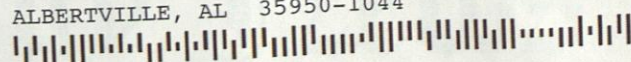

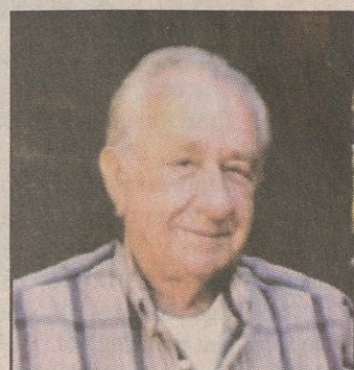

Iuka Businessman Hilton "Popcorn" Moore Dies at 82

One of Iuka's most beloved "characters" and long-time businessman, Hilton Lee "Popcorn" Moore, 82, passed away on May 20, 2021, at North Mississippi Medical Center in Tupelo following a short illness.

He was the owner of Moore's Body Shop and Wrecking Service in Iuka, later to become Moore's Auto Sales, for 50 years, and was also a U.S. Army veteran of the Korean War.

"Popcorn" enjoyed gardening and was especially fond of growing tomatoes, cantaloupes



and watermelons, and was known by a second nickname of "Watermelon Man" to several

Vote in City Municipal Elections Tuesday

Municipal elections will take place on Tuesday June 8th, 2021. See Sample Ballots on page 2.

Josh McNatt, Tishomingo County Circuit Clerk, would like to remind voters of the upcoming City Elections on Tuesday, June 8th, 2021.

The following Cities will conduct elections on June 8th; Belmont, Burnsville, Golden, & Iuka. The town of Tishomingo and Paden will not conduct elections, as the position for Mayor and the positions of Board of Alderman in these towns do not have challenged races.

To be eligible to vote in a

City election you must be registered to vote within the City limits of that City in which you will be voting. Voters will cast their ballot at their City Hall from 7 a.m. - 7 p.m. on Election Day, 6/8/21. Absentee voting is available at your City Clerk's office during regular business hours, or you may call your City Clerk to request a mailed absentee ballot. City Clerk's offices will be open on Saturday, June 5th till noon for Absentee voting. The last day to vote absentee in person will be Saturday June 5th, 2021. The deadline for mailed absentee ballots is to be postmarked by Election

Day, June 8th, and received within 5 business days.

A copy of each city's sample ballot is published in this issue of the paper, and sample ballots can be picked up at your City Hall. Don't forget to bring your voter ID when voting. When voting for Mayor or Chief of Police you will vote for one. When voting for Board of Alderman you will vote for up to five. If you have any questions about the upcoming City Elections you may call the Circuit Clerk's Office at 423-7026 or your City Hall/City Clerk.

School District Needs Your Input!

The Tishomingo County School District is seeking parent and community input on new federal funding it is receiving from the government's response to COVID-19. Several federal funding structures have been put into place to support schools as they respond to the pandemic. Last year, schools received technology funds (Equity in Digital Learning Act, EDLA) to support technology infrastructure and to place devices in each student's and teacher's hands to assist with online learning due to quarantine protocols and possible school closures, such as the one that occurred in March of 2020. The next round of funding (Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief I, ESSER I) was given to schools in preparation of reopening to purchase cleaning supplies, masks, face shields, PPE, nursing supplies, thermometers, etc. as well as any additional technology needs. Recently, schools have received ESSER II funding and is set to also receive ESSER III funding. "We are seeing significant amounts of money coming into public education right now to assist us in our required response to COVID-19 and its impact," stated Superintendent Christie Holly. "However, we can't just spend this money on whatever we would like to spend it on. There are parameters given to us by the federal government in which we have to stay inside to use the money." Federal guidance states that all funds must be spent in the prevention, preparation, and response to COVID-19. "All of the funds we are receiving must meet that main requirement." Each ESSER funding stream

May Declared Cystic Fibrosis Awareness Month in the City of Iuka

John Castleberry, Mayor of Iuka, contributing to the efforts of Audrey Williams, Miss Tupelo's Outstanding Teen, proclaims the month of May 2021 Cystic Fibrosis Awareness Month.

Audrey is the sixteen-year-old daughter of Stephen and Salome Williams who is currently representing Tupelo in the Miss America Organization.

Cystic Fibrosis is a rare, progressive genetic disease that causes thick mucus buildup in the lungs and other organs, leaving those with it at constant risk of infection. Cystic fibrosis (CF) limits breathing ability over time and can lead to respiratory failure and many other complications that include, but are not limited to, the inability to digest fats and maintain healthy weight/height, infertility, and persistent coughing. Thanks to the increase of research

and effective treatments over the last 20 years, the low life expectancy of this disease is steadily rising and those with CF can live to see their mid-40s. There is currently no cure to CF, but scientists are working, with the aid of the CF Foundation, to create the most efficient treatments and find a cure for the disease.

Will McNeely, son of Keith and Jill McNeely, was diagnosed with cystic fibrosis at 10 days old. Having experienced every type of breathing treatment ever created, spending weeks of his life in LeBonheur Children's Hospital in Memphis, and taken 1,200 pills monthly to combat his illness, Will has endured more hardships than imaginable. The recently developed "miracle drug", Trikafta, has given Will a second chance at life. Over the past year of treatment,

Will's lung function has increased by 25% and he's sprouted over six inches. Although it's difficult to access, the treatment's success is undeniable. While it is not a cure for CF, this medication and others like it are inaccessible to some patients. There are also very limited resources for those living with CF—especially Mississippians. As a competitor in the Miss America Organization, Audrey plans to advocate for further assistance from the medical

and social communities of our state for CF to become acknowledged by the Mississippi Department of Health. Together, Williams and McNeely strive to raise funds and awareness so that every person impacted by cystic fibrosis receives the opportunity for a simpler, healthier life that they deserve.

it is factual, and we need to come to understand that fact is more important than fiction! It seems that our world have come to be very much a dream world, but the dream will never come true in the way most people might expect! We will still have to "pay the piper", as the old saying goes. Judah had come to that place, thus God's judgment was ready to fall upon them. The reason being that their tongues and their actions were against God.

Should some people think that every person, or every nation, has a right to decide for itself what is right and what is wrong, I would respond with the fact that God is the One Who has the right to govern His earth and

His universe! It starts with doing something. There is a job you can learn. So many are willing to train new employees today. Be willing, be open to learn and in a few months, it may amaze you how well you are doing and how much your money is growing. Go to work. Go somewhere to work. It's better to go somewhere and find enjoyable work than to sit home in miserable idleness wishing you had pursued the America Dream. Wishing will not get it done for you. You have to go to the opportunities. People all over America have done this during our entire existence and you can benefit your life this way as well.

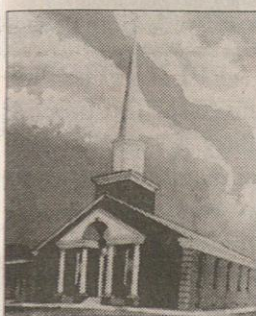

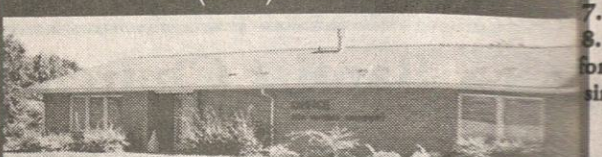

NMMC Presents DAISY Award to Timothy Harris

TUPELO, Miss.—Tishomingo Medical Center presented its most recent DAISY Award to registered nurse Timothy Harris of the Emergency Department.

In January, Harris was nominated by the daughter of an elderly patient who was very weak because of old loss and COVID-19. The daughter was unable to stay with her initially because of COVID-19 visitation restrictions. The daughter says that often medical personnel recognize her mother has been diagnosed with Alzheimer's disease, they tend not to communicate directly with her—even though she is still very aware and able to communicate.

Once her mother was assigned to an exam room in the ER and she was able to join her, her daughter said she was pleasantly surprised. "From the minute I walked in that room and watched the interaction between Mr. Harris and my mother, it made my heart overflow," she wrote. "Mom needed a blood transfusion, she was weak and she was scared. I only did (Mr. Harris) tell her, he was insightful enough to see that she was scared and confused, and he comforted her." The daughter wrote not only was Harris amazing to her mother, but also to her. "He explained to me step by step what was taking place," she wrote. "Now keep in mind, we were not his only patients that night, and he was working with other ER staff in a wide open tending to us, but he sure made us feel like we were the only ones."

Because the hospital



was full at the time, they were given the choice of being transferred to a hospital closer to home or being admitted to the Emergency Department until an inpatient room became available. They chose to stay in the Emergency Department with Harris as her nurse because, "Without a doubt, I knew we were where we needed to be and we were getting the best care," the daughter wrote.

Since recovering, the patient's daughter says her mother has told family members about Harris. "She remembers — isn't that something?" she wrote. "It mattered to her that kindness, that costs nothing, it mattered."

Harris resides in Iuka. He graduated from Har-

din County High School in Savannah, Tennessee, and earned his associate degree in nursing from Itawamba Community College in May 2020. He joined the NMMC staff that June.

Harris received a certificate, a DAISY Award pin, a bouquet donated by Bishop's Flower Shop and a hand-carved stone sculpture titled A Healer's Touch. The DAISY Award is an international program that rewards and celebrates the extraordinary compassionate and skillful care given by nurses every day.
