Location and Schedule

Market officially opens Saturday, June 12, 2021, and the Market officially closes Saturday, October 30, 2021.

ELIGIBILITY

Growers eligible to sell at the Iuka Farmers Market are those living in Tishomingo County and bordering counties: Alcorn, Prentiss, Itawamba, Hardin (TN), Lauderdale (AL), Colbert (AL), and Franklin (AL). All items offered for sale must be grown by the farmer/grower whose name appears on the "Vendor Permit", with the exception of fruits.

VENDOR PERMIT

Prior to their first sale, all growers must secure an annual "Vendor Permit" with photo ID at the Tishomingo County Extension Office, located at 238 Kaki Street in Iuka. The application will allow the grower to be a vendor and sell products at the market. There is no charge for the permit. The permit must be displayed in clear view of customers and inspectors. Please call the Tishomingo County Extension Office at 662-423-7016 to schedule a time to receive a vendor permit.

VENDOR SALE SPOTS

Vendor sale spots will be available on a first-come first-serve basis. Each vendor using the Farmers Market shall be responsible for maintaining his or her spot in a clean and sanitary manner. Vendors are responsible for set up, display, and packaging of



their products. All growers must clean up with them trash and any unsold products. No permanent structures shall be placed on the property. Any tents, umbrellas, etc. shall be removed at the close of business each day.

TAXES

A Mississippi Sales Tax will be provided should you charge sales tax for your products. Money collected should be turned into the Extension Office at 238 Kaki Street, Iuka. Please contact the Extension Office if you have any questions about taxes at 662-423-7016.

Conduct: Fraudulent, dishonest and deceptive merchandising practices, collusion to set prices among growers is prohibited. Camaraderie and cooperation among growers is encouraged.

GENERAL RULES

The following general rules will be in effect during the year for all vendors using the Farmers Market.

Only produce, plants, homegrown, processed, and/or handcrafted items grown or made by the certified grower will be allowed for sale, with the exception of fruits.

Produce should not be sold by weight unless the grower has a scale that have been certified by the Mississippi Department of Agriculture and Commerce.

No drinking alcoholic beverages.

No using profanity.

No gambling.

No loitering.

Do you need Social Security?

In 2020 over 64 million Americans were collecting Social Security.

The National Institute for Retirement Security (NIRS) has reported that Social Security is the only income source for 40 percent of retirees over the age of 60." (Forbes.com) The study also claimed that only 6.8 percent of retirees receive income from the three-legged stool of Social Security, a defined benefit pension and a defined contribution plan.

Another study conducted by researchers at the Social Security Administration, found that only 19.6 of Americans 65 and over received at least 90% of their total incomes from Social Security. That's a big difference from the stat provided by the NIRS.

Nevertheless, the point is that for millions of Americans Social Security is either all they have or mostly all they have. Also, there are some government employees who have their own pension system and do not pay into Social Security.

Social Security taxes take a bite of our income from every check. Employers and employees each pay 6.2 percent of wages up to the taxable maximum of \$142,800 for 2021. The self-employed pay 12.4 percent. Some self-employed struggle with paying the 12.4 percent and look for creative ways to only report a small salary. This may enable you to have more cash now but your Social Security check will be much smaller when you

become retirement age.

Religious objectors can often be exempted from paying the tax. I knew a minister who in his younger days did the paperwork to exempt out of Social Security. It was the one of the biggest mistakes of his life. When he became 65, he couldn't quit working. He had also drawn out most of his other pension savings for emergencies.

With meager retirement dollars he was also faced with having to buy Medicare insurance. To make matters worse he was diagnosed with terminal cancer. At a relatively young senior adult age he had nothing with which to fight. He was tired from his long years of work. He had nothing financially saved. He couldn't stop working. Medical insurance became a dilemma and within two years he was dead.

Social Security is not a perfect world. It won't make you rich but you'll be glad you have the check and the medical insurance.

Keep this in mind

the average monthly Social Security payment for 2021 is \$1,544. The maximum you can receive at full retirement age is \$3,113 a month. If you have waited until you are 70 the amount is \$3,895.00. These changes all depend on cost-of-living adjustments and how you work and how you pay into the system. Keep in mind that you work and the more you pay into Social Security, the more you will receive at retirement.

So, go to work hard for every dollar held from your Social Security.

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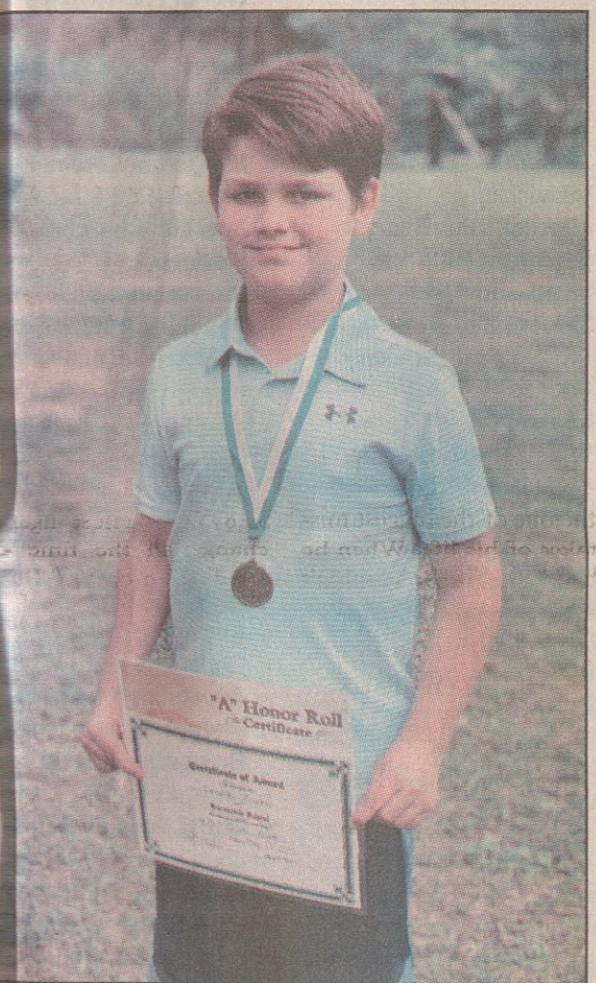

I Remember

Forty-four years ago I was teaching Junior High English at Tishomingo High School and for some unknown reason I was asked by the City Clerk, Lonette Southward (Bill) if I would write a brief history of Tishomingo for the up-coming anniversary.

I had never lived in Tishomingo but had attended high school there in 1940-44, and graduated along with seventeen other seniors.

I had just experienced seeing probably the largest class in the T.H.S. history graduate. It was the class of 1976. There were forty-eight seniors and thirteen of these graduates were my Betas. I had taught the 7th and 8th grade girls and the 7th, 8th, and 9th grade boys English. As I recall, this was an exceptionally gifted class of boys and girls. Most of them had become Betas after the first semester of the 9th grade.

One had to have and keep his grades 90 or above to be invited and if they didn't, they were dropped from membership until requirements were met. I checked at the end of each semester. This left them "on their toes" because no one wanted to be suspended. Would you believe one of my Beta presidents got suspended? He sure got "flocked" by his fellow Betas. I'll share

more about that incident later. Rules and laws were kept regardless of one's status in the club.

For stories on some of the history of Tishomingo,

I'm going to copy the introduction of the little pamphlet verbatim. I still feel the same today about Tishomingo as I did then - 44 years ago.

"Tishomingo, Mississippi 1908-1977"

"The history of the little town of Tishomingo, Mississippi is as colorful as its people. Located at the foothills of Freedom Hills, Alabama, on the east, and midways lengthwise of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, in northeastern Mississippi. Its unique location makes it accessible to the surrounding industries, colleges, hospitals, recreational facilities and larger cities and yet offers the pleasures found in county living."

"Foresight in the checkerboard planning of the streets gives evidence that the founders of Tishomingo believed that it would develop into a large city. Population wise this has not naturalized, but the quality of people has made numerous con-



tributions in fields of education, business, industry, science and medicine give evidence to the quality of its people which is much more important than the number. Those who have settled here in the late 1800's have had lasting influence on the progress of Tishomingo."

"The churches, schools, civic and social organizations have had a major role in the prosperity that has characterized Tishomingo. There are no slums, underprivileged, nor oppressed groups in this small southern town, but a mutual love and respect for the individual still prevails today."

The city of granted its

charter on July 6, 1908, by Governor E. F. Noel. It was named in honor of the great Chickasaw Indian Chief Tishomingo.

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The Form of God's Judgment that Came to Rebellious Judah (part 4)

Some people seem to have the idea that God has left the government of nations to men, so that the people can decide what they wish to do and whom they wish to lead them as a nation. Wrong, wrong wrong! God does allow humans to govern nations, but He does not allow them to do as they please! Perhaps the big problem lies in the point that many people have come to believe, or at least say they believe, in evolution, so that nobody is the "Boss" over human or animal life. What if one's big red bull decides that he wants to govern the actions of men? It might not be too pleasant if he were to catch his "owner" in the pasture with no weapon, when the bull should decide to knock him down and trample over him. Some leaders of men have seemingly taken

that attitude toward the people they are supposed to govern for the "good of the people".

Isaiah 3:10-13 says, "Say to the righteous, that it shall be well with him: for they shall eat the fruit of their doings. Woe unto the wicked! It shall be ill with him: for the reward of his hands shall be given him. As for My people, children are their oppressors, and women rule over them. O My people, they which lead thee cause thee to err, and destroy the way of thy paths. The LORD standeth up to plead, and standeth to judge the people." Yes, this is very "stern and strict", but it is what God said to the nation of Israel through Isaiah the prophet of God. It is interesting that many love Isaiah when he is speaking in Isaiah chapter 53 about Jesus the Lamb who was rejected

of men and hung on a cross to die for man's sins, but they may not love this part of Isaiah, which speaks against wicked leaders and the woes on those whom they govern. Notice that God loves to speak and encourage the righteous, as He sends His message of blessings on the fruit of the righteous. Yet the same passage pronounces a woe on the wicked, either men or women, who lead the people in a wrong direction and oppress them. God did institute human government, but He is certainly against oppressive human government. Isaiah is brave enough to write about the wicked, telling them that they will reap the seeds they have sown by their own "hands", or wrong actions. Children had become oppressors in Israel, evidently because of a failure of parents to

lead and correct them, or maybe God is saying that the grown leaders are acting like children. Women, whom God did not generally place as leaders in Israel, even though there are exceptions such as Deborah the judge and others, had come to rule over at least their husbands and homes. All may not like or agree with this statement, but God ordained that husbands be the heads of homes, with wives also being over the children, yet under the umbrella of the husband's protection and leadership. Israel had gotten away from this form or "household government" and "national government" and had run their ship aground. (I have used "Israel" to mean either "Judah" or "Israel".)



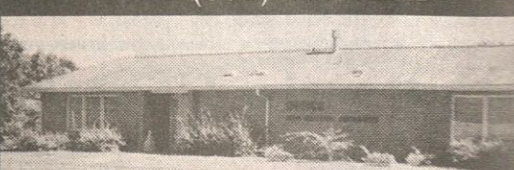

Millipedes On the Move

Prolonged wet weather during the warmer months of the year often results in increased movement of greenhouse millipedes, *Oxidus gracilis*. Although these arthropods are harmless to people, pets, and plants, they can become quite a nuisance when they occur in the hundreds that some fortunate homeowners experience. Following is information about millipedes to help you better understand millipedes and how to best deal with them. The bad news is we do not have any real good solution for this problem; the good news is it will go away on its own as soon as dry weather returns.

Millipedes feed on decaying organic matter, such as flower bed mulch, leaf litter, grass thatch, etc. In favorable habitats, they can be present by the thousands, but they are rarely seen in dry weather, because they can't move when it is dry (unlike ants which are trying to migrate to a moisture source near their original location when it becomes too dry). Millipedes do most of their wandering at night seeking refuge in moist, protected sites during the day. Despite their hard shells, millipedes do not serve moisture very well. This is why they die quickly when they get injured, whether one sprays insecticides or not.

Recommended management for millipedes includes:

1) Establish/maintain exclusion around the building. This insect attention to threshold sweeps, door



and window seals, structural cracks, etc. Sealing such cracks will help keep out other occasional insect invaders as well and will help conserve energy. Physical exclusion is the most effective thing most home and business owners can do to reduce the number of millipedes and other insect pests that invade the building.

2) Use a broom and dust pan or good wet/dry vacuum, or leaf blower to keep dead and dying millipedes cleared off the carport/garage/patio/etc. This takes persistence and patience, but is the best way to avoid having to deal with thousands of dead millipedes crunching under foot.

3) Use cultural practices that help minimize the amount of mulch/leaf litter/grass thatch around the house. Of course, this has to be done before the problem begins. People who have a persistent or recurring problem may want to try to figure out where the millipedes are coming from and take steps to remove/minimize their breeding source. This can be excessive flower bed mulch, accumulations of leaf litter, dethatching the lawn, etc. Houses that have the greatest problems are often located in wooded settings, which results in large numbers of millipedes migrating from leaf litter in the woods. This is one of the most difficult situations to deal with effectively because there is such a large breeding

source.

Insecticides are not really very helpful when dealing with millipedes. The problem is that even if you kill all the millipedes that arrive at the house, more just keep coming back—as long as they have the kind of moist humid weather that lets them wander about in the open at night. Excessive use of insecticides can create an even worse problem, one that will not go away on its own with the arrival of dry weather. It is usually better to spend your time and money on exclusion and source reduction than on spraying.

Applying an outside perimeter spray in a five to ten foot band around the outside of the building may be somewhat helpful in some situations, but it will not be a total fix. Garden Tech Sevin (zetamethrin) and Ortho Bug-B-Gon MAX Lawn & Garden Insect Killer Ready-to-Spray (bifenthrin) are two treatments that are sold in ready-to-use hose-end applicators, which makes them relatively quick and easy to apply.

Trip of a Lifetime from Florida up the Tenn-Tom to Burnsville

On May 20th, an adventure of a lifetime lies ahead. Nathaniel Hyde, friends and family members arrive in the Tampa area to pick up a 1988 Hista 46 Sports Fishing Boat. Nathaniel had recently purchased. It was discovered prior to the trip, that roadway transport was not going to work. So, the journey on water begins.

The first four days had to be waited out for a window of 1-foot waves or less with good wind. Day five, they set sail for Steinhatchee, Florida, 124 miles out. It took 13 hours in the gulf where they were 80 miles offshore at one point. They saw dolphins and sea turtles, and the sun was bright with light winds, what a beautiful sight.

A warning light had come on notifying a malfunction in the boat pump. It was discovered a valve had failed and water was gushing in the boat. There was no landing close by for repairs, so Nathaniel managed to pull a plug allowing a suction affect so most of the water would pull out of the boat, then he could fix the valve. "It was nerve-wrecking to say the least", said Nathaniel.

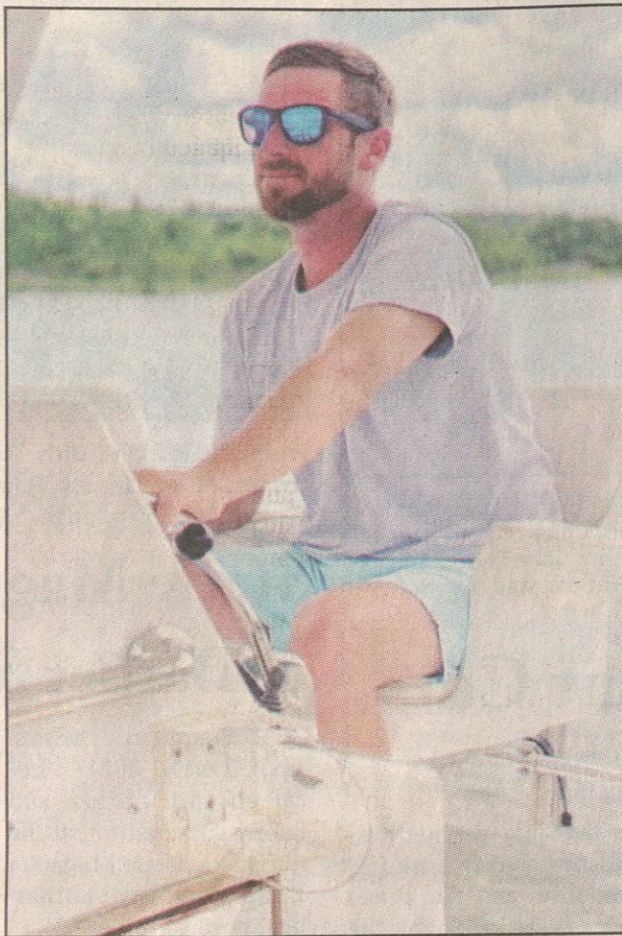
They arrived at Sea Hag Marina in Steinhatchee after 13 hours of sailing the gulf and stayed overnight. There was no water or power, so the generator was used, and they were able to fill the freshwater tanks before leaving Clearwater. Next stop would be Carrabelle. Carrabelle was the best weather for 90 miles until entering the Intercoastal Waterway. That night the boat was anchored out and they saw alligators and the next morning dolphins feeding on fish at the back of their boat. They did not set sail in the Intercoastal Waterway till arriving in Panama City. They left Panama City through the

inlet to Pensacola where they anchored for the night.

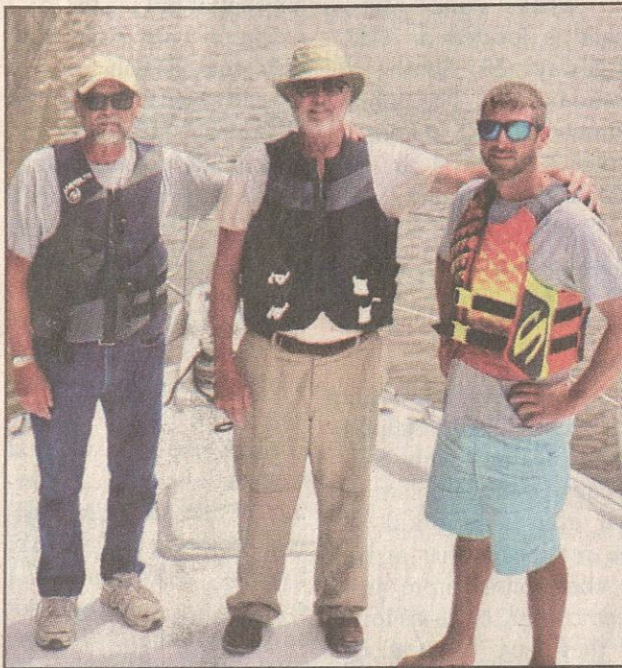
They left Pensacola where they were chased by dolphins playing and jumping out of the water as they passed through Gulf Shores, Alabama. They stayed at Fairhope Marina, no power or water once again so they are still running on the generator and the freshwater that they had gotten in Clearwater. The next morning, they left and continued the Intercoastal Waterway through Orange Beach and Mobile Bay. From there they entered the Tensaw River which connected to the Tennessee Tombigbee Waterway. They anchored out once again the next morning and started the waterway going through their first lock.

They stopped at Bob's Fishcamp for fuel and picked up Nathaniel's wife Lynn and a friend, Kyle Murphy, from Savannah, Tn. Kyle knew about the lock system and helped them get through the remaining locks on the tongue of waterway. The second lock was Demopolis, Alabama where they had their first night of power and water without running the generator. They were able to use the courtesy vehicle from the Marina to go to Walmart for more food and supplies.

There are 12 locks total between Mobile Bay and Pickwick, Tennessee. They departed the next morning heading up the river when a sound was coming from the back of the boat. A water faucet had broken and started draining the freshwater supply so with quick thinking a Red Bull can was used and a wooden spoon to wedge the water faucet handle in place. They then began their journey through the next remain-



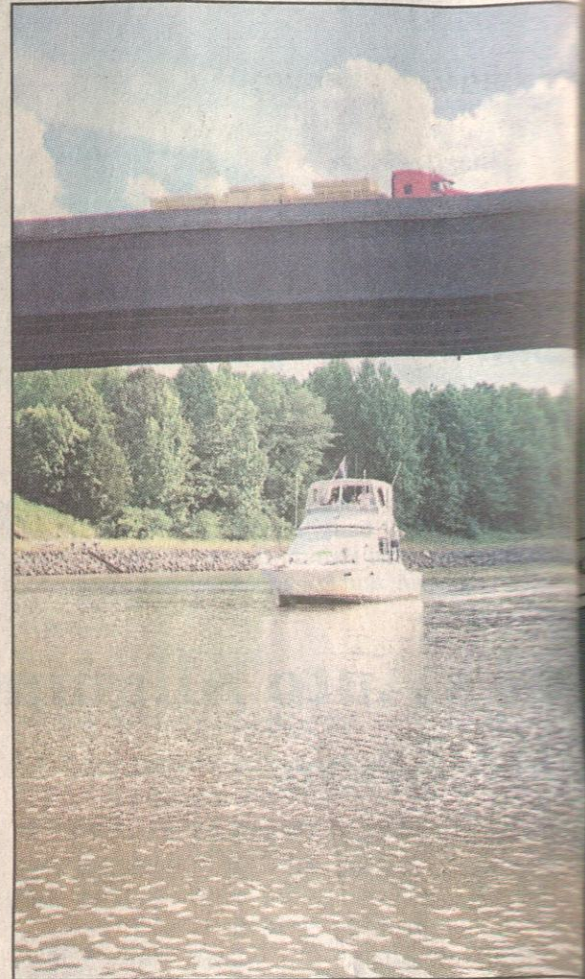
Nathaniel Hyde navigates the vessel on the long journey.

ing locks. They were able to stay at one of the Marinas in Aberdeen. From there on Thursday June 3rd they made their way to the Burnsville Waterway, Burnsville, Mississippi (home) where they were greeted by Nathaniel's mother and Fred's wife
