## Sentences Handed Down in Court

Sentences were handed down in the recent term of Circuit Court in Tishomingo County with the following cases heard:

On April 23, 2021, Judge Paul S. Funderburk ruled on two cases against Martha Taubman, 58 of Iuka. She was convicted of possession of methamphetamine .10G - 2G, a felony and sentenced to 3 years MDOC/3 years suspended/3 years supervised probation; she was also convicted of possession of methamphetamine .10G < 2G, a felony. Sentence imposed by order: 3 years MDOC/3 years suspended/3 years supervised probation.

On May 3, 2021 Judge John R. White ruled on the following cases:

Linda Gail Johnson, 58 of Iuka, convicted of possession of methamphetamine .1G - 2G. Sentence imposed: 3 years MDOC/credit time served/balance suspended/ 2.5 years PRS.

Jimmy Alan Quillen, 66 of Tishomingo; convicted of sale of schedule I/II controlled substance >2DU<10DU, felony. Sentence imposed: 8 years MDOC/7 years suspended/1 year ISP/5 years PRS.

Contrina Shelane Sagley, 56 of Burnsville; convicted of possession of methamphetamine

session of methamphetamine 10G-3G; felony, sentence imposed: 20 years MDOC/15 years suspended/5 years ISP/5 years PRS.

Sammy Don Belue, 50 of Iuka; convicted of aggravated domestic violence with a deadly weapon, felony, sentence imposed: 20 years MDOC/20 years suspended/5 years PRS.

Cases against Samuel Jacob Rice, 36 of Corinth, were heard by Judge Michael P. "Chip" Mills Jr. and a jury of 12. Sentences handed down on May 11, 2021 were: convicted of: CTI: simple assault on a law enforcement officer, felony; sentenced 5 years MDOC/5 years suspended; CT:II simple assault on a law enforcement officer, felony, sentenced 5 years MDOC/5 years suspended; CTIII, simple assault on a law enforcement officer, felony; sentenced 5 years MDOC/5 years suspended; CTIV: simple assault on a law enforcement officer, felony, sentenced 5 years MDOC/5 years suspended; CTV: aggravated assault on a law enforcement officer, felony, sentenced 30 years MDOC/15 years suspended/15 years to serve/5 years PRS; and CTVIII: felon with a weapon, felony, sentence - found not guilty.

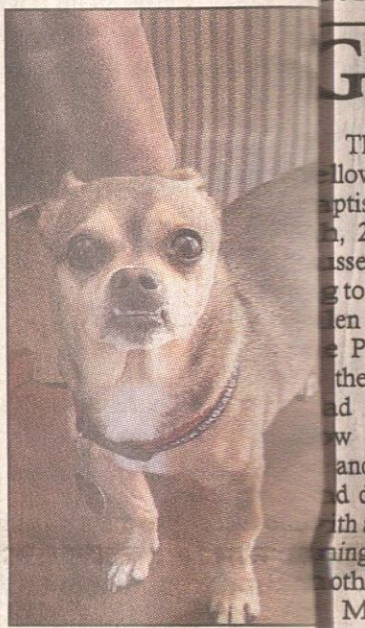

# I Remember

I had planned to write a couple of articles from a little booklet I wrote several years ago while I was teaching at Tishomingo, about the history of Tishomingo from 1908 to 1977. I thought you might find it interesting to be reminded that in the 1970's census there were only 410 people living in Tishomingo. I will try to find how many 41 years later there are. Before I know, I predict it hasn't grown much in these years in number, but for a small town, I feel much progress has been made and I've lived right here all those years except five years in a Memphis suburb - Whitehaven.

(Editor's note: we regret we got this article too late to run before Mother's Day, but it is never too late to honor our mothers!)

What I want to write for Mother's Day is about my Mom. As I told a little student "once upon a time" I know more about my Mom than any other Mother. But in my collegiate dictionary there are twenty-seven entries beginning with "Mother." I am writing about the first entry. "A woman who has born a child," and my Mom had seven - six girls

and one boy. All seven lived to marry and have a family before she died.

I'm sure I've written about my Mom several times down through the years but I could never praise my Mother enough. Remember as I say so often, she raised us during the Great Depression.

Friday, Angie came and she really likes to mow, and why wouldn't she like a riding mower after all those push-mowing years. I had carried my four-prong walking-stick outside and without telling her I traded my walker for a weed-eater. Without my knowing it she made my picture and put it on Facebook. Calls, texts, and at church today I had some fingers pointed at me. That's a no, no.

I got a call from a relative today from Arkansas. Her Mother is ninety-one and still mows. Recently she just fell like we sometimes do. A Fed Ex driver saw her and helped her get up - a good guy and a fussy bunch of adult children.

I remember Mr. Elmer McCoy (Billy McCoy's father) and I were getting P.T. from the same therapist. The therapist suggested he walk a little every

day. His children urged him to follow orders. His reply, "I've lived longer than any of you will live and I'll walk only if I want to." Sounds like most of us aged seniors. Doesn't it!

My Mother lived by herself after Dad died until just a few months before she died. For a few months she lived with us. She didn't like not being at her own home. She was an independent little Mom and my family and friends say I'm looking just like her and acting like her, too. When I get my straw hat on and look in the mirror, I do look like my mother. She loved the outside and especially working in her garden. Her flowers always thrived and she kept a clean house and yard.

I doubt her ever hiring anyone to hoe her garden or clean her house. They never had a vehicle until all us children except one were married and had families.

My Mother never had a washing machine, running water or any of the electric conveniences we take for granted today. Water was drawn from a well, heated in a wash pot; clothes were cleaned on a rub-board, and dried on a



clothes line. With several small ones lots of washing had to be done. Her work ethic was the best. Mom was a great Christian. I wish I could compare with her not only in looks but with her ability to be able to do so many things.

Giving of herself for others would best describe May Belle Luttrell Page. She leaves a legacy that is cherished by her children (me), grandchildren, great-grand's, relatives, and friends. Thank you God for Christian Mothers who love and sacrifice to make a difference because they lived. "Proverbs 31:10-27, the virtuous woman" best describes the traits of my Mother.

Happy Mother's Day to all you mothers out there and God give you grace and direction as you lead and love your children and grandchildren. - your greatest possessions.

contracted them. Changing one's diet to a more plant-based (fresh fruits and vegetables), lower-calorie diet with less processed food, and avoiding sugary drinks and snacks and fatty foods can have a better effect on the outcome of one's health. The lifestyle change can be the medicine.

After the program, President Jo Russell called the business session to order. Corresponding Secretary Joy Kitchens acknowledged the "thank you" letter from our club's contribution to M.P.B.

Treasurer Fredda McCune presented the finan-

cial report. Beverly Estes reported the club's contribution to Turn on the Tap, an international project to provide clean water to the underprivileged populations of the world sponsored by Samaritan's Purse.

## Bimala Gurung, M.D. Speaks to Rotary Club

At the regular weekly Rotary Club meeting at Lil' Smokies, Dr. Ben Kitchens introduced his speaker, Bimala Gurung M.D. of Iuka Family Clinic, who spoke on how changes in lifestyle can prevent or reverse some of the effects of chronic diseases such as diabetes, hypertension, auto-immune diseases and stress. She spoke of food as medicine. She advised changing diets to include mostly fresh fruits and vegetables and avoiding processed foods and fatty foods, and sugary food and drinks.

She advised that one of the best lifestyle changes to reduce stress and improve mental health is to exercise daily. She said it is better than medicine. Even 15 minutes a

day including cardio can improve mood, improve body functions and reduce stress.

Finally, she emphasized the importance of interpersonal relationships (not on social me-

dia) in reducing stress. Having someone caring to discuss what is troubling one can be helpful in reducing stress, whether it is one on one or in a sympathetic group.

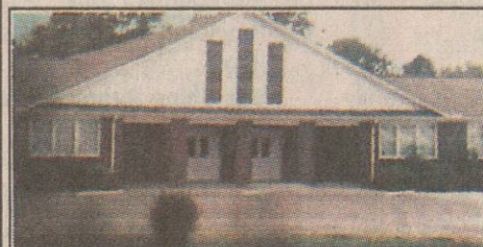

## Lessons On Restoration From The Prophet Isaiah (part 7)

It might seem to some people that I am writing about destruction instead of restoration, but the restoration will come after the destruction caused by Israel's sins against God. So we will continue on the point of destruction with Isaiah 2:18-22: "And the idols He shall utterly abolish. And they shall go into the holes of the rocks, and into the caves of the earth, for fear of the LORD, and for the glory of His majesty, when He ariseth to shake terribly the earth. In that day a man shall cast his idols of silver, and his idols of gold, which they have made each one for himself to worship, to the moles and to the bats; To go into the clefts of the rocks, and into the tops of the ragged rocks, for fear of the LORD, and for the glory of His majesty, when He ariseth to shake terribly the earth. Cease ye from man, whose breath is in his nostrils: for wherein is he to be accounted for?"

I will not seek to cover the entire Book of Isaiah on my subject, but I will show verses and

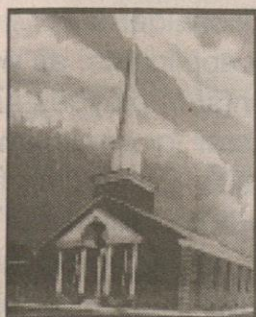

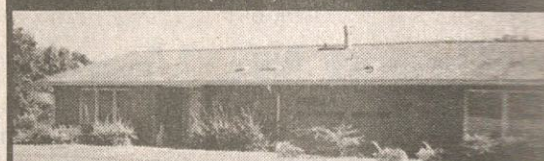
