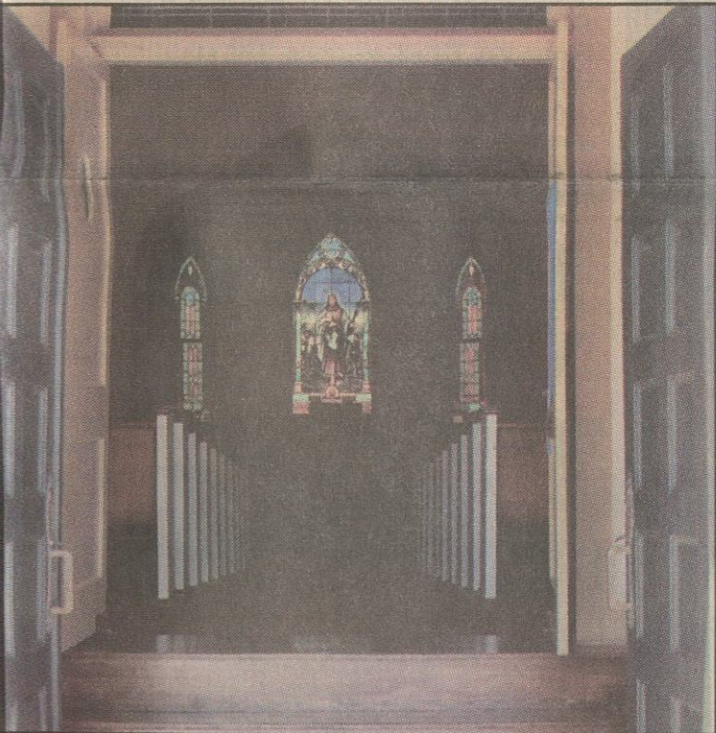

On Monday, June 21st the elected City Officials of Iuka were sworn into office by Tishomingo County Circuit Clerk Josh McNatt. There are some new faces in office this year for Iuka and all the city leaders are looking forward to beginning their work to serve the community.

The Iuka United Methodist Church Sanctuary Reopens After Collapse



Members of the Iuka United Methodist Church are looking forward to a very special service Sunday morning; it will be the first time in 20 months that the congregation will assemble in the sanctuary of this historic church. Services will be held at 11 a.m. and all are welcome to attend. The building will once again be filled with music, preaching, and gathering with old friends. On Sunday, October 13th the church ceiling fell just

before everyone arrived for services. Thankfully no one was injured during the incident but the damage was extensive and left the congregation without their beautiful sanctuary. The insurance company did not cover any of the damages and the church doors were closed indefinitely until a solution could be reached. Services were held in the gymnasium and church leaders took a step back to regroup.

It wasn't until January of this year that repairs got underway. COVID-19 halted many of the plans to move forward with the renovations. It was through the support of special donors that the restoration process was made possible.

Leaders of the church came together and decided to restore the sanctuary as close to the former look as possible. Unfortunately some aspects of the church were unable to be replicated. The intricate design of the ceiling panels and the antique light fixtures, for example, were a work of art from days gone by which could not be replaced as they were.

This project is ongoing and there are still certain finishing touches to be made, but none of the final repairs will prevent the sanctuary from being utilized. Some improvements were made during the renovations as well, like a new wheelchair access point was created to make entering the church easier for disabled individuals.

The church building has a long history in Iuka and some of that information is included here. It is safe to say that faithfulness is clearly demonstrated in the hearts and lives of those associated with the church, from its founding till today perseverance has been seen.

The Iuka Methodist Episcopal Church South was organized in Iuka in 1858. It was comprised of members who moved from Eastport, which was a thriving river town before the Civil War, and Old New Hope Church, located 2 1/2 miles southwest of Iuka.

Old New Hope was transferred almost entirely to Iuka. The church was formed in 1842, two years before the organization of the Methodist Episcopal Church South. The church at Eastport was formed in 1848. From these two churches, Iuka received the pioneer Methodists who firmly planted the doctrines of the people called Methodists.

The earliest records of Iuka Methodist were destroyed during the Civil War; however, Mrs. S.E. Ashmore, wife of the Rev. Sarn Ashmore (pastor from

1931-38), researched and recorded the church history as best she could: "In 1845, while this town was yet unbuilt, Robert Williams and his wife and William Richardson ranged throughout the country following the Indian paths and preaching wherever a congregation could be gathered: in schools, in houses, private homes or out under the broad open skies. With the help of another local pastor, Mr. Elias J. Tidwell, their preaching was 'Holiness of the Lord.' Mrs. Robert Williams was powerful in her exposition of the doctrine of sanctification. Another of those early preachers who laid broad the foundation for God and Methodism was William Winburn, who has long since been gathered to his father."

In 1857, with the completion of the Memphis and Charleston Railroad, which linked the Atlantic Ocean to the Mississippi River, the town of Iuka was planned.

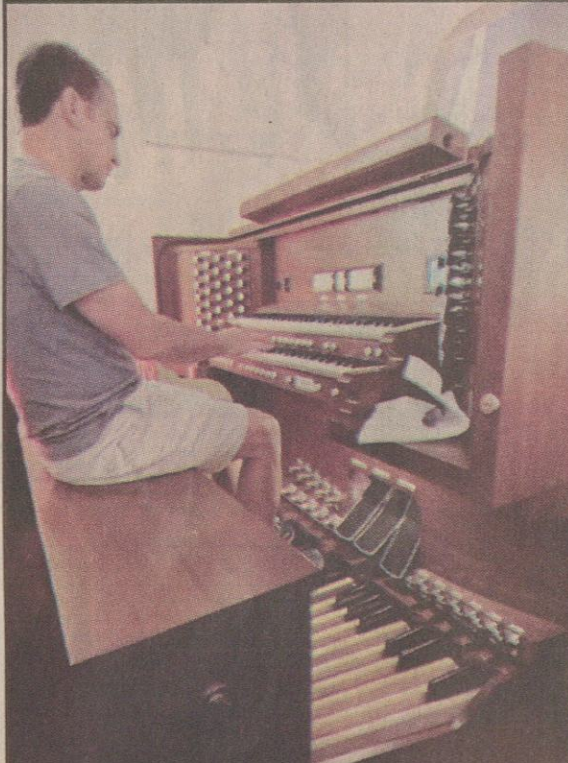
At that time all of this section of Mississippi was a part of the Memphis Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church South, which was established in 1846 as a split off from the Tennessee Conference. It was served for many years by circuit riders, who were clergymen assigned to mainly rural areas.

The Methodist circuit riders preached here in stores and homes and for a while in the old Baptist Church located

on the south side of Iuka, built on the lot where Gene and Beverly Jourdan now live (110 E. Meigg St.). The Rev. J.B. McKutchen and the Rev. W.D. Vincent were preachers who were pivotal in keeping the church together during this period.

When the church was organized in 1858, William McKinght, Samuel DeWoody, A.T. Matthews and G.P. Hammerly (among others from Eastport), and Levi Williams (among others from New Hope), transferred to the new church in Iuka. The church then became part of the Eastport Circuit until sometime after the Civil War, when the church became a "station" (c. 1868).

C.K. Brooks was an "official" pastor from the conference. It was during his term (1859) that the present church structure was built.

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Old Lambert School

Abe South of Killen, Alabama sent us this old photo taken at the Lambert School which was located near Antioch Church in Burnsville. Abe's mother, Ruby Curtis South (1910-1969) is in the center of the photo. It is believed Jeff Lambert is the young man beside her and the photo was taken around 1925. According to the

Tishomingo County History and Families book, Lambert Chapel School was a small two room schoolhouse located one and one-half miles from Burnsville on the Doskie Road. The school has much history and was started by James Clyde Lambert in the early 1850's. After 1855 when the Southern Railway was completed, the town of Burnsville was formed, the Freewill Baptist Church was built and the people began to use this church as a school building. Soon a small school began to grow in

the town of Burnsville. Lambert Chapel School separated from Burnsville School and was located one and one half miles from Burnsville on the Burnsville/Doskie Road. After several years, it was reestablished in 1923 on the new Doskie Highway. The land where the school was built was owned by Lee and Claudie Lambert. Grades one through eight were taught. About 1932 Lambert became a part of the consolidated school system at Burnsville.

Some of the earlier teachers were L. W. Coin, Rap Reynolds, Joe Gurley,

J. M. Woodruff, Ellis Moser, A. D. Woodruff, Edgar Seago, Mrs. Ona Holder, T. L. Ford, Worth Burton, Cleston Scruggs and A. P. Ford. Other teachers were Ms. Betty Foote, Mrs. Ruby Jones, Mrs. Elton Hicks, Mrs. Maudie Lambert, Mrs. Lula Mae Marlar, Ms. Lula Adams, Ms. Carla Honeycutt, Ms. Esther Wynn and Ms. Dorothy Garrett.

This information was submitted to the book by Earl Gaines, great-great-grandson of James Clyde and Lucretia Willis Lambert.

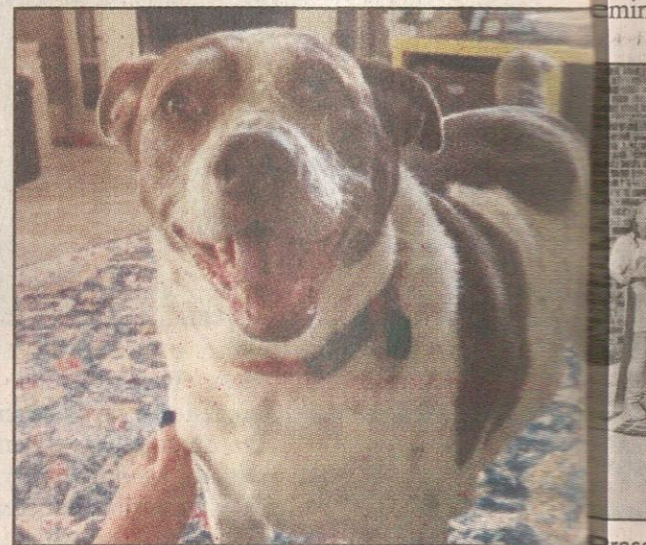
No Homecoming at Snowdown Methodist Church

2020 Annual Drinking Water Quality Report Town of Burnsville

This year's Consumer Confidence Report is being published in the local newspaper instead of being mailed or posted electronically.

We're pleased to present to you this year's Annual Quality Water Report. This report is designed to inform you about the quality water and services we deliver to you every day. Our constant goal is to provide you with a safe and dependable supply of drinking water. We want you to understand the efforts we make to continually improve the water treatment process and protect our water resources. We are committed to ensuring the quality of your water. Our water source is from wells drawing from the Paleozoic Aquifer.

The source water assessment has been completed for our public water system to determine the overall susceptibility of its drinking water supply to identify potential sources of contamination. A report containing detailed information on how the susceptibility determinations were made has been furnished to our public water system and is available for viewing upon request. The wells for the Town of Burnsville have received a lower susceptibility ranking to contamination.

If you have any questions about this report or concerning your water utility, please contact Ken Briggs or David Nixon at (662) 427-9526. We want our valued customers to be informed about their water utility. If you want to learn more, please attend any of our regularly scheduled meetings. They are held on the first Tuesday of each month at 7:00 PM at the Burnsville City Hall.

We routinely monitor for constituents in your drinking water according to Federal and State laws. This table below lists all of the drinking water contaminants that were detected during the period of January 1st to December 31st, 2020. In cases where monitoring wasn't required in 2020, the table reflects the most recent results. As water travels over the surface of land or underground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive materials and can pick up substances or contaminants from the presence of animals or from human activity; microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, that may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations, and wildlife; inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally occurring or result from urban storm-water runoff, industrial, or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farming; pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban storm-water runoff, and residential uses; organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations and septic systems; radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities. In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations that limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. All drinking water, including bottled drinking water, may be reasonably expected to contain at least small amounts of some constituents. It's important to remember that the presence of these constituents does not necessarily indicate that the water poses a health risk.

In this table you will find many terms and abbreviations you might not be familiar with. To help you better understand these terms we've provided the following definitions:

Action Level - the concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements which a water system must follow.

Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL) The "Maximum Allowed" (MCL) is the highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

Maximum Contaminant Level Goal (MCLG) - The "Goal" (MCLG) is the level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.

Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level (MRDL) - The highest level of a disinfectant allowed in drinking water. There is convincing evidence that addition of a disinfectant is necessary to control microbial contaminants.

Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level Goal (MRDLG) - The level of a drinking water disinfectant below which there is no known or expected risk of health. MRDLGs do not reflect the benefits of the use of disinfectants to control microbial contaminants.

Parts per million (ppm) or Milligrams per liter (mg/L) - one part per million corresponds to one minute in two years or a single penny in \$10,000.

Parts per billion (ppb) or Micrograms per liter (µg/L) - one part per billion corresponds to one minute in 2,000 years, or a single penny in \$10,000,000.

As you can see by the table, our system had no violations, and we are proud that your drinking water meets or exceeds all Federal and State requirements as this was also reflected in our capacity assessment inspection for which we received a 4.7 out of a 5.0 rating for 2020. We have learned through our monitoring and testing that some constituents have been detected however the EPA has determined that your water IS SAFE at these levels.

We are required to monitor your drinking water for specific constituents on a monthly basis. Results of regular monitoring are an indicator of whether or not our drinking water meets health standards. In an effort to ensure systems complete all monitoring requirements, MSDH

now notifies systems of any missing samples prior to the end of the compliance period.

If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in Drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. Our water system is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your water, you may wish to have your water tested. Dr. William "Billy" Burge

Dr. William Bryan "Billy" Burge, 62, of Belzoni, passed away Thursday, June 17, 2021, from injuries sustained in an automobile accident.

Billy was born January 29, 1959, in Mobile, Alabama, to William Grey Burge and Betty Ruth Brunson Burge. He spent his younger life in Thomasville, Alabama. After the death of his parents at an early age, Billy and his two sisters moved to Mobile to live with their aunt and uncle, Herron and Betty Brunson. He attended John Shaw High School, where he lettered in baseball and football. He also held the Alabama High School record for fastest 100-yard dash. After high school, he attended Mississippi Delta Community College where he also lettered in baseball and football. Billy completed his BS degree at Athens State University in Athens, Alabama and then went on to complete his master's degree at Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary in Wake Forest, North Carolina. He completed his doctoral degree at In-

ternational Baptist Theological Seminary in Plymouth, Florida.

Strategize your money flow

If your outgo is more than your income then your upkeep will be your downfall.

A sure way to disable yourself financially is to spend more than your income.

If your income is \$2500 a month then you can't spend \$3500 a month and come out ahead.

An old friend used to say, "You can't borrow yourself rich."

We have "wants" and "needs." Needs must always outweigh wants. We need food and shelter, transportation and basic utilities to survive.

A person with a small income has severe financial pressure and must live on a strict budget. The person who has a lot of income still must determine a budget. The principal is the same for the person who has more income. Your outgo must not exceed your income. If you are earning \$9,000 a month but spending

\$10,000 you are going to end up in financial trouble.

With a very low income even the very basic needs become a luxury. Keeping the house warm or cool is a luxury. Buying good or healthy groceries are difficult. Buying gasoline to go to work is expensive. If you have access to a credit card, the pressure is great to put basic living needs on the card but the exorbitant fees and interest of credit card companies begin to quickly intensify your financial burden.

Your choices are few when it comes to good household budgeting. Let's look at a lean budget. Let's say your income is \$2,000 a month.

You can afford the following: \$500 a month in rent, \$250 a month in utilities, \$250 a month for a used car payment and \$150 a month for gasoline. This gives you \$850 a month to buy food on and buy basic auto insurance. You will have to go through your state medical insurance program and apply for free state health insurance because you can't afford to buy health insurance. You also have to figure out how to make more money. You have to work hard where you are and do good so you can get a better paying job. Or, you must gain additional income through a second job. With surging inflation facing our

country this makes these numbers an intense strain. Consider living as close to your job as possible to save on transportation costs.

If your income is \$5,000, \$10,000 a month or more. Your strategy is easier. Your main goal must be to not buy a house or a car that stretches your income to the max. You don't need the stress. Budget so you can afford to take a vacation or have a play day. Life is short! Enjoy it along the way. How you budget and spend your money can make you financially unstable or you can live with a feeling of financial security.

Pastor's Tidbits

The Form Of God's Judgment That Came On Rebellious Judah (part 6)

It is always interesting to see God's pictures of nations and individuals. In Isaiah chapter three God pictures Judah as a woman who has done everything in her power to make herself attractive, yet she is not attractive to God, but rather repulsive. In Isaiah 3:16-18 God shows us something of the actions of Judah that compare to a woman seeking to attract attention: "Moreover the LORD saith, Because the daughters of Zion are haughty, and walk with stretched forth necks and wanton eyes, walking and mincing as they go, and making a tinkling with their feet: Therefore the Lord will smite with a scab the crown of the head of the daughters of Zion, and the LORD will discover their secret parts. In that day the Lord will take away the bravery of their tinkling ornaments about their feet, and their cauls, and their round tires like the moon." This is not the end of the list of the things that Judah did to attract attention, but I will give the rest in another article.

Notice that the first

thing God says against the daughters of Zion (Judah) is that they are haughty, which means: "to soar, be lofty and to mount up with pride". Pride is one of the seven things that God says He hates, found in Proverbs 6:16-19; in fact, "a proud look" is the first thing in this list! Not only had Judah come to the place to "strut like a peacock", but she walked with a "stretched forth neck and wanton eyes", which means she was glad to put her pride on display as she walked, but she blinked her eyes to attract attention. Although God is not speaking about an actual woman, Judah can be pictured by such a woman as is being described by Isaiah. Yes, we can take "pride" in certain things relating to a nation", but this is not the kind of pride that says, "There are no people or any nation quite as great as we". When individuals or nations gloat in their own abilities or accomplishments to the point of despising all who are not like them, there is a pride that God hates in such actions and will bring judgment

on it at some point in time! The "tinkling with the feet" that describes Judah was the act of wearing anklet jewelry that tinkled as one walked, thus drawing attention to oneself. Isaiah said that God would smite with a scab the crown of the head of Judah, because of her pride. Moreover, He would discover her secret parts, or make her "naked" in the sight of other nations. Even though our world has come to regard nakedness as a virtue or a beauty, God has never pictured nakedness as beautiful, at least not when it is on public display. The nakedness of a human is nothing to put on public display, for it is reserved for the marriage of a man to a woman! If public nakedness were a beauty to behold, God would not have used it as a picture to portray the spiritual nakedness of Judah in Isaiah's writing above! For God to discover Judah's spiritual nakedness was a shameful thing, so should natural nakedness be when displayed publicly. By J. Briggs King, Evangelist, Rainsville, AL

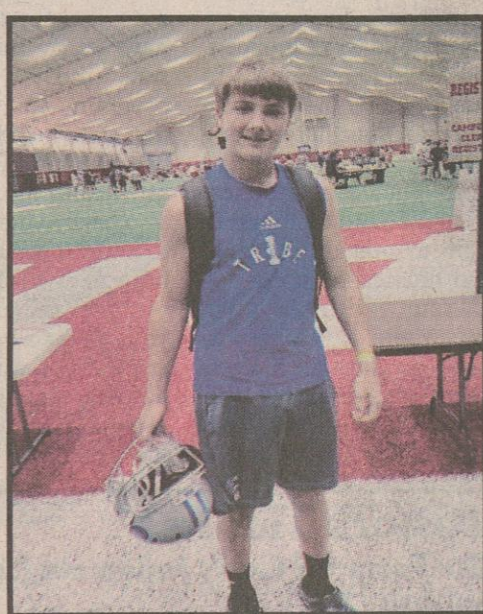

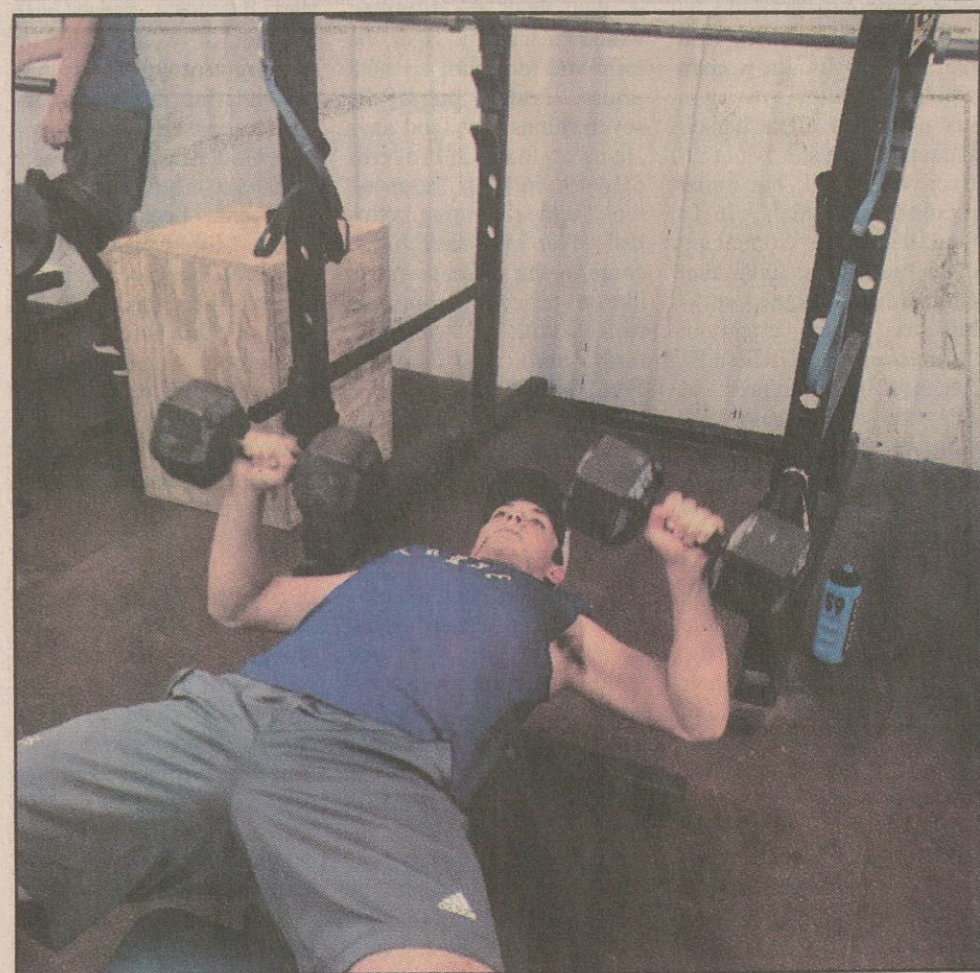
