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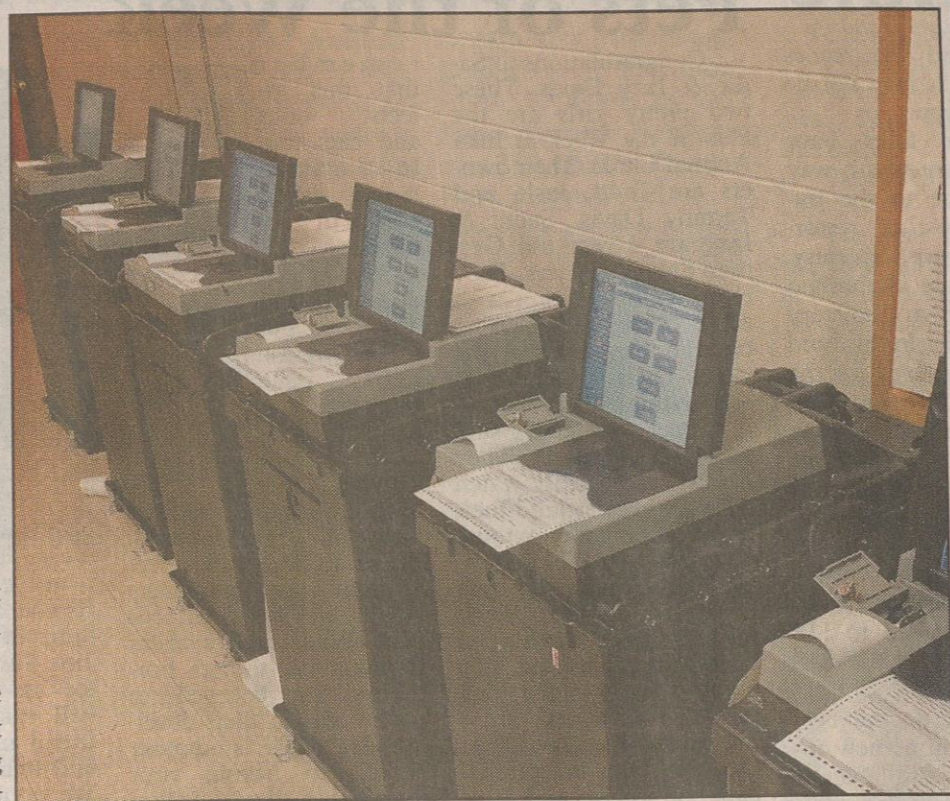

New Election Equipment For Tishomingo County

The Screen Voting machines have replaced New Voting equipment in form of a ballot-based. The new equipment is composed of individual scanner units every precinct. The new paper ballot will mark place it in the scanner. Once the ballot is scanned it is securely stored in the ballot box. The new equipment will support ballot marking for voters with disabilities.



who may require assistance casting their ballot. There will be one ADA marking device at each precinct in addition to the ballot scanner. The TSX machines have been in service for 17 years. This equipment was paid with approximately 30% federal HAVA grant money, and money budgeted for consecutive years by Tishomingo County. The new equipment allows us to still utilize the technology, while having an auditable paper trail for each ballot cast. The Election Commission and myself still have a lot of work to be done getting our new equipment ready. In the coming months, election officials across the county will be going through training. Between now and the next election in 2022, our new equipment will be shown in every community, so voters may become familiar with it and ask questions. There will also be a social media campaign to familiarize voters. This project has been a focus for me since 2020 and I want to thank the County Election Commission for their help. Our new equipment not only replaces outdated units riddled with issues, it also helps promote integrity in our election system, which obviously is a great concern for citizens. As we progress with implementation more information will be shared here and on our Facebook page. Please reach out if you have any questions.

The Cleanup Process Continues at Oak Grove Cemetery in Iuka

If you've driven by or through the cemetery in the last couple of weeks, you've seen a great deal of work has been done to clear the fallen trees and debris left behind in the wake of the devastating tornado that hit our city on August 21st. To the credit of the good people of Iuka, dedicated volunteers who brought in heavy equipment to move trees and brush and to the many individuals who simply showed up day after day with chain saws, rakes, weed eaters and blowers to do their part to clear the area. A lot of work has been done.

There is still a great deal of work that needs to be done in order to restore this space where our loved ones were laid to rest. A group of volunteers has begun re-excavating similar city cemeteries that may have similar work to be done in Oak Grove.

Last week Zach Yow, Agriculture and Natural Resource Agent and Dr. John Kushla, Research Professor, Mississippi State University, met with this group to do a walk-through of the cemetery. Dr. Kushla examined each of the damaged trees that remain standing to determine their viability. Sadly, many of these trees will need to be removed.

Dr. Kushla stated that many of the trees would need to be taken down soon anyway due to their age. He offered suggestions for tree replacements and planned to consult with colleagues who might offer additional resources. Both Dr. Kushla and Zach Yow discussed opportunities that may be available to us for replanting of trees as well as the potential to develop an overall plan drawn that would indicate the placement of new trees and shrubs.

fell during the tornado. It is the responsibility of each family to contact the company of their choosing to do this work. It is possible that this repair might be covered under your homeowner's insurance, but it may be that the deductible is higher than the actual cost of paying out of pocket. We are fortunate to have one local company, Iuka Monument Company that has already begun this work for several families.

Because of the specialized equipment necessary to safely re-mount many of the 100+ year old headstones without further damage, representatives from at least one company met with us to offer their opinion and to discuss their particular expertise in this area of restoration.

An enormous amount of work has been done organizing the deeds to the plots in Oak Grove. There are 19 sections of the cemetery. Individual maps of each section have now been put together into one large map in order to make locating graves easier. However, we have been unable to locate a map of one section - the Henry Little section. If you know where a copy of this map can be found, please let someone in the Mayor's office or Charlotte at the Tishomingo County News office know. It is our hope in the future to establish a database that would make it easier to do the record keeping for the cemetery such as locating grave sites, deeds, and available

plots.

The gazebo that stood in the middle of the cemetery was crushed during the storm by falling trees. Some of the structure has been moved and stored offsite so that large trucks can drive through that area. For years it has been difficult for equipment to move through the cemetery due to the height of the gazebo. Plans are being made to raise the height of the gazebo to ten feet once it can be safely rebuilt to remedy this problem. Many have asked if the gazebo footprint could be enlarged. However, due to the close proximity of graves around the structure, that is not possible. Also, the Col. John Moore sign over one of the entrances was blown down but has also been stored until the stone wall around that portion of the cemetery can be repaired.

We continue to ask that all flowers and other items of memorabilia that have been placed around graves be removed. We are attempting to clear the area in order that those mowing and weed-eating can more easily do their job. Flowers in monument vases or on top of the monument are fine. When clearing your loved ones grave please take the discarded flowers with you or dispose of them in the blue barrels located throughout the cemetery.

With so many areas of our city in need of attention, we hope that you will bear with us as we do our best to work in the most efficient and timely manner that we can. While it may not always seem as if things are getting done as quickly as we wish, be assured that work is being

done behind the scenes even when it may not be obvious to you.

Many folks have asked if there was a way to contribute to the tremendous cost of restoring Oak Grove Cemetery. We have now established the Oak Grove Cemetery Fund. Monies in this fund may only be used for the restoration of the cemetery. Contributions may be made in memory of loved ones or simply as a generous way to honor our heritage. Checks should be made payable to Oak Grove Cemetery Fund and mailed to 118 S Pearl Street, Iuka, MS 38852.

We will do our best to update you as new information is available or as work is being done. We hope to have additional work days when volunteers will be encouraged to help and we will get the word out on those dates as we schedule them. If you have thoughts and/or suggestions for the committee working on plans for the cemetery, feel free to email us at friendssof oakgrovecemetery@gmail.com or by contacting city hall. Thoughtful consideration will be given regarding your suggestion or concern. All recommendations made by the committee will be presented to the Mayor and Board of Aldermen/Alderwomen for their approval.

October is Breast Cancer awareness month and Dr. Jim Perkins would like to remind pet owners that while we typically think of Breast Cancer as something for humans, we need to

remember that this affects dogs and cats too. In animals it is called Mammary Gland Tumors, which doesn't sound as scary, but in fact, is the same issue that face humans. Mammary Gland Tumors affect female dogs and cats that have not been spayed. These tumors can affect any of the mammary glands, or breasts, in our pets. What causes them is unknown, though hormones are believed to play a role in their development. This is another benefit to having your female pet spayed before their first heat cycle. The main sign of breast cancer in dogs and cats is a lump or mass (usually painless). You can usually detect the lump easily by gently palpating the animals mammary glands. The larger



glands (the 4th glands which are the groin) are more likely to develop such a lump in your pet. If you find a lump in your pet, please call Dr. Jim Perkins at 662-423-6666 for an appointment. 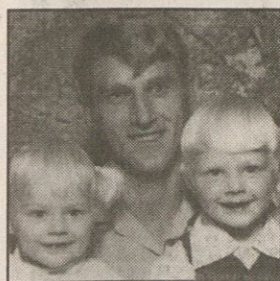

Iuka Man Honored as Patient of the Year

IUKA, Mississippi—Charles Stafford was recently honored as Patient of the Year by Vapotherm, a medical device company that he credits with helping save his life from COVID-19.

Vapotherm is a New Hampshire-based medical device company that manufactures the only mask free, non-invasive ventilation device on the market. Patients can eat, talk, drink and take their medications while receiving therapy because it is delivered through a lightweight nasal cannula.

"The great thing about Vapotherm is that it delivers much higher oxygen percentages than a regular oxygen cannula," says Stephanie Carr, NMMC-Iuka Respiratory Therapy supervisor. "Respiratory therapists are skilled in knowing the oxygen amount needed for each patient to improve their work of breathing."

Vapotherm honored Stafford, 43, of Iuka because of the lengths it took to save his life. He was recognized Aug. 15 at the national Value in Employees event in New Hampshire, where Vapotherm employees perform charitable acts throughout the week. He attended the event with his wife, Jessica, who is a registered nurse at North Mississippi Medical Center-Iuka, and Kerri Mitchell, an NMMC-Iuka respiratory therapist who helped care for him.

Stafford's journey

started in November when he battled what he thought was a sinus infection. Instead, he was diagnosed with COVID-19. He took over-the-counter remedies in the beginning but within a few days needed home oxygen therapy to help him breathe. "When COVID-19 first came about, I was a skeptic. I didn't think it was that big of a deal. Usually when I am sick, I can shake it," says Stafford, who has no underlying health conditions. "But COVID-19 is real, and it's the scariest thing I've ever been through in my life."

"Walking to and from the bathroom was causing extreme shortness of breath," says his wife, Jessica. "He was seemingly getting worse with each passing night. 'I would continue to monitor his oxygen saturation, watching them drop and needing to increase his oxygen.' At this point they knew he was going to need a higher level of care."

"I started going downhill quickly," Stafford says. "Everything we were doing at home wasn't working. My wife is a registered nurse and she works with COVID-19 patients all the time. She was doing everything she could." She drove him to the NMMC-Iuka Emergency Department, where he was admitted to the hospital.

Stafford was one of the first patients in Iuka to receive Vapotherm therapy—if that had not

helped him, the next step was BIPAP or intubation with mechanical ventilation. "Within minutes it brought my oxygen saturation back into the 90s," he says. "Every day I got a little better. Without it, I don't think I would be here today. Without it, I know I would've had to go to a different hospital."

The Staffords were thankful Charles was able to get the care he needed at NMMC-Iuka, and he appreciated the opportunity to thank the hospital staff and Vapotherm employees publicly. "Thank you for bringing breath back to me," he told them. "I knew I was about to die if I didn't get some kind of help. I'm living still because of the hard work that you do."

Score 222-0, The Record Still Stands

This is the week of Oct. 7, the middle of football season. Last Saturday Mississippi State pulled off a great victory over a ranked Texas A & M team, Ole Miss played Alabama. This date, Oct. 7 is significant in the football world, because on this day in 1916, Georgia Tech played Cumberland and beat them 222 to 0. A record that still stands. The Tech team coach was the legendary John Heisman, the coach for Cumberland was the legendary George E. Allen, a Booneville native, legendary for reasons other than football. Allen was a student at Cumberland, not a coach, or even a very good player.

In those days, Cumberland was a baseball school, and a good one. The football program had been all but abandoned, they didn't have a coach anymore, nor an organized team, but they still had a lingering schedule date with Georgia Tech, and Heisman insisted on Cumberland honoring it or pay a \$3,000.00 fine (\$30,000.00 in today's dollars). Most of the other schools on the schedule just took a Cumberland forfeit and went on, not Tech. Tech had a national championship caliber team that year, as they did most years when Heisman coached. You might ask why a coach of Heisman's stature would want to embarrass and humiliate and virtually destroy an inferior team like Cumberland. Well, earlier that year, Cumberland had played Tech's baseball team and beat them an embarrassing 22 to 0. That's a big score today and it was really big back then. The baseball team was also coached by the legendary John Heisman. He wanted revenge.

Allen had a special fondness for Cumberland, one of his famous relatives, Private John Allen, a longtime Congressman for our district had gone there, and Harry Ryan, a young man who grew up in the Allen household had also attended and came back to Iuka to practice law. Ryan had a special gift for creative story telling, a gift probably learned in the Allen household, and was known as the biggest liar in Tishomingo County,

(but that's another story, best left to Dr. Ben Kitchens).

Allen's involvement was indeed more than a student, so the school asked him, or he volunteered, to put a team together to play Tech and avoid the big fine. The players were mostly his fraternity brothers, and mostly inexperienced. One of his draftees, who had been promised that he wouldn't have to touch the ball, when he did, threw it down and ran off the field.

The game was in Atlanta and Cumberland simply didn't have the funds to get the team there, so Heisman sent them \$500.00 for travel expenses. He really wanted this game. The train stopped in Nashville for a layover and Allen contacted several Vanderbilt players about joining him... they refused.

The famous sports reporter for the Atlanta Constitution Grantland Rice, (the one they named a bowl game after) covered the game and commented that one of the better plays made by Cumberland was a handoff to Allen who only lost 6 yards. Knowing Mr. Allen's propensity for personal promotion, I checked the Georgia Tech archives and one of the first names I saw was

George E. Allen

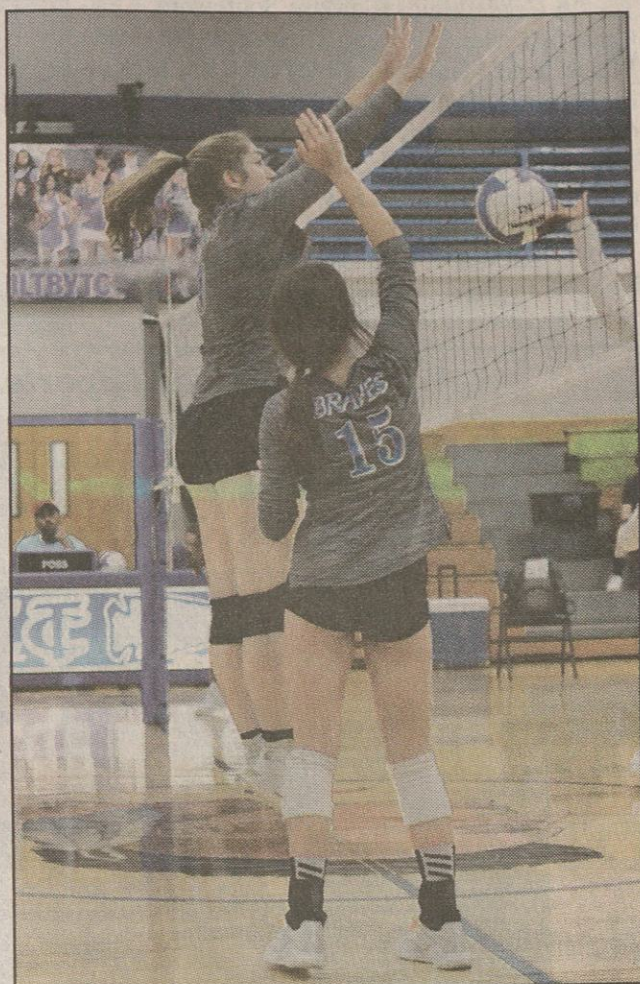


Lady Braves Softball Team Celebrating the Win Against Ripley

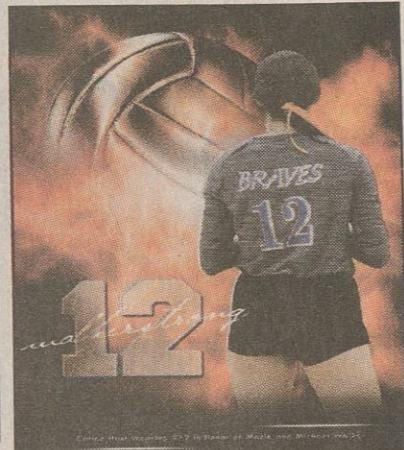

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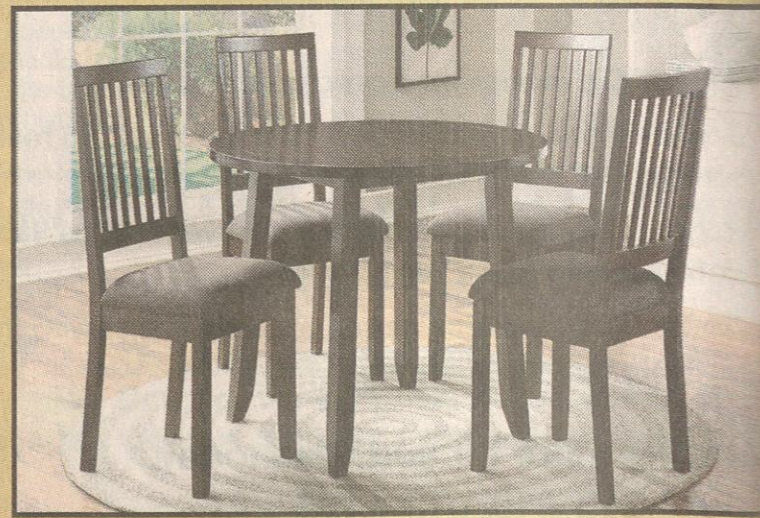
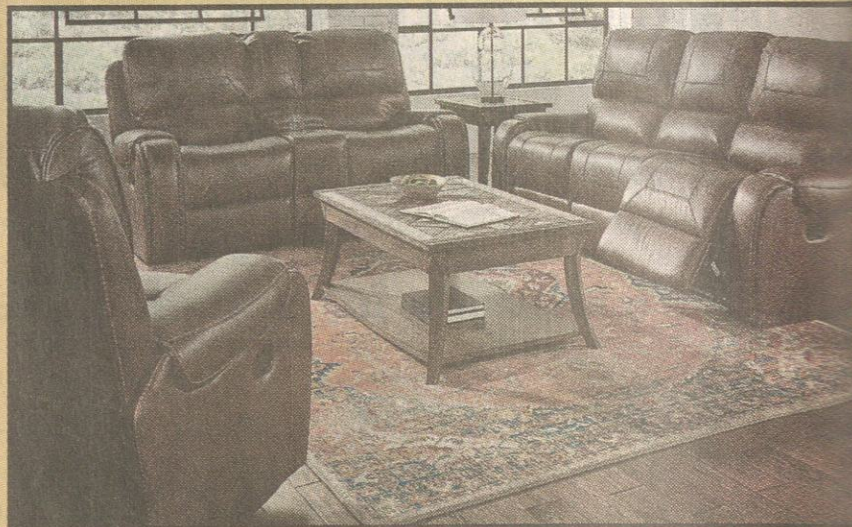
TC Cross Country Ran at Jesse Owens Field
