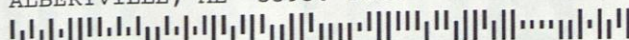

On Sunday, September 19th, an early morning fire destroyed four units at Riverside Apartments in Iuka.

The fire was reported to the Fire Department at 3:17 p.m. It burned units 16-A, B, and D at 1000 North Pearl

Thankfully no injuries were reported, it appears that the fire initially broke out in unit A. Responders to the scene were able to contain the fire to prevent it from spreading to other near-by units.

The fire was devastating and four tenants lost everything they

This fire is under investigation by the county investigator and the State Fire Marshall.

Fatal Accident Claims the Life of Iuka Teen

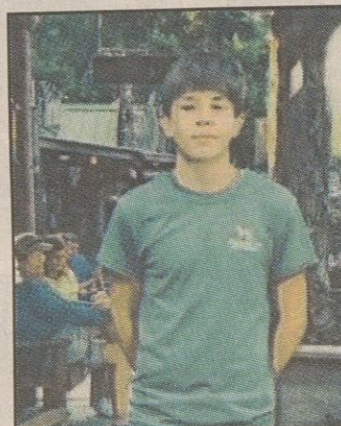
A two vehicle crash on Monday, September 20, 2021, at approximately 8:47 p.m. has claimed the life of a young man from Iuka and critically injured others in the wreck.

The Mississippi Highway Patrol responded to the fatal crash on Highway 365 south of Burnsville in Tishomingo County and reported a 2014 Ford Escape driven by Melissa K. Walker, 44, of Iuka, MS, was traveling north on Highway 365. A 2011 Ford Explorer driven by Brittany A. Norris, 33, of Counce, TN, was traveling south on Highway 365. Both vehicles made contact causing the Ford Escape to go off the east side of Highway 365. The Ford Explorer came to rest in the center of Highway 365. This crash is currently under investigation by the Mississippi Highway Patrol.

Thirteen-year-old Michael Walker of Iuka received fatal injuries from the crash and was pronounced dead at a local hospital. His mother, Melissa Walker and his sister, Macie Walker are in critical condition and are being treated at North MS Medical in Tupelo, MS. The Walker family was returning from Booneville where Michael plays on a travel basketball team and had been at practice.

Michael was a much loved student at Iuka Middle School. He played 7th grade basketball and loved hunting, fishing and basketball.

His mother, Melissa Walker

teaches 7th grade Cyber and leads the Tech Team at IMS.

Also a passenger in the car was his sister, Macie Walker, an 18-year-old former Belmont High School basketball player and is currently attending the University of North Alabama on a basketball scholarship. Macie had come home to visit with her family and watch her brother's practice.

School at IMS was dismissed on Tuesday, September 21, as the news spread of Michael's death. A prayer visual was held at noon for students and faculty.

On Wednesday morning, sources reported that Melissa was undergoing surgery and Macie was suffering from internal injuries. The community continues prayer for the family, especially remembering father, Matthew Walker and other family members as they bear this loss and pain.

TCSD Amends COVID-19 Policies

The Tishomingo County School District amended its COVID quarantine policies at the last school board meeting. Masks indoors remain optional in the district since the temporary mask mandate ended after Labor Day. However, the TCSD school board voted to allow anyone who is wearing a mask that comes in contact with a positive COVID individual to be exempt from quarantine if not within 3 feet for 15 cumulative minutes or longer to the positive person. "The distance and time limit established in this new policy is in line with the distances and times set by the CDC and Mississippi State Department of Health. This new policy went into effect on September 14th and will remain in place unless the board amends it," stated Christie Holly, superintendent of education. Previously, the TCSD enforced the MSDH policy that both the COVID-positive individual and the close contact had to be wearing masks and not within 3 feet for 15 cumulative minutes to be exempted from quarantine. With this new policy, the following reasons will allow a student or staff member to be exempt from quarantine if exposed and determined to be a close contact to a COVID-positive person:

The close contact must be wearing a mask and not within 3 feet for 15 cumulative minutes or longer, or

The close contact has been fully vaccinated (2 weeks have passed since the last shot), or

The close contact has been confirmed to have had COVID-19 within the last 90 days, or

The close contact and the positive person were both wearing masks and not within 3 feet for 15 cumulative minutes or longer.

Contact tracing will still continue based upon CDC and MSDH guidance with the new TCSD policy as well, and those identified as a close contact will be notified by the school. The district posts a weekly chart on its website under the "COVID 19" tab for the public to view the current status of positive cases and quarantine numbers at each campus. "From the beginning of the pandemic, we have posted our numbers to be as transparent as possible to our stakeholders," stated Holly. "Each school continues to sanitize buildings and buses daily as well as encourage proper hand washing, social distancing as feasible, and frequent use of hand sanitizer. Any student that wants a mask can simply ask for one as the district has plenty for any interested individual to use in our buildings," Holly explained. "We encourage parents to consider all possible options and make the best decision for their child. The board will continue to monitor cases and amend policy if needed."

She came to the Monjeau home as a very skinny, 4-month-old kitten. With food and tender loving care, she became healthy and playful. She spent the first 5 years as an indoor/outdoor cat, living in their workshop, but then decided she wanted to be with her people all the time. She became a happy inside only house cat. In May, Mr. & Mrs. Monjeau adopted a rambunctious 6-week-old kitten. Tiger is very tolerant of the kitten, and they wrestle and play all day. Tiger is very sweet, affectionate, and her family loves her dearly. Cats like Tiger are very healthy due to the routine health care maintained by their owners. Routine health care refers to the non-emergency, general care that is needed to keep your

cat healthy throughout its life. This includes routine veterinary care for vaccinations, parasite control, and dental care. Also, proper nutrition, grooming, and protection from household hazards are very important. Adult cats should have a complete veterinary examination at least once a year. Kittens need veterinary visits usually every 3 to 4 weeks until they are about 4 months old. Geriatric cats (older than 8 to 9 years old) should see their veterinarian twice a year or more frequently because illness



is more common in older pets and should be identified sooner to provide proper treatment. Your veterinarian may recommend a wellness program for your pet, such as routine blood tests to monitor for early kidney or liver disease. "NOTICE OF TAX INCREASE TISHOMINGO COUNTY"

The Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors will hold a public hearing on its proposed budget for fiscal year 2021-22 Monday September 27th 2021 at 9:00 AM at the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors Office. At this meeting, a proposed ad valorem tax revenue increase in the proposed budget will be considered.

The Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors is operating with projected total revenue of \$14,773,976 and \$5,881,050 (40 percent) of such revenue is obtained through ad valorem taxes. For next fiscal year, the proposed budget has total projected revenue of \$17,178,910. Of that amount \$5,881,050 (34 percent) is proposed to be financed through a total ad valorem tax levy.

This increase in ad valorem tax revenue means that you will pay more in ad valorem taxes on your home, automobile tag, utilities, business fixtures, and equipment and rental property.

Any citizen of Tishomingo County is invited to attend this public hearing on the proposed ad valorem tax revenue increase in the budget and will be allowed to speak for a reasonable amount of time and offer tangible evidence before any vote is taken.

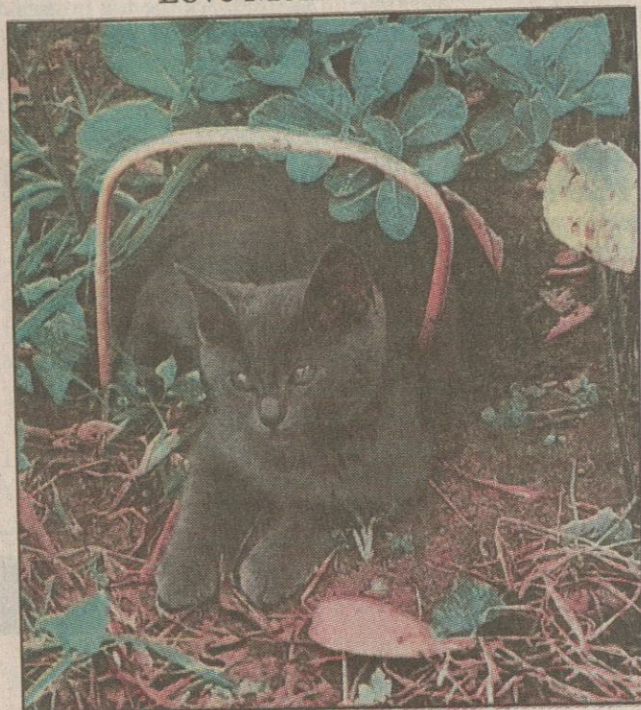

I Remember

A few days ago one of my readers wanted me to write about weddings of long ago compared to a wedding of today. (I could have just written about mine. It was seventy-eight years ago.)

I don't know too much about weddings in the late 1890's. I do remember my grandmother telling us a little. According to the birth of her children, she would have married in the 1890's.

If the wedding was approved by both families they celebrated the wedding at the bride's house. They would have a big feast and then a square dance. The music was a fiddle (violin) and usually a banjo.

Before all the guests began to arrive the big fire place room which usually had two beds, and if able, a secretary's desk, a big dresser with a tall mirror and a place to hang coats and hats, and of course, everyone had a rocking chair. All this had to be removed from the room for the night because it took all the space for dancing.

I remember when I was young buck dancing



by the men and I called it Charleston by the ladies while the "caller of the sets and dancers took a break." This went on for hours. Then the newlyweds usually had their cabin home ready if it was just two rooms - an open fire-place room/bedroom and kitchen. All the log houses I remember had added on rooms and porches. Most of them had an open "dog-trot" between the two big log rooms.

In the house-place on CR 55 about 1/2 mile south from where I live, a big square dance was planned, a wedding was planned, too, but only a few knew about it.

There was a couple who wanted to get married but the dad said "no way." While the dancing was going on the couples' plans

were executed while the parent were busy talking.

A window was raised and a couple of the young boys lifted the "bride to be" out the window right into the waiting arms of the groom and away they ran. They had planned everything and her parents didn't know she was gone until they got ready to go home. I won't use any names because I might not get them right. I've heard my daddy tell about the escape several times. It was so funny to him.

Iuka was known as the marriage capital of the South for several years. No requirements except the fee for the license. Then the couple could walk out of the office and if you wanted to get married right then? There was a minister or an official qualified to perform the marriage vows just waiting to make a few bucks.

I have read stories where many of these couples return to Iuka after maybe fifty or more years to visit where they got married.

As to the cost of a wedding then and the difference now is astronomical. Parents can spend as

much as their means allows, or as little as they choose.

Years ago a dowry was required by the bride's family. That went out of style a long time ago. The parents of the bride and groom may share the expense. They do exchange rings. Some parents today don't want their daughters to marry if the groom is not able to provide for her as she has been used to.

I have lost so many of my friends in the last few weeks. Mr. Ralph Martin was Sheriff of Prentiss County when Chester was Sheriff of Tishomingo County (1976-80). We became good friends and Betty Martin died this week. Ex-sheriffs Ralph and Chester have both been gone several years.

Covid 19 has spiked again in our community. I went to church last Sunday and observed the rules. No hugging, no shaking hands (we did bump elbows), and wear a mask. I did most of the time. I have stayed home today.

One of my former students died this week from Covid. She lived in Florida but wanted to come home (New Prospect) for burial.

Her funeral will be some time this week. It takes time to bring one across state lines.

I'm going to take a vacation from writing, "I Remember" for a spell. There are so many pictures from school events and stories about ballgames and other activities now, that the Editor doesn't need something just to fill up space. The memories I have will be safe in the Memory Box. Thank you readers for your encouragement, and a big thanks to Charlotte for always printing my scribbles as written. With Halloween, Thanksgiving and Christmas, the Editor won't need old memories because she will have lots of new ones to record for future generations.

Memories are made and cherished by the written word, by pictures and "yes, by talk" for which I've been voted for. Maybe I would have learned more by listening! Too late now, enjoy the holidays.

How To Identify Pipeline Locations

Since pipelines are buried underground,
line markers like the ones shown above
are used to indicate their approximate
location along the route. The markers can
be found where a pipeline intersects a
street, highway or railroad. The marker
displays the material transported in the
lines, the name of the pipeline company,
and a telephone number where the company
can be reached in the event of an emergency.

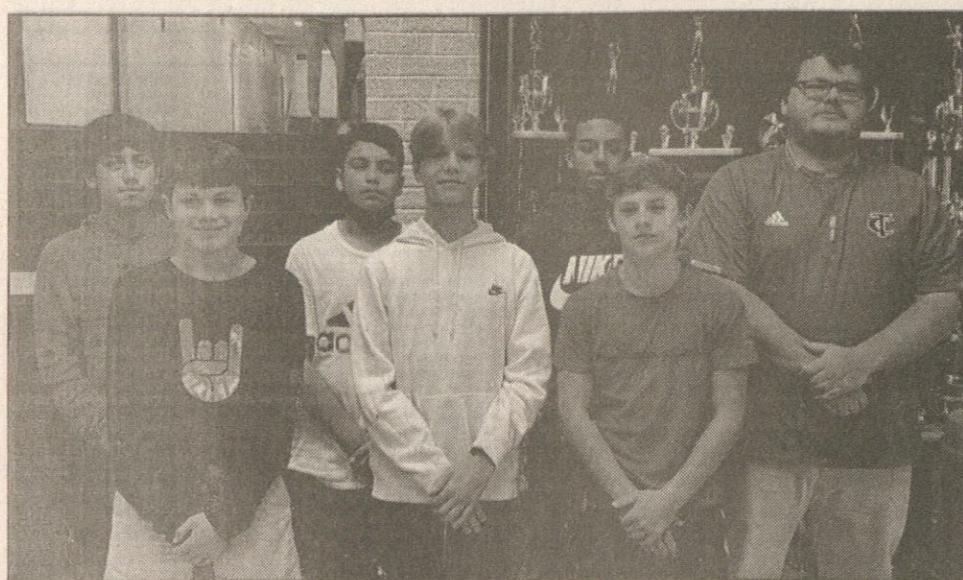

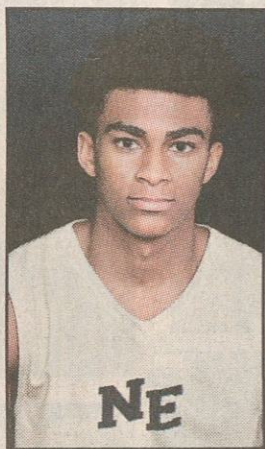
from Tigerland.

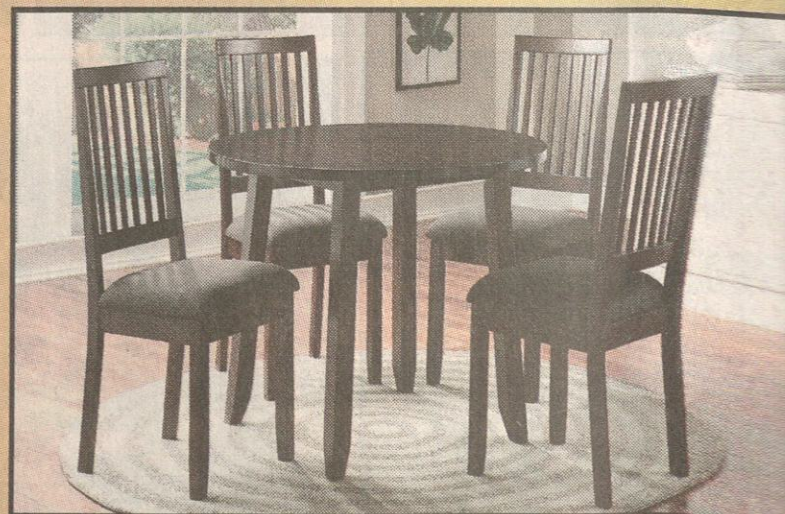
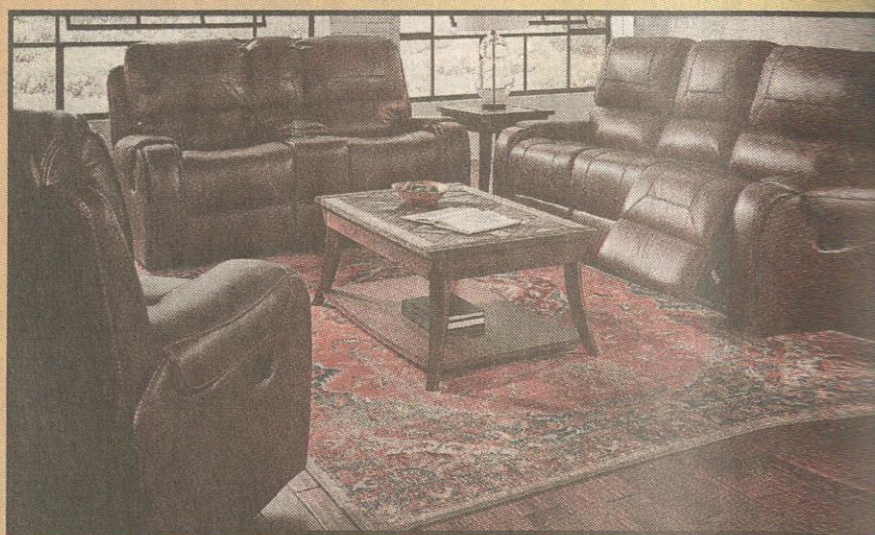
