Lady Cardinals Seeking Back to Back State Titles

Jackson's Mississippi Coliseum is a familiar court to Lady Cardinal teams, and this year, Coach Chris Higginbottom's team will be seeking the 2A State Championship, after beating Kossuth for the 3A State Championship in 2020-21.

Belmont beat the West Lincoln Lady Bears 39-18 Tuesday morning to advance to the state final game this Friday afternoon against the Lake Hornets.

Defense Wins Championships
"Today was a great team effort and team win," said Coach Higginbottom. "I was extremely proud of our defense.

We held them to two made field goals for the entire game - the rest of their points were off successful free-throws."

"I am excited for this group of girls to be able to play for a state championship and for some of them to play in back-to-back state championship games," said Higginbottom.

Belmont was 14 of 14 in the first half for free throws, and they were ahead 14-2 after the first quarter. West Lincoln didn't even make their first field goal until the second quarter. At the half it was 26-9 Belmont, and that theme continued through to the end of

History already made for TC's Lady Braves

It's the first time since 1998 that any Tishomingo County basketball team has been to the finals of the State Tournament, and the Lady Braves showed they have the ability to play at that level after a 65-52 victory in overtime over Pass Christian Monday night.

"We should have won that in the fourth quarter," said TC Coach Brian Middleton. "Pass Christian played better than the eight films we have watched of them. Five threes in the first half was unexpected, but we didn't think they could keep that up, either."

After going into halftime trailing by three (25-22) the Lady Braves came alive in the second half, helped by senior Madison Bennett finally finding ways to sink some three-pointers, herself, with 21 points in the second half for a total 27 points.

"Madison has managed to find another gear these past few games," Middleton said. "I know she will not let us down."

Senior Clara Garland had 10 points, and underclassmen Lexi Kennedy, Zarelli Ozuna and Reece Moore all had 8 points each.

Tishomingo Connect: More than 5,400 in county have high-speed internet

More than 5,400 homes have high speed fiber internet service so far in Tishomingo county thanks to Tishomingo Connect, and they are adding about 75 to 100 customers each week.

TCEPA assistant general manager Cody Durham said that crews have lately been working to connect customers in the Eastport and Snowdown areas, heading toward the areas west of Highway 25, like Midway and south to Tishomingo. Next on the list will be the areas south of Burnsville and on the other side of the Tennessee

see Tombigbee Waterway.

We have had an overwhelmingly positive response, said Durham. We were told to expect about 30 percent of those offered would accept and go through with installation, but we have a 50 percent "take" rate.

From the Tennessee River to remote Bloody Springs, homes have reliable internet that have never had it before.

"I can see Alabama from my house," quipped Aurora. The new fiber service works well enough for him to have daily video meetings, do screen sharing, and for his whole family to be online when they are all there.


"Tishomingo County is a wonderful place for telecommuting, now," said Aurora. "We have low property costs, generally low cost of living, and now super-fast internet!"

The installation started in 2020 with

\$4.7 million in CARES Act funds. Since then, they bid on, and won \$10.9 million in rural digital fund money that will fund the project over the next ten years.

TCEPA has about 13,700 electrical account customers, and discounting shops, barns and the like, has made available fiber internet to about 11,500 homes. Seventy percent of the area is ready for home hook-up, said Durham. The infrastructure is there to connect to when new homes want to be connected.

They hope to have everyone who has asked to be connected, connected by next year.

Second child born to Burnsville mom on 2/22/22

FLORENCE, Ala. — So what would be better than to have your second child on “Twosday?”

Coleson Branch Morris topped it when he was born at North Alabama Medical Center at 2:22 a.m. on 2/22/22.

The 6 pound, 3 ounce, blue-eyed, sandy-blond baby boy who was 21 inches in length wasn't supposed to be arriving so early, according to his mother, Jade Newcomb.

She said his due date was March 15.

“[On Monday] I had a regular visit with my OB for a 37-week checkup. She did the ultrasound, told me the fluid level was really low and that I needed to be admitted to the hospital,” Newcomb said. “I was already 4 centimeters dilated, so he was on his way.”

Newcomb said she arrived in Florence from her home in Burnsville, Mississippi, around 3:30 p.m. and in a few short hours her baby boy arrived.

“I had just gotten his car seat on Sunday, and when I went to work on Monday, the girls at work told me that I had better take my bag with me to the OB because they felt that it was time too because my legs and feet were so swollen.”

Newcomb said her Facebook page has been filled with well wishes for her and her

son. “My friends can't get over the time and date he was born,” she said. “They all just think it's so cool.”

Coleson is the 28-year-old's second child. Shyloh Newcomb was born on March 13, 2018, at the former ECM in Florence.

“She really wanted a baby sister, but she got used to the idea of having a baby brother,” Jade said of what her daughter's

reaction was to having a baby brother. “She's ready to meet him, though.”

Charlotte “Bebe” Morris, who was with her daughter at the time of delivering Coleson, said she thought the time and the date of his birth was “hilarious.”

“She goes to the doctor's office and the next thing I know she needs to go to the hospital,” Morris said. “Luckily, I already had my bag partially packed.”

Morris described the birth of her

grandson as being “better than chocolate,” and she admitted to being a chocoholic.

“It's very warm feeling ... it's something you can't describe,” she said. “When you have a child you think can never love that child more than at that moment. Then with a grandbaby, it's that all over again. The love keeps expanding and the heart keeps growing.”

“When I think about my grandchildren, I smile.”

Tiny Houses Fit a Variety of Plans

Availability of prefab sheds opens door to tiny house ownership locally

Tiny houses have grown in popularity in recent years, and many people are customizing what might have been originally designed as a garden shed to suit their needs for affordable housing.

Even in Tishomingo County some people are jumping on the tiny house trend, to serve as guest housing, short-term rentals, or even as primary residences.

Tiny houses are recognized as an affordable housing system, preferred especially by millennials. They are just a fraction of the cost and can be designed and built based on customer requirements at a fraction of the cost of traditional homes, especially when customizing prefabricated buildings traditionally used as storage or garden sheds.

But millennials aren't the only ones using them! State parks and AirBnB sites now feature many tiny house options, often adding special features around a theme or related to their locality. Retirees and empty nesters have reduced their belongings in order to build a low-maintenance tiny home, and maybe travel part of each year. Women have adopted the concept as She-Sheds, making them into pretty backyard retreats, home offices, or hobby rooms. And they make for the perfect "First Home," allowing young people to own a home, affordably.

Perfect First Home

"We looked at campers, at first, but then this became available, and it suited my purpose per-

fectly," explained Kylee Barry, 20. She and her family are customizing an 11' x 32' shed for her first home, on land near her parents' place in Dennis. Living at home through her three years of college, working and saving money, her new personal tiny home will allow her to live independently, while still being close enough to help her nearby parents and grandmother.

Barry explained that the prefabricated, insulated shed was a sewing workshop for someone in Red Bay, and her family bought it for about \$7,000.

They mounted it on footers on a pretty little lot they prepared

themselves that nestles up to nearby woods. Custom Tishomingo sandstone steps lead to a railed porch with a 9-light front door. Stepping inside, you enter a bright, open living area, with new luxury vinyl flooring, clean, white beadboard paneling, and natural wood shiplap ceiling. It's hard to remember it started out as a garden shed.

Inside, they built an interior partition to wall off a bedroom, and they have added on an approximately 12' x 12' room to house a full bathroom, laundry and closet. Pocket doors provide additional separation between areas, and slide conveniently out of the way when

not in use.

It is bright and open, even though the windows are small. At the far end of the open plan, Barry shows where a full "tiny kitchen" is a work in-progress, including a small refrigerator, small stove, sink, custom cabinets and a microwave.

The added bath/laundry area cost another \$3-4 thousand, Barry said. Compared to a traditional home, it's a really affordable option for a young person.

The tiny house is still in work, and she hopes to move in about three months.

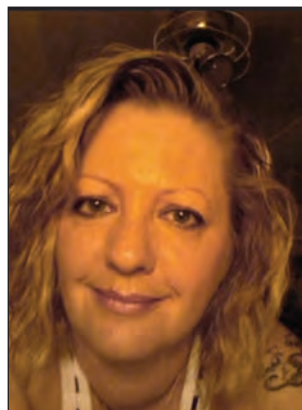

IUKA, Miss. (Feb. 21, 2022) – Boater Heath Gilmore of Meridian, Mississippi, caught five bass Saturday weighing 21 pounds, 15 ounces, to win the MLF Phoenix Bass Fishing League Presented by T-H Marine on Pickwick Lake. The tournament, hosted by Tishomingo County Tourism, was the season-opener for the Bass Fishing League Mississippi Division. Gilmore earned \$5,395 for his victory.

“I made a cold, long ride,” Gilmore said. “But it was worth it to find the transition fish in the ditches. I pulled up on the right ditch and caught the right size fish.”

Gilmore said he caught his seven fish of the day, all keepers, on a Bill Lewis Rat-L-Trap focusing on ditches that were around six feet deep.

“I had to change the retrieve up,” Gilmore said. “I started the morning out using a yo-yo action, and as the day got warmer I moved it a little faster. I just tried all types of retrieves.”

Gilmore said the water temperature was 48 degrees when the tournament began but warmed up to 53 degrees as the day progressed, which allowed him to experiment with the different retrieves.

“I had seven bites all day,” Gilmore said. “It was a long day. It wore me out. But this win feels good. I’ve been fishing Pickwick about 20 years, and I’ve been close to winning a few times, and I finally did it. I love fishing Pickwick.”

During the time I was sponsor several articles and poems were published in the National Journal by T.H.S. Betas.

I was not teaching at T.H.S. then but became sponsor of the club in 1966-1967 and sponsored until 1984. I always called them “the cream of the crop” and we had many experiences that non-Betas got to do.

A student must have had an overall 90 average before being invited and maintain this average or they were dropped from membership until his/her grades were brought to the requirement of the Beta laws at T.H.S.

Each chapter is autonomous and chooses projects that adhere to its motto “Let us lead by serving others”. The whole purpose of Beta is for the “Achievement, Character and Leadership” of high school boys and girls. We learn by doing.

What prompted me to write about the Beta Club is that I had sponsored at THS about seventeen years and I saw young boys and girls spread their wings and achieve things they thought impossible. I remember when Jackie Pennington was elected President of the THS Beta Club he told me, “Mrs. Dawson, I can’t do all this work!” He was active in sports. My reply, “You don’t do the work. You delegate.”

Like all my other Betas, he was a blessing to me and still is today.

What put me on this line of thinking? Today’s TCHS Betas have chosen a project to honor senior adults this semester. Each Beta was given a senior adult name with the charge: “You will write a letter once a month to your senior adult.” I have already received two letters. Both are very informative and I was so happy to receive a letter from a young senior Beta I had never heard of. She told me about her activities and it made me so proud to have a new friend. We are going to be pen pals because I’m going to write to her, too.

If you received a letter from a senior Beta a TCHS, please write

and answer it. If you can’t write, and many can’t, ask a friend to write for you. Tell him/her what school was like when you were a senior. It will be so special to your recipient to be able to make a comparison to yours.

I was advised by Mr. W. R. Nettles in 1944, when I started teaching, “You don’t see everything you see, neither do you hear everything you hear.”

This fact has become a reality to me now after 78 years. Take care of yourself and remember the rules.

Covid is still around taking a toll. “God is good all the time,” but we need to read and abide by His words. They never change whether we are a young senior as an oldie in senior years. They are for both.

Slower way of travel in days past

Benny Weathers of Iuka shred this photo he made in November of 1971. He says the photo has been lost for some 50 years and his daughter found it recently, to his delight. Benny remembers taking the photo of Fairfoot Coman as he passed his house on Pleasant Hill Road south of Iuka each Saturday. Fairfoot drove his mules and wagon to town and it was told that on some occasions when Fairfoot would fall asleep in downtown Iuka, his mules would take him home to Pleasant Hill.

According to the Tishomingo County Cemetery book, Fairfoot Coman was born August 22, 1896 and died June 29, 1986. His stone reads that he served in World War I as a Pvt.

On the left side of the photo is the old Chunky Chambers' (Jourdan Ford Co.) wrecker. Benny said the wrecker belonged to Popcorn Moore and was parked in his yard when the photo was taken. Those of us who remember Jourdan Ford/Chunky Chambers Ford on Fulton Street where Cornerstone Insurance is located today, remembers the old late 40's model wrecker, probably the only one in Iuka at the time. You will also remember, John Henry, the mechanic that worked at the dealership. John Henry was a Comon and possibly related to Fairfoot. I remember as a child when we had car trouble, daddy would always stop by to see John Henry and what I remember best is his big laugh. He was always happy and loved to work on cars.

If our readers know more about Fairfoot and his family we would love to hear about them.

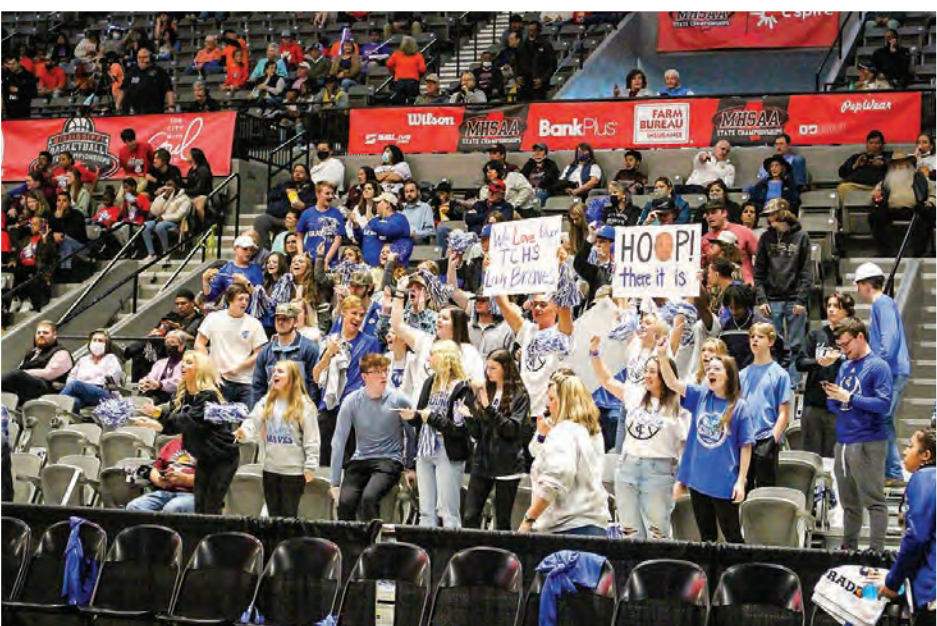
