## Tishomingo County School District Prepares For New School Year

### Classes Begin August 5

The Tishomingo County School District is getting ready for school to begin in August and is looking forward to a greater sense of normalcy after a year of dealing with the COVID-19 pandemic. The district has published its "Safe Return to School Plan" on the district website and received positive feedback from stakeholders. The plan is flexible as the situation with COVID-19 can change quickly. The district encourages parents and the community to review the plan and submit any comments, if needed.

As the district plans to return to school, there are several things to note that will be different from last year:

School will be in session 5 days a week in its traditional learning schedule.

Buses will run as normal and masks are not required on buses.

Students will return to school on August 5, 2021. The school calendar can be found on the district website ([www.tcsk12.com](http://www.tcsk12.com)).

Masks are optional and not required at this time. The mask mandate from the governor for K-12 schools ended on May 31st.

Visitors are welcome at each campus. However, the district asks that if the visitor is experiencing any sickness or symptoms to refrain from entering the building.

All athletic and school events are at full capacity. The governor lifted the seating capacity caps toward the end of

the school year.

If a student is showing symptoms of illness or COVID-19 specific symptoms, he/she should not come to school.

Due to a new Mississippi Department of Education policy regarding virtual learning, a student must be "live online" all day while a teacher is teaching his/her classes to be a virtual student. In response to this policy, the district WILL NOT offer a virtual option for students at this time. All students will be required to come to school face-to-face.

Students and staff who are exposed to positive COVID-19 individuals (whether outside of school or during school) will still have to follow the CDC's quarantine guidelines. Vaccinated individuals are exempt from quarantine requirements according to the CDC's guidelines.

If a student was home schooled last year, the student is required to take a placement test to register for school. Families of home school students should contact their child's school to schedule this test as soon as possible so registration can occur.

The district has plans to implement new programs and new personnel to assist with any learning gaps and/or learning loss that students may experience from last school year and the school shutdown in 2020. A K-4 summer program was considered, but after parent feedback and concerns students may

## Aircraft Makes Emergency Landing on Highway in Iuka

A small vintage plane bound for Florida made an emergency landing on Veterans Memorial Highway in Iuka around 4 p.m. on Tuesday, July 17th.

No injuries occurred during the incident on highway 25 near the hospital, when the plane landed on the roadway; Iuka Police, Mississippi Highway Patrol and first responders responded to the scene. One of the pilots commented, this is something you don't see every day. The pilot and the plane's owner were reportedly in this historic two-seater when the landing took place. It was reported the pilot had attended an air show in Gas City, MO.

The aircraft struck a mailbox before coming to a complete stop in the yard of the Vaughn residence near NMMC. Two of the planes tires went flat during the incident.

The word Marines is printed on the aircraft, which was flying south. According to reports

The pilot had stopped for fuel in Waynesboro, Tennessee; the plan was to visit our local airport as well but due to issues with the engine an emergency landing on the highway was necessary.

The ordeal turned into an almost 8 hour event before the plane was pulled from the side of the highway. It was moved to the parking lot of a nearby busi-

ness around midnight by a local tow truck. Traffic was stopped by law enforcement so the aircraft could be safely pulled to a nearby parking lot.

Many residents have greatly enjoyed viewing the aircraft parked in front of the Bingo establishment next to Jacks.

## State Giving Free Taxpayer Money to Magnolia to Build For-profit Clinic in County has Local Health Providers Angry

10 July 2021 - Local health providers are expressing concern that the Yellow Creek Port Authority is funding the building of a new for-profit clinic in Burnsville with taxpayer funds.

After investing decades of service, medical expertise, community donations to Tishomingo County, in their privately funded clinics, doctors and nurses were surprised by the recent announcement that the state government is providing \$750,000 to a clinic that will be run by Magnolia Regional Health Center, of Belmont.

"It's like the state is cutting legs out from under us," Iuka nurse practitioner Sara Glynn explained. "We have invested our money, and served, and worked hard to not only provide quality health care locally, but bring home and hire doctors, and are from Iuka, Belmont,

Burnsville and keep this rural community healthy - to make sure that you don't have to drive an hour for a doctor like they do in other places."

"And it's not as if there is a need for another clinic; in addition to the award-winning hospital in Iuka that many people have worked hard to keep open through the years, there are four full-service clinics in Iuka, and a new urgent care clinic just opened up in the last year," said Dr. Margaret Glynn, of Iuka. "And now the state government is going to fund another clinic run by a competing hospital system in our county."

**Not a Free Clinic**  
"It would be different," Dr. Glynn explained, "if the government was funding a free clinic for people who could use it. But, it's NOT a free clinic they are proposing, it is a for-profit clinic getting hundreds of thousands

of free state money. And land from the Port to build on!"

"Our county has at least nine doctors that were born and raised in Tishomingo County," said one doctor in a letter. "They attended school in the county for twelve years, went on to college and studied day and night for another twelve years to become a hometown doctor. How are they rewarded? Their own state leaders have given their tax dollars away to Magnolia Regional Hospital to directly compete against them!"

Additionally, the county has many advanced nurse practitioners who are native Tishomingo Countians and are "the backbone of our local clinics, nursing homes, and assisted living facilities."

"They know their patients very well because they see them at church, see them shopping, and their kids attend school together. Home grown medicine

is the best medicine," reads the letter.

"Imagine if, despite having a couple good grocery stores in your town run by hard-working private individuals or companies, and the state decided to GIVE Walmart or Costco (private, for-profit companies) \$750,000 and land to build on," said Cooley. "That would not be right, and this isn't either. If they want to enter the health care market because there is a need, let them fund a clinic themselves; not use our tax dollars to build something that's going to hurt existing providers!"

**No Need?**  
Tishomingo County is ahead of much of the rest of the state when it comes to needing additional medical services, according to the federal Health Resources and Services Administration. Tishomingo County is actually one of the few counties

in Mississippi that scores very low in their calculations of what counties are underserved for medical services, scoring 1-13 compared to neighboring counties whose scores indicate they have more of a shortage of services.

The Port Authority is the state board that is responsible for the day-to-day function of the multi-million dollar earning Yellow Creek Port in the north end of Tishomingo County, as well as a Burnsville industrial park. The board is made up of ten government-compensated appointees by county boards from Alcorn, Tishomingo, Itawamba and Prentiss counties, and the Governor. With multiple industrial tenants like CMC Comets, Mississippi Silicon, Skyline Steel, FerroSouth, Hago Auto-

motive and RollForm, the Port employs about 800 people in some of the best-paying jobs in Tishomingo County.

The Port has long been profitable, from fees it gets on the freight it moves in and out of the Port on the Tennessee Tombigbee Waterway. This \$750,000 in state allocation for this specific purpose comes from SB 2971, passed by the legislature and signed by the governor. It was

praised by Burnsville mayor David Nixon, a longtime member of the Port Board.

It is not unusual for the Port, or the Port through the County, to build a building (using government loans and grants) to house an industry, as it has done with many of the afore-mentioned industries, but there is always a lease agreement, and those industrial clients make lease payments

on the facilities. Lease payments are processed through the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors office, since in most cases the county "owns" the buildings and leases them to the industrial clients.


In this case, it appears the funding is free taxpayer money from the government, awarded without any competition.

# Letter to the Editor

## State Bill SB2971 Gives FREE Money to Magnolia to Open Clinic in Tishomingo County!

Dear Editor,  
I write this letter today out of concern for Tishomingo County's growth and out of shock of the apparent misappropriation of state funding that I have witnessed this year. I am a graduate of Tishomingo County High School and made the choice to return to my community to serve its people as a medical provider. This is my sixth year as a Family Nurse Practitioner in my community, and I am an active individual in community projects for growth and development for our county.

The According to recent reports, the State of Mississippi has issued a grant to the Yellow Creek Port Authority for \$750,000 to "meet the workforce healthcare needs of many of the industries located at both port locations" (Tishomingo County News, June 17, 2021) and awarded (without competition) this appropriation to Magnolia Health Care Center based out of Corinth, MS in Alcorn County. The industries that supposedly have a "need" for this clinic are based in Tishomingo County, and presumably,

the majority of its employees in Tishomingo County. I also state that this possible use of tax money was not brought to the attention of the area clinics, nor were any other clinics offered the opportunity to make new services available that they may not have known were needed. I also state that services that each industry has voiced a need for have already been added to the full complement of services already provided by already established clinics in our area.

(Shown above) The government Health and Research Services Administration (HRSA) sets a measurement for AREAS OF MEDICAL NEED in the United States. Specifically in Mississippi, we are the only county in northeast Mississippi that DOES NOT HAVE a need, per capita, for more medical providers to service the medical and Occupational Health needs for this area. So why are we using government tax dollars to push another medical clinic that is not needed? Furthermore, tax dollars should be allocated to counties that are currently underserved to improve the health of Mississippi. Tishomingo County IS NOT in need as designated by research provided by HRSA.

The Tishomingo County Newspaper states

the needs of these industries are in the area of the Occupational Health. All the industries' needs are facilitated by the SEVEN area medical clinics already established in Tishomingo County. These services include workman's compensation cases, occupational health assessments such as hearing and drug screens, pulmonary function testing, vision testing, federal physicals, and department of transportation physicals. Onsite testing and preventative vaccines are performed on a need basis for each industry. There is no service needed that is not already provided by established clinics in our home county. Already established hometown clinics depend on these services to monetarily support the clinics and provide profitable jobs and services for our area.

I write this out of concern for our small business clinics and their longevity in our area. I am aghast at the process to allocate these tax dollars in an unnecessary and seemingly disingenuously covert process. I believed that those who helped to pass this bill should be held accountable for a misappropriation of our tax dollars that our rural area works so hard to provide.

of snakes. Puppies are at high risk for snake bites because they are curious and try to play with them. Puppies that live in rural areas often encounter snakes in their outdoor exploration. When the dog is too curious to leave a snake alone, the dog may be bitten. Most often bites occur on the face or neck when the dog tries to catch the snake but can also be on the dog's legs. A non-poisonous snake bite will leave tiny horseshoe-shaped teeth marks. The severity of a venomous bite depends on the size of the dog in relation to the snake, the number of bites inflicted, and much venom is There may be red bleeding and firmness of a snakebite usually include agitation, panting and drooling weakness. You may notice vomiting or seizures. These are common signs of a bite location that hides the bite. You might mistake swelling to be a spider bite or bite. If you think you've been bitten by a snake, Dr. Jim Perkins at Animal Clinic is just a short drive away at 423-

### NOTICE OF PROPOSED AD VALOREM TAX EFFORT TISHOMINGO COUNTY SCHOOL DISTRICT

The Tishomingo County Special Municipal Separate School District will hold a public hearing on its proposed school district budget for fiscal year 2021-2022 on July 26, 2021, 6:00 p.m., at the Superintendent's office. At this meeting, a proposed ad valorem tax effort shall be considered.

The Tishomingo County Special Municipal Separate School District is now operating with a projected total budget revenue of \$32,076,041.72. Of that amount, 27% or \$8,770,915, of such revenue is obtained through ad valorem taxes. For the next fiscal year, the proposed budget has total projected revenue of \$34,063,596.22. Of that amount, 25% or \$8,550,069 is proposed to be financed through a total ad valorem tax levy.

For the next fiscal year, the proposed increase in ad valorem tax effort by Tishomingo County Special Municipal Separate School District may result in an increase in the ad valorem tax millage rate. Ad valorem taxes are paid on homes, automobile tags, business fixtures and equipment, and rental real property.

Any citizen of Tishomingo County Special Municipal Separate School District is invited to attend this public hearing on the proposed ad valorem tax effort, and will be allowed to speak for a reasonable amount of time and offer tangible evidence before any vote is taken.

place of mount Zion, and upon her assemblies, a cloud of a flaming fire by night: for upon all the glory shall be a defence. And there shall be a tabernacle for a shadow in the daytime from the heat, and for a place of refuge, and for a covert from storm and from rain."

I may not be able to comment on all of these verses in this article, but they need to be given together to get the full sense of what is being said. Notice that God speaks of those who are "left in Zion", indicating that many in Israel will be killed during the tribulation, yet there will be a believing remnant that will survive and come to a time of peace in the reign of

Christ on earth for the thousand years. Notice that those left will be called "holy", for they will have turned to the one true God. These will have been "written among the living in Jerusalem", which indicates that God Himself chooses who will live through the tribulation and the anti-christ's hatred of Israel (see Revelation chapters 12 & 13). It will be the Lord Who washes away the filth of the "daughters of Zion", and we need to stop listening to those who say that "Zion" is the church, for it is not. Moreover, the prophecies that are given concerning the future of Israel will not fit the church. Yes, the church will be on earth during

# I Remember

The devil got a big hold on me this morning. It's Sunday and about seven A.M. I woke up, time for me to roll out and be ready to go to church by 9:45 a.m.

The trouble maker of this world kept telling me I didn't need to go to church today. "It's raining and oldies like you need to sleep in. Your age will excuse you from attending. Pull the covers up and snuggle for two or three more hours you don't need to go to church." Wrong! I needed to go to church to worship and fellowship with my sisters and brothers. I needed to go to worship in a place that was dedicated for the gathering of God's people to thank Him and praise Him for His love and care for His children. We need to worship and thank the creator more than the created every day.

With all the restrictions that have been made to try to keep us safe and from spreading Covid 19, follow the rules.

At Tishomingo Baptist Church I sit in the middle of a pew. On each end sits a couple, and the wives of each couple were my students when I was teaching them at Paden: Fredia (Nichols) and Bobby Scott and Peggy (Ward) and Roger Rohloff. If I need anything either lady will graciously assist me. Sometimes I don't understand the scripture? I just pass my note sheet and they take care of that. Now that we have the hearing aids? Bobby Scott sees that I get a fresh battery every Sunday. This gives Kim or Teresa a break. Makes me proud.

Today Peggy said to me, "Mrs. Dawson, why don't you write about you carrying your class to the summer revival at the Paden Baptist Church every year. I was saved because you carried us to church, and I'll never forget it." Hugs and tears. She looked radiant telling about it. She has been a great Christina lady and lived for God all these years. Peggy is not ashamed to tell anyone when she made her profession of faith and has shared her testimony in praise and song. I have several gospel tapes that she, her first husband, the late Jessie Pruitt, and children, made when they were doing gospel concerts. So good. They were a great witness for Christ for several years.

The principal at Paden School always announced at assembly that the revival would be going on and if any teacher wanted to carry their students and go with them, they were welcome to do so.

I would discuss our going ahead of time so they could tell their parents. I never had a student that didn't want to go.

You are probably thinking? "They didn't have any other choice," really they probably didn't or if they did, no one ever knew. The parents back then wanted their children to go to church and was happy for me to go and take them. It never bothered the lunch room ladies that sometimes we were a little late getting to lunch. They were always glad to feed us when we got back.

I'm going to share a comical incident about Peggy and her twin sister Patsy. As with sisters and brothers, they didn't always agree. I had the perfect cure for their problem: I would make them hug and love each other. It worked and ended up with the class and me laughing. A good rule, usually, and they forgot what was their problem.


I had two students that became ministers. Don't get the idea that I think I was the only teacher they had, that loved the lord. There was Mrs. Artie Timbes and Mrs. Arta Mars and others I'm sure. Mrs. Artie Timbes was the pianist and this was her home church. It was like "a great reunion day" when we'd just open up and sing. My memory may be slipping, but as I recall, the majority of the congregation was school students.

Digress: While teaching at Boggs Chapel we were the congregation. Bro. Will Whitner was the pastor. He knew the school children would be there and he brought the best messages any minister could preach to young boys and girls. They learned more in that hour than I could have taught them in any subject matter.

The parents at Boggs Chapel were like those later at Paden. Denominations? Didn't matter. Jesus Christ was preached at both churches. One Baptist and one Methodist. Both churches were less than one tenth of a mile from school. I can honestly say "In those twelve years there was never a problem. We behaved at church like we did at school."



