# Young Iuka Man Killed in Accident

A two vehicle accident on Monday morning in Burnsville claimed the life of 26-year-old Dakota Lynn Nelson of 208 Pickwick Circle in Iuka.

According to Tishomingo County Deputy Coroner, James Rich, the accident happened around 11:40 a.m. on Hwy. 72 in front of the old J. C. Lambert Hardware building in Burnsville.

Rich said Nelson was driving east on 72 when he apparently crossed the highway median into the oncoming west-bound traffic and was struck by a truck hauling industrial co2 tanks. The driver of the NexAir truck was not injured.

A female passenger, Maggie Coleman, in the Nelson car was air lifted to Tupelo and remains in critical condition.



According to Rich, the wreck is under the investigation of the Mississippi Highway Patrol.

Graveside services for Dakota will be held Friday, January 8, 2012 at 2:00 p.m. at Magnolia Gardens in Corinth. Visitation will be Thursday from 5:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. at Magnolia Funeral Home-South. Bro. Shane Woodruff will officiate the service.

Dakota was born April 15, 1994 and was of the Christian faith. He was a construction worker and much loved by his many friends.

# School Opens Next Monday

will begin the second semester of the 2020-2021 school year with teachers reporting back to work on January 7th and January 8th for professional development.

Students will return to school on Monday, January 11,

Students will return to school on Monday, January 11, 2021. The district will continue its current schedule of traditional learning on Monday through Thursday and virtual learning on Friday at this time.

"With COVID numbers still high and with the holiday season just ending, we will continue our current schedule," stated superintendent Christie Holly. The district moved to all virtual learning at the end of the first semester due to an increase in numbers of staff and students in quarantine. Paper packets were sent home with students who did not have devices. "In order for students to be counted present for days in virtual/distance learning, completed packets must be returned to school on January 11th. Otherwise, students must be counted as absent if they didn't complete the work

Tishomingo County Schools and if they didn't respond to teacher communication during the 2020-2021 school year that time," explained Holly.

The district was able to complete the majority of the semester with very little school transmission of the virus. "It is a huge testament to our peoplecustodians, food service employees, bus drivers, nurses, teachers, staff, administrators, students, and parents- that allowed us to have a relatively normal first semester. The cleaning protocols, screening, masks, hand washing/sanitizing, scheduling, and many other strategies with social distancing have been effective in reducing school transmission," stated Holly. "We know the holidays may present a spike in community cases which means an impact on our students. We encourage parents to keep children at home if any symptoms appear that may indicate a possible COVID diagnosis.

We look forward to seeing our students on January 11th, but we want to ensure we keep our schools as safe as possible during this time," Holly stated.

to serve as head principal at TCHS.





# hat Six Dollars Can Do

When I was sixteen years old, I was invited to speak at a little country church in rural Denver Kentucky, not far 20 to 30 people and from Paintsville.

but closed its doors but joined the church and one man, Harold Rice, and his family wanted was all amazing. to see the church stay

open and do well. A church with few to almost no people typically does not attract too many interested ministers. I had spoken in my home church a few times and was a guest speaker in a few others. Mr. Rice asked if I would consider speaking at the church on the second and fourth Sunday afternoons at 2:00. I agreed, and brought a message to maybe seven or eight people my first Sunday. The crowd consisted of Harold and his wife June Rice and their family. The church was an old building with a pump organ and a sign behind the pulpit that said, «Preach the Word.»

I stayed with the little congregation called Liberty Baptist Church throughout high school. By the time I was seventeen Mr. Rice was talking to me about being the official pastor and about ordination. In time I would become the pastor and would be ordained. I was too young, too inexperienced and unskilled for such a responsibility but youth is adventurous

of us who know better would never consider.

The church grew and we started having often more. People lit-The church had all erally received Christ, were baptized.

was Mr. Rice offered me a grand salary of \$60 a month to help buy my gasoline. The trip one way from home was over 30 miles so this was appreciated. He also presented me with paperwork for a perk. The church was going to put 10 percent or \$6 of my salary into the church denominational retirement plan, then known as The Annuity Board. Its called Guidestone today. He had me to complete a form solidifying my agreement to this monthly contribution. I was about seventeen at this stage and had zero interest or thoughts about retirement. Six dollars a month kind of seemed

like a joke. I was with Liberty church a couple of years or more and about ten to twelve of those months Mr. Rice made that \$6 contribution to my retirement faithfully. Although, I never thought another day about it from the moment I signed those papers.

Seven or eight years

and will try what those ago I did wonder if that account even existed. I called up The Guidestone retirement people and with my Social Security number they told me in a few seconds that the account did indeed exist and my balance was \$31,000. Shocked would not describe how Even more amazing I felt. I almost had to pick myself off the floor. If Mr. Rice had made as many as 12 contributions the total invested would have been \$72. Now, years later I was looking at over \$31,000. Since that day of first inquiring that little \$6 account now has over \$46,000 and still grow-

> o a thing of the past. J. C. Jourdan, Sr. and family came to Iuka ound 1898 from the vler place southwest of ka. He established a mber business in Iuka in 898 which still remains

in business today east of Iuka on Airport Road. The business was originally located in downtown Iuka along the tracks of Southern Railway from Indian Creek to Bettydale Drive. The planing mill was located between Main and Pearl Streets and lumber was loaded into boxcars on the rail siding. A sawmill was also on the grounds. From its inception until the early 1960's, 2x4" lumber was the principal product. Today the company, which still remains in the Jourdan family, manufactures wooden handling pallets, crating materials and specialty lumber products.

J. C., Sr. was a young country boy who moved his family of six children and his wife, Ada Robinson, to town in 1898 and became one of Iuka's and Mississippi's most successful businessmen - a builder with great vision for the future. One of his first adventures was to own a livery stable with his father-in-law Al Robinson and his son Jim Robinson. The livery stable was located beside the now "Vidette" building in Iuka which is a vacant lot owned by the Baptist Church for parking.

According to Down Memory Lane by Autic; Mangurn, Mr. Jourdan did all his traveling on horseback. He liked horses, and he kept good ones. In the very early 1900's he had a very tall, and very dark bay horse named Harry. The old mule barn, which was behind the Jourdan home, was probably home to Harry and Mr. Jourdan's dapple gray, named Raymond.

According to Gene Jourdan, J. C. Sr. at one time owned 10,000 acres of land in Alabama with 7

sawmills operating. Gene can remember the old mule barn when he was a kid – playing in the stalls and he also remembers a place to get your horses shoed near the old mule barn. He believes the barn

was built around 1915. The mules could be put out to pasture in "Jour-Pasture" across dan's from the Mineral Springs Park. The pasture was also used to store lumber, as well as the town's base-

ball field, and even home to fairs and circus'. J.C.'s great-grandchildren, Jane and Bubba, can remember helping their father, Olen, round up the mules when they escaped the barn and wondered through Iuka.





hurts. Then you can't send a sympathy card because you don't know the address. So many obstacles. So much for restrictions. God is still in control and He will see us through this ordeal.

I wanted to touch on the vaccines that they are giving now. They are distributed to those who care for us first as it should be. Someone asked me yesterday if I was going to take the hopefully preventive shot. My reply, "you better believe I am when it becomes available to me."

I remember in the 1930's, a vaccine become available for typhoid fever. The Tishomingo County Health doctor and a couple of nurses came to the rural schools and gave the

My mother could wield a peach tree switch better than any mom in our community. She had plenty of practice on my brother, George Robert Jr. and me. I'm sure we needed every whipping we ever got. We could get into more things than I can remember. But remember we wore dresses back then and our legs showed stripes the next day at school. That's what hurt. Today, mothers would be locked up if they left stripes. We, as
