No change for Iuka voters in November election

The Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors recently approved the Iuka Voting Precinct physical location to be relocated in 2023, at the request of the Circuit Clerk and Election Commission. The current location of the Iuka Voting Precinct at the TCEPA metering department (Old Chevrolet Place), 104 Constitution Drive Iuka will NOT change for the November 8, 2022 Election. However, in 2023 the Iuka Voting Precinct will be relocated to the Boy Scout Building on Paul Edmonson Drive for the 2023 Countywide election.

The Tishomingo County Electric Power Association (TCEPA) informed the Election Commission in June they will be utilizing the current Iuka Precinct space for Tishomingo Connect offices and storage in 2023.

Expanding the Tishomingo Connect operations in the metering department building leaves no space for the voting precinct. This required the Iuka Voting Precinct to be relocated.

Again, there will be no change to the Iuka voting Precinct for the upcoming November 8th General Election.

The Boy Scout Building will require some improvements to the entrance, parking lot, and minor ADA items.

More information we will provided in the future, including individual notice to voters affected.

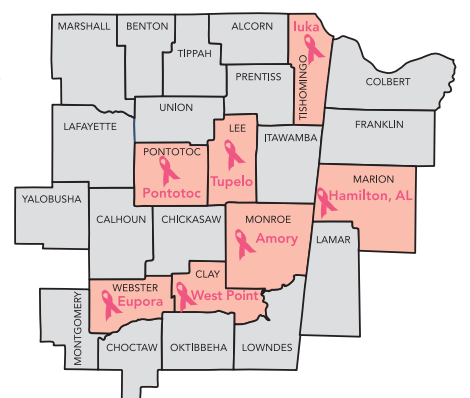

Making straw and cotton mattresses, brooms and mops in the Depression

Sleeping on a straw mattress was common during the Great Depression. If possible, sage grass was the best. We would take our pick sacks and go to the farm where sage grass was plentiful, break it off and fill our sacks running over with the good-smelling dried grass. It was a team effort. Mom would empty our last year's grass, wash and dry the old mattress cover and before bedtime, we'd have a big, fluffy, fresh smelling mattress.

Not all our beds had straw mattresses, but Jewel and mine did for a few years.

When Franklin D. Roosevelt became president of the U.S. on March 4, 1933, banks had closed but he introduced several projects that put people to work. I am telling about the one where he sent trained crews to rural communities and cotton mattresses were made. We would go to Mt. Glory Church to learn how to make them. As I recall, all the materials were provided, and we provided the labor. Mom and Dad got one and Jewel and I moved out of the straw bed, too!

Another thing we raised was a special type of straw to make brooms. Brooms were made and many became quite skilled at broom making. Mops to scrub floors were made from dried corn shucks. They were

very simple: they cut round holes in a board/plank about 16 inches by 6 inches, put husks through and scrub away.

I think I've alluded in the past to Cripple Deer Creek's almost clear water.

Only after a rain, when runoff from local fields made it unfit for swimming was it not perfect. There were no beavers to dam up the creek and make it go where they wanted. They ruined our swimming pool.

Fall has sprung and most oldies do not like cold weather. Autumn months are very pretty, but I like spring much better. Every fall it is time for me to pull from the bookshelf my seventeen-year-old book of poems from autumn. I read them sometimes when it isn't autumn.

One of my students and Beta club members gave me a booklet of autumn poems. It has been a cherished gift and one I have read many times. Thanks, Kirby, it's this kind of

Support local news. It's the good stuff.

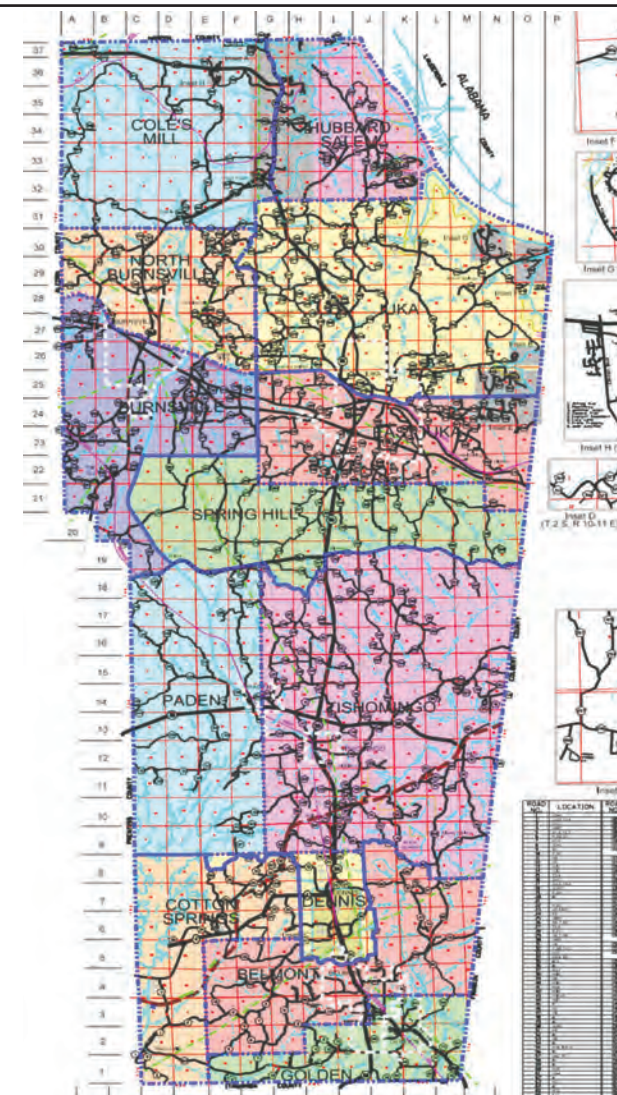

Redistricting reminders for the November election

Approximately 4,000 voters in the county have been affected by redistricting. Voters could see one or more changes from this process including a new supervisor district, a new voting precinct location, and/or a new State of Mississippi House of Representatives District. You can find the New Supervisor District Map, Voting Precinct Map, and more about redistricting at TISHCOCIRCUITCLERK.COM by clicking the announcements tab. Changes from redistricting are effective for this year's General Election on November 8th, 2022. Notification of changes and new voter registration cards were mailed to those affected this summer. If you have questions, please call us at 662-423-7026.

The redistricting or redrawing of the Tishomingo County Supervisor voting district boundary lines was completed in 2022 by the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors, utilizing the 2020 Census data, and working with the Northeast Mississippi Planning and Development District. The redistricting process is required to be completed by law every 10 years, with the intent of making each voting district equal in number of people, within 10 percent. The Board of Supervisors are responsible for making any changes to the district lines, while it's the Circuit Clerk's job to ensure voter records are updated accordingly and voters are notified of changes.

Two charged with 1st degree murder, arson after fire in Tishomingo

Tishomingo County authorities have charged two men with first degree murder, arson and tampering with physical evidence following in investigation of a burning residence in Tishomingo where human remains were found.

According to a release by the sheriff's department, Monday morning, October 3rd, in the early morning hours, Tishomingo County 911 received several calls reporting a possible fire in the area of Hill Road in Tishomingo. Deputies responded to the area along with the fire

department.

A residence at 13 Hill Road in Tishomingo was found to be fully engulfed in flames. As fire fighters attempted to extinguish the fire, it was discovered that human remains were inside the residence. Investigators with the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department

and State Fire Marshal's Office were called to the scene. After a preliminary investigation, foul play was suspected. Two individuals who were reported to have been at the residence on the prior day were questioned.

After being questioned, those two individuals were criminally charged as follows: Randy Barrett Kelly of Tishomingo, Mississippi, was charged with first degree murder, arson, and tampering with physical evidence. Kelly is being held on a \$825,000 bond.

James Matthew Richardson of Blue Springs, Mississippi, was charged with first degree murder and is being held on a \$750,000 bond.

The name of the victim is being withheld pending further forensic investigation, said authorities. The investigation is ongoing. The Sheriff's Department would like to extend our condolences to the family of the victim in this crime and will continue in our commitment into investigating this crime.

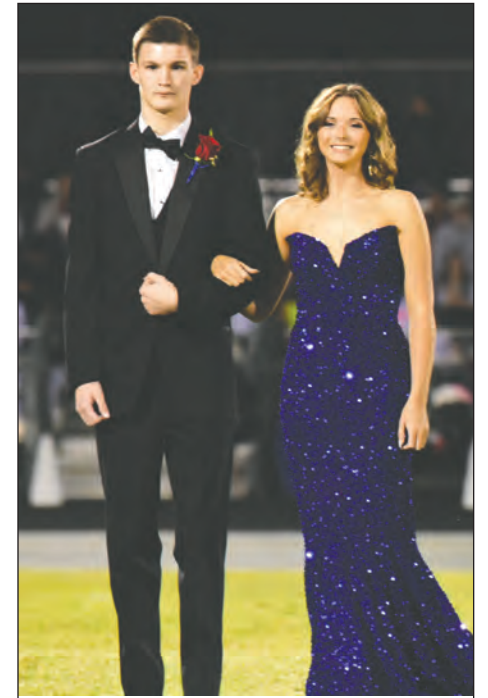

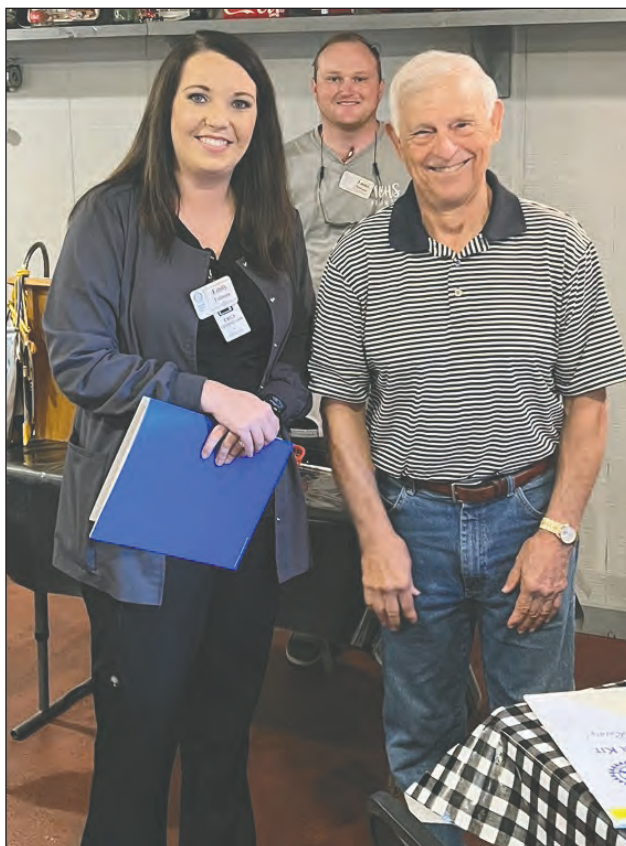

Lung Cancer, It Still Kills

1,900 Mississippians die each year from lung cancer.

Mississippi ranks 46th in the nation for tobacco use. We are still killing ourselves, slowly. According to the Mississippi State Department of Health (MSDH) Office of Tobacco Control, 1,900 Mississippians die each year from lung cancer.

Becky Smith, a 36-year-old mother who lives in Madison County decided to quit because she wanted to live for her baby. "I started smoking cigarettes when I was 14. I thought I was cool. Because I couldn't see lung cancer, I didn't think about it." Smith added, "I care about my health now, and the health of my baby. I learned that secondhand smoke is incredibly dangerous and could give my baby cancer. I didn't want to do that to him."



The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) reports that 20 percent of all adults in Mississippi smoke. That is significantly higher than the national rate of just 15 percent.

"If you are a smoker, quitting is the best bet against lung cancer," said Sonya Sanderson, Director of the Mississippi Tobacco-Free Coalition of Prentiss and Tishomingo Counties. "In Mississippi only 5 percent of high-risk individuals get screened for lung cancer. We want to see rates much higher than that. Getting a diagnosis is the first step and the most important step once

you quit." "Quitting smoking was hard work, and I'm glad I had help," said Becky. Using programs like those offered through the MSDH can increase the likelihood of quitting and staying smoke free for life.

Sonya Sanderson reminds all Mississippians that the Health Department stands ready to support you on your smoke-free journey.

"One call to 1-800-QUIT-NOW can change your life for the better. We offer one on one support that has been tested for over 25 years. Our program has helped countless Mississippians, and we want to help you too," Sonya Sanderson said.

National Fire Prevention Month/Week

October is National Fire Prevention Month with National Fire Prevention Week being observed October 9-15, 2022. This year's theme "Fire Won't Wait. Plan Your Escape™" works to educate everyone about the simple but important actions they can take to keep themselves, and those around them, safe from home fires.

Today's homes burn faster than ever. From the time the smoke alarm sounds, you may have as little as 2 minutes or less to escape a home fire. During a fire, early warning from smoke detectors and advance planning helps your ability to escape the burning home.

This yearly observance was established to remember the Great Chicago Fire, which occurred in 1871. It killed more than 250 people, left 100,000 homeless, destroyed more than 17,400 structures, and burned more than 2,000 acres. The fire began on October 8, but continued into and did most of its damage on October 9, 1871.

While the Great Chicago Fire was the best-known blaze to erupt during this fiery 2-day period, it wasn't the largest. That distinction goes to the Peshtigo Fire, the most destructive forest fire in American history. The fire, which also occurred on October 9, 1871, roared through Northeast Wisconsin, burning down 16 towns, killing 1,152 people, and scorching 1.2 million acres before it was done.

The Peshtigo Fire began when several railroad workers clearing land for much needed tracks unintentionally started a brush fire. Soon the fast moving flames were raging across the land. It was the small town of Peshtigo, Wisconsin that suffered the worst

damage. Within an hour, the entire town had been destroyed.

People start most wildfires, but some are attributed to lightning from electrical storms. These fires can spread quickly, igniting brush, trees, and even homes. We need to be especially careful when using campfires or bonfires.

Without proper precautions, campfires are potentially dangerous. You need to know how to properly build one, how to keep it going, and how to properly extinguish it. Most of these fires burn out of control in one of two basic ways: on the ground or in the trees. Dead leaves or pine needles on the ground may ignite from direct contact or airborne embers or sparks may ignite overhanging branches.

No fire should be lit near trees, tents, or other fire hazards. Never leave a fire unattended. You should always have sand and/or water on hand to smother the fire if it does get out of control. Water is more efficient and effective in extinguishing a fire. The water should be poured until all hissing noises stop. Then you need to stir the ashes with a stick to make sure the water has penetrated all layers.

If water is unavailable, sand may be used to smother the fire. Once the fire has been covered thoroughly with sand, you will then need to stir the ashes with a stick to make sure it has been fully extinguished.
