School Opens Next Monday

Tishomingo County Schools will begin the second semester of the 2020-2021 school year with teachers reporting back to work on January 7th and January 8th for professional development.

Students will return to school on Monday, January 11, 2021. The district will continue its current schedule of traditional learning on Monday through Thursday and virtual learning on Friday at this time.

"With COVID numbers still high and with the holiday season just ending, we will continue our current schedule," stated superintendent Christie Holly. The district moved to all virtual learning at the end of the first semester due to an increase in numbers of staff and students in quarantine. Paper packets were sent home with students who did not have devices. "In order for students to be counted present for days in virtual/distance learning, completed packets must be returned to school on January 11th. Otherwise, students must be counted as absent if they didn't complete the work

and if they didn't respond to teacher communication during that time," explained Holly.

The district was able to complete the majority of the semester with very little school transmission of the virus. "It is a huge testament to our people-custodians, food service employees, bus drivers, nurses, teachers, staff, administrators, students, and parents- that allowed us to have a relatively normal first semester. The cleaning protocols, screening, masks, hand washing/sanitizing, scheduling, and many other strategies with social distancing have been effective in reducing school transmission," stated Holly. "We know the holidays may present a spike in community cases which means an impact on our students. We encourage parents to keep children at home if any symptoms appear that may indicate a possible COVID diagnosis.

We look forward to seeing our students on January 11th, but we want to ensure we keep our schools as safe as possible during this time," Holly stated.

Young Iuka Man Killed in Accident

A two vehicle accident on Monday morning in Burnsville claimed the life of 26-year-old Dakota Lynn Nelson of 208 Pickwick Circle in Iuka.

According to Tishomingo County Deputy Coroner, James Rich, the accident happened around 11:40 a.m. on Hwy. 72 in front of the old J. C. Lambert Hardware building in Burnsville.

Rich said Nelson was driving east on 72 when he apparently crossed the highway median into the oncoming west-bound traffic and was struck by a truck hauling industrial CO2 tanks. The driver of the NexAir truck was not injured.

A female passenger, Maggie Coleman, in the Nelson car was air lifted to Tupelo and remains in critical condition.



According to Rich, the wreck is under the investigation of the Mississippi Highway Patrol.

Graveside services for Dakota will be held Friday, January 8, 2021 at 2:00 p.m. at Magnolia Gardens in Corinth. Visitation will be Thursday from 5:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. at Magnolia Funeral Home-South. Bro. Shane Woodruff will officiate the service.

Dakota was born April 15, 1994 and was of the Christian faith. He was a construction worker and much loved by his many friends.



What Six Dollars Can Do

When I was sixteen years old, I was invited to speak at a little country church in rural Denton, not far from Paintsville.

The church had all but closed its doors but one man, Harold Rice, and his family wanted to see the church stay open and do well.

A church with few to almost no people typically does not attract too many interested ministers. I had spoken in my home church a few times and was a guest speaker in a few others. Mr. Rice asked if I would consider speaking at the church on the second and fourth Sunday afternoons at 2:00. I agreed, and brought a message to maybe seven or eight people my first Sunday. The crowd consisted of Harold and his wife June Rice and their family. The church was an old building with a pump organ and a sign behind the pulpit that said, "Preach the Word."

I stayed with the little congregation called Liberty Baptist Church throughout high school. By the time I was seventeen Mr. Rice was talking to me about being the official pastor and about ordination. In time I would become the pastor and would be ordained. I was too young, too inexperienced and unskilled for such a responsibility but youth is adventurous

and will try what those of us who know better would never consider.

The church grew and we started having 20 to 30 people and often more. People literally received Christ, joined the church and were baptized. This was all amazing.

Even more amazing was Mr. Rice offering me a grand salary of \$60 a month to help buy my gasoline. The trip one way from home was over 30 miles so this was appreciated. He also presented me with paperwork for a perk. The church was going to put 10 percent or \$6 of my salary into the church denominational retirement plan, then known as The Annuity Board. Its called Guidestone today. He had me to complete a form solidifying my agreement to this monthly contribution. I was about seventeen at this stage and had zero interest or thoughts about retirement. Six dollars a month kind of seemed like a joke.

I was with Liberty church a couple of years or more and about ten to twelve of those months Mr. Rice made that \$6 contribution to my retirement faithfully. Although, I never thought another day about it from the moment I signed those papers.

Seven or eight years

ago I did wonder if that account even existed. I called up The Guidestone retirement people and with my Social Security number they told me in a few seconds that the account did indeed exist and my balance was \$31,000. Shocked would not describe how I felt. I almost had to pick myself off the floor. If Mr. Rice had made as many as 12 contributions the total invested would have been \$72. Now, years later I was looking at over \$31,000. Since that day of first inquiring that little \$6 account now has over \$46,000 and still growing.

The point of this is save some money when you can. Start young as possible even if you are old something away each month. If you can save hundreds of months that is wonderful, please do. However, do ever underestimate the growth potential of saving a little bit of money every month, even if just \$6. And yes, even time I look at that account, I remember Mr. Rice and the good people of Liberty Baptist Church who not only encouraged me then but are still encouraging me today with just \$6.

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Governor Reeves Announces COVID-19 Vaccine Measures

JACKSON — Governor Tate Reeves announced the decision to allow the most vulnerable Mississippians to have access sooner than expected to the COVID-19 vaccine. Next week, individuals 65 and older will have availability to the vaccine. The following week, Mississippians 65 and older will have the

next available access. The Executive order 1535 is still in effect until 5pm January 15th, 2021. The following counties are currently under a county wide mask mandates after meeting the certain requirements in relation to COVID-19: Adams, Alcorn,

Amite, Attala, Benton, Bolivar, Calhoun, Carroll, Chickasaw, Choctaw, Clarke, Clay, Coahoma, Copiah, Covington, De Soto, Forrest, Franklin, George, Greene, Grenada, Hancock, Harrison, Hinds, Holmes, Humphreys, Itawamba, Jackson, Jasper, Jefferson, Jefferson Davis,

Jones, Kemper, Lafayette, Lamar, Lauderdale, Lawrence, Leake, Lee, Leflore, Lincoln, Lowndes, Madison, Marion, Marshall, Monroe, Montgomery, Neshoba, Newton, Noxubee, Oktibbeha, Panola, Pearl River, Perry, Pike, Pontotoc, Prentiss, Quitman, Rankin, Scott, Simpson, Smith,

Stone, Sunflower, Tallahatchie, Tate, Tippah, Tishomingo, Union, Walthall, Warren, Washington, Wayne, Webster, Wilkinson, Winston, Yazoo and Yazoo Counties. As of now, 78 of Mississippi's 82 counties are under mask mandates. "The most impor-

tant task that we have is getting the vaccine out to the public. That is our only way out of all this," Governor Tate Reeves said. "I still believe everyone should continue to take social distancing seriously."

The Year 2020 Remembered in Tishomingo County

The year 2020 began every year, black-eyed peas, the Rose Parade, and firecrackers. But little did we know that 2020 would be one of the most unforgettable years in recent history. Slowly the good times celebrated on January 1 gave way to a tragic pandemic that touched the whole world and made 2020 a year that ended with Christmas ornaments saying, "I survived 2020."

The world was hit by a new virus that has caused death and fear throughout. COVID-19 is the name given by the World Health Organization (WHO) on February 11, 2020 for the disease caused by the novel coronavirus SARS-CoV2. It started in Wuhan, China in late 2019 and has since spread worldwide. COVID-19 is an acronym that stands for coronavirus disease of 2019.

COVID-19 is the disease caused by the SARS-CoV2 virus. Viruses and the diseases they cause have different names. For example, AIDS is the disease caused by the human immunodeficiency virus, HIV. On December 31, 2019, a strange new pneumonia of unknown cause was reported to the Chinese WHO Country Office. A cluster of these cases originally appeared in Wuhan, a city in the Hubei Province of China. These infections were found to be caused by a new coronavirus which was given the name "2019 novel coronavirus" (2019-nCoV).

It was later renamed severe acute respiratory syndrome coronavirus 2, or SARS-CoV2 by the International Committee on Taxonomy of Viruses on February 11, 2020. It was named SARS-CoV2 because the virus is a genetic cousin of the coronavirus which caused the SARS outbreak in 2002 (SARS-CoV).

It was not until April 2 that the first confirmed case of COVID-19 hit Tishomingo County. From that day on, our world, as we knew it, would never be the same.

Many of our friends and neighbors have died this year, but as the year closed we saw the development of a vaccine for this strange new virus. Hopefully, 2021 will be a great, new year with less isolation and worry!

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



I Remember

"If I had known down through the years what I know now, I wouldn't have worked nearly as hard to stay young." Age is just a number. I can reverse my 96 to 69 and I'm still the same.

Let me explain my introduction sentence. I'm not the originator of the thought, but it fits my situation perfectly.

This year, with me, because of the care of my son and daughter, I have had so much help. The little garden, working, picking, mowing, and for the first time in many years I have not had help cleaning the house. Because of the corona virus and Angie and I have survived. I could do more than I thought I could.

They have taken care of the grocery shopping as well as all the miscellaneous items. Appointments to the hospital, physical therapy, doctors, and other needs have been



covered. All I've had to do is just give a hint of my wants and they become "needs" with the kids.

What a blessing. They have tried as hard as they can to keep me safe and I'm thankful. This dreadful scourge of corona virus, covid 19 has taken some of my friends.

What hurts us oldies the most is not being able to visit, cook for the family, go to the viewing and funeral to pay our respects to our friends and family. No way now and it really

hurts. Then you can't send a sympathy card because you don't know the address. So many obstacles. So much for restrictions. God is still in control and He will see us through this ordeal.

I wanted to touch on the vaccines that they are giving now. They are distributed to those who care for us first as it should be. Someone asked me yesterday if I was going to take the hopefully preventive shot. My reply, "you better believe I am when it becomes available to me."

I remember in the 1930's, a vaccine become available for typhoid fever. The Tishomingo County Health doctor and a couple of nurses came to the rural schools and gave the shots.

The dates would be set up and word spread around in the communities. Mothers and a few dads brought their children and we were scared to death. I remember most

of the children would hide their faces in their mothers' arms. Some had to be manually held down and some just fell to the floor screaming. This did not please the doctor nor the nurses. I believe it was Dr. Hainey and it scared the rest of us. You can rest assured that the four Page kids didn't "show out" or we would have gotten worse than a shot when we got home.

My mother could wield a peach tree switch better than any mom in our community. She had plenty of practice on my brother, George Robert Jr. and me. I'm sure we needed every whipping we ever got. We could get into more things than I can remember. But remember we wore dresses back then and our legs showed stripes the next day at school. That's what hurt. Today, mothers would be locked up if they left stripes. We, as parents, need to remember

the Bible teaches us to correct a child when they are young and (paraphrase) they'll become a man or lady."Spare the rod and spoil the child."

Washington is not the reason our nation is experiencing the problem we have. We are, a simple rule/law "Don't litter!" Yet our highways an our country roads are filled with litter.
