This property will become the location of Mr. Little's newest Taco Bell, and his eighth overall in the surrounding area. The building will be a new structure built on the property, and the former Ford Dealership building located on the property will remain as is for rent or lease for additional businesses.

Mr. Little stated "I have been looking at investing in Iuka by bringing a Taco Bell to town for a long time, but struggled

with locating a suitable property that would meet our specific needs. In reaching out to Iuka's new Mayor, Joel Robertson, he was able to locate this property, put me in contact with the former owner, and we were able to move forward with the purchase of the site. Without Mayor Robertson's dedication and due diligence in working to make this happen, this project may not have come to fruition."

Iuka Woman Remains Missing After 17 Years

Seventeen years ago today, October 21, 2004, an Iuka woman dropped her daughter off at the Tishomingo County High School and was never seen again.

Her disappearance is today called a cold case by the MS Bureau of Investigation although her family still holds out hope that Donna Cupido will still be found.

According to reports, her daughter said Cupido was behaving normally that morning and promised to pick her up after school was over. She never picked her daughter up as scheduled and has never been heard from again. Her silver two-door 2001 Kia Sportage was later found abandoned behind the Apostolic Church on Highway 72 East of Iuka.

Cupido's family believes she

met with foul play, as it was uncharacteristic of her to leave without warning. Reports said she was having an extramarital affair at the time of her disappearance; both her husband and her lover took lie detector tests and passed.

Local law enforcement officers worked around the clock for weeks hunting Mrs. Cupido around the area her car had been found. Many leads came in to the Iuka Police Department but they led nowhere.

Donna Cupido, was a white female, 5 foot 9 inches, 135 lbs. with blond hair and green eyes. She had a butterfly tattoo on her right shoulder and would now be 61 years old. She and her husband Brian had left Alberta, Canada to move to Iuka with his business and had lived



here eight years before her disappearance.

Seventeen years later her family still looks for her each day and asks that anyone who might have information about the case call the MBI, the Tishomingo County Sheriff's office, or the Iuka Police Department.

National Take Back Day

Tishomingo County Sheriff's Office is taking back unwanted prescription drugs Saturday, October 23, 2021, at the Sheriff's Office located at 1208 Bettydale Drive, Iuka, MS.

[Iuka, MS] - On Saturday, October 23rd, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Office is participating in the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration's National Prescription Drug Take Back Day. This is a day for citizens within the county to properly dispose of expired/unwanted prescription medication.

The National Prescription Drug Take Back Day addresses a crucial public safety and public health issue. According to the 2019 National Survey on Drug Use and Health 9.7 million people misused prescription pain relievers, 4.9 million people misused prescription stimulants, and 5.9 million people misused prescription tranquilizers or sedatives. The survey showed the majority of misused prescription drugs were obtained from family members and friends, often from the home medicine cabinet.

The DEA's National Prescription Drug Take Back Day event provides an opportunity for citizens to prevent drug addiction, theft, and overdose deaths. The Tishomingo County Sheriff's Office is giving our citizens the opportunity to safely dispose of these medications on Saturday, October 23rd at 1208 Bettydale Drive, Iuka, MS. (Sites cannot accept liquids, or needles, only pills or patches.) The service is free and anonymous, no questions asked. This will provide the pub-



lic the opportunity to prevent pill abuse and theft by ridding their homes of potentially dangerous expired, unused, and unwanted prescription drugs. Bring your pills for disposal to the Sheriff's Office at 1208 Bettydale Drive, Iuka, MS. (Sites cannot accept liquids, needles, or sharps, only pills or patches.) The service is free and anonymous, no questions asked.

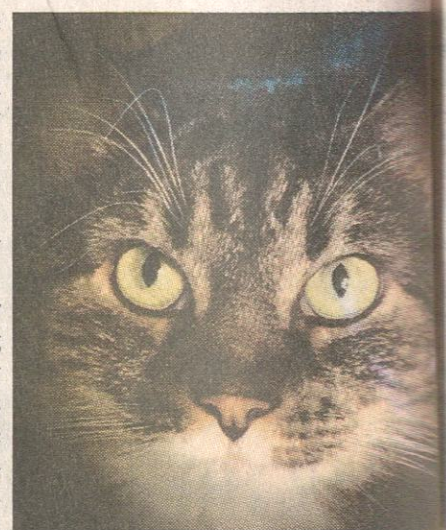

they had not been in contact since then. Believing that "when a story comes to you, it comes for a reason," Meredith decided on the spot to meet with the Vuncannon family to offer condolences and give his thanks for Larry Joe's service and protection. Needing a place to meet, they called the Iuka Public Library to arrange to use the meeting space, and the group assembled at the library.

James Meredith made a promise to the Lord to go to every county in his

home state, and he is currently on a tour through Mississippi to talk about his Bible Society Mission—an effort to spread teachings of Christian morality to uplift Mississippians. Although his purpose for visiting the library was to honor Mr. Vuncannon's service, Meredith donned a "New Miss®" baseball cap and graciously shared an intimate recounting of his experience at the University of Mississippi, taking the opportunity to also explain what the idea of "New Miss®" means to him. He gave his perspective on the heightened racial tensions currently plaguing our country and

talked about his optimism for the future of Mississippi. He took time to share how religion has impacted him throughout his life, recounting childhood memories of memorizing the books of the Bible. Mr. Meredith concluded his visit by taking pictures and signing memorabilia, including his memoir Mission from God which is housed at the library. The Iuka Library was deeply honored to welcome this former and current Civil Rights pioneer, and we thank to the Vuncannon family for allowing us to facilitate this meeting and to hear first-hand from one of the pioneers of the era.

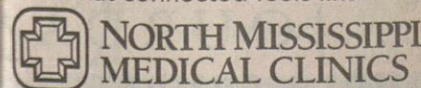

37-48; Most of the minor prophets; Matthew chapter 24; Mark chapter 13; Luke chapter 21 etc.) When Jesus comes to rule and reign on earth, there will be no attempts at crucifying Him again; there will be no rebels with an ability to overthrow His government; there will be no people who say: "All that teaching about Jesus' rule on earth is 'spiritual', and not to be taken literally!

Isaiah 11:10-12 says, "And in that day there shall be a root of Jesse, Which shall stand for an ensign of the people; to it shall the Gentiles seek: and His rest shall be glorious. And it shall come to pass in that day, that the Lord shall

set His hand again the second time to recover the remnant of His people, which shall be left, from Assyria, and from Egypt, and from Pathros, and from Cush, and from Elam, and from Shinar, and from Hamath, and from the islands of the sea. And He shall set up an ensign for the nations, and shall assemble the outcasts of Israel, and gather together the dispersed of Judah from the four corners of the earth." The root of Jesse is clearly the Lord Jesus Christ, Who will stand for an ensign (meaning a flag or token) of His people Israel. The Gentiles, which is the same word

in Hebrew as "nations", will seek a relationship with Jesus and Israel, and the rest that Jesus will give will be glorious. Should anyone doubt that Jesus Christ will do what our verses are saying, I might ask: "What nation do you know that has been out of its land for over 2500 years, and then returned to it (in 1948), except Israel?" God has a plan for that nation and the world concerning the Messiah, even if most of Israel is now still in unbelief, but that will change in the tribulation! We are seeing a "second" time of recovery for God's people Israel, so we are not here seeing their return to the land after the Babylonian captivity, but a later time, which is still future. The LORD will gather His people from all the countries where they have been scattered, as well as from

the islands of the sea. Our verses say that He will gather them from the four corners of the earth, or every place and direction! If God does not restore Israel, then Bible prophets wasted time and writing materials saying that He will restore them!

Cargo Ships — America's old jobs floating at sea

Cargo ships waiting to unload at the Ports of Los Angeles and Long Beach California could keep some of America's store shelves bare for a while. These two ports handle the bulk of cargo coming from China. Cargo keeps coming from China, making the congestion craziness only worse. The dozens of ships floating in the Pacific are carrying products that used to be some of America's good paying jobs.

Today, about 90% of non-bulk cargo worldwide is transported by container. Modern container ships carry over 21,000 TEUs and rival crude oil tankers as the largest commercial vessels on the ocean. A TEU (twenty-foot equivalent unit) is a measure of volume in units of twenty-foot-long containers. If you have ever seen any of these cargo ships come into the port at Savannah, Georgia, or these California ports then you know its mind blowing the amount of cargo stacked and transported across the ocean.

General cargo vessels carry packaged items like chemicals, foods, furniture, machinery, motor vehicles, shoes, clothing and more. Dry bulk carriers carry coal, grain, ore and other similar products. Reefer ships are refrigerated ships which specifically carry perishable commodities such as fruits, vegetables, meats and dairy products. Roll-on ships are designed to carry wheeled cargo, such as cars, trucks, semi-trailer trucks, trailers, and railroad cars, that are driven on and off the ship on their own wheels.

China's exports to the United States were \$452.58 Billion during 2020, according to the United Nations COM-TRADE database on international trade. The top goods exported from China to the U.S. and their total values for 2018 were electrical machinery (\$152 billion), machinery (\$117 billion), furniture and bedding (\$35 billion), toys and sports equipment (\$27 billion), and plastics (\$19 billion).

Japan's exports to the United States were \$118.79 Billion during 2020, according to the United Nations COM-TRADE database on international trade. These

products are vehicles, machinery, electronics, optical and medical, aircraft, pharmaceuticals, plastics, rubbers, toys, games and sports equipment.

United States Imports from Germany were \$117.39 Billion during 2020, according to the United Nations COM-TRADE database on international trade. We import most of the same products from Germany as we do Japan including \$78 billion dollars in mineral fuels including oil.

We continue to hear about all the job openings in the United States. Amazon needs employees, Federal Express, UPS and all the trucking companies are begging for workers. I've seen several big banners on trucks begging for drivers at a starting salary of \$2,500 a week. Walmart advertises all the time for truckers with a beginning salary of \$84,000 a year. There is obviously a lot of work in delivering goods from the shipping ports of America. The shipping ports are all products made in China,

Japan, Germany, and other places. We have and are pumping these countries with billions and billions of dollars.

We hear a lot about infrastructure. We need good roads and bridges, Internet, new pipe lines throughout America to carry our water supply and American made chips for our cars, computers and phones and more. We also must start making all the products just mentioned in America. Our President and Congress must give companies every opportunity in reasonable tax breaks and incentives to compete with foreign countries. If we can bring manufacturing back to the United States then we will return to real jobs in this country that pay enough money for people to raise a family, own a car and save for retirement. Until this happens Americans will only see increasing financial hardships and more jobs floating away.

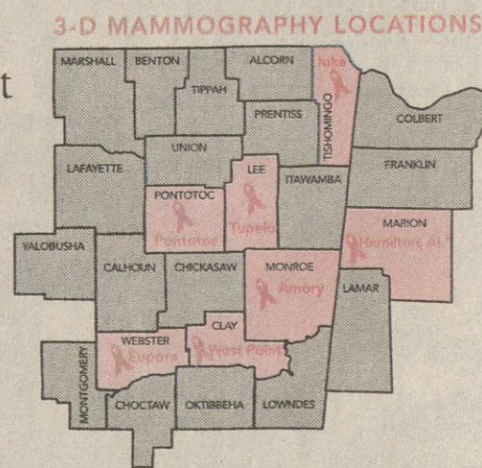

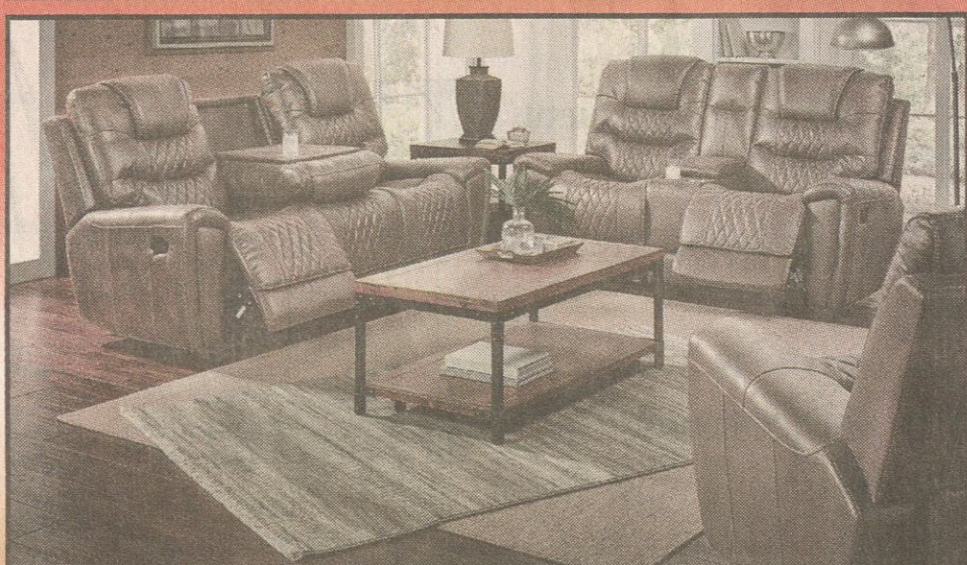
