Internet services provided through Tishomingo Connect, LLC will be available soon as the company makes plans to launch its operation in 2021.

2020 brought many challenges to the world. One of the needs brought to light during the pandemic is the need for fast, reliable internet. Tishomingo Connect, LLC has been

working hard to prepare to fill this need across its parent company, Tishomingo County Electric Power Association's, service territory. After months of building fiber and setting up a reliable network, Connect is very near beginning hooking up customers with fiber internet. Please visit tishomingoconnect.com to see a tentative timeline and build out schedule.

Connect will offer two packages for residential service. 200 Mbps/200 Mbps for \$60 and 1 Gbps/1Gbps for \$80. Home phone can be added for \$25 per line. The high download and equal upload speed, reliability,

and local support is going to be some of the strong suits of Tishomingo Connect, LLC. If you are interested in service, please visit tishomingoconnect.com and pre-register. If you do not have internet access, please call our office at 662.423.3646, and we will assist you.

There is no obligation with pre-registering, and if you change your mind about which

package you want, or if you choose to not take the service at all, you will have a chance to take care of this before any installation takes place. If you are pre-registered, someone will call you to schedule your fiber drop and then again to schedule your home installation when we are in your area. A Tragic Vehicle Accident Left One Dead Saturday Morning

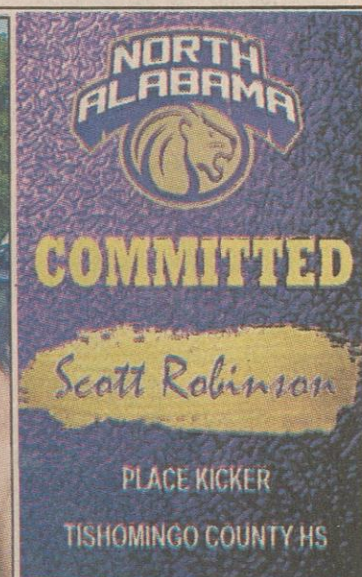
A one vehicle accident claimed the life of an individual believed to be from Tishomingo on Saturday, January 16th near Paden.

The pickup truck apparently left the road and crashed into a ravine causing the vehicle to catch fire around 2 a.m. on Saturday morning. A passing motorist saw flames well off the road on highway 30 and called 911.

According to Tishomingo County Coroner Mac Wilemon the fatal wreck occurred on the

south side of highway 30, one point five miles west at the Paden Corp. line. The pickup truck was found near Pollard Mill Branch 20 ft. below the road. Wilemon stated he would not have an official positive identification of the driver till a later date.

On Tuesday afternoon on January, 19th the Mississippi Highway Patrol Office reported to the Tishomingo County News that the victim in the accident was Dillon R White, age 21 of Tishomingo.

Governor Tate Reeves Announces Additional 20,000 New Vaccine Appointments

JACKSON — Governor Tate Reeves announced additional COVID-19 vaccine measures in an effort to keep Mississippians safe and help individuals receive the COVID-19 vaccine. 20,000 new appointments - loaded into the system today - are for first doses and can be booked at covidvaccine. umc.edu OR by calling 877-978-6453.

Since receiving the

first doses of the vaccine, we have administered over 105,000 of the first dose, along with 9,719 second doses - making that many Mississippians fully vaccinated. A total of 114,947 doses have been given across the state.

The website has also been expanded to be able to help 6,000 individuals per second get an appointment to receive the vaccine. The call center

is also being expanded so callers should have less of a wait time.

"We celebrated a milestone over the weekend, with more than 100,000 Mississippians receiving vaccinations for COVID-19," Governor Tate Reeves said. "That's something we can all be proud of, as we work to get even more access to all."

Announces December Transfer to the State \$50,000 Unclaimed Tickets Sold in Burnsville (as of Tuesday, Jan. 19)

JACKSON, MISS.—The Mississippi Lottery Corporation (MLC) completed December transfer of \$9,828,078.61 in net proceeds to the Lottery Proceeds Fund the Mississippi State Treasury. This brings the total net proceeds for Fiscal Year 2021 to \$51,453,200.15. The MLC year-to-date number includes a financial adjustment of \$76,400 from Fiscal Year 2020.

Mega Millions® has an estimated \$865 million jackpot for the drawing Tuesday, January 19. Additionally, Powerball® has an estimated \$730 million jackpot for the drawing Wednesday, January 20.

"These high, rolling jackpots have generated a lot of excitement with our players," said MLC President Tom Shaheen. "This is the first time players purchasing tickets in Mississippi have experienced jackpots at such levels since we started selling Mega Millions and Powerball last year."

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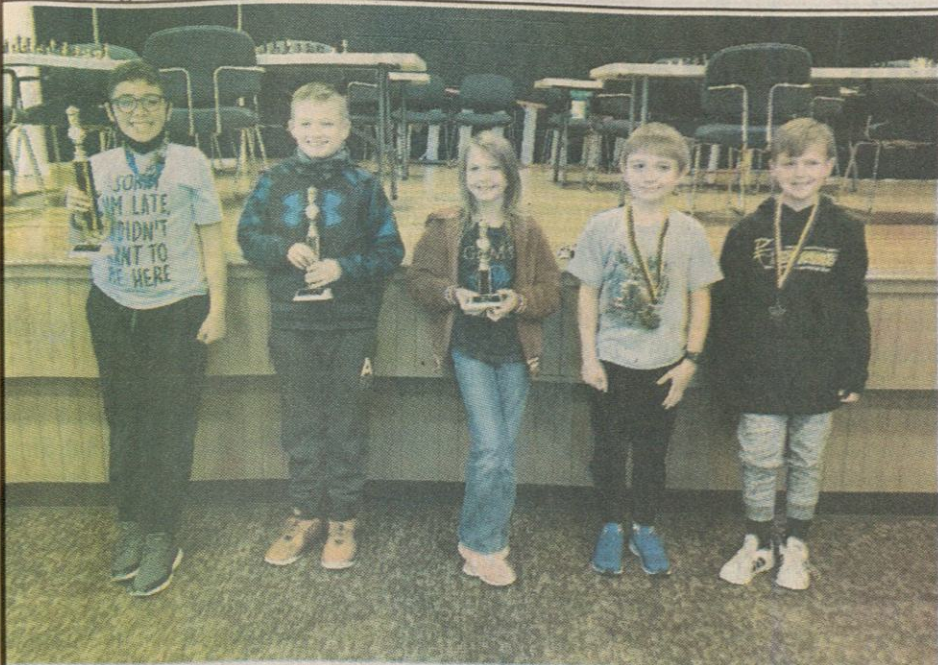

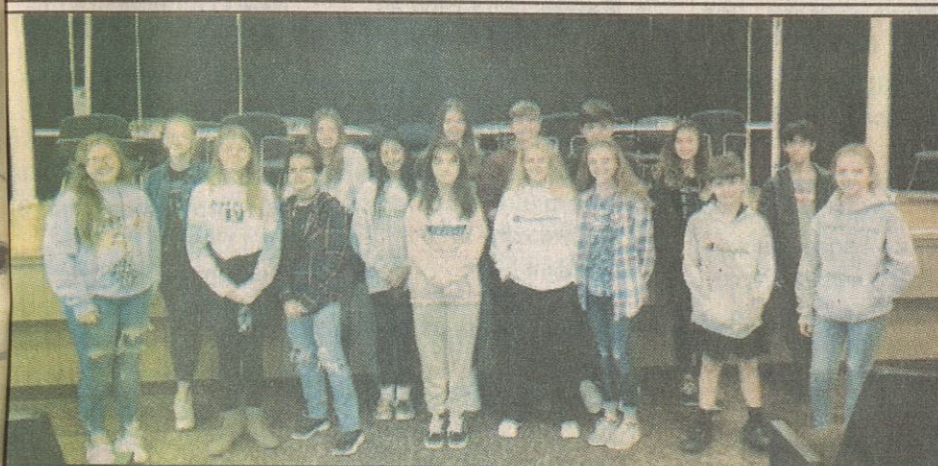

Tishomingo Middle School Chess Tournament

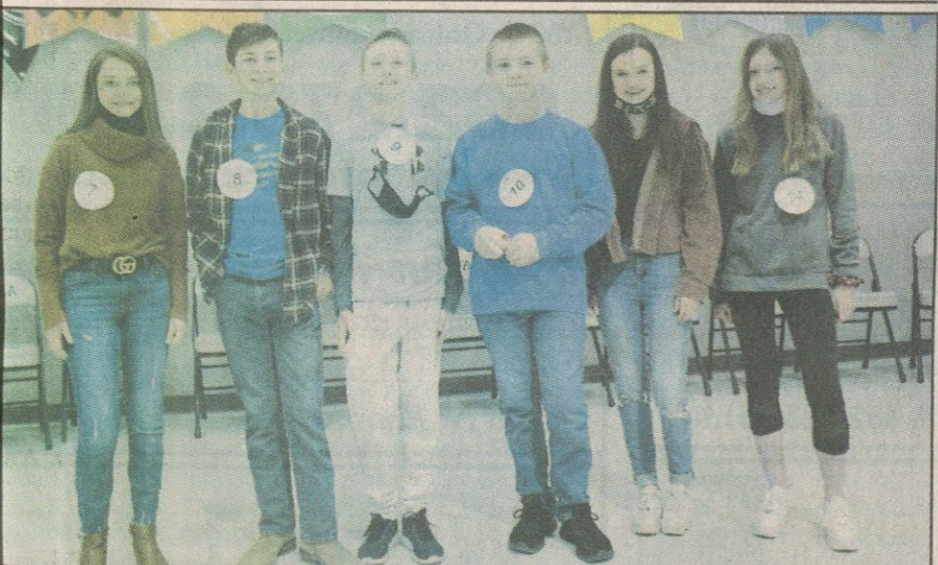

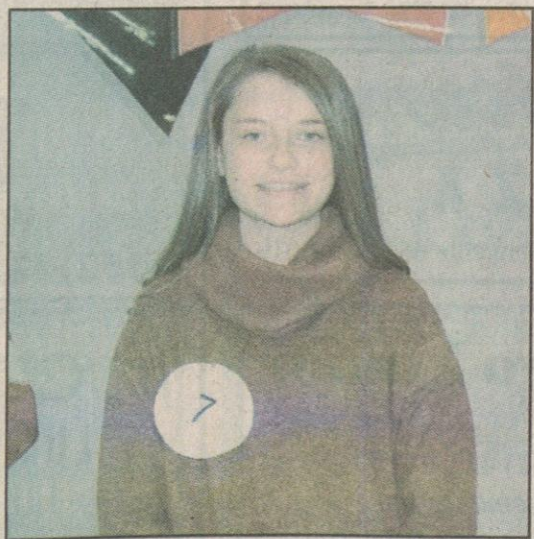

Sunday night Ryan said Daddy do you know the weatherman? I said no, well we need to call him and tell him to move the forecast further north. I said Ryan you know who controls the weather. Yes Dad, God does. I want some snow Dad. He continued the conversation minutes later. He said "God can change things" I thought for a few seconds, do I try to explain this to a seven-year-old? All of a sudden, I said "YES HE DOES" I heard him praying that night for snow. I didn't close the door on his faith. DON'T CLOSE DOORS ON 2021.

Lessons On Life From The Prophet Isaiah (part 6)

God has an interesting, and sometimes an accusing way, of telling His people what they need to hear. We have come to a time in our nation, and to great degree in the world, when Bible teaching and preaching is expected to encourage believers, and even unbelievers, concerning how to live life with zest, while doing what one desires. God is expected to "play second fiddle", so that more enjoyable things can get the "prime time" of one's life. Isaiah was not the kind of prophet that most people would want to hear, should he be able to speak to people in our day. Even when he spoke to his own people, he was not a popular speaker. Tradition indicates that Isaiah was cut into two pieces by a saw. Hebrews 11:37 says

that some of the faithful believers of Bible times were "sawn asunder". It needs to be emphasized that the Bible writers were not "practicing their skills in good communication", rather they were simply delivering God's message in their own speech and style, most of which were not acceptable to the masses of men.

Isaiah 1:6-7 is pointed, yet absolutely correct and inspired by the Lord. It says, "From the sole of the foot even to the head there is no soundness in it;

but wounds and bruises, and putrifying sores: they have not been closed, neither bound up, neither mollified with ointment. Your country is desolate, your cities are burned with fire: your land, strangers devour it in your presence, and it is desolate, as overthrown by strangers." Do you see how pertinent this message is to our own nation and the world? Isaiah describes the spiritual condition of his own country Israel, and its capitol city, Jerusalem. He used the symbolism of a human

body and says that from head to toe the city of Jerusalem and the nation of Israel is sick! There is nothing that about the spiritual health of the city and nation that could be described as wholesome. It is like a physical body that is covered with sores and wounds that have had no remedy applied. Isaiah said that there were open sores and bruises from head to toe, symbolizing the spiritual condition of his own people whom he loved. His message, however, was not accepted by most of his people. They likely thought that he was just "some negative preacher who delights in emphasizing what is wrong". The word "positive" is never used in the entire Bible, although there are, of course, things

that could be called "positive". My point is that we may be going beyond what God has in mind for a "healthy message" from the Word of God. I love to think on positive things, but seven of the ten commandments have the word "not" in them. In accentuating the positive, we have forgotten that some things still have to be negative. (One pole on your car battery is negative! Isaiah has many positive notes in his message, but he starts his book on a negative note, because we can never come to a positive relationship with God, until we see the negative nature of our sins.

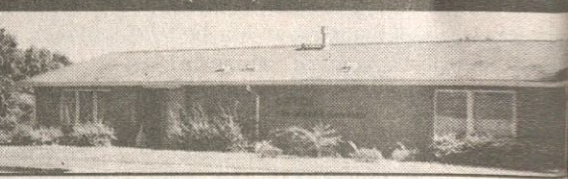

This photo appeared in a 1969 issue of the Tishomingo County News. It and the information about the photo was furnished by Clifton Reid. The church shown above is probably the church that was located where the present church is, was plank and faced St. It was destroyed by fire. The article with the photo to read: The Tisho-

mingo Baptist Association met in its fifth-third annual session with Iuka Baptist church on Sept. 11, 12, and 13, 1912. The association was organized at Burnsville in 1860. The Association was called to order by the Moderator, Hon. W. D. Conn. Messengers for Iuka Baptist Church were D. J. Akers, G. W. Reid, and Sister Willard Carmack. Rev. J. D.

Franks was Pastor; G. T. Reid, Clerk; J. W. Hiatt, Sunday School Superintendent; and J. Houston Reid, Secretary. The Sunday School had five teachers and 31 pupils. Value of the Iuka Baptist church property was \$700.00. Minutes of the Association showed the church to be active in home, state and foreign missions. Total contributions for the year for pastor's salary, mis-

sions, etc. was \$730.80. Proceedings of the Womens' Missionary Union of the Tishomingo Association were held in the Presbyterian Church at Iuka on Thursday, September 12, 1912. Among those mentioned on the program were Mrs. Lizzie Hiatt, Mrs. Willa Carmack, Mrs. Granville Dudley, Mrs. G. W. Reid, and Miss May Robinson.

Some of the people identified are front row, second from the right is Jimmy Moore, next on the left is J. W. Hiatt. On the left side of the picture, about the fourth row back is Miss Mae Robinson wearing the large, white hat. On the left behind her is Mark Seago. Third from the back row on the right is G. W. Reid (father of Clifton B. Reid). Fourth from the back row on the

right is W. A. Rhodes, Sr., Garland Akers is on the second row from the back on the left side of the post. Second from the right of the post on the second row from the top is Rev. Jesse B. Franks. Second from the right on the top row is George Bacon. Third from the right on the top row is Charlie Bacon.

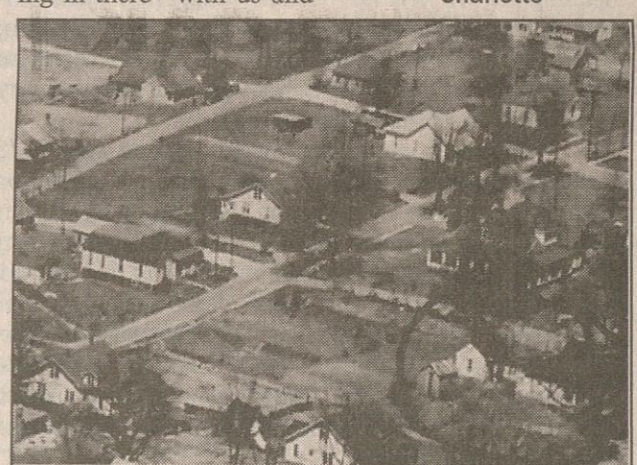
