Tishomingo County School District Prepares For New School Year

Classes Begin August 5

The Tishomingo County School District is getting ready for school to begin in August and is looking forward to a greater sense of normalcy after a year of dealing with the CO-VID-19 pandemic. The district has published its "Safe Return to School Plan" on the district website and received positive feedback from stakeholders. The plan is flexible as the situation with COVID-19 can change quickly. The district encourages parents and the community to review the plan and submit any comments, if needed.

As the district plans to return to school, there are several things to note that will be different from last year:

School will be in session 5 days a week in its traditional learning schedule.

Buses will run as normal and masks are not required on buses.

Students will return to school on August 5, 2021. The school calendar can be found on the district website (www. tcsk12.com).

Masks are optional and not required at this time. The mask mandate from the governor for K-12 schools ended on May 31st.

Visitors are welcome at each campus. However, the district asks that if the visitor is experiencing any sickness or symptoms to refrain from entering the building.

If a student is showing symptoms of illness or CO-VID-19 specific symptoms, he/ she should not come to school.

Due to a new Mississippi Department of Education policy regarding virtual learning, a student must be "live online" all day while a teacher is teaching his/her classes to be a virtual student. In response to this policy, the district WILL NOT offer a virtual option for students at this time. All students will be required to come to school faceto-face.

Students and staff who are exposed to positive COVID-19 individuals (whether outside of school or during school) will still have to follow the CDC's quarantine guidelines. Vaccinated individuals are exempt from quarantine requirements according to the CDC's guidelines.

If a student was home schooled last year, the student is required to take a placement test to register for school. Families of home school students should contact their child's school to schedule this test as soon as possible so registration can occur.

The district has plans to implement new programs and new personnel to assist with any learning gaps and/or learning loss that students may experience from last school year and the school shutdown in 2020. "And it's not as if there is a need for another clinic; in addition to the award-winning hospital in Iuka that many people have worked hard to keep open through the years, there are four full-service clinics in Iuka, and a new urgent care clinic just opened up in the last year," said Dr. Margaret Glynn, of Iuka. "And now the state government is going to fund another clinic run by a competing hospital system in our county."

Not a Free Clinic

"It would be different," Dr. Glynn explained, "if the government was funding a free clinic for people who could use it. But, it's NOT a free clinic they are proposing, it is a for-profit clinic getting hundreds of thousands from the Port to build on!"

"Our county has at least nine doctors that were born and raised in Tishomingo County," said one doctor in a letter. "They attended school in the county for twelve years, went on to college and studied day and night for another twelve years to become a hometown doctor. How are they rewarded? Their own state leaders have given their tax dollars away to Magnolia Regional Hospital to directly compete against them!"

Additionally, the county has many advanced nurse practitioners who are native Tishomingo Countians and are "the backbone of our local clinics, nursing homes, and assisted living facilities."

"They know their patients very well because they see them at church, see them shopping, and their kids attend school together. Home grown medicine

"Imagine if, despite having a couple good grocery stores in your town run by hard-working private individuals or companies, and the state decided to GIVE Walmart or Costco (private, for-profit companies) \$750,000 and land to build on," said Cooley. "That would not be right, and this isn't either. If they want to enter the health care market because there is a need, let them fund a clinic themselves; not use our tax dollars to build something that's going to hurt existing providers!"

No Need?

The Port has long been profitable, from fees it gets on the freight it moves in and out of the Port on the Tennessee Tombigbee Waterway. This \$750,000 in state allocation for this specific purpose comes from SB 2971, passed by the legislature and signed by the governor. It was


praised by Burnsville mayor David Nixon, a longtime member of the Port Board.

It is not unusual for the Port, or the Port through the County, to build a building (using government loans and grants) to house an industry, as it has done with many of the afore-mentioned industries, but there is always a lease agreement, and those industrial clients make lease payments

State Bill SB2971 **Gives FREE Money** to Magnolia to Open **Clinic in Tishomingo County!**

Dear Editor,

I write this letter today out of concern for Tishomingo County's growth and out of shock of the apparent misappropriation of state funding that I have witnessed this year. I am a graduate of Tishomingo County High School and made the choice to return to my community to serve its people as a medical provider. This is my sixth year as a Family Nurse Practitioner in my community, and I am an active individual in community projects for growth and development for our county.

the majority of its employees in Tishomingo County. I also state that this possible use of tax money was not brought to the attention of the area clinics, nor were any other clinics offered the opportunity to make new services available that they may not have known were needed. I also state that services that each industry has voiced a need for have already been added to the full complement of services already provided by already established clinics in our area.

(Shown above) The government Health and Research Services Administration (HRSA) sets a measurement for AREAS OF MEDICAL NEED in the United States. Specifically in Mississippi, we are the only county in northeast Mississippi that DOES NOT HAVE a need, per capita, for more medical providers to service the medical and Occupational Health needs for this area. So why are we using government tax dollars to push another medical clinic that is not Furthermore, needed? tax dollars should be allocated to counties that are currently underserved to improve the health of Mississippi. Tishomingo County IS NOT in need as designated by research provided by HRSA.

the needs of these industries are in the area of the Occupational Health. All the industries' needs are facilitated by the SEVEN area medical clinics already established in Tishomingo County. These services include workman's compensation cases, occupational health assessments such as hearing and drug screens, pulmonary function testing, vision testing, federal physicals, and department of transportation physicals. Onsite testing and preventative vaccines are performed on a need basis for each industry. There is no service needed that is not already provided by established clinics in our home county. Already established hometown clinics depend on these services to monetarily support the





Tishomingo County Special The Municipal Separate School District will hold a public hearing on its proposed school district budget for fiscal year 2021-2022 on July 26, 2021, 6:00 p.m., at the Superintendent's office. At this meeting, a proposed ad valorem tax effort shall be considered. The Tishomingo County Special Municipal Separate School District is now operating with a projected total budget revenue of \$32,076,041.72. Of that amount, 27% or \$8,770,915, of such revenue is obtained through ad valorem taxes. For the next fiscal year, the proposed budget has total projected revenue of \$34,063,596.22. Of that amount, 25% or \$8,550,069 is proposed to be financed through a total ad valorem tax levy. For the next fiscal year, the proposed increase in advalorem tax effort by Tishomingo County Special Municipal Separate School District may result in an increase in the ad valorem tax millage rate. Ad valorem taxes are paid on homes, automobile tags, business fixtures and equipment, and rental real property. Any citizen of Tishomingo County Special Municipal Separate School District is invited to attend this public hearing on the proposed ad valorem tax effort, and will be allowed to speak for a reasonable amount of time and offer tangible evidence before any vote is taken.

A Vision Of The Future Glory Of Israel After Judgment (part 2)

One could actually write volumes on this subject, but I will not attempt to do so here, yet I do want to write enough to give the idea that God has said much about Israel's future glory. Yes, judgments have come on Israel already, and there are more to come, but one day those judgments will end and Israel will be restored to a glorious future. This, however, will begin with a redeemed remnant of Israel. Isiah 4:3-6 says, "And it shall come to pass, that he that is left in Zion, and he that remaineth in Jerusalem, shall be called holy, even every one that is written among the living in Jerusalem. When the Lord shall have washed away the filth of the daughters of Zion, and shall have purged the blood of Jerusalem from the midst thereof by the spirit of judgment, and by the spirit of burning. And the LORD will create upon every dwelling



place of mount Zion, and upon her assemblies, a cloud of a flaming fire by night: for upon all the glory shall be a defence. And there shall be a tabernacle for a shadow in the daytime from the heat, and for a place of refuge, and for a covert from storm and from rain."

I may not be able to comment on all of these verses in this article, but they need to be given together to get the full sense of what is being said. Notice that God speaks of those who are "left in Zion", indicating that many in Israel will be killed during the tribulation, yet there will be a believing remnant that will survive and come to a time of peace in the reign of



Christ on earth for the thousand years. Notice that those left will be called "holy", for they will have turned to the one true God. These will have been "written among the living in Jerusalem", which indicates that God Himself chooses who will live through the tribulation and the anti-christ's hatred of Israel (see Revelation chapters 12 & 13). It will be the Lord Who washes away the filth of the "daughters of Zion", and we need to stop listening to those who say that "Zion" is the church, for it is not. Moreover, the prophecies that are given concerning the future of Israel will not fit the church. Yes, the church will be on earth during

this time of peace for a thousand years, but it will not be a part of Israel. Notice also that it is the "spirit of judgment" that washes Israel and purges her. The "little positive essays" of some preachers and teachers will not do the job when it comes to correcting the people of God, either in Israel or the church! After God has judged Israel, He will create a cloud of defense and glory upon Israel during the night. Even the word "night" lets us know that this is not in "heaven", for there shall be no night there in the new heavens and earth, according to Revelation 22:5. So, God is going to bring peace to earth for a thousand years, and redeemed Israel, at least the remnant, will enjoy the peace and prosperity that God has promised them through thousands of years!

I would discuss our going ahead of time so they could tell their parents. I never had a student that didn't want to go.

You are probably thinking? "They didn't have any other choice," really they probably didn't or if they did, no one ever knew. The parents back then wanted their children to go to church and was happy for me to go and take them. It never bothered the lunch room ladies that sometimes we were a little late getting to lunch. They were always glad to feed us when we got back

I'm going to share a comical incident about Peggy and her twin sister Patsy. As with sisters and brothers, they didn't always agree. I had the perfect cure for their problem: I would make them hug and love each other. It worked and ended up with the class and me laughing. A good rule, usually, and they forgot what was their problem.

I had two students that became ministers. Don't get the idea that I think I was the only teacher they had, that loved the lord. There was Mrs. Artie Timbes and Mrs. Arta Mars and others I'm sure. Mrs. Artie Timbes was the pianist and this was her home church. It was like "a great reunion day" when we'd just open up and sing. My memory may be slipping, but as I recall, the majority of the congregation was school students.

Digress: While teaching at Boggs Chapel we were the congregation. Bro. Will Whitner was the pastor. He knew the school children would be there and he brought the best messages any minister could preach to young boys and girls. They learned more in that hour than I could have taught them in any subject matter.

The parents at Boggs Chapel were like those later at Paden. Denominations? Didn't matter. Jesus Christ was preached at both churches. One Baptist and one Methodist.
