TCHS Athletic Hall of Fame

In early December, 2020, TCHS announced it would be accepting nominations for nominees into the 2020-2021 TCHS Hall of Fame - Student Athlete. The nominee had to be distinguished themselves in athletic competition over the course of his/her career at TCHS and had to be separated from TCHS a minimum of three years. During the Tribe Pride Day last Saturday at the campus, four recipients were chosen by the Hall of Fame Committee to receive recognition as the new members of the Hall of Fame. Nominees will now reopen this fall for the second class.

Aaron Foster attended TCHS between the years of 1991-1996. He graduated with several honors including Valedictorian, Mr. TCHS, and voted Most Athletic by his classmates. He lettered in Football, Basketball, and Baseball. He went on to further his education at NEMCC where he lettered in

three sports before moving on to Mississippi State University where he graduated Magna Cum Laude while getting his Bachelor of Science Degree in Mechanical Engineering. Currently, Foster resides in Booneville, MS with his wife, Cassie, and 4 children. He works as an Executive for Toyota Motor Manufacturing in Blue Springs, MS. He has also spent many years as a Pulpit or College Minister and serves on the Board of Pine Vale Children's Home as well as to give back to others.

Jackie Beals began his service for Tishomingo County Schools at Burnsville in 1989 teaching physical education and coaching football, basketball and baseball. He served as a teacher, coach, vice principal and principal at Tishomingo County High School from 1991 through 2017. He taught health, physical education and coached football, basketball, golf and tennis prior to his serving in school administration. He had a positive impact on countless Braves throughout the years.

Richy Harrelson was a member of the first graduating

class in 1992. Richy broke multiple state records while lettering in football, baseball, and basketball. He was elected the first Mr. TCHS. After graduation he played for 4 years at Ole Miss. His first head coaching job was at Lafayette High School, his team won the 2006 state championship, and was also named Clarion Ledger Coach of the Year. He was an assistant coach for the 2009 College World Series team at Southern Miss. Rich is currently the head coach at NEMCC. He lives in Booneville, MS. He is married to Hope and has two children, Gage and Mary Cille.

Chris Cornelison attended TCHS in 1992, and graduated with honors as part of the first ever graduating class of TCHS. He went on to further his education at NEMCC where he lettered in baseball from 1993 to 1994, before moving to the University of Mississippi where he obtained a Bachelors of Pharmacy. His wife Janet and two children, Megan and Alex, are all TCHS Alumni. Chris is a nationally recognized Pharmacist, Entrepreneur, and Leader.

Sheriff's Office Assists in Operation Blue Rain

On April 22, 2021, the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Office assisted the office of the Mississippi Attorney General, Mississippi Bureau of Narcotics, and the U.S. Department of Homeland Security in "OPERATION BLUE RAIN".

The operation involved the use of online, undercover, and traditional investigative actions to locate individuals attempting to lure children to meet for sex or asking them to produce child pornography. One of the arrests made was one Richard Cratis Carter, a 62-year-old white male of 245 CR 392 Tishomingo, MS.

Carter was transported to the Tishomingo County Jail where he is awaiting extradition back to the State of Florida to face crimes committed in

that state in relation to his arrest.

Sheriff Daugherty states that crimes such as this against children will

not be tolerated in Tishomingo County and his office will do everything in its power to make sure those that have committed these horrendous crimes are brought to justice. Sheriff Daugherty would like to thank the Attorney General, Lynn Fitch, and her investigators as well as the Mississippi Bureau of Narcotics and U.S. Homeland Security in this effort.

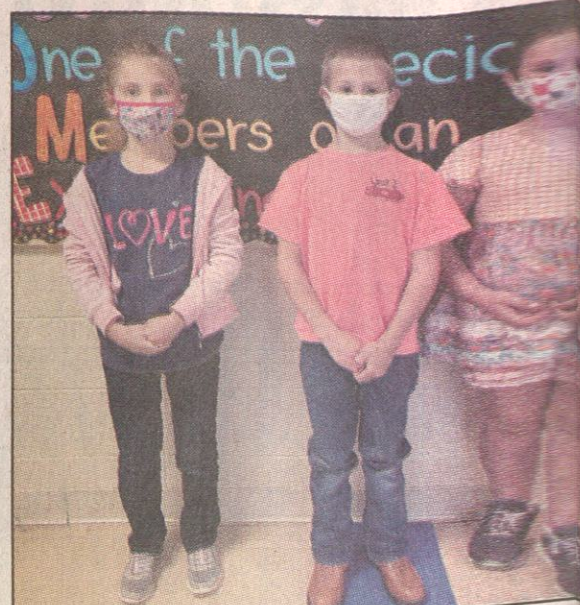

Attorney General Fitch Continues Fight to Protect Mississippi Children

April 27, 2021

Operation Blue Rain

The Mississippi Attorney General's Office, in partnership with the Hernando Police Department, has completed a week-long effort known as Operation Blue Rain. The operation involved the use of online, undercover, and traditional investigative actions to locate individuals attempting to lure children to meet for sex or asking them to produce child pornography. The operation was coordinated by the Office of the Mississippi Attorney General and the Hernando Police Department with the assistance of the United States Department of Homeland Security, Mississippi Bureau of Narcotics, Panola County Sheriff's Office, Monroe County Sheriff's Office, and the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Office. "Nothing motivates me more than protecting our children from predators who would rob them of their innocence," said Attorney General Lynn Fitch. "I would like to thank the law enforcement officers, investi-

gators, and all of our federal, state, and local partners who assisted in Operation Blue Rain for their hard work and continued support in our fight to protect our children and our communities." Operation Blue Rain led to the arrest of at least six individuals on charges related to the sexual exploitation or enticement of minors, as well as three suspects arrested on charges related to narcotics. With investigations still ongoing, the operation may result in additional arrests. Law enforcement officers served eight search warrants in support of the operation. The following were arrested and charged as part of Operation Blue Rain: Michael Murphy, 37, was arrested on allegations of accessing child exploitation material following a search warrant. Murphy was apprehended at his place of employment in Panola County. Terry Eugene Johnson III, 23, was arrested and charged with child exploitation for enticing a child. Johnson made arrangements to meet the child for sexually

explicit conduct at a location in DeSoto County. Rick Russell, 21, was arrested in DeSoto County and charged with child exploitation for enticing a child to meet for sexually explicit conduct. Johnny Allen Polnitz, 23, was arrested for possession of drug paraphernalia in DeSoto County. Tailya Tane Smith, 20, was arrested for possession of drug paraphernalia in DeSoto County. Deandra Donelle Wilson, 29, was arrested in DeSoto County and charged with child exploitation for enticing a child to meet for sexually explicit conduct. Johnathan Deshaun Ford, 21, was arrested in DeSoto County and charged with child exploitation for enticing a child to meet for sexually explicit conduct. Jermichael Parker, 26, was arrested for possession of drug paraphernalia in DeSoto County. Richard Carter, 62, who is already a registered sex offender, was arrested on charges originating from the State of Florida. Pending charges allege Carter sexually abused a minor in Mississippi and Florida. Mississippi investigators located Carter and collected evidence from Carter's residence in Tishomingo County

Fifty Years After Leaving Hometown, Author Returns With A Novel!!!

Kate Ware is her pseudonym and Iuka is her hometown. Almost fifty years after leaving her hometown, Kate returns to launch her new novel, *Fingerprints on the Pew*. Fifty years ago, in 1971, Kate left home the day after graduation. She left with her one piece of luggage, a red Skyway luggage bag her mother had given her for graduate. She also took one box of groceries from Franks' Grocery, a store from her dad. Kate began her college career at Dyersburg State College in Dyersburg, TN, where she majored in music and was elected to the position of representative of the Student Government Association. Her tuition payment was only dollars a quarter. She could barely scrape together the money, at the time, but she paid her tuition by babysitting at fifty an hour. She sold her 1961 Chevrolet Corvair for \$25.00, to pay for her books. She began school at the University of Tennessee-Martin, in January, 1971. After graduation, she taught school in Shelby County for thirty years.



She often volunteered for grade changes, so she taught grades kindergarten-seventh, with the exception of third. Her favorite was sixth grade science, where she needed her career at Houston Middle School, in Germantown, TN. Kate began the book as a promise to her cousin, whose sister had suffered abuse at the hands of a minister. In the beginning, it was going to be a pamphlet or a brochure. Sixty-two thousand words later, it is a novel. She began writing the work of

fiction on August 12th, 2015, and ended it last October. The original title was going to be, "Don't Drink the Kool-Aid", but during research, she found that title had already been used. The book became a murder mystery/thriller, when Covid 19 happened last year, and allowed Kate more time to finish the project.

The book is a fictional work about a DNA search for family ties. During her research, "Carolina", the heroine in the book, discovered stories of horrors and abuse.

The story was written for victims of abuse, past, present and future. IT is a work of fiction with a twist. The L.A. Agent, who wanted her book at the Clarksville Writers' Conference, suggested she might call it realistic or reflective fiction. That was three years ago, and the book wasn't ready at the time.

The subject is "Abuse Awareness". The genre is realistic fiction. The readers' most often used term in describing the book, so far, has been the word, "intriguing"!

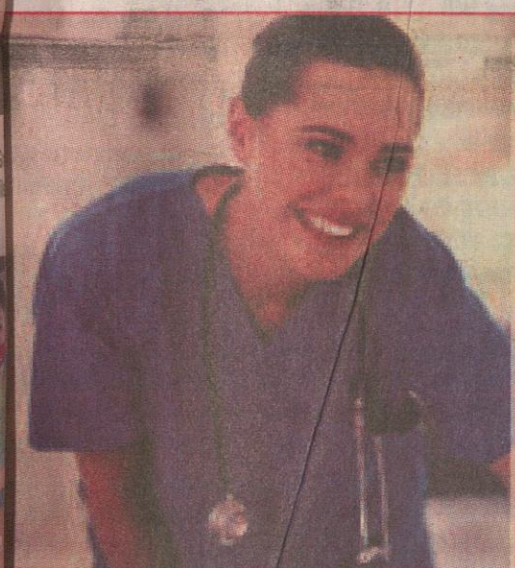

Not necessarily my age but the grands and my ten great-grand keep their parents pretty busy with all their activities or they live too far away to eat at my table like it once was. It takes much less canning, pickling, and freezing. It's good and yet it's sad. I don't have them or a niece or nephew a week or two at a time anymore. Enjoy them while you have them young because the older they get the less you'll see them. They have a busy schedule while making their own memories so someday they'll have them to write about and read when they can't do anything else. Smile. I'm not in that stage just yet, but every day we live is a blessing from God. So enjoy the day and if perhaps you are afraid you're going to "get in the dumps." Just read your diary. 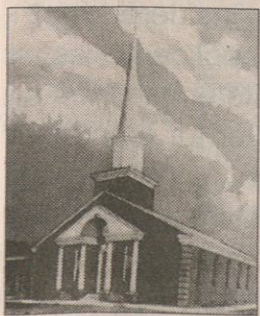

Pastor's Tidbits

Lessons On Restoration From The Prophet Isaiah (part 6)

The second chapter of Isaiah gives some very vivid details on who and what will be brought down when God determines to deal with the sins of Israel. Isaiah 2:12-18 says, "For the day of the LORD shall be upon every one that is proud and lofty, and upon every one that is lifted up; and he shall be brought low; and upon all the cedars of Lebanon, that are high and lifted up, and upon all the oaks of Bashan, and upon all the high mountains, and upon all the hills that are lifted up, and upon every high tower, and upon every fenced wall, and upon all the ships of Tarshish, and upon all all pleasant pictures. And the loftiness of man shall be bowed down, and the haughtiness of men shall be made low: and the LORD alone shall be exalted in that day. And the idols shall be utterly abolished."

It may be that some people will think that the judgments mentioned in our verses are too severe, but that kind of thinking would come only from those who have not read the rest of the Scriptures, for God had clearly commanded that there should be no other gods beside Him, even in the ten commandments given to Israel. So when men directly take actions against God and what He has commanded, judgment will ultimately follow! It is strange, and even heartbreaking to think that our world, and even our beloved America, has to a great degree come to accept all kinds of idolatry under the banner of "freedom of religion". I wonder why Christians do not have the same privilege as others concerning "freedom of religion"? Why does our book, the Bible, get banded from our schools, while nonsensical literature is read, distributed and praised as being a part of good education? When I was a student at Plainview High School in Rainsville, Alabama, we were allowed to have daily devotions from the Bible, plus literature stories that sometimes revolved around the Bible. Now the Bible is taboo in schools, for the most part!

Other nations have traveled the road we are traveling, and they have not fared very well from it. Israel is one such nation. Our verses above show that God has long since tired of idolatry, especially in the nation that He had greatly blessed. God promised through Isaiah that there would be a day when all of the proud would be brought down. More than that, the very trees used for building houses and other buildings would be destroyed. Also the very landscape itself would be judged and changed, perhaps by earthquakes etc.. The towers used as place of outlook for enemies would be destroyed; ships and city walls would be wrecked, and all proud people would be humbled. Then the most outstanding statement in these verse is that the LORD alone will be exalted in this day of God's great wrath against the sins of Israel. And so it happened, at least to a great degree, when Israel was captured by other nations, yet there is a future aspect of these verses that is yet to come!

Third stop: Summer Outdoor summer games, watermelon and a Parade. EVERYONE LOVES A PARADE

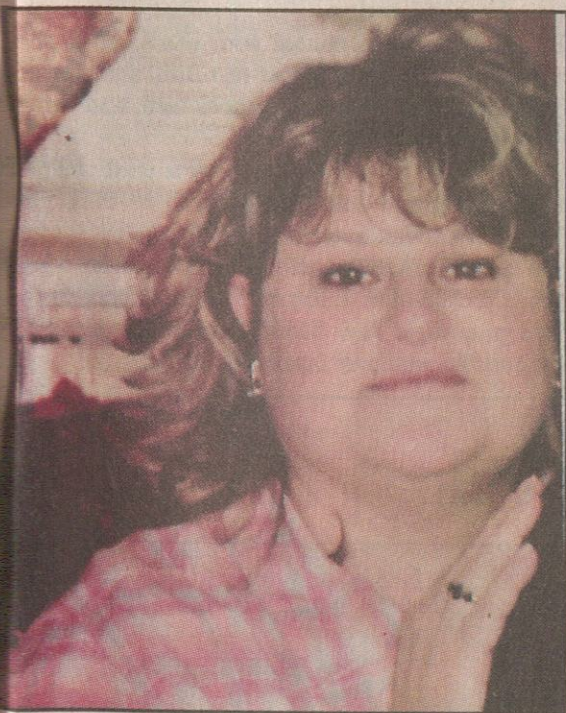

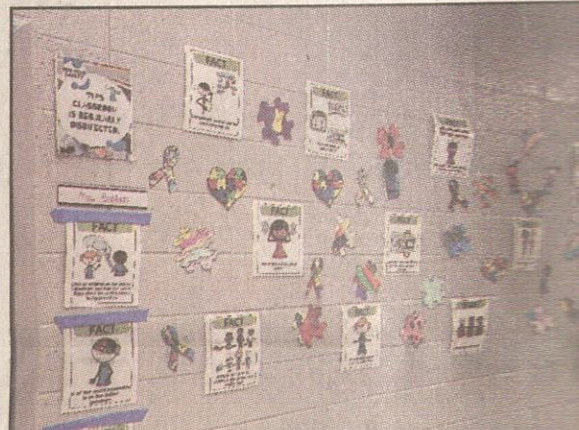


Seniors Maddison Bartlett and Sarah Daniel walk off the field for the last time as a Lady Brave.
