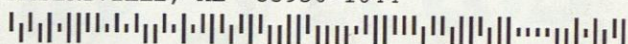

Former Iuka City Alderman Leroy Dean Dies at 90

Marshall Leroy Dean, 90, of Iuka, Mississippi, died Friday, June 25, 2021, at his residence. Leroy was born in Iuka to Marshall Major Dean and Georgie Ann Bishop Dean. He was a member of Iuka United Methodist Church and was a 50-year member of the Iuka Lodge #94 F&AM. He attended Central Elementary School and graduated from Iuka High School in 1950. He then attended Northeast Junior College and then served in the U. S. Army in Germany during the Korean Conflict. Following the war, Leroy graduated from Florence State College in 1956. He started his career with Weaver Pants Corporation from 1956 - 1959, and then M. W. Kellogg Construction Co. in Counce, TN, and Cherokee, AL from 1959 - 1962. He then continued his career with U. S. Agri-Chemicals from 1962 - 1986. Leroy loved his city and was elected and served as Iuka alderman from 1977 - 1997 during the time of Tenn-Tom and Yellow Creek Nuclear Plant construction. Some of Leroy's past community involvement was as director of the Iuka Head Start Program, treasurer for the first re-enactment of the Battle of Iuka, treasurer of Iuka Heritage Day for many years, past-director for the Jaycees, the American Legion, and the Tishomingo County Development Foundation, president of Vertagreen Credit Union, and past-director and president of Muscle Shoals Chapter of Credit Unions. After retirement, he spent many happy days with his best buddy, Sarge.



He is survived by a host of nieces and nephews. He was preceded in death by his parents, Marshall Major Dean and Georgie Ann Bishop Dean; three sisters, Lorene Dean, Evelyn Luttrell, and Reba Stevenson; and two brothers, Horace Dean and Bruce Dean.

Cutshall Funeral Home Breaks Ground in Iuka for Crematorium

Cutshall Funeral Home in Iuka broke ground this week at the future site of their new crematorium planned for opening in the fall. This will be the first such facility in the Tishomingo County area and has in recent years become a choice many families are asking for. No longer will family members have to be transported many miles for cremation, it will be available in the county.

The 30x40 building is

being constructed at 1108 Maria Lane in Iuka and will be completely operated by employees of Cutshall Funeral Home. It will be available for use by other funeral homes in the surrounding area, but will be maintained and operated by Cutshall's.

According to Bo Murphy, Vice-President and Managing Director of Cutshall Funeral Home, in the past several years, the funeral business has seen a growing demand

for the use of crematoriums. "Twenty-five years ago when I began working there was maybe one cremation every three or four years, now it is a service that is widely asked for by our customers. We are also proud to say the new facility has been fully approved by MDEQ and is equipped with a high tech filtration system which will result in no observable emissions from the facility."

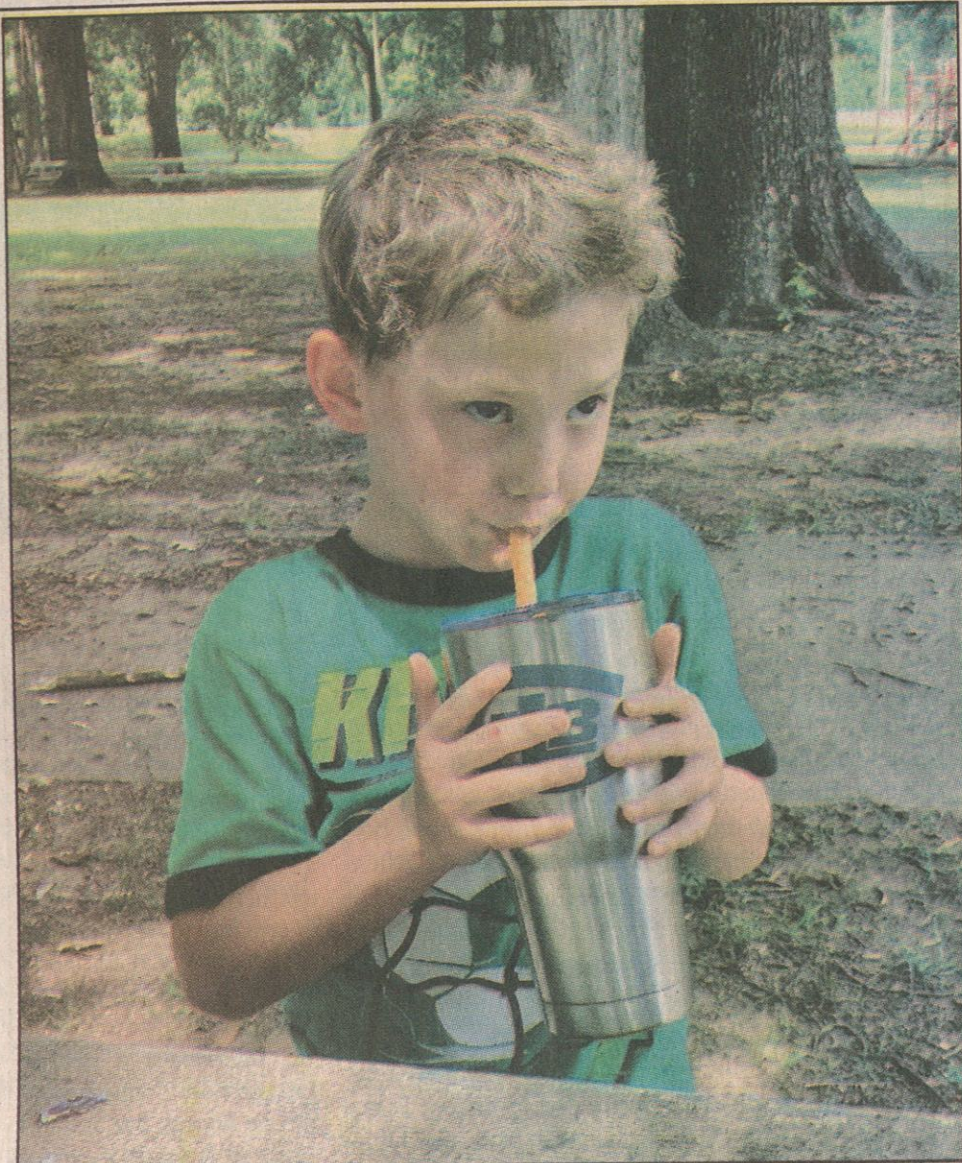
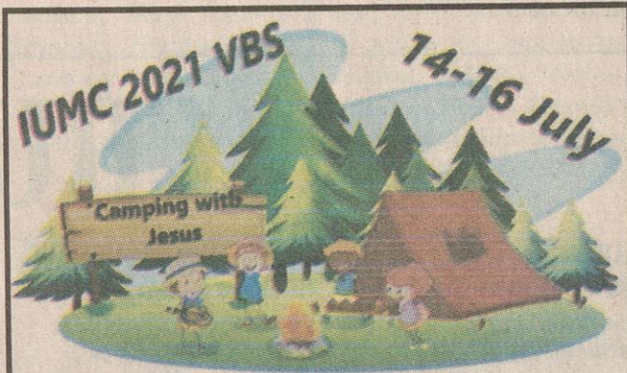

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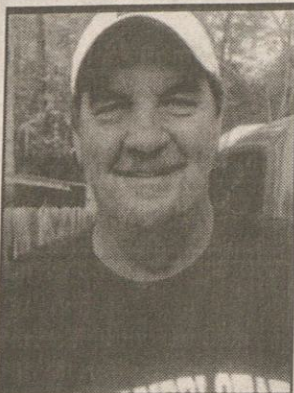

The Form Of God's Judgment That Came To Rebellious Judah (part 2)

I did not finish with my comments on Isaiah 3:16-18, so I will give verse 18 again: "In that day the LORD will take away the bravery of their tinkling ornaments about their feet, and their cauls, and their round tires like the moon." The Book of Isaiah gives much information about the judgment of God on the wrong actions of His people, Judah and Israel. Our word "bravery" is also translated "beauty", in fact the Hebrew word for "bravery" is translated as "bravery" only here. So God promised to take away the beauty of the tinkling ornaments on the ankles of Judah. Although God is speaking of a nation of people, He likens her to a woman who is seeking to be beautiful without any real character behind that beauty! Our word "cauls" is translated: "to interweave a netting for the hair", which may not be wrong, but Judah's pride in it made it wrong in the eyes of God, thus

He would take it away. Again, we are looking at a woman who is seeking to be beautiful, yet this is actually a picture of the nation of Judah, who is seeking to be beautiful in all the wrong ways. It is not that it is necessarily wrong for a woman, or a nation, to seek to be "beautiful", but when that beauty is motivated by a deep pride, it becomes wrong! Our word "tires" means: "a round pendant for the neck", so Judah was wearing jewelry in her quest to be accepted as beautiful. Round pendants were not necessarily wrong, but they became a cause of sin when worn with pride. This might give us something about

which to think concerning what makes one beautiful. It is not necessarily what one may wear, but the humility with which it is worn!

God was seeking to bring Judah to the place to rely on Him, not on her own power or beauty, and that is Isaiah's reason for denouncing Judah's actions, because of her pride! Isaiah 3:19-23 gives a long list of other ornaments that Judah was wearing: "The chains, and the bracelets, and the mufflers, The bonnets, and the ornaments of the legs, and the headbands, and the tablets, and the earrings, The rings, and nose jewels, the changeable suits of apparel, and the mantles,

and the wimples, and the crisping pens, the girdles, and the fine linen, and the hoods, and the veils. And they will not seek to elate themselves on each of these, but they will simply say that these are ornaments of jewelry and they were not necessary. When worn with pride, they are to attract wrong attention. Ezekiel 16:9-14 and shows God "adorned" Jerusalem with similar ornaments of beauty. Verse 12: "And thy renown went forth among the heathen for thy beauty for thou wast perfect through My holiness, which I had put thee, saith the Lord God. So the problem in verse 15 is not with the wearing of beautiful jewelry or clothing, but with the pride with which she was wearing it. In Ezekiel 16:14 we see that God made Jerusalem beautiful with similar items, yet she also misused that beauty to attract wicked nations. By J. Briggs King, Evangelist, Rainsville, AL

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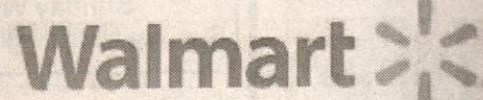

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Remember

God is certainly smiling on us today. We have had two nice showers. We could almost see the tomatoes, beans, okra and corn growing; and yes, the grass and weeds, too. It helps the good plants as well as the grass and weeds.

Reminds me of what the Bible teaches about rain on the just and unjust. God is no respecter of persons. He sees hearts. God loves and blesses us all. If we are Christians and do wrong? We know it. He wants us to repent or "He will give us a good chastening to bring us to remember whose we are." We should thank Him and praise Him for His love and goodness toward us.

Now, I'm going to get back on the history of Tishomingo. These facts come from the town minutes and not any special person; but before writing those dates, I also had the input with several other adults at the time writing. This was 1977, they added a lot to the story because they had experienced.

If I repeat myself just remember who is writing. Digress: A nurse at the funeral of Tommy Ray Miller yesterday told me when the paper came out the group would get together to read my articles. I bet



they can straighten me out lots of times. Smile. Sometimes I'll inject and think that helps clear up what I was writing. Then later on I want to tell something about the incident or person and I just do. Just as everything seemed to be progressing and the town was beginning to grow - tragedy struck.

On March 13, 1913, a Friday when the townspeople and school children were experiencing a typical day, a dark cloud came from the west about 2:00 p.m., and brought death, disaster and heartbreak to the newly five year old little town.

School was in secession. The building was a one floor structure located near the present well on the high school campus near the entrance. (Today I don't know if the well is still there. I'll check this weekend. It's Homecoming!)

The building was picked up and turned completely over. The rooms where the children

were huddled together were spared. Miss Annie Wren, the teacher received a broken nose and several children received cuts and scratches. A miracle indeed.

Dr. Dayton Waldrep was killed along with Mr. R. C. Edmondson and Mr. Jeff Smith, traveling salesmen from Corinth. They were in the J. W. "Dack" Nash store.

There were only six businesses at this time and they were all damaged. The top of the Post Office which was located on the present H. B. Southward lot across hwy. 25 from the Kreme Castle had the top blown off.

The first church in Tishomingo was the Methodist Church. The old Niblets Chapel was torn down and was used to build the present parsonage. (I don't know where it was and I surely failed to write it down.)

All denominations used the school building for Sunday School and Worship. It was the center for all church and social activities prior to this time.

The present Methodist Church was erected in about 1915. Rev. Will Dobbs was the first minister to serve in the present church (1977). The church has undergone some renovations as well as the addition of Sunday School rooms. At the time the

Methodist Church was built there were no buildings between the A. C. Gardner store on the west side of Hwy. 25 and the Methodist Church.

The old Tishomingo Baptist Church was destroyed in 1913, when the tornado hit Tishomingo. Mr. John Trimm and his sister, Mrs. Alecia Thomas, who lived in the Dr. N. C. Waldrep home helped clean up the debris in 1914. The church was re-built in about 1916, and served until 1966. It was torn down to make a way for the beautiful new building constructed by the Bolton Brothers of Red Bay, Alabama. The contract for the present building was awarded in

March 1966. It was completed in six months. One of the earliest ministers was a Bro. Genthorpe. Bro. Gene Tennison was pastor in 1977 and several years at different times. The Fellowship Hall was built while Bro. Bob Wadkins was our pastor. When the Fellowship Hall was dedicated it was named "The Tennison Building."

My family had lived

in the Memphis area five years. We joined the Tishomingo Baptist in 1967. Several changes have been made in the sanctuary - the lighting, windows and the entrance. Our pastor today is Bro. Rusty Fair. Now that the restrictions have been lifted? We welcome all of you back plus any newcomers are welcome, too.

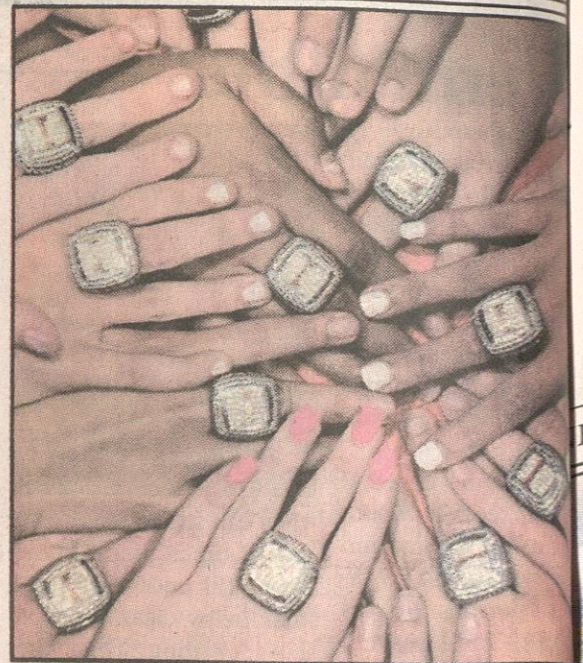

Fans, businesses, and the community began to rally behind the players and embrace the motto.

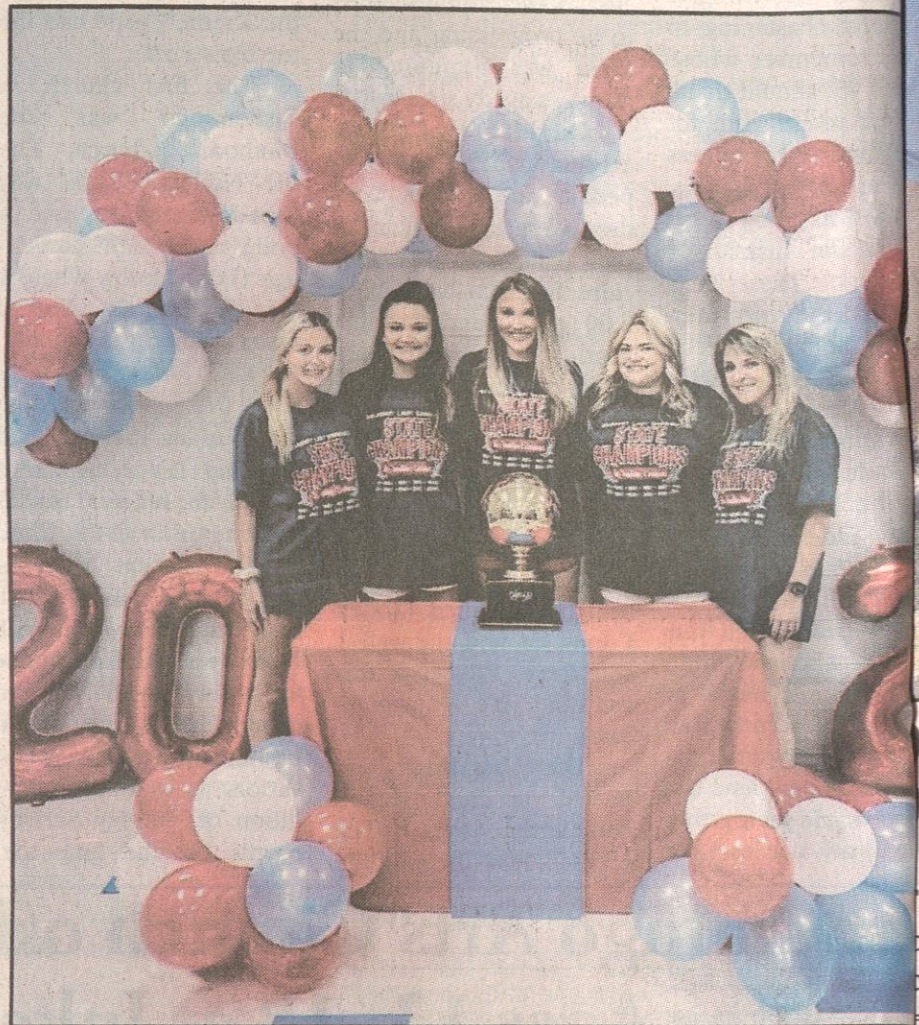

Three months later, the Belmont Lady Cardinals celebrated their 2021 basketball state championship at a ring celebration in the Malcolm Kuykendall Gymnasium. The players, managers, and coaches received their state championship rings and looked back on their successful season.

The 2021 championship rings include the word "Belmont" across the top in red surrounded by diamonds on a rectangle-shaped elevated ring outlined by navy jewels. One side of the ring is embossed with the words "Our Time".

Booming on the Battlefield at Shiloh

On Saturday, July 3, and Sunday, July 4, Shiloh National Military Park will present cannon firing demonstrations in commemoration of the July 4th week. The scheduled demonstrations will be presented by the Shiloh Cannon Crew, firing a 6-pounder gun, across the street from the park visitor center.

"These demonstrations will hopefully allow visitors to get a sense of the destructive power of the weapons and the terrible experience Shiloh soldiers faced by confronting massed artillery," said Superintendent Len Etheridge. "The 6-pounder field piece was the prevalent big gun in the Battle of Shiloh, making up 40% of all the cannon on the battlefield," Etheridge continued.

On Saturday there will be five demonstrations at 10:00 am, 11:00 am, 12:00 pm, 1:30 pm and 2:30 pm. On Sunday, there will be four demonstrations at 10:00 am, 12:00 pm, 1:30 pm, and 2:30 pm. Each demonstration will last approximately 20-minutes and include cannon firings.

All demonstrations are free and open to the public. There is no mask mandate for vaccinated visitors in open spaces. The park visitor center and bookstore are open normal operating hours from 8:00 am - 5:00 pm daily.
