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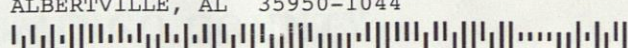

Marlin Named Head Baseball Coach at TCHS

Coach Austin Marlin was promoted to head Baseball Coach at Tishomingo County High School at the June school board meeting. Coach Marlin takes over from Jarred Robinson, who resigned to become Assistant Principal and Athletic Director.

Austin is a TC alumni who "bleeds blue" all the way through except when he is wearing on the Mississippi Bulldogs. Austin graduated from TC in 2014 where he played football and baseball. He is a product of "the old" Jerry Long.

Austin played under Coach Long for three years before Blake Holly took over in 2014. He then played at the east Mississippi Community College under Kent Hix and Richey Harrelson. Marlin hung up playing the year after two years JUCO to focus on his studies at Mississippi State University. He graduated from there in the spring of 2018. Austin says he really never thought he would move back home but an opportunity was there and he took it. Austin has a Bachelor of Science degree in Special Education.

Coach Marlin will be starting out with a young team with the exception of a few key players that will be seniors this season. "I believe if we play hard, practice hard and have discipline, we can make it to the playoffs," Marlin said. "It is a hard pill to swallow when your pro-



gram doesn't make it to the playoffs. That is what you're working toward EVERY season, EVERY year. That is something I wasn't used to when I played baseball at TC. We only missed the baseball playoffs my senior year by one game. I don't like to lose, but I know it happens."

Marlin says he played under some great men who knew the game well. He also said the last three years being an assistant coach under previous coaches, Casey James and Jarred Robinson, helped him learn more of the coaching experience and how it all works.

"It will definitely be time to regroup. We have a lot of work to do and some tough games in the spring. I want the kids to buy into what we want to do and that is WIN again. I'm looking forward to seeing where we end up this coming season."

NOTICE OF PROPOSED AD VALOREM TAX EFFORT TISHOMINGO COUNTY SCHOOL DISTRICT

The Tishomingo County Special Municipal Separate School District will hold a public hearing on its proposed school district budget for fiscal year 2021-2022 on July 26, 2021, 6:00 p.m., at the Superintendent's office. At this meeting, a proposed ad valorem tax effort shall be considered.

The Tishomingo County Special Municipal Separate School District is now operating with a projected total budget revenue of \$32,076,041.72. Of that amount, 27% or \$8,770,915, of such revenue is obtained through ad valorem taxes. For the next fiscal year, the proposed budget has total projected revenue of \$34,063,596.22. Of that amount, 25% or \$8,550,069 is proposed to be financed through a total ad valorem tax levy.

For the next fiscal year, the proposed increase in ad valorem tax effort by Tishomingo County Special Municipal Separate School District may result in an increase in the ad valorem tax millage rate. Ad valorem taxes are paid on homes, automobile tags, business fixtures and equipment, and rental real property.

Any citizen of Tishomingo County Special Municipal Separate School District is invited to attend this public hearing on the proposed ad valorem tax effort, and will be allowed to speak for a reasonable amount of time and offer tangible evidence before any vote is taken.

I Remember

written October 21st, 1999

Today, I am working in the office at the Tishomingo Middle School for the office secretary, Geneva Ware. I thought this day should not be wasted and I'd put on paper a typical day when I started my more than forty years of teaching. Times have really changed. So have we.

Bright and early, I'd roll out of bed, prepare breakfast, pack Chester's and my lunch, and he to work for his dad on the farm or saw-mill, haul lumber or saw, and I to Cripple Deer School for my first days as a teacher.

I was 19 and just out of high school, married nearly a year, and ready to walk about two miles to the little one-teacher school where I had spent nine years in school. (My Mom made me take the third grade twice. Then both years were only eight months).

When I arrived that first morning, I remember that most of the children were "kin folks", about 10 or 15 children, grades "one through eight" but I didn't have all grades that year.

In the front of the room was the same plank "blackboard" that had been there since the building had been built in 1904. It was one small room with four windows and a door. I had a

crude table for a desk as I remember, a tall square stand for the water bucket and dipper, yes, when I was growing up we always drank from the same dipper at school, but now I had learned about washing hands and hygiene so we each had to bring our own glass to drink from. As I recall, growing up we were never sick!

When the little bell rang, we all got in line and marched into the room quietly, got into our wooden desk (two or three to a seat) and went to work.

Yes, work we did. I had my three youngest sisters in school. I remember a few incidents with them because we were family, but we must have worked, played and got along great, because they turned out great. Nancy married young in High School, but Hilda and Ann did great and achieved much in high school.

Back to a typical day. When we were seated, we always stood and gave our pledge to the American Flag. One of the students would come to the front of the room and hold up a little flag and we gave our allegiance to our country. The World War II was taking its tolls on our American boys, and we really did give our all for the freedom we were enjoying that was at "risk". It was a sad time in my life, but we gave our all to our studies,

our games, and each other. Never any problems that couldn't be solved between the students and me. I was only 19 and I tried to teach my students everything I knew, plus what was in the text book. I was taking General Psychology from Mississippi State and Freshman English at the same time and teaching. I used the psychology and found out how little I knew about split-infinities, etc., as a result of having poorly trained English teachers in 11th and 12th grade in high school. Most of the qualified teachers left the profession and went to defense plants for better paying jobs and many of our high school school teachers had only a high school education. After the pledge to the flag, we read from the Bible and repeated the "Lord's Prayer". Verbal praying has never been a gift God bestowed on me, even down to the present time and yet, I pray sometimes. All the time. That's what keeps me going.

If there were happenings in the community or in the Vidette or on the radio, we had current events and then it was down to basics, reading, writing, and arithmetic. The punishments I dished out were about the same as when I went to school at Cripple Deer; stay in during play period, stand in the corner or stand at the board with "Nose in a Circle."

I soon learned that chalk was very un-hygienic and I dropped that. (Another thing that teachers did when I was a child, was stand on one foot, but this entertained the whole room.) The tall table could have been used for the "dunce stool" but not while I was in school.

After the math and spelling (of which I always placed much emphasis), we would have a thirty minute break. We called it recess. We had snacks we had brought from home, "went to the woods" boys on one side of the building and girl's on the other. Then, we played basketball, baseball, hop-scotch, marbles, or whatever. The period was always too short!

I would say, let's go work a little and we would work hard until lunch. Then we would all either go outside, or eat in the room, then to play! We would finish the game we had started at the recess and the children would play hard.

We had no library books but what we had personally, we shared. Comic books we shared. Some teachers frowned on comic books, but I always said, "Give me a good comic-book reader and I'll give you a good student." (Now, fifty years later, educators are promoting what I knew was good then!!) Look how much time was wasted all these years.

We had tablets and notebooks and special test-

ing days about like we have today. We had a 15 minute break in the P.M.

At the close of the day, classes were dismissed, and each one walked home including me. I always stopped for a few minutes at Mom and Dad's and held Carolyn (Edmondson) Southwood. She was so pretty and her dad was overseas fighting, this made her more precious to us all. Jewel lived with Mom and Dad until Darlan got to come home. After the visit, I would walk across Cripple Deer Bottom to where we lived and get supper, do my college work, and wait for Chester. We had so much fun during those years. This is what keeps me going now.

On each holiday we would have a school program. Sometimes I would write the plays, or remember poems, stories, etc. that I had had in school. Every morning we sang! I love music and we sang patriotic songs. Sometimes some of the students would teach me a song they knew and I'd let them teach all of us!

We would use bed-sheets and sometimes build a stage and invite the parents for our performance. There were never any charges for our plays. The first Christmas program, I invited Bro. Edgar Monroe to come and bring our devotional. He had been a friend all my life, and I used him.

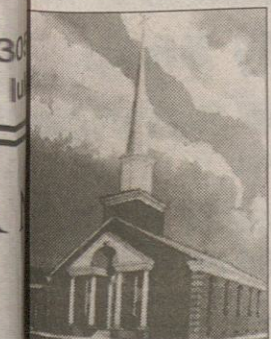

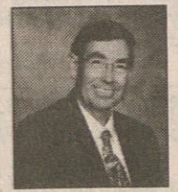

A Vision Of The Future Glory Of Israel After Judgment

I am glad that all of the Bible is not negative, in fact, I am glad that all of the history of Israel is not bleak, for there will be a restoration of that nation. Isaiah 4:1-3 says, "And in that day seven women shall take hold of one man, saying, We will eat our own bread, and wear our own apparel: only let us be called by thy name, to take away our reproach. In that day shall the branch of the LORD be beautiful and glorious, and the fruit of the earth shall be excellent and comely for them that are escaped of Israel. And it shall come to pass, that he that is left in Zion, and he that remaineth in Jerusalem, shall be called holy, even every one that is written among the living in Jerusalem." 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EXHIBIT A - COUNTY GOVERNMENT RESOLUTION OF INTENTION

The Board of Supervisors, acting for and on behalf of Tishomingo County, Mississippi (the "County"), took up for consideration the matter of authorizing and approving a loan on behalf of the County from the Mississippi Development Authority (the "MDA") for the purpose of assisting existing industries deploying long term fixed assets that through new technologies will improve productivity and competitiveness and to assist existing industries through the purchase of land, buildings and equipment.

Whereupon Supervisor Brandon Grissom offered and moved the adoption of the following resolution:

RESOLUTION DECLARING THE INTENTION OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF TISHOMINGO COUNTY, MISSISSIPPI, TO AUTHORIZE AND APPROVE A LOAN ON BEHALF OF THE COUNTY FROM THE MISSISSIPPI DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY IN A MAXIMUM PRINCIPAL AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED THREE MILLION DOLLARS (\$3,000,000) FOR THE PURPOSE OF MODIFICATION OF EXISTING BUILDING TO MEET MANUFACTURING REQUIREMENTS: such as new HVAC, air compressor, fencing, improvements to an existing door, driveway modification, electrical upgrades, crane upgrades, and other building improvements.

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi (the "Governing Body" of the "County"), does hereby find and resolve, determine, adjudicate and declare as follows:

The Mississippi Existing Industry Productivity Loan, constituting Sections 57-93-1 et. seq. Mississippi Code of 1972, as amended (the "Act"), was enacted for the purpose of promoting business and economic development in the state of Mississippi (the "State") through investment by private companies locating in the State.

Pursuant to Section 57-93-1 of the Act, the MDA is authorized to make interest-bearing loans to state, counties or incorporated municipalities for the purpose of making loans to existing industries to deploy long term fixed assets.

The County will agree to assist existing industries and will request the MDA to finance a portion of the cost associated with the development of these improvements (the "Project").

Pursuant to the Act and guidelines adopted by the MDA, the County will file an application with the MDA for a loan to be used for development of the Project in the amount of Three Million Dollars (\$3,000,000) (the "Loan").

The County and the Authority will enter into a Loan Agreement (the "Agreement"), with the MDA wherein the County agrees to use the proceeds of the Loan subject to and upon the terms and conditions of the Agreement.

In order to secure the Loan, the County will execute and deliver to the MDA a Promissory Note (the "Note"). Failure of the County to meet its repayment obligations shall result in the forfeiture of homestead exemption annual tax loss reimbursement in an amount sufficient to repay obligations due pursuant to Section 57-93-1 of the Act.

The Loan shall not be deemed indebtedness within the meaning specified in Section 19-9-5, Mississippi Code of 1972, as amended.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE COUNTY, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The Governing Body of the County does hereby declare its intention to authorize and approve a Loan from the MDA in a principal amount not to exceed Three Million Dollars (\$3,000,000) for the purpose of making loans to existing industries to deploy long term fixed assets.

Section 2. The Loan will be secured by a Note executed and delivered by the County to MDA. Pursuant to Section 57-93-1 of the Act, the County to meet its repayment obligations shall result in the forfeiture of homestead exemption annual tax loss reimbursement in an amount sufficient to repay obligations due until such time as the indebtedness has been discharged or arrangements made to satisfy such indebtedness satisfactory to the MDA have been made.

Section 3. The Governing Body proposes to authorize and approve the Loan from the MDA in the amount and for the aforesaid purposes at a meeting of the Governing Body to be held at its regular meeting place at the County Courthouse in Iuka, Mississippi at 9:00 a.m. on the 2nd day of August, 2021, or at some meeting held subsequent thereto. If twenty percent (20%) or fifteen hundred (1,500), or more, of the qualified electors in the County shall file a written protest with the Clerk of the County against the authorization of the Loan on or before the aforesaid date and hour, then the Loan shall not be entered into unless authorized at an election on the question of authorizing and approving the Loan. Such election shall be called and held as provided by law. If no protest is filed, the Loan may be entered into without an election on the question of authorizing and approving the Loan at any time within a period of two (2) years after the date above specified.

Section 4. This Resolution shall be published once a week for at least four (4) consecutive weeks in the Tishomingo County News, a newspaper published in the City of Iuka, Tishomingo County, Mississippi and having a general circulation in the County and qualified under the provisions of Section 13-3-31, Mississippi Code of 1972, as amended. The first publication of this Resolution shall be made not less than twenty-one (21) days prior to August 02, 2021 and the last publication shall be made not more than seven (7) days prior to such date as said Resolution to be published on July 08, 15, 22, and 29, 2021.

Section 5. The Clerk of the County shall be and is hereby directed to procure from the publisher of the aforesaid newspaper the necessary proof of said publication of this Resolution and have the same before the Governing Body on the date and hour specified in Section 3 hereof.

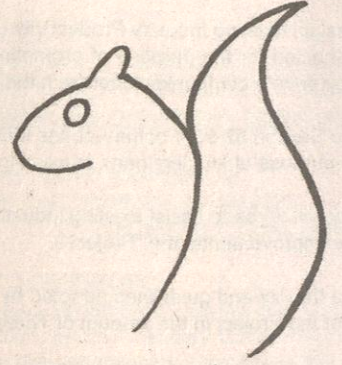

BOONEVILLE, Miss. - Northeast Mississippi Community College is set to take another step in its ongoing efforts to make quality, higher education more easily accessible in its five-county district throughout North Mississippi.

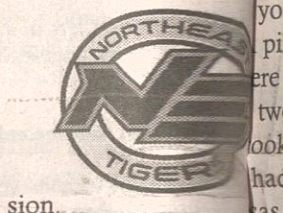
Today, Northeast launches "Northeast Promise," a last-dollar scholarship funding any remaining tuition or mandatory fees balance after all other forms of gift aid (aid that doesn't have to be paid-back such as Pell grant, institutional merit or activity scholarship, Northeast Development Foundation scholarships) have been applied. Housing and meals are not included.

We're extremely proud to be in a position to offer this scholarship opportunity," Northeast president Dr. Ricky G. Ford said. "While it is available only to career and technical students now, as workforce need evolve, we will look to enhance this program so students in other programs such as health sciences may benefit from it as well."

Simply removing the financial burden many students face is important, but the "Northeast Promise" also provides ongoing support through mandatory meetings with the student's academic advisor. Each student participating in the program must meet specific criteria to remain eligible semester-to-semester and year-to-year such as renewing the FAFSA by a specific deadline each year, those mandatory meetings with advisor and maintaining satisfactory academic progress (2.0 gpa) each semester.

Students may receive "Northeast Promise" funds until they earn the associate degree or certificate, or up to four semesters, whichever occurs

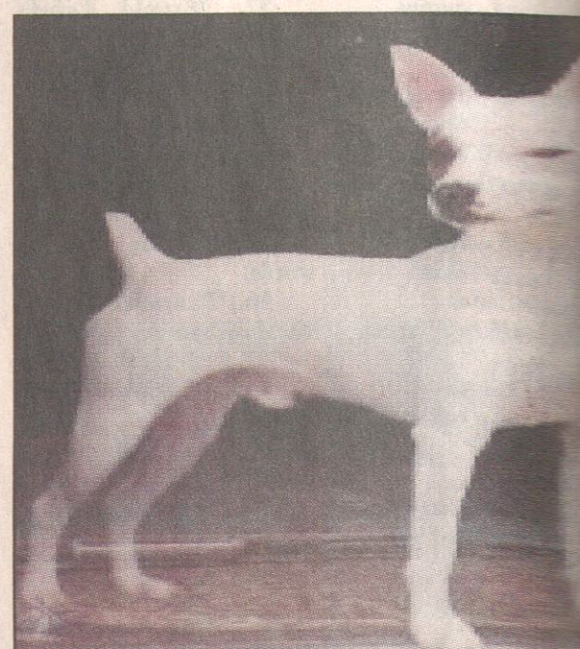
