Governor Tate Reeves Makes Statement on COVID-19 Vaccine

JACKSON —Governor Tate Reeves made a statement in regards to the COVID-19 vaccine plan.

"Vaccines are rolling out across the US. That's great news. The bad news: it's not going nearly fast enough (at least here). I said that on Monday, and I said we were working on plans to eliminate roadblocks. Here are some of the problems and solutions discussed behind the scenes:

We had around 78K doses that were marked by the federal government for long term care facilities. State government was basically removed from that part of the process—direct delivery. Only around 2% had been given. That worried me.

I spent the week meeting with people in long term care/nursing homes. At every one of their facilities they had dates scheduled for vaccinations. They complimented the professionalism and

believe 100% of first doses will be done by the end of the month. Makes me feel much better.

We've had around 30K doses out at hospitals that had not been reported administered. It's hard to say whether that's a delay in actually delivering the vaccine on their end, or a reporting error. I want more information and accountability there. That's coming.

Drive-through clinics have been a huge point of success. It's still early, but the ones we've stood up have worked. I've been talking with the team, and here's what we're doing with that lesson: Doubling the number of those vaccine sites. Double the number of days open. Double the number of appointments at each site per day.

That should make our max possible number of appointments go from 8,000 to 30,000 over the coming days.

We're also working on the customer service piece.

Elderly Mississippians—most vulnerable to the virus—can't rely on apps and social media. We're increasing call center capacity as we speak, so you can speak with a real person and get accurate information.

When we have a problem in Mississippi, my goal is always the same: be honest about it. Try to fix it, not hide it. Keep you up to date.

If you want a vaccine, you should have quick, simple access. Government logistics should not stand in your way.

Shutdowns are done. This is the mission now. We can't lose precious months to debate over who is more essential. We need to quickly get this out to everyone we can. Allow people to protect themselves. Then open this country back up—wide open! Get back to life without this fear! away! God bless!"

Christmas in the South During the 1800's

The Daughters of the Confederacy, John Marshall Stone Chapter is still not meeting in person but holding their meeting by phone. As you can guess we do not have any new business except that we have some inquiries about membership.

Our December program was Christmas in the South during the 1800's.

By the mid-1800's the American Christmas tradition included much of the same customs and activities as it does today, including tree decorating, gift-giving, Santa Claus, greeting cards, stockings by the fire, church activities and family-oriented days of feasting and fun.

Americans did not even begin to conceive of Christmas as a national holiday until the middle of the last century. Like many other such 'inventions of tradition', the creation of an American Christmas was a response to social and personal needs that arose at a particular point in history.

New Year's Eve, the fourth of July and, especially, Thanksgiving had their merits and partisans, but Christmas emerged as the most logical and affecting choice. By the 1850s, it had captured the northern imagination and was making inroads in the South.

The Civil War intensified Christmas' appeal. Its sentimental celebration of

family matched the yearnings of soldiers and those they left behind. Its message of peace and goodwill spoke to the most immediate prayers of all Americans.

Our own day, Christmas gift-giving has become the single most important sector of the consumer economy.

The Gilded Age, a time of particularly challenging social and economic upheaval, underlined the importance of family ties even as it threatened them. Gifts symbolized and helped secure these important relationships. The magazine Harper's gave early voice to the link between gifts and givers in 1856: 'Love is the moral of Christmas ... What are gifts but the proof and signs of love!'

Christmas was also a time to help those in need. It was but one larger step to extend those good feelings and generosity to the homeless, hungry and unemployed, and to target Christmas as the time for the amelioration of those conditions (or at least the assuaging of guilt over them). 'Nowhere in Christendom are the poor remembered at Christmas-tide as generously as they are in American cities.

Two books recommended to read about midcentury Christmas are "The Golden Christmas: A Tale of low country Life" By William Gilmore Simms and "A Plantation

Christmas" by Julia Peterkin.

The Golden Christmas" is an historical plantation romance by William Gilmore Simms, who is hailed in literary circles as the "father of Southern literature." Serialized in 1852 and then released as one volume, this short novel includes elements of both "Romeo and Juliet" and "A Christmas Carol."

"A Christmas Plantation" At the age 16, Julia Mood graduated from Converse College in Spartanburg, South Carolina; she earned her master's degree there a year later. She taught at the public school in Fort Motte, South Carolina for a few years, then married William George Peterkin in 1903. He was a planter who owned Lang Syne, a 2,000-acre (8.1 km²) cotton plantation near Fort Motte.[1] She began writing short stories, inspired by the everyday life and management of the plantation.

Our ancestors were celebrating Christmas much like we do except they didn't have the money that we have or all the decorations. Most of their gifts were homemade and fruit. The rich Plantation's Christmas during the Civil War served as a escape from and a reminder of the awful conflict rending the country into; the owners had more and had large celebrations.

I knew that she hadn't taught me the past four months and not know my writing. She gave no indication that she knew.

My friend Betty Ross Deaton and I always went to the campus and had our lunch together under a special tree. My conscious was killing me and I had to tell her, "I wrote that cheat-sheet and I've got to fess up." She agreed that was what I needed to do. Honest Betsy!

Mrs. Stephens always went to her house for her lunch. When she got about halfway from the building to the entrance gate, I stopped her and told her it was I who had written the article. She looked disappointed in me but didn't tell me she already knew. She said she was so surprised that I would do that, but she thanked me for coming and sharing what I had done. I felt so ashamed and began to cry. She began to hug me and she wept too. She was assured I wouldn't ever do that again, and in that manner I didn't.

"Honest confession is good for the soul" even though at the time it hurts.



My classmate apologized for getting me involved. Neither of us had to cheat. This incident made me not only a better student but taught me "cheating for myself or cheating to help someone else is wrong." Whether you know it or not? "Someone is watching you and wants to be just like you." It would be a shame to disappoint them by sinful living. I didn't mean to preach, but "Thou shall not steal" the good book says. Exodus 20:15.

Lessons On Life From The Prophet Isaiah (part 5)

Isaiah speaks in a manner that is not hard to understand concerning the sins of Israel and Judah. Yet even the chastening hand of God had not brought His people to their senses concerning their need to repent of their wrongdoing. Isaiah 1:5 says, "Why should you be stricken any more? Ye will revolt more and more: the whole head is sick, and the whole heart faint." Notice that God has become tired of trying to correct Israel by His judgments that are like a whip on the backs of fools! If the straying nation does not receive correction, then the only thing left is judgment for it. That seems rather harsh to some, I suppose, but it is a biblical fact. All that is necessary to understand God's way of

dealing with the sins of nations, or individuals, is a reading of the Bible, for even a casual reading will prove the point that God does deal with those who continue to follow their own sinful ways, even after God's efforts to correct them. So, God has decided, by Isaiah's time, that there is no need to keep prodding His people to repent. God said that they would simply revolt more and more. It is interesting that nations seem to pattern after each other, at least most of the time, so that more modern nations

have not actually learned much about God's dealing with ancient nations!

Now God says that Israel is "sick in the head and heart". When He says the whole head is sick, He is saying that the nation of Israel cannot seem to get her head "screwed on straight", for their mental faculty has had a breakdown due to sickness. When God mentions the word "sick", He is saying that they have a disease of the brain, at least when it comes to thinking on spiritual matters. It is not hard to understand that

we have some very brilliant minds in our world today, but a part of a brilliant mind is malfunctioning, if that mind does not consider the place of God in the world and in the individual lives of men! It might be worth some consideration for us to think about what we put into our minds. So much of what one may see in the media world speaks against what we need in our spiritual makeup. Then there is the other problem that Israel had, for their hearts were also faint. The word "heart" is used to speak about the innermost part of our being. It deals with the desires we have and the emphasis we put on accomplishing those desires, either good or bad. If the heart is faint, meaning "troubled", it will be unable to rightly

calculate what is really important in life. The heart is used figurative to mean the real point from which all else in life gets its direction. If the heart is faint, the direction will be unclear, and this is what was wrong in Israel during the time of Isaiah, and I could say that America and the nations of the world today have the same problem, at least to some degree. It is interesting that God gets tired of having to correct a nation, or an individual, on a continual basis, so that He will finally allow either a nation or individual to do their own thing, but also to suffer its consequences!

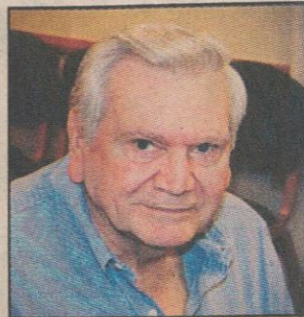
Molly Jordan

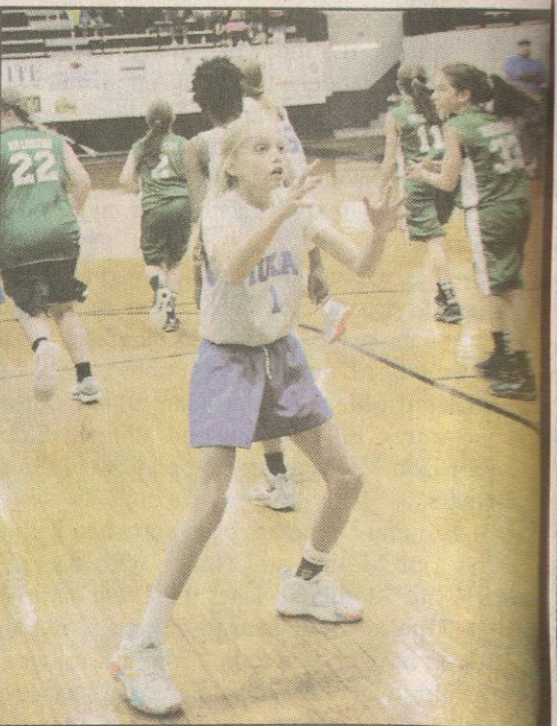
