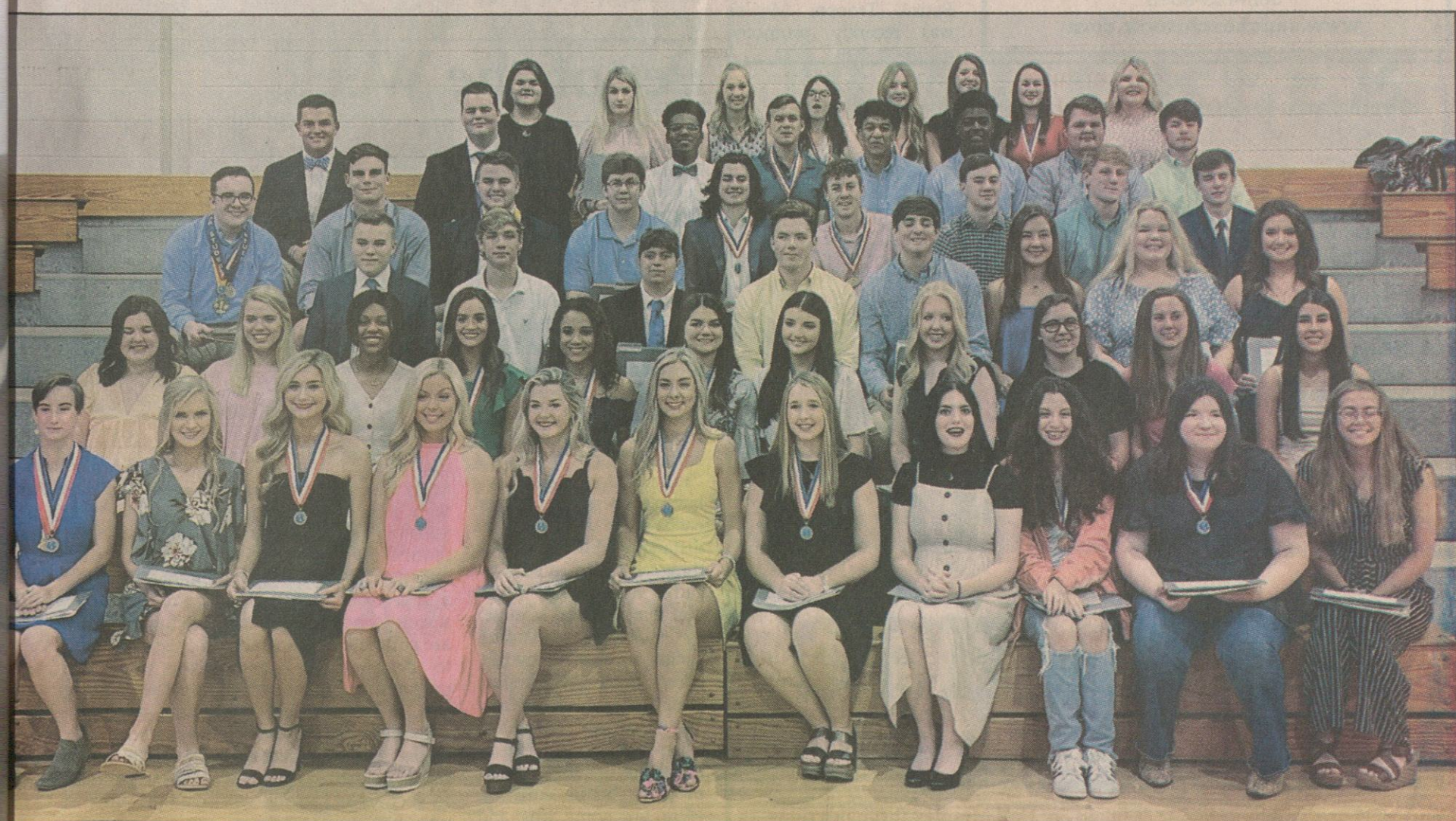
Local Libraries Now Open

Two City of Iuka Officials Awarded Certification by the Mississippi Municipal League

Iuka, Mississippi - Kenny Carson and Nancy South Stripling, of the City of Iuka, have graduated from the Basic Level of the Certified Municipal Official (CMO) program sponsored by the Mississippi Municipal League (MML). Under this program, local elected officials complete training and activities directly related to understanding and improving the management of local municipal issues.

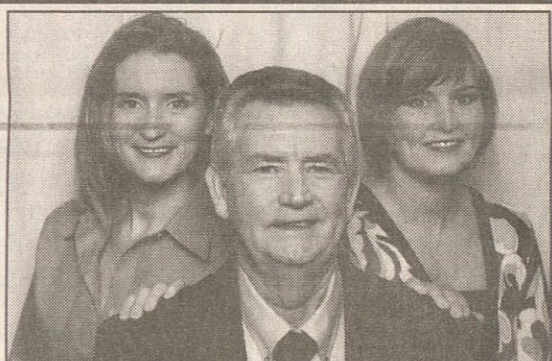
Kenny Carson and Nancy South Stripling both received the Basic CMO certification, which was earned by accumulating a minimum of 60 hours of training presented by the MML.

Although the certification course is voluntary, receipt of the designation of "Certified Municipal Official" requires completion of four core courses:

Municipal Organization, Municipal Law, Municipal Finance, and Municipal Land Use, in addition to 40 elective hours.

MML Executive Director Shari T. Veazey stated, "The CMO program provides the participants training to help them become more effective leaders for their respective cities, and the Mississippi Municipal League is proud to offer this opportunity."

Established in 1931, MML represents 289 city, town, and village governments in Mississippi. The mission of the MML is helping cities and towns excel through training, lobbying at the state and federal level, and providing resources and networking opportunities with state, federal, and private entities. 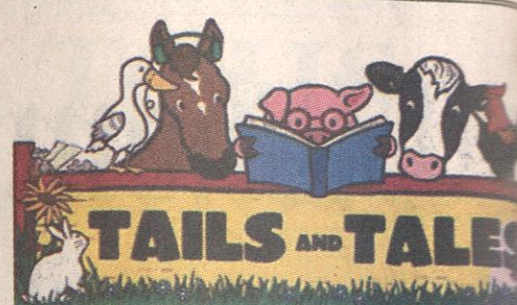

The branches of the Northeast Regional Library invite you to join us this summer as we explore the worlds of animals of all shapes and sizes through our 2021 Summer Reading Program - "Tails and Tales." Summer Reading activities will run from June 1 through July 23 and will follow four main themes - "Local Tales", a celebration of all our household pets, as well as animals found in our local areas, "Farm Tales," a look at all the various animals that work and live on farms, "Jungle and Zoo Tales," an exploration of all the wild animals found in those locations and "Water Tales," an examination of all the various animals that make their homes in oceans, lakes and ponds.

Library branches are still not able to provide in person programming, so all Summer Reading Program activities will continue to take place through virtual programming, 'grab and go' activity packets, and Story Walk collaborations in partnership with local communities.

Virtual programming kicks off on June 1 with a presentation by local favorite Deb Davis, an Outreach Educator from the Mississippi Museum of Natural Science in Jackson. Deb will tell the story of "The Heron and the Hummingbird," a new spin on the classic tale of "The Tortoise and the Hare." Afterwards, fellow Outreach Educator Jackie Henne-Kerr will tell about each animal. The virtual programs can be viewed through the NERL website at www.nerel.lib.ms.us.

Additionally, various NERL staff will provide daily Story Times on the website, most of which will be recorded so that the stories can be watched at your convenience. NERL will also continue posting daily suggestions for fun family activities that fit into our Summer Reading Program theme on the Suggested Family Activities page of the website.

Over the course of eight weeks, branches will hand out activity packets filled with coloring activity sheets, crafts, suggested lists and more. A total of four different packets will be available (each on the above) to age level and with different themes available for those under, 7 - 11 and up.

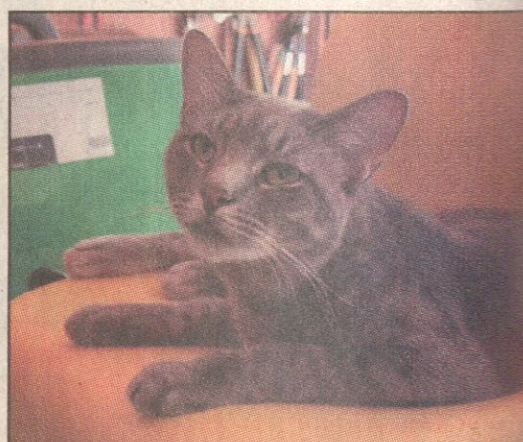

Older cats are particularly vulnerable to dehydration. Kittens, pregnant mothers, older cats, obese cats, and cats with heart or respiratory issues have an increased risk of heatstroke. It is best to keep your cats indoors when the sun is strongest, between 11:00am and

3:00pm. Make sure water is available to your cat at all times. Be aware of cats getting in sheds, greenhouses, garages during summer because cats follow their own instincts to these places. Memorial Day Service Returns to Shiloh National Cemetery

SHILOH, TN - After cancelling last year's ceremony due to COVID, one of the longest running Memorial Day events returns to the national military park. On Monday, May 31, at 11:00 am, Shiloh National Military Park will host its annual Memorial Day observance ceremony in the Shiloh National Cemetery. This time-honored service will include music, patriotic salutes, and the laying of a wreath on the grave of an unknown soldier.

"Memorial Day is a day for remembering all the people who have died while serving in our country's armed forces," said Superintendent Allen Etheridge. Originally known as Decoration Day, it began after the Civil War to commemorate the soldiers who died in the war. "We are pleased to once again be able to invite everyone to commemorate our fallen heroes," said Etheridge.

The keynote speaker this year is retired U.S. Army Brigadier General Parker Hills. Parker Hills served almost 32 years in the U.S. Army uniform in active and reserve components. He owns Battle Focus, a leadership training company that trains soldiers, Marines, airmen, tourists, and corporate leaders. He holds an undergraduate degree in commercial art from the University of Southern Mississippi; a Master's degree in educational psychology from Sul Ross State University; and is a 1995 graduate of the U.S. Army War College. He is the author of *A Study in Warfighting: Nathan Bedford Forrest and the Battle of Brice's Crossroads*; co-author of the *Vicksburg Campaign Driving Tour Guide*; and co-author with Edwin C. Bearss of *Receding Tide: Vicksburg and Gettysburg*. General Hills has been married to his wife Carol, a native of Hattiesburg, for 43 years. The Hills reside in Clinton, Mississippi.

Following the cemetery service, ranger led programs will be offered on the battlefield. A complete schedule will be available at the front desk of the park's visitor center beginning that morning. The service and ranger programs are free and open to the public. Mask are still required for un-vaccinated persons in the interior of buildings, or spaces where social distancing cannot be achieved.

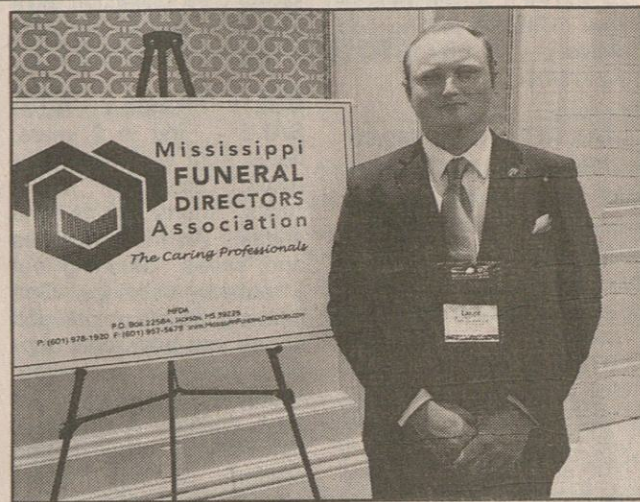

Cannon Firing Demonstrations

Return for Memorial Day Weekend

SHILOH- "The sound of cannon fire will again rumble across Shiloh battlefield throughout the weekend of May 29 and 30," announced Superintendent Allen Etheridge. On Saturday and Sunday, park volunteers dressed in period uniforms will present cannon firing demonstrations in the open area south of the park's visitor center in honor of Memorial Day weekend.

The Shiloh Cannon Crew will be firing a reproduction 6-pounder Field Piece and introducing visitors to the proper drill, ammunition, and equipment used by Civil War artillerymen.

"These period correct firing demonstrations allow the public an opportunity to use their imaginations and visualize the immense destruction a cannon could deliver," said Etheridge. Of the 246 cannon in the Battle of Shiloh, 96 of them were 6-pounders, making them the most common big gun on the battlefield.

On Saturday there will be five demonstrations at 10:00 am, 11:00 am, 12:00 pm, 1:30 pm and 2:30 pm. On Sunday, there will be four demonstrations at 11:00 am, 12:00 pm, 1:30 pm, and 2:30 pm. Each demonstration will last approximately 20-minutes and include two cannon firings.

All demonstrations are free and open to the public. There is no mask mandate for vaccinated visitors in open spaces.

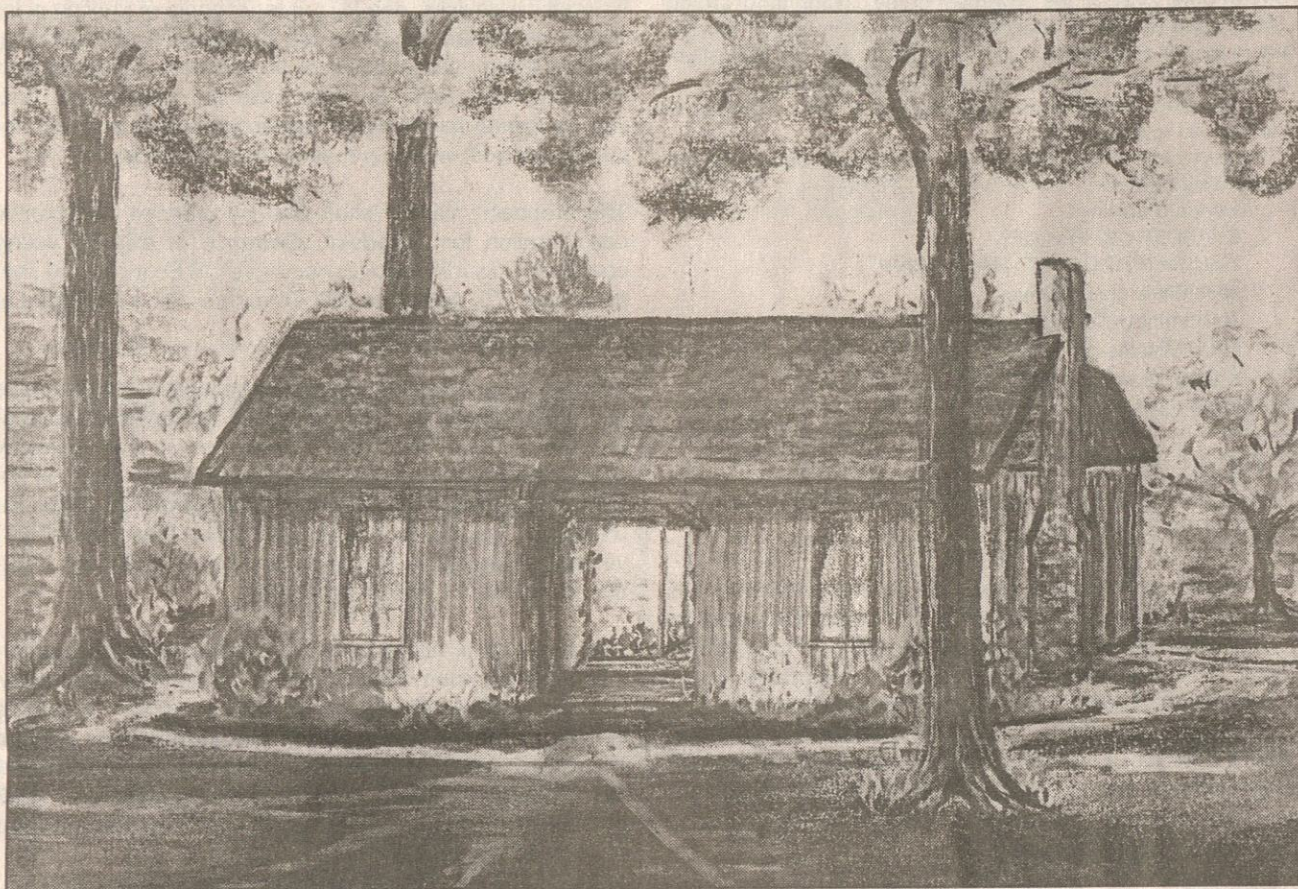

Sunday I received gifts from family as usual, including a delicious lunch prepared by my oldest daughter. Only a few were allowed to get together. We went to observe the rules of preventing catching COVID.

I wasn't expecting company and before I knew it School being taught by Teresa on zoom? In walking my daughter to enjoy the S.S. lesson from John 19:11 to Tishomingo Baptist Church for a wonderful service from Exodus 2:1—Where Moses was born and he sacrificed her life to save Moses. She demonstrated care and love all we mothers and grandparents have for our children. The Bible tells us to train our children when they are young. They may stray temporarily but will never get away from God's wooing which become an adult.

I am so proud of my ten great-grands. To sit with me on the violin. Then, I have an eight-year old granddaughter who performed in her first recital Saturday night. Grandparents drove down and got to be there late but I saw to it that she received a bouquet from Maw Ruth.

Let's remember our mothers every day and tell them you love them. The old Proverb that says, "You speak so loudly, I can't hear a word you say." Is a reminder to be careful as to what you say as well as what you do.

Live today. Yesterday's gone. Tomorrow brings its surprises. As was said about Queen Elizabeth II, "Maybe we, too, were born for such a time as this." Live each day to the fullest and don't forget to remember the shut-ins. Always thank God and others as you would have them do unto you."

I want to thank you who have sent cards and to keep writing. I have kept journals for years and someday Angie and Kim will get those they desire for others to read and have them made into a book. Me? I don't have time. I have too much living to do. Time is still my greatest commodity. The time is passing so quickly. Thank God for life. Don't waste it. Make a garden or read funny stories. Child. Laughter is better for us than a dose of pills.
