Shooting Death **Under Investigation**

One Tishomingo County man is dead following a shooting which occurred on Friday, November 26th; the case is currently under investigation by law enforcement.

After a call to 911 Friday evening, Deputies of the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department responded to a residence at 63 County Road 246 (Snowdown) in Iuka. The initial report indicated there was a fight and shooting which resulted in inju-

According to Tishomingo County Sheriff John Daugherty, multiple witnesses stated that Michael Ray Thacker, age 60, got into an argument with a family member and retrieved a gun and began firing at the family member and another male who was present at the scene. The male returned fire, striking Michael Ray Thacker; 911 was then

Talking Taxes

With the 2021 tax bills going out soon, I wanted to take this opportunity to let everyone know that there will be some changes that affect the tax bills. This year, 2021, was our update year,in which our new index must be implemented. This index must be updated every 4 years, as required by the Mississippi Department of Revenue. The index is affected by new homes built within the county in 2020 and added to the tax roll for 2021. The index ensures that building cost is area specific to our county and not across other areas of the state. The index affects the square foot cost of homes, buildings and structures. We are required to do this every 4 years in order to stay in compliance with the regulations of the Mississippi Department of Revenue.

This is also the year new land schedules had to be put into place. During our 2017 audit, we were made aware that these new land schedules must be implemented by the 2021 update year. These land values are based on sales information that we have compiled, over the last 4 years, from sales letters sent in by the citizens of Tishomingo County. These sales letters are required by Mississippi Department of Revenue and help us to keep up with market value of property being sold within our county. Unfortunately, these changes and updates are required by the Mississippi Department of Revenue and are beyond our control. We hope that this will give you a better understanding of the reasons for these changes.

I'm very much a hands-on person. We have four classes of professional pharmacy students, as well as graduate students, so I made sure that the Monday and Tuesday of that very next week I had five meetings scheduled, and any of those students could attend.

All school is difficult, but when you get to professional school, especially pharmacy school, it can be demanding and stressful. The work and expectations can be rigorous and challenging, so there is already a lot on our students' plates. Then you add these outside factors - meaningless, dreadful acts of violence towards people of marginalized groups, feelings of unsafety for themselves and the ones they love, pressures to act, which are huge and stressful for our students. A lot of people don't understand that students car-

ry that weight around. Another challenging example related to inclusion is the pandemic. It of course impacted our second-, third- and fourthyear students, but they at least already knew each other. Our first-year students did not. We worked to find creative ways for our first-year students to get to know each other because we were doing hybrid learning, so some classes were over Zoom and some classes were in person.I truly believe in inclusion, and it's a big part of my job. Inclusion is thinking about students, staff, colleagues and even alumni. I work to understand how we can support anyone who walks through our doors, and that is integral to the DEI

In addition to my role as Associate Dean for Diversity and Inclusion, I have the opportunity to practice in pediatrics every Friday. Most of the time I am in the neonatal intensive care unit (NICU) and rounding with that team. I'm their pharmacist, so I come in and look over all the patients, mainly focusing on medicationrelated issues. There are pharmacists, physicians, physician's assistants, nurse practitioners, the nurse who takes care of the patient, dietitians and social worker on the team. All of us, each person using their talents and expertise, work together to determine the best plan for each patient.

During the pandemic, we also activated the mobile vaccine clinics where we went to underserved communities in Lexington. I was able to volunteer at multiple clinics and was happy to bring potentially life-saving vaccines to those who are often overlooked. This effort is important to me, and I think it's even more important for people of color to see a person of color in

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF TISHOMINGO COUNTY, MISSISSIPPI, DECLAR-ING THE INTENTION TO ISSUE GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS OF THE COUNTY, TO ISSUE A GEN-ERAL OBLIGATION BOND OF THE COUNTY FOR SALE TO THE MISSISSIPPI DEVELOPMENT BANK, OR TO ENTER INTO A LOAN AGREEMENT WITH THE MISSISSIPPI DEVELOPMENT BANK, IN PRIN-CIPAL AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$6,000,000, IN ONE OR MORE SERIES, TO PROVIDE FUNDS FOR THE PURPOSE OF CONSTRUCTING, RECONSTRUCTING, AND REPAIRING ROADS, HIGHWAYS AND BRIDGES, AND ACQUIRING THE NECESSARY LAND, INCLUDING LAND FOR ROAD BUILDING MATERIALS, ACQUIRING RIGHTS-OF-WAY THEREFOR, AND FOR THE PURCHASE OF HEAVY CON-STRUCTION EQUIPMENT AND ACCESSORIES THERETO REASONABLY REQUIRED TO CONSTRUCT, REPAIR, AND RENOVATE ROADS, HIGHWAYS, AND BRIDGES AND APPROACHES THERETO WITHIN THE COUNTY; AND PURCHASING MACHINERY AND EQUIPMENT WHICH HAVE AN EXPECTED USE-FUL LIFE IN EXCESS OF 10 YEARS; DIRECTING PUBLICATION OF NOTICE OF SUCH INTENTION; AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES.

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi (the "Governing Body" of the "County"), acting for and on behalf of the County, hereby finds, determines, adjudicates, and declares as follows

1. It is necessary and in the public interest to issue debt obligations of the County to provide funds for the purpose of (i) constructing, reconstructing, and repairing roads, highways, and bridges, and acquiring the necessary land, including land for road building materials, acquiring rights-of-way therefor, and for the purchase of heavy construction equipment and accessories thereto reasonably required to construct, repair, and renovate roads, highways, and bridges and approaches thereto within the County; and purchasing machinery and equipment which have an expected useful life in excess of 10 years (the "Authorized Purposes");(ii) funding a capitalized interest account, if necessary; and, (iii) paying the costs of the authorization, issuance, sale, validation, and delivery of the debt obligations (together,

2. The County is authorized by Sections 1991 et seq., Mississippi Code of 1972, as amended (the "County Improvements Act"), to issue general obligation bonds of the County in an amount not to exceed the principal amount of \$6,000,000, in one or more series (the "Bonds"), for the Project, and for which purpose there are no other available

3. The assessed value of all taxable property within the County, according to the last completed assessment for taxation, is \$187,733,636. The County has outstanding bonded indebtedness subject to the 15% debt limit prescribed by the County Improvements Act, in the amount of\$3,780,000, and outstanding bonded and floating indebtedness subject to the 20% debt limit prescribed by the County Improvements Act (which amount includes the sum set forth above subject to the 15% debt limit), in the amount of\$3,780,000. The issuance of the bonded indebtedness hereinafter proposed to be issued, when added to the outstanding bonded indebtedness of the County, will not result in bonded indebtedness, exclusive of indebtedness not subject to the aforesaid 15% debt limit, of more than 15% of the assessed value of taxable property within the County, and will not result in indebtedness, both bonded and floating, exclusive of indebtedness not subject to the aforesaid 20% debt limit, in excess of 20% of the assessed value of taxable property within the County, and will not exceed any constitutional or statutory limitation upon indebtedness which may be incurred by the County.

4. Under the provisions of the County Improvements Act, Sections 31-25-1 et seq., Mississippi Code of 1972, as amended (the "Bank Act"), and other applicable laws of the State of Mississippi (the "State"), the County is authorized to undertake activities for the Project and to provide for the payment of the costs thereof, or any portion of such costs, by issuing a general obligation bond or general obligation bonds of the County in an amount not to exceed the principal amount of \$6,000,000, in one or more series, for the Project(the "Qualified Obligation"), for sale to the Mississippi Development Bank (the "Bank"), or entering into a loan agreement and obtaining a loan from the Bank for the Project in an amount not to exceed the principal amount of \$6,000,000, in one or more series (the "Loan")

5. The County reasonably expects that it will incur expenditures for the Project for which the County will advance internal funds prior to the issuance of theBonds, the Qualified Obligation, or the Loan, and that it should declare its official intent to reimburse itself for all or a portion of such expenditures of the Project made in anticipation of the issuance of the Bonds, the Qualified Obligation, or the Loan

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE COUNTY AS FOLLOWS: SECTION 1. This resolution is adopted pursuant to the County Improvements Act, the Bank Act, and other ap-

SECTION 2. The Governing Body, acting for and on behalf of the County, does hereby declare its intention to issue and sell the Bonds or the Qualified Obligationor enter into the Loan, pursuant to the Act.

The Bondsor the Qualified Obligation, if issued, will be general obligations payable as to principal and interest out of and secured by an irrevocable pledge of the avails of a tax to be levied annually, if necessary, upon all the taxable property within the geographical limits of the County, which tax, together with any other moneys available for such purpose, shall be sufficient to provide for the payment of the principal of and the interest on the Bonds according to the terms thereof. The Loan, if issued, will be payable from the legally available revenues of the County. Other funds available to the County which may be lawfully used for payment of the principal of and interest on the Bonds, Qualified Obligation, or the Loan, if issued, include, but are not limited to, use taxes remitted from the State to the County as a result of the Infrastructure Modernization Act of 2018, House Bill 1, 2018 First Extraordinary

SECTION 4. Pursuant to Section 1.150-2 of the Treasury Regulations (the "Reimbursement Regulations"), the Governing Body hereby declares its official intent to reimburse expenditures made for the Project prior to the issuance of the Bonds, the Qualified Obligation, or the Loan with the proceeds of the Bonds, the Qualified Obligation, or the Loan, to the extent permitted by the Reimbursement Regulations.

SECTION 5 The Governing Body proposes to direct the issuance of the Bonds, the Qualified Obligation, or the Loan in the amount, for the purpose, and secured as aforesaid, at a meeting of the Governing Body to be held at its regular meeting place and time in the Courthouse of the County located at 1008 Battleground Drivein the City ofluka, Mississippi, at 8:30 a.m. onDecember 6, 2021, or at some meeting held subsequent thereto. If 20%, or 1,500, whichever is less, of the qualified electors of the County shall file with the Chancery Clerk of the County a written protest against the issuance of the Bonds, the Qualified Obligation, or the Loan on or before the aforesaid date and hour, then the Bonds, the Qualified Obligation, or the Loan shall not be issued unless authorized at an electionto be called and held as provided by law on the question of the issuance of the Bonds, the Qualified Obligation, or the Loan. If no sufficient protest is filed, then the Bonds, the Qualified Obligation, or the Loan may be issued without an election on the question of the issuance thereof at any time within a period of 2 years after the date above specified.

SECTION 6. This resolution shall be published once a week for at least 3 consecutive weeks in the Tishomingo County News, located inthe City of luka, Mississippi, a newspaper published in and having a general circulation in the County and qualified under the provisions of Section 13-3-31, Mississippi Code of 1972, as amended. The first publication of this resolution shall be made not less than 21 days prior to the date fixed herein for the issuance of the Bonds, the Qualified Obligation, or the Loan, and the last publication shall be made not more than 7 days prior to such

SECTION 7. The Chancery Clerk shall be and is hereby directed to procure from the publisher of the aforesaid newspaper the customary proof of the publication of this resolution and have the same before the Governing Body on the date and hour specified in Section 5 hereof.

SECTION 8. If any one or more of the provisions of this resolution shall for any reason be held to be illegal or invalid, such illegality or invalidity shall not affect any of the other provisions of this resolution, but this resolution shall be construed and enforced as if such illegal or invalid provision or provisions had not been contained herein.

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
