Most of these stones are 100+ years old. Because of the donations of private donors and family members we are able to begin the repairs. In addition to these headstones, we have two local donors who have committed to paying for the repair of Governor Stone's monument and that family plot.

Work will soon begin on the rock wall that surrounds the cemetery. Over the years it has fallen into disrepair with many of the rocks displaced and crumbling. Thanks to a generous donor, we were able to begin work this week on the wall.

Yet, there remains much work to be done and your contributions are still needed to continue the work on this sacred ground. If you wish to contribute to the work that remains to be done,

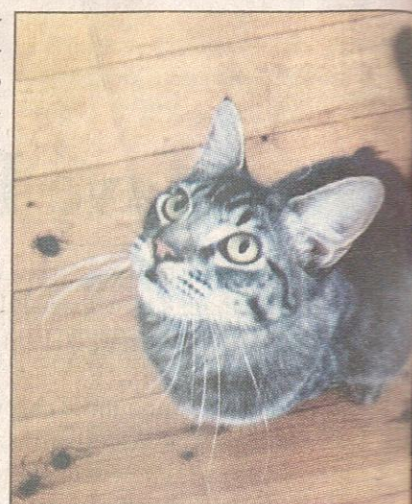
Pet of the Week

What Will Happen When The Big Judge C

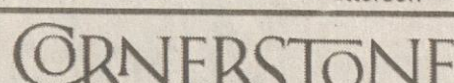

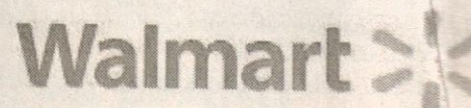

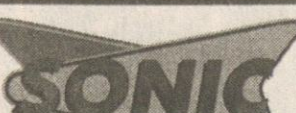

Americans horrifically viewed the murder of George Floyd by a Minneapolis police officer and said we aren't going to take that anymore.

Over 762,000 people have died from Covid-19 in America. Over 47 million of us have been sick. Families who have buried loved ones don't need convincing about the realities of Covid-19. Americans who have spent weeks in hospital intensive care units know they are fortunate to be alive. However, in the midst of America's pandemic nightmare, Americans have debated with each other over vaccinations, masks, school and business closures. We have watched our businesses suffer. Our government's finances have been further strained to supply money to hurting unemployed people.

Americans watched our departure from Afghanistan in horror. We argued among ourselves about how we should have left, the timing of our departure, and whether we should have left at all.

In November 1621, after the Pilgrims' first corn harvest proved successful, Governor William Bradford organized a celebratory feast and invited a group of the fledgling colony's Native American allies, including the Wampanoag chief Massasoit. Now remembered as America's "first Thanksgiving"—although the Pilgrims themselves may not have used the term at the time—the festival lasted for three days.

That first brutal winter, most of the colonists remained on board the Mayflower ship, where they suffered from exposure, scurvy and outbreaks of contagious disease. Only half of the Mayflower's original passengers and crew lived to see their first New England spring. In March, the remaining settlers moved ashore, where they received an astonishing visit from a member of the Abenaki tribe who greeted them in English.

Several days later, he returned with another Native American, Squanto. Squanto taught the Pilgrims, weakened by malnutrition and illness, how to cultivate corn, extract sap from maple trees, catch fish in the rivers and avoid poisonous plants. He also helped the settlers forge an alliance with the Wampanoag, a local tribe, which would endure for more than 50 years and tragically remains one of the sole examples of harmony between European colonists and Native Americans. The early settlers who came to America suffered hardships that few Americans can comprehend. In the midst of so much death, sickness and starvation they found a way to stop and express gratitude. The friendship and humanitarian aid given to them by native Americans stand out as to what really makes America great. We all need to learn from the first Thanksgiving. Bogg's Chapel School

This was a one classroom school. The school had two rooms. The large room was used for holding classes and for the teacher and children. The smaller room was used for wood for the classroom in the winter and also for drinking water. My teacher from second to eighth grade was Mrs. Ruth Dawson.

She had a high comprehension of all the subjects offered which was a high concern for each student in atten-

dance. A concern not only for the advancement of scholastic knowledge but overall growth as a good citizen and in good health.

Each week on Friday afternoon, a different student was assigned and completed a program. The program consisted of the pledged of allegiance, the Lord's Prayer, Bible reading, a poem by said student, and ending with all singing from the school song books. The songs were selected and led by our teacher Mrs. Dawson. The wood for heating was supplied by parents and the drinking

water was from a well from the house nearby. The students carried their lunch from home.

Each year at the end of the school, a play was presented and attended by the parents of the students and other members of the community. The plays became so popular that it was presented in a larger building so that a larger audience could attend. Before Christmas each year, we presented a Christmas program consisting of a Christmas tree with gifts to be shared with all the children. This event ended with the children sing-

ing Christmas carols.

Our teacher Mrs. Dawson selected and presented many events that the community and parents participated in to raise funds for the improvement of the school. These events provided good fun and entertainment for all. We had cake walks, box suppers where boys could bid on each box so they could sit and eat with the girl who brought it. There would be contests to determine who was the prettiest girl and one to determine the ugliest man. These were determined by voting and it was one

cent a vote.

One event scheduled at the school was called "Tacky Party". I don't know who could have persuaded them but Chester Dawson and my brother John, came to the party wearing dresses. The stayed outside of the building at first, but eventually they had to come inside in the light and tied for first place.

Mrs. Dawson was enrolled at Mississippi State while teaching at Bogg's Chapel School. She was one of Dr. J. D. Falls' students and was involved in science experiments with her stu-

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF TISHOMINGO COUNTY, MISSISSIPPI, DECLARING THE INTENTION TO ISSUE GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS OF THE COUNTY, TO ISSUE A GENERAL OBLIGATION BOND OF THE COUNTY FOR SALE TO THE MISSISSIPPI DEVELOPMENT BANK, OR TO ENTER INTO A LOAN AGREEMENT WITH THE MISSISSIPPI DEVELOPMENT BANK, IN PRINCIPAL AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$6,000,000, IN ONE OR MORE SERIES, TO PROVIDE FUNDS FOR THE PURPOSE OF CONSTRUCTING, RECONSTRUCTING, AND REPAIRING ROADS, HIGHWAYS, AND BRIDGES, AND ACQUIRING THE NECESSARY LAND, INCLUDING LAND FOR ROAD BUILDING MATERIALS, ACQUIRING RIGHTS-OF-WAY THEREFOR, AND FOR THE PURCHASE OF HEAVY CONSTRUCTION EQUIPMENT AND ACCESSORIES THERETO REASONABLY REQUIRED TO CONSTRUCT, REPAIR, AND RENOVATE ROADS, HIGHWAYS, AND BRIDGES AND APPROACHES THERETO WITHIN THE COUNTY; AND PURCHASING MACHINERY AND EQUIPMENT WHICH HAVE AN EXPECTED USEFUL LIFE IN EXCESS OF 10 YEARS; DIRECTING PUBLICATION OF NOTICE OF SUCH INTENTION; AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES.

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi (the "Governing Body" of the "County"), acting for and on behalf of the County, hereby finds, determines, adjudicates, and declares as follows:

1. It is necessary and in the public interest to issue debt obligations of the County to provide funds for the purpose of (i) constructing, reconstructing, and repairing roads, highways, and bridges, and acquiring the necessary land, including land for road building materials, acquiring rights-of-way therefor, and for the purchase of heavy construction equipment and accessories thereto reasonably required to construct, repair, and renovate roads, highways, and bridges and approaches thereto within the County; and purchasing machinery and equipment which have an expected useful life in excess of 10 years (the "Authorized Purposes"); (ii) funding a capitalized interest account, if necessary; and, (iii) paying the costs of the authorization, issuance, sale, validation, and delivery of the debt obligations (together, the "Project").

2. The County is authorized by Sections 1991 *et seq.*, Mississippi Code of 1972, as amended (the "County Improvements Act"), to issue general obligation bonds of the County in an amount not to exceed the principal amount of \$6,000,000, in one or more series (the "Bonds"), for the Project, and for which purpose there are no other available funds on hand.

3. The assessed value of all taxable property within the County, according to the last completed assessment for taxation, is \$187,733,636. The County has outstanding bonded indebtedness subject to the 15% debt limit prescribed by the County Improvements Act, in the amount of \$3,780,000, and outstanding bonded and floating indebtedness subject to the 20% debt limit prescribed by the County Improvements Act (which amount includes the sum set forth above subject to the 15% debt limit), in the amount of \$3,780,000. The issuance of the bonded indebtedness hereinafter proposed to be issued, when added to the outstanding bonded indebtedness of the County, will not result in bonded indebtedness, exclusive of indebtedness not subject to the aforesaid 15% debt limit, of more than 15% of the assessed value of taxable property within the County, and will not result in indebtedness, both bonded and floating, exclusive of indebtedness not subject to the aforesaid 20% debt limit, in excess of 20% of the assessed value of taxable property within the County, and will not exceed any constitutional or statutory limitation upon indebtedness which may be incurred by the County.

4. Under the provisions of the County Improvements Act, Sections 31-25-1 *et seq.*, Mississippi Code of 1972, as amended (the "Bank Act"), and other applicable laws of the State of Mississippi (the "State"), the County is authorized to undertake activities for the Project and to provide for the payment of the costs thereof, or any portion of such costs, by issuing a general obligation bond or general obligation bonds of the County in an amount not to exceed the principal amount of \$6,000,000, in one or more series, for the Project (the "Qualified Obligation"), for sale to the Mississippi Development Bank (the "Bank"), or entering into a loan agreement and obtaining a loan from the Bank for the Project in an amount not to exceed the principal amount of \$6,000,000, in one or more series (the "Loan").

5. The County reasonably expects that it will incur expenditures for the Project for which the County will advance internal funds prior to the issuance of the Bonds, the Qualified Obligation, or the Loan, and that it should declare its official intent to reimburse itself for all or a portion of such expenditures of the Project made in anticipation of the issuance of the Bonds, the Qualified Obligation, or the Loan.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE COUNTY AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. This resolution is adopted pursuant to the County Improvements Act, the Bank Act, and other applicable laws of the State (together, the "Act").

SECTION 2. The Governing Body, acting for and on behalf of the County, does hereby declare its intention to issue and sell the Bonds or the Qualified Obligation or enter into the Loan, pursuant to the Act.

SECTION 3. The Bonds or the Qualified Obligation, if issued, will be general obligations payable as to principal and interest out of and secured by an irrevocable pledge of the avails of a tax to be levied annually, if necessary, upon all the taxable property within the geographical limits of the County, which tax, together with any other moneys available for such purpose, shall be sufficient to provide for the payment of the principal of and the interest on the Bonds according to the terms thereof. The Loan, if issued, will be payable from the legally available revenues of the County. Other funds available to the County which may be lawfully used for payment of the principal of and interest on the Bonds, Qualified Obligation, or the Loan, if issued, include, but are not limited to, use taxes remitted from the State to the County as a result of the Infrastructure Modernization Act of 2018, House Bill 1, 2018 First Extraordinary Session.

SECTION 4. Pursuant to Section 1.150-2 of the Treasury Regulations (the "Reimbursement Regulations"), the Governing Body hereby declares its official intent to reimburse expenditures made for the Project prior to the issuance of the Bonds, the Qualified Obligation, or the Loan with the proceeds of the Bonds, the Qualified Obligation, or the Loan, to the extent permitted by the Reimbursement Regulations.

SECTION 5. The Governing Body proposes to direct the issuance of the Bonds, the Qualified Obligation, or the Loan in the amount, for the purpose, and secured as aforesaid, at a meeting of the Governing Body to be held at its regular meeting place and time in the Courthouse of the County located at 1008 Battleground Drive in the City of luka, Mississippi, at 8:30 a.m. on December 6, 2021, or at some meeting held subsequent thereto. If 20%, or 1,500, whichever is less, of the qualified electors of the County shall file with the Chancery Clerk of the County a written protest against the issuance of the Bonds, the Qualified Obligation, or the Loan on or before the aforesaid date and hour, then the Bonds, the Qualified Obligation, or the Loan shall not be issued unless authorized at an election to be called and held as provided by law on the question of the issuance of the Bonds, the Qualified Obligation, or the Loan. If no sufficient protest is filed, then the Bonds, the Qualified Obligation, or the Loan may be issued without an election on the question of the issuance thereof at any time within a period of 2 years after the date above specified.

SECTION 6. This resolution shall be published once a week for at least 3 consecutive weeks in the *Tishomingo County News*, located in the City of luka, Mississippi, a newspaper published in and having a general circulation in the County and qualified under the provisions of Section 13-3-31, Mississippi Code of 1972, as amended. The first publication of this resolution shall be made not less than 21 days prior to the date fixed herein for the issuance of the Bonds, the Qualified Obligation, or the Loan, and the last publication shall be made not more than 7 days prior to such date.

SECTION 7. The Chancery Clerk shall be and is hereby directed to procure from the publisher of the aforesaid newspaper the customary proof of the publication of this resolution and have the same before the Governing Body on the date and hour specified in Section 5 hereof.

SECTION 8. If any one or more of the provisions of this resolution shall for any reason be held to be illegal or invalid, such illegality or invalidity shall not affect any of the other provisions of this resolution, but this resolution shall be construed and enforced as if such illegal or invalid provision or provisions had not been contained herein.

Following the reading of the foregoing resolution and discussion thereof, Supervisor Jeff Holt moved and Supervisor Greg Collier seconded the motion to adopt the foregoing resolution, and the question being put to a roll call vote, the result was as follows:
