




Pet of the Week

The Daughters of the skirts were worn by women of less means. The elite women of the Antebellum South enjoyed French and English fashions. The elite women of the south wore fabrics in silk, velvet for colder weather; fine lawn, linen, and muslin in warm weather. White was a popular color in warm weather for women with status. Black, worn for mourning, was often worn due to the high death rate and during the war as women lost loved ones who perished in battle.

> Large prints were difficult to match and restricted to the wealthy as the voluminous skirts were made of up to 5 yards of fabric, and using a print, stripe or plaid increased the need for even more material. Accessories- Jewelry: brooches and matching chunky bracelets. Fans: Fans were popular. A nosegay, or small bunch of aromatic flowers. Small purses or drawstring bags held a lady's necessities. Aprons, often worn for cooking or doing chores protected dresses. Lace was not widely

used, except for collars and cuffs. Collar and cuffs were removable for laundering or a stylish change. Parasol: A fabric umbrella carried on a sunny day to protect a woman's complexion from the sun, and offered a kind of portable shade.

Women of the Civil War period wore many layers of undergarments. Chemise, corsets, and the hoop skirts were popular. The Hoop skirts was mostly for the richer and was for evening wear. Lower class women did not wear wide hoop skirts, though less expensive crinoline cages (with fewer hoops) were available for those who could afford the style. The lower classes wore coarser fabrics. Most women of the day wore solid fabrics. Stripes and plaids were limited to the wealthy as matching pieces of fabric use more material. Small prints, like calico, were easier to match and mend. Calico prints were usually dark to hide stains. Black was a common color for all classes and worn for mourning dress.

I Remember

Today's article is a continuation of the last article.

Lonette Southward (Bill) helped me from the minute books of the various business meetings in Tishomingo and Mr. John Trim was especially helpful in writing the history of Tishomingo. Mr. Trim was one of the locals along with his wife, Sadie Negal. She had been my teacher and loved to share with me.

Grandpa Dee (David) Dawson was very knowledgeable. He had been here since he was nine years old. He was born during the Civil War, but when I married in '43, he loved to share his life experiences with me. We'd sit on the front porch and shell peas and he'd talk. How I wish I'd been writing all their history down instead of shelling peas.

Grandpa Dee was born somewhere between Tupelo and Booneville. His mother died, (a Wheeler) and his father and he carried what they owned and walked from what seems like Guntown to Tishomingo County. They kept a fire at night to keep the wild animals away. His father Joseph married again and he had two-half-brothers. George Dawson (Ida Page) and Martin Dawson (a Brown) Grandpa Dee married Sarah Alice Mauldin.

They had two sons: Sidney James Dawson and William Frank Dawson. Dee and Sarah Alice had a store across the road from where I live. He was a good manager, and employed several young boys. (My dad was one of them.)

The big white house across Hwy. 25 from me is the original Dee and Sarah's home. It was built in the early 1900's by a Mr. McRae. We did have the record where he paid for the cost of building. Then in the '40's the Poole Bros. underpinned it with those colorful rock and made a nice basement with rock and concrete. The house is still very sturdy today. During the early '40's Hwy. 25 was undergoing a new and straighter route to Iuka. From Tishomingo to Cripple Deer Creek there were only two houses, the Browning and the Dee Dawson's. A few like the Sappington house were not too far off the highway.

As I recall Mr. W. R. Nettles had a hand in establishing Tishomingo Cemetery and the rules for burial plots. I was already married before the first burial was in the cemetery. The changing of the route for Hwy. 25 and the cemetery opening both took place about the same time - early 1940's.

The first principal for the Tishomingo High School was Mr. J. O. Loo-

ney. He is buried in the Tishomingo Cemetery. Today the cemetery is really filling up. Another space just south of the original plat has been opened up. Lots can be purchased and it is kept mowed and clean the year round, by the foresight of the local citizens of Tishomingo's governing body. I can recall in our 1944 government class how Mr. Nettles would smile sharing this feature

with us. So happy to see progress being made. I was ten years old the first time I ever came to Tishomingo. My dad and I went in a wagon. He carried me to get a "permanent wave" at a beauty shop. I cannot remember why I was given the honor. My oldest sister's hair was straight as a board. The shop was located just across from the Bancorp-South Bank. We parked the mules and wagon across the street. He carried me to the shop, told the lady what to do and I didn't see him any more until I was ready to go. When she (I believe Ethel Hicks?) showed me how I looked? My, but I thought I was so pretty. Blond curls

all over my head. At this time a W. B. McRae was the Mayor and the population was 402 from the 1930 census. Today the 2020 census

gave a decline from the original census.



man government was set up, for it started in the garden of Eden. By the time we get to the prophet Isaiah hundreds and thousands of years have passed since Eden. So, Isaiah writes about the wrong of mankind, both in governmental leadership and individual actions.

Isaiah 3:14-15 will continue our story: "The LORD will enter into judgment with the ancients of His people, and the princes thereof: for ye have eaten up the vineyard; the spoil of the poor is in your houses. What mean ye



that ye beat My people to pieces, and grind the faces of the poor? saith the Lord God of hosts." We have not yet seen exactly the "form of judgment" that God will bring on Judah, but we are seeing that He will bring judgment. In these verses we see that God will enter into judgment with the ancients (meaning the old men, basically) of His people. But we also see that the princes of the people are involved in this judgment, which means the leaders. The reason for God's judgment is also given, for these have

eater the vineyards that were not theirs; they have spoiled the poor; they have beaten God's people to pieces and ground the faces of the poor, which means to treat them like grain that is "ground" in a mill! Oppression by leaders has always been condemned by the Lord, as is the case. here! We see that it is the "princes", or leaders of Judah, who are oppressing the people, especially the poor. The idea of having "eaten up the vineyards" and having the "spoil of the poor" in the houses of the ancients and princes also speaks of the oppression of the poor and the financial strain put on them by the princes. God asks the princes what they meant by

their actions, and any who may think that such questions from God were only for people of ages past will someday learn that God is always against oppression, no matter from what "page in history" it may come! God has not finished with His message of judgment on Judah, but I will not be able to go further than this for this writing. I will say that the message from our verses comes from "the Lord God of hosts", which means that God is over all the "hosts" of men. Our word "hosts" means: "a mass of people, especially warriors. So God is over all "hosts" of men, including soldiers, kings and common people!






