A variety of information is available for NMSC to evaluate: The Finalist's academic record, information about the school's curriculum and grading system, PSAT/NMSQT Selection Index score, the high school official's written recommendation, information about the student's activities and leadership, and the Finalist's own essay. Beginning in

March and continuing to mid-June, NMSC notifies approximately 7,600 Finalists that they have been selected

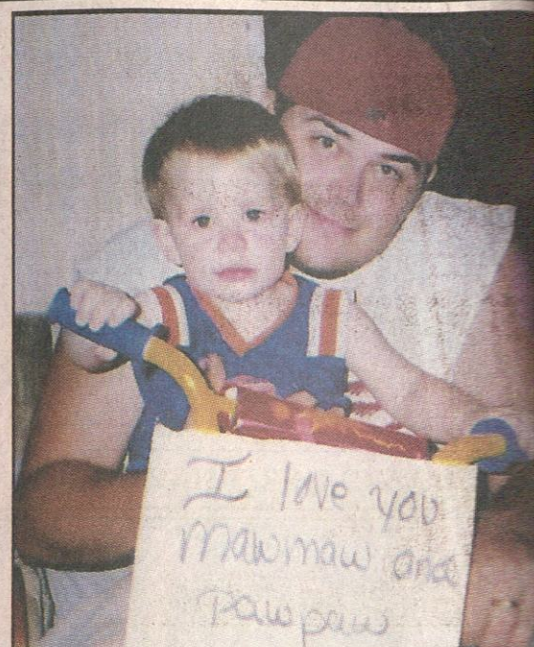

A bit of history from last year, someone sent a sheriff's deputy to our home to complain that our goats had broke a corn feeder they used to bait deer. When the officer came out our goats were in the pen by our house, so the officer said he didn't think it was ours. The next

day, one of the hunters came to our house angry and rude. We offered to pay for anything they broke and apologized. The man didn't give his name and the sheriff department can't follow up without a name.

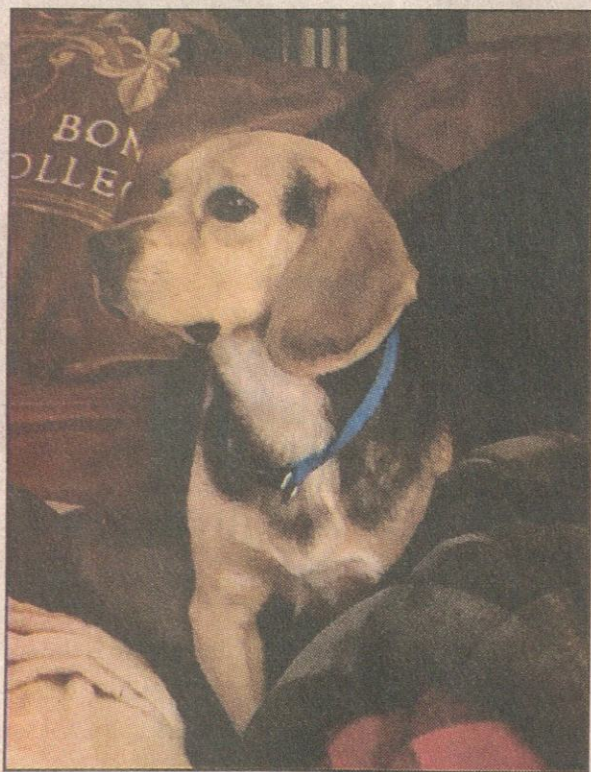
If someone found them, let me know. If you killed them, let the sheriff know! I have sadness and hate in my heart. This is no way to heal and I need closure.

I Remember

I have had a special great niece visit me this week. All my nieces and nephews are special but some visit more than others, but of course, some are retired and have more time.

Lorie came and brought her cross stitching to do while we talked and I was going to crochet. I had a late breakfast so no need for dinner because it was past lunch time when she got here.

I got another cup of decaf-coffee and we sat down. She didn't get her cross-stitching out nor did I get out my crocket thread and needle. Why?

We just started talking and there was no time to work. With either job we had planned to do, one has to count stitches and we had no time to work. She wanted to hear a few stories about my first year teaching at Cripple Deer where her mother had gone. About half of the students were kin to me.

I had the three youngest siblings of mine as students. A memory of making rabbit-tobacco came up. My baby sister was in first grade. In the small schools at the time everyone had to use the woods for their toilets. I always let my students be excused to use the woods during class time, one at a time, if necessary. The boys used the woods on one side of the road and the girls the other side.

One day my baby sister asked to be excused and of course I gave her permission to go. I felt she had been gone too long and when she got back, I noticed something different. She wore little overalls and her two front pockets were stuffed with rabbit-tobacco. She was so cute, but I scolded her and sent her back outside to throw it away.

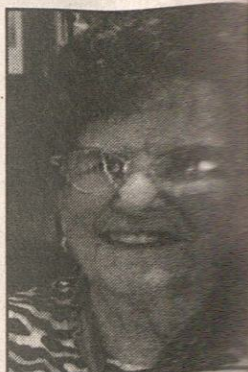
Digress: at this young age, I never remembered how my older sister Jewel and I would slip and smoke. Daddy wouldn't let us smoke. He hated the odor. My grandmother, Mae Page, let her daughter

Eunice Page Quinn and us smoke sometimes. I didn't even remember Jewel and I were trying to smoke on the bale of cotton that got destroyed.

Back to the story. She did as told and returned quickly to her seat. That afternoon most of us walked home the same way. Only Jeanette Quinn and James Ray Page went east. I took a good look and was really surprised at what I saw. Ann's two front pockets were stuffed with the rabbit-tobacco. I helped her empty her pockets and then spanked her. I'm sure I didn't hurt her too badly, but her older sister, Nancy, thought I had killed her baby sister. She said "I'm going to tell Mama and Daddy on you," and away she ran. As I recall there were Clifford Cox and Toosie, Betty Jean Williams, Albert C. Aldridge, Hilda Gay Page and myself all walking together. When I got to Dad and Mom's, I always visited for a few minutes to get to hold Carolyn Jewel Edmondson for a few minutes. Dorlan, her dad, was overseas during World War II and Jewel was back home with our parents. Nancy was not in sight. It had tickled my parents and after visiting I headed back to where I live today or Hwy. 25.

I want to explain how and why a bale of cotton was destroyed during the Great Depression.

Jewel was left with us kids while Mom and Dad were picking cotton for the Sidney Dawson's on a rolling hill-side across from our house. With the babies asleep we were on the front porch playing on a bale of cotton. She got her rabbit-tobacco and brown paper and rolled us a cigarette. Matches were scarce but she was trying to light my cigarette from hers and dropped the match on the cotton and immediately it blazed up. Big! We started screaming for Mom and Dad who ran as fast as they could and so did the other pickers, but a whole bale of cotton was ruined. Not



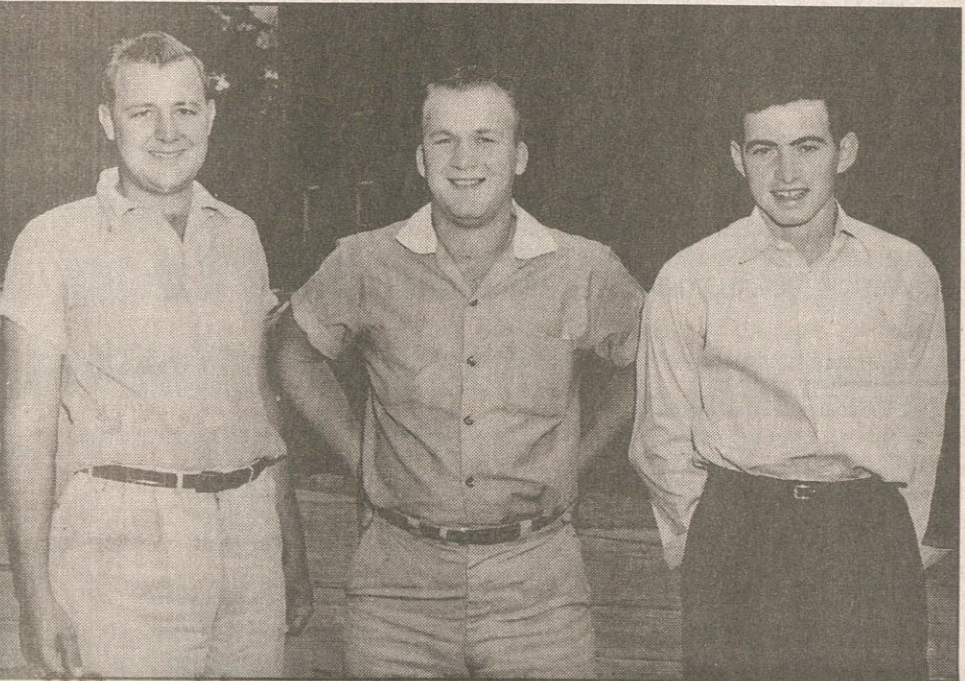
burned up but so. It was put out in the yard where we tried off the burned lot. The whole bale was ter. Jewel was probably seven. Time hard and we hadn't many bales that year didn't whip us, the too thankful we were burned along with house. I do remember how sad my parents though and even though we were young, we have known better. None of these memories passed through my mind while I was doing Shirley Ann.

To explain how why we could carry cotton off the porch yard? No one wanted in their yards. We sweep with brush (usually made from wood limbs because many branches on over the whole year week. Flowers were in. No leaves or grass of any kind was left yard. It had to be all summer before we would carry us to the Cripple Deer Creek for a dip. No swimming was a disgrace to the such a thing. I was not before I had a swim. We used to cut off grass and a top. Would Grandpa Page think was disgracing his reputation to allow such on farm today? Time changes and then the manufacturers have gone a little. My opinion. Too slow.

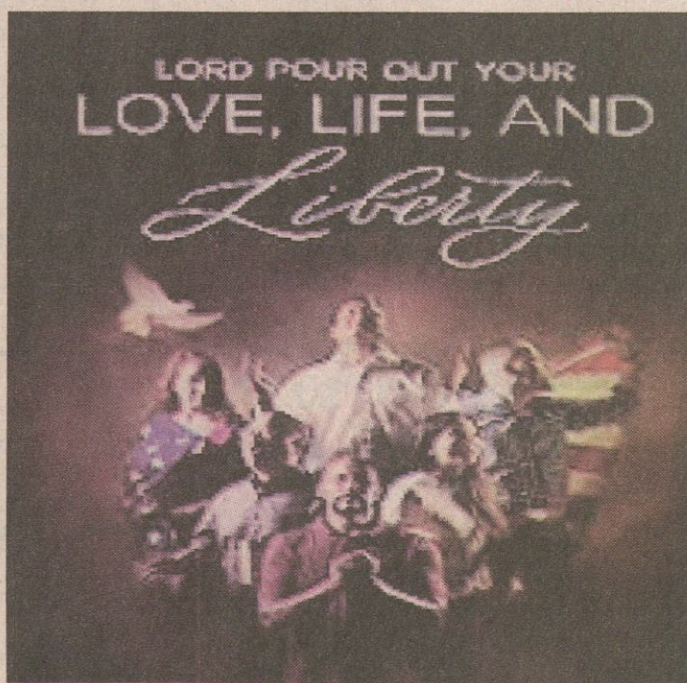

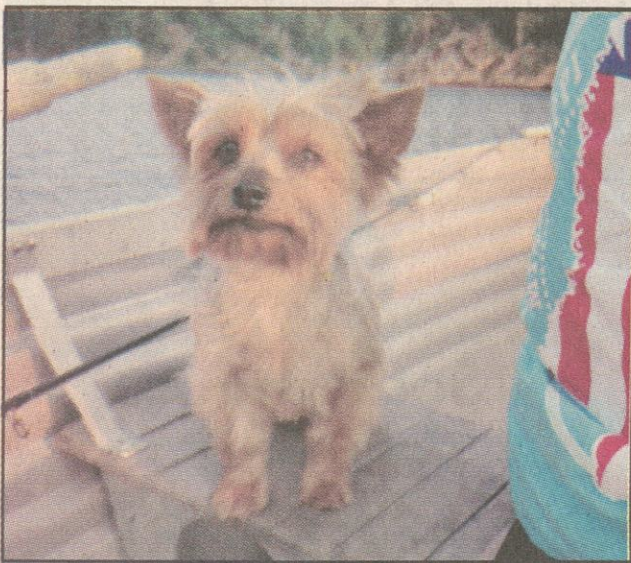

We're pleased to present to you this year's Annual Quality Water Report. This report is designed to inform you about the quality of our drinking water and services we deliver to you every day. Our constant goal is to provide you with a safe and dependable supply of drinking water. We want you to understand the efforts we make to continually improve the water treatment process and protect our water resources. We are committed to ensuring the quality of your water. Our water source is from a natural spring at Jackson Springs in Tishomingo.

The source water assessment has been completed for our public water system to determine the overall susceptibility of its drinking water supply to identified potential sources of contamination. A report containing detailed information on how the susceptibility determinations were made has been furnished to our public water system and is available for viewing upon request. The spring for town has received a moderate susceptibility ranking to contamination.

If you have any questions about this report or concerning your water utility, please contact Kim Daily at 662.438.6302. We want our valued customers to be informed about their water utility. If you want to learn more, please attend the meeting scheduled for the Tuesday of each month at 6:00 PM at the Tishomingo City Hall.

We routinely monitor for contaminants in your drinking water according to Federal and State laws. This table below lists all of the drinking water contaminants that we detected during the period of January 1st to December 31st, 2020. In cases where monitoring wasn't required in 2020, the table reflects the most recent results. As water travels over the surface of land or underground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive materials and can pick up substances or contaminants from the presence of animals or from human activity; microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, that may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations, and wildlife; inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally occurring or result from urban storm-water runoff, industrial, or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, farming; pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban storm-water runoff, residential uses; organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations and septic systems; radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities. In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations that limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. All drinking water, including bottled drinking water, may be reasonably expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. It's important to remember that the presence of these contaminants does not necessarily indicate that the water poses a health risk.

In this table you will find many terms and abbreviations you might not be familiar with. To help you better understand these terms we have provided the following definitions:

Action Level - the concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements which a water system must follow.

Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL) - The "Maximum Allowed" (MCL) is the highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

Maximum Contaminant Level Goal (MCLG) - The "Goal" (MCLG) is the level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.

Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level (MRDL) - The highest level of a disinfectant allowed in drinking water. There is convincing evidence that a disinfectant is necessary to control microbial contaminants.

Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level Goal (MRDLG) - The level of a drinking water disinfectant below which there is no known or expected health risk. MRDLGs do not reflect the benefits of the use of disinfectants to control microbial contaminants.

Parts per million (ppm) or Milligrams per liter (mg/l) - one part per million corresponds to one minute in two years or a single penny in \$10,000.

Parts per billion (ppb) or Micrograms per liter - one part per billion corresponds to one minute in 2,000 years, or a single penny in \$10,000,000.

We're proud that your drinking water meets or exceeds all Federal and State requirements. We have learned through our monitoring and testing that some constituents have been detected however the EPA has determined that your water IS SAFE at these levels.

We are required to monitor your drinking water for specific contaminants on a monthly basis. Results of regular monitoring are posted on our website. We did complete the monitoring requirements for bacteriological sampling that showed no coliform present. In an effort to ensure systems complete all monitoring requirements, MSDH now monitors systems of any missing samples prior to the end of the compliance period.

If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. Our water system is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. If your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds before using water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your water, you may wish to have your water tested.
