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
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

Election Year in Local Cities

Qualifying Deadline February 5th

Municipal elections will be June 8th in all the cities/towns in Mississippi, and some potential candidates for Tishomingo County's towns have already picked up papers to qualify to run for office.

The qualifying date, which is usually in March, has been set for February 5, which is next week. All towns in the county are reporting slow pickups on qualifying papers. Officials that will be on the ballot are aldermen and mayors, and, in Iuka, police chief.

To qualify to run, candidates must be a registered voter residing within the corporate limits of the town. They have to present a petition with 50 signatures of other registered voters within the municipality.

In Iuka, one person has picked up papers to run for mayor, and four for aldermen. Police Chief Randy Stringer has already turned in his qualifying papers.

In Belmont, the mayor and board of alderman have picked up papers and three additional people are going to qualify at this time.

Because Yellow Creek Port was among those chosen Tishomingo County will benefit greatly from the funds awarded.

Construction began January 18, 2021, on restoration of the sanctuary of Iuka United Methodist Church

In the early hours of the morning on Sunday, October 13, 2019, the ceiling collapsed in the empty sanctuary. By the grace of God, there were no bodily injuries.


Following an investigation of the collapse and removal of debris, church officials began developing plans for the rebuilding of the historic church. A search for architectural expertise to guide the project led to the selection of Belinda Stewart Architects of Europa, MS with experience in restoration

and revitalization of a number of historic buildings within Mississippi. After numerous meetings with the architect and necessary engineering studies, drawings and construction specification were prepared for presentation to a number of qualified contractors. Contractor proposals and a recommen-

dation by the architect led church trustees to award a construction contract to The Roberts Company of Ripley, MS. According to Chairman of the Board of Trustees, Donnie Brown, "The church congregation is looking forward to the celebration of a beautifully restored sanctuary in late spring or early sum-

Brief History of the Iuka Methodist (

The Iuka Methodist has long since been Episcopal Church South was organized in Iuka in 1858. It was comprised of members who moved from Eastport, which was a thriving river town before the Civil War, and Old New Hope Church, located 2 1/2 miles southwest of Iuka.

Old New Hope was transferred almost entirely to Iuka. The church was formed in 1842, two years before the organization of the Methodist Episcopal Church South. The church at Eastport was formed in 1848. From these two churches, Iuka received the pioneer Methodists who firmly planted the doctrines of the people called Methodists.

The earliest records of Iuka Methodist were destroyed during the Civil War; however, Mrs. S.E. Ashmore, wife of the Rev. Sam Ashmore (pastor from 1931-38), researched and recorded the church history as best she could: "In 1845, while this town was yet unbuilt, Robert Williams and his wife and William Richardson ranged throughout the country following the Indian paths and preaching wherever a congregation could be gathered: in schools, in houses, private homes or out under the broad open skies. With the help of another local pastor, Mr. Elias J. Tidwell, their preaching was 'Holiness of the Lord.' Mrs. Robert Williams was powerful in her exposition of the doctrine of sanctification. Another of those early preachers who laid broad the foundation for God and Methodism was William Winburn, who



New Sites on the Old Shiloh Battlefield

SHILOH, Tennessee If you haven't visited iloh National Military rk in the last month, exct to come across a few w additions to the park. ew signage has been ected along the driving ir route and more trees ve been added to the toric orchards.

At Tour Stop #16 ent Hospital Site) and ur Stop #18 (Peach Orard Site) new fruit trees re planted on December in the historic orchards the Shiloh maintenance ff.

In Larkin Bell Field. t south of the Tent Hos-

pital site, a dozen new apple trees now occupy the historic orchard. Union Colonel David Stuart's regiments camped in this orchard before the Battle of Shiloh, and many of the soldiers left accounts of camping among the apple trees.

In the historic Peach Orchard, dozens of threeyear old peach trees of the June Gold variety were resettled in the area. "In the past, we have plated younger trees, but they just were not surviving due to weather conditions and wildlife," said Maintenance Chief Randy

Martin. "We hope that by park brochure is available transplanting these older trees, we will have better results."

The Peach Orchard was the scene of severe fighting on both days of the Battle of Shiloh. General Albert Sidney Johnston, the commander of all Confederate forces in the Western Theater, would be among those killed on April 6, 1862, in this area of the battlefield.

Features were added to the Shiloh Driving Tour last month including two new stops and accompanying wayside exhibits. In addition, an updated to visitors in the Visitor Center.

Tour stop #13 (Woolf Field) and Tour Stop #15 (Davis Wheat Field) are brand new additions to the driving tour which help further tell the story of the battle. "Our wayside exhibits not only explain the action which took place during the bloody fighting, they also give visitors a sense of place in the big picture of the two-day struggle in 1862," said Superintendent Allen Etheridge

Visitors will also notice that new signage has been erected at tour stop #5 (Shiloh Church) which includes the story of both days of fighting in and around this iconic landmark. All tour stops include concrete pads and walkways making these sites completely ADA accessible.

Currently, all facilities at the Shiloh Battlefield and the Corinth Civil War Interpretive are open. Due to COVID restrictions, the number of visitors to the Shiloh Visitor Center is 10 (ten) and the Corinth Center is 40 (forty). The visitor center at Shiloh is open from

8:00 am - 4:00 pm daily with the 45-minute park film "Shiloh: Fiery Trial" shown on the hour, every hour. The Corinth Civil War Interpretive Center is open from 8:00 am - 5:00 pm daily with three films shown throughout the day. The bookstore at Shiloh is open from 8:00 am - 4:30 pm daily.

Your country is desolate, your cities are burned with fire: your land, strangers devour it in your presence, and it is desolate, as overthrown by strangers." I will not recap what I said in the last article, but I do want to say that Isaiah said the whole city and nation was sick, like one who is covered with sores from head to toe, along with other wounds. Now he says that the sores have not even been closed, nor





Week of January 18, 2021

This is the third week of the 2021 Legislative Session. The deadline for introducing general bills was on Monday night, and committees will now begin discussing these bills in meetings. After Tuesday, Feb. 2, no additional bills will be added to the House calendar for consideration.

Speaker Philip Gunn announced new chairmanships of several House Committees:

- Insurance Chairman: Hank Zuber (R-Ocean Springs)
- Banking and Financial Services Chairman: Jerry Turner (R-Baldwyn)
- Drug Policy Chairman: Lee Yancey (R-Brandon)
- Rules Chairman: Rob Roberson (R-Starkville)
- Medicaid Vice-Chairman: Clay Deweese (R-Oxford)

The Speaker also announced new safety protocols that will be implemented starting next week. All committee meetings and sessions will happen via teleconference, which will be available to the public on the Legislature website. The House is scheduled to return to in-person sessions on Wednesday, Feb. 3 after the deadline to pass bills out of committee.

House Resolution 12, which was introduced on Friday morning, creates a temporary House rule determining quorum on meetings happening remotely. The resolution passed unanimously by a voice vote and makes it possible for the House to conduct business by teleconference.

WHEREAS, pursuant to Mississippi Code Section 23-15-221, the Town of Burnsville, Mississippi has appointed municipal election commissioners as provided for therein; and desiring to avail itself of the provisions of the Mississippi Election Code (i.e., use the county election commission) regarding the duties of municipal election commissioners despite having an established election commission with appointed commissioners, was authorized by law to contract with the Tishomingo County Election Commission to handle many, if not all, aspects of municipal elections; on July 1, 2017, an Amendment to Mississippi Code Section 23-15-221 became effective, which mandated that any municipality shall adopt an ordinance declaring its intention to enter into an agreement with the municipality county to have the county election commissioners conduct municipal elections and other functions that are performed by municipal election commissioners for the benefit of the efficiency and conformity of elections

SECTION 2shall be added to the Code of Ordinances and shall read as follows:

Pursuant to Mississippi Code Section 23-15-221, the Tishomingo County Election Commissioners shall conduct all of the duties of the municipal election commissioners including, but not limited to:

(a) Canvass the results of bond elections in a municipality;

(b) Canvass the returns of special and general elections for mayor and councilmen and within five (5) days after any special or general election, deliver to each person receiving the highest number of votes a certificate of election;

(c) Certify to the Secretary of State the name or names of the person or persons elected at special and general elections within ten (10) days after any special or general election;

(d) Revise the primary pollbooks for municipalities at the time and in the manner and in accordance with the laws now fixed and in force for revising pollbooks, except they shall not remove from the pollbook any person who is qualified to participate in primary elections; (e) Print the pollbooks that are to be used in municipal elections; (f) Print and distribute the "official ballots";

(g) Perform the duties of poll managers in the event there is only one (1) election precinct in the municipality:

(h) Perform any of the duties required of the municipal executive committee pursuant to Section 23-15-239 if the municipal executive committee has entered into a written agreement with the municipal clerk or the municipal or county election commission that gives such authorization:

Determine whether each party candidate in the municipal general election is a qualified elector of the municipality, and of the ward if the office sought is a ward office, whether each candidate either meets all other qualifications to hold the office he or she is seeking or presents. It is the Board of Aldermen's intent and desire to abolish the Town of Burnsville' Municipal Election Commission and authorize the Tishomingo County Election Commissioners to conduct the municipal election commissioner's duties. By adoption of this Ordinance, it is the Town's intent enter into an Agreement for Services with Tishomingo County to have the Tishomingo County Election Commission conduct municipal elections and other functions that are performed by municipal election commissioners, which will benefit the Town, and all of its citizens, by making the elections more efficient and in conformity with all other cities throughout the County result of this Ordinance, all current members of the municipal election commission are removed. To provide sufficient proof that he or she will, subject to no contingencies, meet all qualifications on or before the date of the general or special election at which he or she could be elected to office, and whether any candidate has been convicted of any felony in a court of this state, or has been convicted on or after December 8, 1992, of any offense in another state which is a felony under the laws of this state, or has been convicted of any felony in a federal court on or after December 8, 1992;

(j) Declare each candidate elected without opposition, if the candidate meets all the qualifications to hold the office as determined pursuant to a review by the commission in accordance with the provisions of paragraph (i) of this subsection (3).

(k) Canvass the returns for municipal elections received from all voting precincts and within ten (10) days after the election, deliver to each person receiving the highest number of votes a certificate of election. If it shall appear that any two (2) or more of the candidates receiving the highest number of votes shall have received an equal number of votes, the election shall be decided by the toss of a coin or by lot, fairly and publicly drawn by the election commissioners;

(I) Transmit the statement provided in Section 23-15-611 to the Secretary of State certifying the name or names of the person or persons elected at municipal elections, and such person or persons shall be issued commissions by the Governor;

(m) Receiving the filed document by any person desiring to contest the qualifications of another person who has qualified pursuant to the provisions of Section 23-15-361 as a candidate for municipal office elected on the date designated by law for regular municipal elections that specifically sets forth the grounds of the challenge no later than thirty-one (31) days after the date of the first primary election set forth in Section 23-15-309; and

(n) Perform all other duties with respect to the municipal election prescribed by law.

SECTION 3. Any and all ordinances or parts thereof in conflict or inconsistent with any of the terms and provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed to such extent as they are so in conflict or inconsistent.

SECTION 4. It is hereby declared to be the intention of the Town of Burnsville that the actions, paragraphs, clauses and phrases of this ordinance, when adopted, are severable, and if any sections, paragraphs, clauses, sentences or provisions of this ordinance as adopted shall be declared unconstitutional or otherwise invalid, same shall not affect any of the remaining sections, paragraphs, clauses and phrases of this ordinance.

SECTION 5. This Ordinance shall take effect in the manner prescribed by law.

SECTION 6. That upon adoption, the City Clerk shall cause this Ordinance to be recorded in the Book of Ordinances of the Town of Burnsville, Mississippi, and published in the manner prescribed by law.

SECTION 7. The provisions of this Ordinance may be included and incorporated in the Code of Ordinances of the Town of Burnsville, Mississippi, as an addition thereto, and appropriately renumbered to conform to the uniform numbering system of the Code.


