents, costing me not just the money for the plants, but the time it would take to get more planted before winter. And dashed hopes.

Luckily for me, I understand the problems and why I couldn't or wouldn't do much about them; but for the countless newbies around the state who set out little gardens for the very first time this year the learning curve was steep. I stopped on my walks to chat with many of the dozens in my own neighborhood, offering advice and hoping they didn't notice my own miserable

lack of results.

A few accomplishments include building a new raised bed, reconfiguring my compost pile, adding a triangular porch to my cabin with a threelevel bird condo, fashioned an above-ground water garden from a galvanized horse water trough, made a concrete bird bath, designed a corner English cottage garden, made Christmas decorations from garden materials, and put up enough fig preserves to get me and mine through a year or two.

Oh, and wrapped up Maverick Gardeners, my latest book, about the outlier DIGrs (Determined Independent Gardeners) with whom I've had the pleasures of meeting and sharing plants. Out in a couple of months.

So...my garden and I survived an abysmal year. Buh-bye, 2020, no love lost! Here's hoping for better next year.

Lessons On Life From The Prophet Isaiah (part 4)







Charlotte's Attic -**303 North Pearl Street – Iuka**

By Charlotte Whitfield Vines

My first encounter with North Pearl Street was in 1958-59. Mom, Dad and I lived in one side of a duplex known as the Duggar house on the corner of Pearl and Fourth Streets. The Hardy McMasters' family lived on the other side. That is also the same time I met Brenda Phifer, who became a life-long friend (and cousin). As young girls we were talking and giggling much of the time. I can still hear both our dad's threatening us (especially at night) to use the belt if we didn't be quiet. The threat would work for a while. You know we never did see that belt. The "Duggar house" was sold and remodeled in the early 1960's. It is presently owned by Raymond and Katrina Osborn.

Now in my later years, I find I have come full circle. By the Providential Hand of God I was led to this house in answer to prayer. I knew it was mine when I saw it. It happened to be Brenda Phifer Whitfield with me that day we went looking. I had lived in the Memphis area 35 years and needed to move back to help my parents. Being the history person she is, it was Brenda who asked me in recent months to write a history on my house. Feeling like I had



some time now to do it, I excitedly said yes. I'd love to. Never dreamed where it would take me nor how much time I would spend reading and researching. So, here goes.

My lot and the 2 next to me (Tanner and Osborn) make up Block 21 of the Hubbard Survey. According to history of the town, David Hubbard surveyed all the land he sold. Col. Terry surveyed all the land Lemmuel Hubbard sold, known as the Terry Survey.

The first deed I was able to find (in Corinth records) is dated Feb., 1860. T. C. Terry to J. H. Doan.

Storment Home

Oddly, is for Blocks 21, 26, and 35. I am so curious as to what was on these lots at that time but at this time I have found no record. The other frustrating thing is I have not been able to find the first deed: from David Hubbard to T. C. Terry.

The next deed I found is dated 1882 and, to me, the most interesting. It is between R. W. Price, J. A. Powell, D. R. Hubbard and George Hammerly, Trustees for the Stockholders of Block 21 Academy Lot and the Board of Mayor and Alderman of the town of Iuka. From reading the history of Iuka, I find there was a Male Academy built on this location in 1870. Again, frustration. I have not found thus far records on the particulars of the school.

March, 1891, the Board of Mayor and Alderman sell Block 21 known as the Male Academy Lot to E. J. McRae. Later sold to Mrs. E. J. Doan (Emma). May, 1894, Emma sells Block 21 to A. F. Whitehurst. He sells the block to G. W. Dudley December, 1898. The description for the first time refers to Block 21 "and known as the A. F. Whitehurst Residence."

Price - Osborn Home

I am missing a transaction but I do know Katherine Bell (Brown) Hodges bought the South half of Block 21. First record of the block being divided. The next deed and reference of a Deed of Trust I can find involve

Katherine and the Koonces. The lot sold for \$750. Feb. 1919. In the description it reads "part of the property deeded to A. F. White-

hurst and G. W. Dudley." April, 1921, Katherine Bell Hodges was highest bidder for \$550. There had been a lack of payment of the Deed of Trust. She is the owner again. I have a copy of the Deed of Trust she gives to the Iuka Guaranty Bank in the amount of \$868. Frustration again. I don't know if she remodeled the existing house or if she other one. But 1 B. F. 


