## The Tradition Continues – Belmont Girls Bring Home the State Championship Title

The Belmont Lady Cardinal basketball team was victorious in their bid for the State 3-A Championship last weekend, bringing home the gold trophy once again, making it 12 state championship titles in program history. Over the years, the Lady Cardinals have played 39

times in the state tournament, 19 times with a record of 12-7.

Coach Higginbottom just finished his 16<sup>th</sup> season at Belmont and has led the girls' basketball program to the state tournament 11 times. He also has led the Lady Cardinals to the state championship game 6 out of the last 12 years where Belmont has won it 4 times. The 2021 3A Girls Championship is Coach Higginbottom's 4<sup>th</sup> state championship.

"This team had a mentality, whatever we need to do to help our team win a state champi-

onship that is what we want to do! Every player on this team played a different role for our team and they all fulfilled their role and that is why we are the 2021 3A state champions! I cannot be any happier for a great group of girls, said Coach Chris Higginbottom!"

The action at the "big house" in Jackson started on Wednesday evening, when Belmont defeated Kemper County 61-29. Scorers were: Macie Walker with 31 points, Mary-Grace Stormont with 8 points, Abby Kuykendall and Kassi

Grimes with 6 points each, Kalea Koger with 4 points, Brooklyn Hodum and Rayleigh Guin with 3 points each.

On Saturday the championship game pitted Belmont against old rival, Kossuth. This was the second time Belmont and Kossuth had played for the championship in three years. The nail-biting game ended with Belmont on top, 56 -55.

Scorers were Macie Walker with 29 points, Abby Kuykendall with 12 points, Mary-Grace Stormont with 8 points, Rayleigh Guin with 3 points, Kassi Grimes and Brooklyn Hodum with 2 points each.

Macie Walker was named the Most Valuable Player of the 3A State Championship Game and Abby Kuykendall received the Scholar Athlete Award.



### Pursuit Leads to Arrest of Alabama Man

On March 4, 2021, Tishomingo County Sheriff's deputies assisted the Tuscumbia, Alabama Police Department in attempting to apprehend a possible stolen vehicle that had entered Tishomingo County, heading westbound on US Hwy 72. While attempting to flee from law enforcement, the driver of the vehicle entered the Tishomingo County High School campus and followed the road back out on to US Hwy. 72. Law enforcement began attempting to "box" the vehicle in to end the pursuit. The alleged suspect then used his vehicle and struck the patrol units of both the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Office and the Tuscumbia Police Department.

The alleged suspect's vehicle then became disabled and law enforcement was able to take him into custody. During this time, law enforcement closed the right-side lane of the highway while conducting an initial investigation of the pursuit. The Mississippi Highway Patrol (MHP) and the Mississippi Bureau of Investigations (MBI) was notified and assisted in the investigation. A total of four

(4) law enforcement vehicles were damaged, due to the actions of the alleged suspect. He was then transported to the Tishomingo County Jail awaiting charges.

**Markus Wayne Fields**, 35-years-old, of 6273 Florence, Alabama was officially charged with: felony fleeing and aggravated assault on law enforcement (x2). Tishomingo County Justice Court Judge, Seth Adams, set a bond in the amount of \$200,000 on Fields. Fields was also charged with several misdemeanor violations from the MHP. Fields also has a hold placed on him by the Tuscumbia Police Department, where he could possibly face more charges.

The Tishomingo County Sheriff's Office and the Mississippi Bureau of Investigation are still investigating this incident.

At Iuka Animal Clinic we know how much you love their pets. Some of us don't want to go anywhere without our beloved fur baby. Pets like Wiley who are used to traveling are comfortable with travel situations, but some pets can get nervous. If you are taking a road trip you need to prepare your pet, you need them geared up by taking them on a series of short trips first, gradually lengthening time spent in the car. The best to keep your pets safe and secure in well-ventilated crate or carrier. The crate should be large enough for your pet to stand, sit, lie down and turn around. It is important to secure your pet's crate so it will not shift in the event of an abrupt stop. Remember, your pet where you're headed or how you plan to get there. Make sure your pet has identification and wear a collar and tag imprinted with your name, phone number, and any relevant contact information. It's a good idea for your pet's collar to also include a temporary tag with your cell phone and destination phone number for the duration of your trip. ## CHS Inaugural Football Coach, Keith Steele, Passes Away

Fulton, Miss. --- On Monday, February 19, 2021, Inaugural Head Football Coach for the Tishomingo County Braves in the Fall of 1991, passed away at the age of 73.

Coach Steele was hired as the first Head Football Coach of the Braves and led the team to a (5-4) season that included victories over Belmont, Slatton, and Wamba Agricultural High Schools.

Richie Harrleson, who was a Senior standout for the Braves in the Fall of 2011, said, "Coach Steele was a great man. He just showed us how to make people

feel special. He touched a lot of lives and for that we should be grateful. Coach made us better people. Whenever we would cross paths later in life he would go out of his way to make time to speak with me. Thank you Coach from all of us first Braves, you made the world a better place."

Chris Cornelison, who was also on that very first Brave squad, added, "There are no greater lessons that the ones made on the Football Field. We merged three schools and overcame all kinds of differences to become one team and one community



in a really short period of time. Coach Steele was a big lead in that effort through the game of Football."

He was predeceased by his parents, Woodrow Steele and Corinne Mattox Harrison; and his brother Butch Steele. He is survived by his wife Cathy Steele; his daughters, Meisha Sparks (Bert) of Slatton and Leah Wilson (Michael) of Slatton; his grandchildren, Emma Cate Sparks, BreAnne Sparks, Jacob Crump, Hayes Wilson and Harris Wilson; his brother Kevin Steele of Lafayette, TN; his sister-in-law Marcia-deen Steele of Fulton; his nephew Kory Steele of Fulton; and his nieces, Laura Leigh Fowlkes (Jen) of Tupelo and Lisa Kay Johnson (Sonny) of Madison, AL.

## UDC Story

### "Belle" Boyd

#### Confederate Spy

Following a skirmish at nearby Falling Waters on July 2, 1861, Federal troops occupied Martinsburg. On July 4, Belle Boyd shot and killed a drunken Union soldier who, as she wrote in her post-war memoirs, "addressed my mother and myself in language as offensive as it is possible to conceive. I could stand it no longer...we ladies were obliged to go armed in order to protect ourselves as best we might from insult and outrage." She did not suffer any reprisal for this action, "the commanding officer...inquired into all the circumstances with strict impartiality, and finally said I had 'done perfectly right.'" Thus began her career as "the Rebel Spy" at age 17.

Learning that Union Major General Nathaniel Banks' forces had been ordered to march; she rode fifteen miles to inform Confederate Major General Thomas J. "Stonewall" Jackson who was nearby in the Shenandoah Valley. She returned home under cover of darkness. Several weeks later, on May 23, when she realized Jackson was about to attack Front Royal, she ran onto the battlefield to provide the General with last minute information about the Union troop dispositions. Jackson's aide, Lieutenant Henry Kyd Douglas, described seeing "the figure of a woman in white glide swiftly out of town...she seemed...to heed neither weeds nor fences, but waved a bonnet as she came on." Boyd later wrote, "the Federal pickets...immediately fired upon me...my escape was most providential... rifle-balls flew thick and

fast about me...so near my feet as to throw dust in my eyes...numerous bullets whistled by my ears, several actually pierced different parts of my clothing." Jackson captured the town and acknowledged her contribution and her bravery in a personal note.

Boyd's flirtations with Union officers, however, were her strongest source of influence. Contemporaries noted that «with-out being beautiful, she is very attractive...quite tall...a superb figure...and dressed with much taste.» On one occasion, she wooed a Northern soldier to whom, she wrote, «I am indebted for some very remarkable effusions, some withered flowers, and last, but not least, for a great deal of very important information...I must avow the flowers and the poetry were comparatively valueless in my eyes.» Boyd continued, «I allowed but one thought to keep possession of my mind—the thought that I was doing all a woman could do for her country's cause.»

Boyd was arrested six

or seven times, but managed to avoid incarceration until July 29, 1862, when she was finally imprisoned in Old Capitol Prison in Washington, D.C. She was released after a month as part of a prisoner exchange, but was arrested again in July 1863. Boyd was not a model inmate. She waved Confederate flags from her window, she sang Dixie, and devised a unique method of communicating with supporters outside. Her contact would shoot a rubber ball into her cell with a bow and arrow and Boyd would sew messages inside the ball. In December 1863 she was released and banished to the South. She sailed for England on May 8, 1864 and was arrested again as a Confederate courier. She fled to Canada with the help of a Union naval officer, Lieutenant Sam Hardinge, and eventually made her way to England where she and Hardinge were married.



# I Remember

I have been house-bound for a year yesterday. I fell, 2-16-20, and broke my right arm in the elbow - a terrible place. It affected all the activities I did with my right hand. Then after using my left arm I was finally able to begin using my right hand again. The Coronavirus Covid 19, invaded my family as well as the whole universe.

I've had both my shots. So thankful. It looks like now I'll be cooped up for a few more weeks according to the weatherman. Being shut in gives one time to slow down, and recall days gone by. I thought of a few times such as today to share with you.

It was either 1934 or 35 that we had a huge ice and snow storm. The snow came up to the windows and insulated our house since it was not underpinned. Smile.

School never closed or had never before, but it did this day.

There were four of us school age; Jewel 13, Ruth 10, George Robert Jr. 7, and Flora Mae 5. It was dreadfully cold. We had no boots but all except Jewel had high top shoes and long, black and brown long stockings held up by garters above our knees.

Mom and Dad would put paper sacks, newspapers, old rags or anything they could find to tie around our legs to the top of our shoes. Remember we wore dresses!

On this particular cold morning my dad helped us to the road, as he usually did. We went across the cotton-patch rather than going the long distance by the road. We had to cross a big ditch with a wide plank to walk across. There was no water in the ditch unless it had been raining but it carried the water from both sides of the rolling fields and was wide and deep.

My dad got us all across the big ditch and into the road and we were on our way to Cripple Deer, the little one-teacher school.

We were all nearly frozen when we got to the school house. The door was locked, no teacher and no fire. My uncle John Keith usually had built a fire in the "pot bellied stove" and the room was warm, not today. We four kids had no choice but to turn around and go home. We lived a good mile from our house to the school house. John and Johnnie McManus lived about half a mile from school. Evidently they had seen us pass going to school. Hulsey, their son, went to the same school but he didn't go that day. Wise.

When we got back even with their house, the door opened and they took us inside their home. To this day, I have a feeling Flora Mae would have died from hypothermia had they not taken us in and thawed us out before they'd let us go on home.

That gesture of carrying for children has always stuck with me.

Kindness is a virtue and they really were kind. Our feet were wet and cold as well as our hands and faces. So kind. Mrs. Oralee McManus of Iuka is the widow of Hulsey. He and I were the same age, and today I still have a string of beads he gave me wrapped around a toy blue soldier. The toy soldier was crushed at the Pruitt's Gin where it had been lost in a bale of cotton. When I was growing up, I never let children play with the toy, but years after I'd married I let my nephew who was having a serious surgery play with it and he lost it in a bale of cotton!

The story of Little Boy Blue was one we had that goes like this:

Little Boy Blue come blow your horn.  
The sheep are in the meadow  
The cows are in the corn  
Where is the little boy who tends the sheep?  
He's lying on a haystack fast asleep.  
He was supposed to be a watchman, but like a child he needed a nap and took it.

# Lessons On Life From The Prophet Isaiah (part 13)

Isaiah the prophet never hesitated to bring out the sins of his nation and its leaders, and it would be good if we had a few "Isaiahs" in our day! Isaiah 1:21-23 says, "How is the faithful city become an harlot! It was full of judgment; righteousness lodged in it; but now murderers. It would seem that enough people would have recognized the downward spiral of the nation to have helped turn it around, but that did not happen, just as it is not yet happening in our nation. The leaders of Jerusalem had become rebellious against God, thinking that they own reasoning and laws were superior to God's. Does that also have a familiar ring to it? Leaders had become companions of thieves, much as the powerful businesses of our nation can turn national leaders into "partners" in commerce and its gains! Court systems in Jerusalem had come to "favor the money", leaving the poor with no recourse for true justice. The leaders of Jerusalem had become "companions of thieves",

which the widows and orphans never had enough wealth to get anyone to hear their cases. It is amazing to me that history does repeat itself, for the nations of our present world seem to pay little, or any, attention to what has brought the downfall of nations through the centuries of time. Isaiah 1:24 shows God's thinking about Jerusalem and Israel's wrong thinking: "Therefore saith the LORD, the LORD of hosts, the mighty One of Israel, Ah, I will ease Me of Mine adversaries, and avenge Me of Mine enemies." a double. Chloe Hollingsworth had 2 hits and Bearden added a double.




