
cNatt Signs to Play Softball at Southwest

Most of these stones are 100+ years old. Because of the donations of private donors and family members we are able to begin the repairs. In addition to these headstones, we have two local donors who have committed to paying for the repair of Governor Stone's monument and that family plot.

Work will soon begin on the rock wall that surrounds the cemetery. Over the years it has fallen into disrepair with many of the rocks displaced and crumbling. Thanks to a generous donor, we were able to begin work this week on the wall.


America has gone through a tough time, maybe better said, we are going through a tough time. This is why we desperately need Thanksgiving.

In November 1621, after the Pilgrims' first corn harvest proved successful, Governor William Bradford organized a celebratory feast and invited a group of the fledgling colony's Native American allies, including the Wampanoag chief Massasoit. Now remembered as American's "first Thanksgiving"-although the Pilgrims themselves may not have used the term at the time-the festival lasted for three days.

That first brutal winter, most of the colonists remained on board the Mayflower ship, where they suffered from exposure, scurvy and outbreaks of contagious disease. Only half of the Mayflower's original passengers and crew lived to see their first New England spring. In March, the remaining settlers moved ashore, where they received an astonishing visit from a member of the Abenaki tribe who greeted them in English.

Several days later, he returned with another Native American, Squanto. Squanto taught the Pilgrims, weakened by malnutrition and illness, how to cultivate corn, extract sap from maple trees, catch fish in the rivers and avoid poisonous plants. He also helped the settlers forge an alliance with the Wampanoag, a local tribe, which would endure for more than 50 years and tragically remains one of the sole examples of harmony between European colonists and Native Americans. The early settlers who came to America suffered hardships that few Americans can comprehend. In the midst of so much death, sickness and starvation they found a way to stop and express gratitude. The friendship and humanitarian aid given to them by native Americans stand out as to what really makes America great. We all need to learn from the first Thanksgiving. He was born near Augusta, Georgia and spent early life most of his growing up with relatives

in Derby, Connecticut. His parents were Joseph Wheeler and Julia Knox Hull Wheeler. He was the grandson of Brigadier General William Hull, a veteran of the American Revolution who was courtmartialed for surrendering at Detroit early in the War of 1812.

Despite his northern upbringing, he was appointed to the United States Military Academy at West Point from the state of Georgia and always considered himself a Georgian and Southerner.

At the start of the Civil War, Wheeler entered the Confederate Army on March 16 as a first lieutenant serving in the Georgia state militia artillery, and then was assigned to Fort Barrancas off of Pensacola, Florida, reporting to Maj. Gen. Braxton Bragg.^[4] His resignation from the U.S. Army was accepted on April 22, 1861. He was ordered to Huntsville, Alabama, to take command of the newly formed 19th Alabama Infantry Regiment and was promoted to colonel on September 4.

He fought at the Battle of Shiloh in April 1862 and the Siege of Corinth in April and May, Wheeler's men on picket duty clashed repeatedly with Union patrols. Serving as acting brigade commander, Wheeler burned the bridges over the Tuscumbia River to cover the Confederate withdrawal to Tupelo, Mississippi.

He later transferred to the cavalry branch in middle Tennessee. He was promoted to brigadier general on October 30 and led the cavalry belonging to the Second Corps of the Army of Tennessee from November to December. During action at La Vergne, Tennessee, on November 27, Wheeler was wounded by an artillery shell that exploded near him.


In late 1864, Wheelers cavalry did not accompany Hood on his Franklin-Nashville Campaign back into Tennessee and was virtually the only effective Confederate force to oppose Sherman's March to the Sea to Savannah.1 However, his resistance to Sherman did little to comfort Georgia civilians, and lax discipline within his command caused great dissatisfaction. Robert Toombs was quoted as saying, "I hope to God he will never get back to Georgia." Maj. Gen. D. H. Hill wrote that "the whole of Georgia is full of bitter complaints of Wheeler's cavalry."[

Wheeler and his men continued to attempt to stop Sherman in the 1865 Carolinas Campaign. He defeated a Union cavalry force under Brig. Gen. Judson Kilpatrick in South Carolina at the Battle of Aiken on February 11. He was replaced as cavalry chief by Lt. Gen. Wade Hampton and fought under him at the Battle of Bentonville on March 19-20. While attempting to cover Confederate President Jefferson Davis's flight south and west in May, Wheeler was captured at Convers Station just east of Atlanta. He had intended to reach the Trans-Mississippi and Gen. Edmund Kirby Smith, still resisting out west, and had with him three officers from his staff and 11 privates when he was taken. Wheeler was imprisoned for two months, first at Fort Monroe and then in solitary confinement at Fort Delaware, where he was paroled on June 8. During his career in the Confederate States Army, Wheeler was wounded three times, lost 36 staff officers to combat, and a total of 16 horses were shot from under him. Military historian Ezra J. Warner believed that Wheelers actions leading cavalry in the conflict «were second only to those of Bedford Forrest». After the war, Wheeler became a planter and a lawyer near Courtland, Alabama, where he married and raised a family. His home, Pond Spring, in an area now known as Wheeler, Alabama, is a historic site owned by the Alabama Historical Commission. In 1880, Wheeler was elected from Alabama as a Democrat to the United States House of Representatives. Wheelers opponent, Greenback incumbent William M. Lowe, contested the election, and after a contentious legal battle which lasted over a year, Lowe was declared the winner and assumed the seat on June 3, 1882. Lowe, however, served only four months before dying of tuberculosis. Wheeler won a special election to return and serve out the remaining weeks of the term. Wheeler supported the election of Luke Pryor in 1882 and did not run for reelection, but was elected again in 1884, and re-elected to seven subsequent terms before resigning in 1900. While in Congress, Wheeler strove to heal the breach between the North and the South, and championed economic policies that would help rebuild the Southern states. He volunteered for the Spanish-American War at the age of 61. He died in New York in January 25, 1906 at the age of 69

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF TISHOMINGO COUNTY, MISSISSIPPI, DECLAR-ING THE INTENTION TO ISSUE GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS OF THE COUNTY, TO ISSUE A GEN-ERAL OBLIGATION BOND OF THE COUNTY FOR SALE TO THE MISSISSIPPI DEVELOPMENT BANK OR TO ENTER INTO A LOAN AGREEMENT WITH THE MISSISSIPPI DEVELOPMENT BANK, IN PRIN CIPAL AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$6,000,000, IN ONE OR MORE SERIES, TO PROVIDE FUNDS FOR THE PURPOSE OF CONSTRUCTING, RECONSTRUCTING, AND REPAIRING ROADS, HIGHWAYS AND BRIDGES, AND ACQUIRING THE NECESSARY LAND, INCLUDING LAND FOR ROAD BUILDING MATERIALS, ACQUIRING RIGHTS-OF-WAY THEREFOR, AND FOR THE PURCHASE OF HEAVY CON-STRUCTION EQUIPMENT AND ACCESSORIES THERETO REASONABLY REQUIRED TO CONSTRUCT REPAIR, AND RENOVATE ROADS, HIGHWAYS, AND BRIDGES AND APPROACHES THERETO WITHIN THE COUNTY; AND PURCHASING MACHINERY AND EQUIPMENT WHICH HAVE AN EXPECTED USE-FUL LIFE IN EXCESS OF 10 YEARS; DIRECTING PUBLICATION OF NOTICE OF SUCH INTENTION; AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi (the "Governing Body" of the "County"), acting for and on behalf of the County, hereby finds, determines, adjudicates, and declares as follow

1. It is necessary and in the public interest to issue debt obligations of the County to provide funds for the purpose of (i) constructing, reconstructing, and repairing roads, highways, and bridges, and acquiring the necessary land, including land for road building materials, acquiring rights-of-way therefor, and for the purchase of heavy construction equipment and accessories thereto reasonably required to construct, repair, and renovate roads, highways, and bridges and approaches thereto within the County; and purchasing machinery and equipment which have an expected useful life in excess of 10 years (the "Authorized Purposes");(ii) funding a capitalized interest account, if necessary; and, (iii) paying the costs of the authorization, issuance, sale, validation, and delivery of the debt obligations(together, the "Project")

2. The County is authorized by Sections 1991 et seq., Mississippi Code of 1972, as amended (the "County Improvements Act"), to issue general obligation bonds of the County in an amount not to exceed the principal amount of \$6,000,000, in one or more series (the "Bonds"), for the Project, and for which purpose there are no other available funds on hand.

3. The assessed value of all taxable property within the County, according to the last completed assessment for taxation, is \$187,733,636. The County has outstanding bonded indebtedness subject to the 15% debt limit prescribed by the County Improvements Act, in the amount of\$3,780,000, and outstanding bonded and floating indebtedness subject to the 20% debt limit prescribed by the County Improvements Act (which amount includes the sum set forth above subject to the 15% debt limit), in the amount of\$3,780,000. The issuance of the bonded indebtedness hereinafter proposed to be issued, when added to the outstanding bonded indebtedness of the County, will not result in bonded indebtedness, exclusive of indebtedness not subject to the aforesaid 15% debt limit, of more than 15% of the assessed value of taxable property within the County, and will not result in indebtedness, both bonded and floating, exclusive of indebtedness not subject to the aforesaid 20% debt limit, in excess of 20% of the assessed value of tax-

4. Under the provisions of the County Improvements Act, Sections 31-25-1 et seq., Mississippi Code of 1972, as amended (the "Bank Act"), and other applicable laws of the State of Mississippi (the "State"), the County is authorized to undertake activities for the Project and to provide for the payment of the costs thereof, or any portion of such costs, by issuing a general obligation bond or general obligation bonds of the County in an amount not to exceed the principal amount of \$6,000,000, in one or more series, for the Project(the "Qualified Obligation"), for sale to the Mississippi Development Bank (the "Bank"), or entering into a loan agreement and obtaining a loan from the Bank for the Project in an amount not to exceed the principal amount of \$6,000,000, in one or more series (the "Loan").

5. The County reasonably expects that it will incur expenditures for the Project for which the County will advance internal funds prior to the issuance of theBonds, the Qualified Obligation, or the Loan, and that it should declare its official intent to reimburse itself for all or a portion of such expenditures of the Project made in anticipation of the issuance of theBonds, the Qualified Obligation, or the Loan

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE COUNTY AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. This resolution is adopted pursuant to the County Improvements Act, the Bank Act, and other applicable laws of the State (together, the "Act").

SECTION 2. The Governing Body, acting for and on behalf of the County, does hereby declare its intention to issue and sell the Bonds or the Qualified Obligationor enter into the Loan, pursuant to the Act.

The Bondsor the Qualified Obligation, if issued, will be general obligations payable as to prin-SECTION 3. cipal and interest out of and secured by an irrevocable pledge of the avails of a tax to be levied annually, if necessary, upon all the taxable property within the geographical limits of the County, which tax, together with any other moneys available for such purpose, shall be sufficient to provide for the payment of the principal of and the interest on the Bonds according to the terms thereof. The Loan, if issued, will be payable from the legally available revenues of the County. Other funds available to the County which may be lawfully used for payment of the principal of and interest on the Bonds, Qualified Obligation, or the Loan, if issued, include, but are not limited to, use taxes remitted from the State to the County as a result of the Infrastructure Modernization Act of 2018, House Bill 1, 2018 First Extraordinary

SECTION 4. Pursuant to Section 1.150-2 of the Treasury Regulations (the "Reimbursement Regulations"), the Governing Body hereby declares its official intent to reimburse expenditures made for the Project prior to the issuance of the Bonds, the Qualified Obligation, or the Loan with the proceeds of the Bonds, the Qualified Obligation, or the Loan, to the extent permitted by the Reimbursement Regulations

SECTION 5 The Governing Body proposes to direct the issuance of the Bonds, the Qualified Obligation, or the Loan in the amount, for the purpose, and secured as aforesaid, at a meeting of the Governing Body to be held at its regular meeting place and time in the Courthouse of the County located at 1008 Battleground Drivein the City ofluka, Mississippi, at 8:30 a.m. onDecember 6, 2021, or at some meeting held subsequent thereto.If20%, or 1,500, whichever is less, of the qualified electors of the County shall file with the Chancery Clerk of the County a written protest against the issuance of the Bonds, the Qualified Obligation, or the Loan on or before the aforesaid date and hour, then the Bonds, the Qualified Obligation, or the Loan shall not be issued unless authorized at an election to be called and held as provided by law on the question of the issuance of the Bonds, the Qualified Obligation, or the Loan. If no sufficient protest is filed, then the Bonds, the Qualified Obligation, or the Loan may be issued without an election on the question of the issuance thereof at any time within a period of 2years after the date above specified.

SECTION 6. This resolution shall be published once a week for at least 3 consecutive weeks in the Tishomingo County News, located in the City of luka, Mississippi, a newspaper published in and having a general circulation in the County and qualified under the provisions of Section 13-3-31, Mississippi Code of 1972, as amended. The first publication of this resolution shall be made not less than 21 days prior to the date fixed herein for the issuance of the Bonds, the Qualified Obligation, or the Loan, and the last publication shall be made not more than 7 days prior to such date

SECTION 7. The Chancery Clerk shall be and is hereby directed to procure from the publisher of the aforesaid newspaper the customary proof of the publication of this resolution and have the same before the Governing Body on the date and hour specified in Section 5 hereof.

SECTION 8. If any one or more of the provisions of this resolution shall for any reason be held to be illegal or invalid, such illegality or invalidity shall not affect any of the other provisions of this resolution, but this resolution shall be construed and enforced as if such illegal or invalid provision or provisions had not been contained herein.

Following the reading of the foregoing resolution and discussion thereof, SupervisorJeff Holt moved and SupervisorGreg Collier seconded the motion to adopt the foregoing resolution, and the question being put to a roll call vote. the result was as follows
