County's Only Traffic Light to be Down as MDOT Changes Poles

The signal contractor for MDOT is ready to begin the signal and pole upgrades for the existing intersection at Battleground Drive and Highway 172/Quitman, according to Iuka Mayor Joel Robertson.

If things go as planned, on Wednesday March 30th, MDOT will convert the intersection to an ALL-WAY stop and it will remain that way for approximately eight weeks during the construction of the new signals.

"We ask for your patience and understanding of this necessary change. MDOT will put out traffic alerts for the public, but the City of Iuka wanted to make the public aware of the coming changes," said Mayor Robertson. "This will be a minor inconvenience for the city's residents, but will result in a much needed improvement for the city."

County Accepts Bids for New Fire Station at Golden

The county negotiated with the sole bidder on a new volunteer fire department building at Golden to get the project within the available funding limit.

On March 18 the county board opened one bid for construction on the new Golden Volunteer Fire Dept. The sole bid was from Pearson Construction for \$217,352; more than the available funding.

Fifth District Supervisor Greg Collier asked engineer Tommy Dean (Dean McRae Engineering) to negotiate with Pearson to remove the interior meeting room and restroom. Pearson offered a price reduction of \$39,631.00 resulting in a contract award value of \$177,721 which Dean-McRae recommended, and the board voted to award the contract to Pearson Construction. The board had a bid opening on Walker's Switch Water System Improvements and received three bids: Buz Plaxico Dozer Service, Enscor, LLC, and Eubank Construction. The Board Voted to take under advisement.

Payton Berklite, EMA Director, was approved for a \$1 million grant for the sixteen county volunteer fire departments to purchase self-contained breathing apparatuses, plus extras. The grant paid for all but \$50,606.91. Board voted to divide the balance due between the five district volunteer fire department accounts. Ferrin Rainey was approved a \$20,000 grant she is using for Woodall Mountain, placing security cameras and having a camera installed on the lookout tower providing a virtual view that will be linked to the Tishomingo County website.

The goal was to re-write the curriculum for all academic business courses that are offered in the state so that when new teacher comes into this profession, they have some type of guidance to help them get started.

After a few more sessions,

the entire curriculum will have been updated and be presented to the Department of Education for approval.

Two-headed Snakes and the Feral Cat

There is a hummingbird feeder outside the door. I was supposed to take it down and clean it at the end of hummingbird season, put it away, and wait for the birds to return. Since I never got around to taking it down, it still hangs there, one-quarter full of some fermented sugar substance fit for a tipsy June bug. It sways back and forth in the wind, as if it is trying to coax birds to return that have long-since flown away. Today is a beautiful sixty-degree day in mid-March. The winter is starting to fade away and the bright sun casts prisms through the glass bird feeder. The first flies are starting to buzz and I find myself strangely thankful. It is a very brief period that one is thankful for flies.

I have been told that the hummingbirds that frequent our feeder leave every fall and fly all the way to Central America in search of the food and warmth their raging metabolisms require. Then many of them promptly die from all the activity, much like Mayflies and mosquitoes. Hummingbirds resemble really big flying bugs anyway. I had a hummingbird in the house one time. I think it would have been easier to remove a two-headed snake.

Speaking of odd animals in the house, I used to share a house with thousands of bats. They left evidence of their presence on the windowsills every morning in the form of guano. We all resided in peace until the first brave bat ventured out of the attic and down the stairs into the world of the humans. This poor creature found the humans very inhospitable. I remember standing

in the hall with a baseball glove trying to catch the bat as it circled above causing absolute terror below. The bat was largely unaffected. All the humans needed therapy.

Then there was the feral cat. One day my then five-year-old son walked up to me and proclaimed, "That cat is still under my bed." We didn't own a cat, and no one was prepared for the events that followed. In my wisdom, I thought that I would remove the cat from under the bed with a broom. This would turn out to be a bad idea, as this was not Fluffy the kitty cat that belonged to the lady next door. This was a wild feral cat, and it was now very upset with me and especially the broom. The cat ultimately climbed eight feet up the wall and bounced off the ceiling towards my head. An hour later, there was no glass left intact, a fish named Harley gasping his last breaths on the hardwood floor, and a five-year-old in the front yard screaming at the top of his lungs over the untimely and violent demise of his fish. In a joint effort by the city police, the local animal control, and me, the cat was finally eradicated by a group of men with brooms and paralyzing darts. Very few of our breakable belongings survived the feral cat attack.

All of this leads me to wonder about the hummingbird feeder. Why would I continue to invite these creatures so close to my door? It is not as if I want a bird-bug flying around inside my house. Bad habits are a lot like bird feeders. We continue to use them to invite unwanted pests into our homes and lives. What we really should do is take them down, clean them up, and put them away.



Lamar enjoyed tinkering with his sports cars, loving on his various pets through the years, and playing trumpet and the French horn.





Camp Ground School

This photo was taken around 1910 at Camp Ground School located west of the Camp Ground Church near a spring and was the first school house built in the Camp Ground Community.

Camp Ground Church was started on January 10, 1857 when Ben and Amanda Hodges sold five acres of land for the church. It was believed to have been one of the first Methodist Episcopal Churches in the South. The original log church was destroyed during the Civil War and the second log church was built and also used as a school.My great-great grandfather, Jesse Biggs II (born 1867) attended school in the old log Camp Ground Church. This photo has some 23 children who were descendants

of the Biggs-Dexter families living between Yellow Creek and Indian Creek.

The photo belonged to my aunts, Rayma and Mary Biggs and shows Camp Ground School with a large attendance. According to their book "The Jesse Tree" these Biggs-Dexter children attended their first school at Old Clement Chapel near Eastport and moved to the Camp Ground School around 1908.

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

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Robbie & Kim Crane Head to Senegal for Full Time Mission Work

Preaching to the nations has long been Robbie Crane's heart, and this summer, he and his wife Kim will enter the mission field full time when they move to Senegal in West Africa to work at Dakar Academy, an American Christian school.

Bro. Robbie, 48, a Tishomingo native, has for the past 24 years pastored churches in the southeast, including more than ten years at Tishomingo Baptist Church, followed by his most recent position as Director of Missions for the Tishomingo Baptist Association.

"The Lord is leading us to West Africa to continue the mission of making His name known among the nations and we are saying yes," said Crane in an interview Monday. He has accepted the position of Head Chaplain at Dakar Christian Academy in Dakar, Senegal, and plans to start in late July.

The Cranes, often with their children, Jordan and Kalynn, have done short term missions in places around the world: Mexico, Kenya, Jordan, and even China, but this time the two Tishomingo natives will be full time on the ground in Senegal's largest city, providing spiritual leadership and pastoring adults, staff and students at a school for missionary kids.

At the edge of the desert

Senegal is the most western country in Africa, just south of the massive Sahara Desert, and Dakar has long been the capital city of the region. The city of 4 million people is perched on a peninsula jutting out even further west into the Atlantic. Though first colonized by the Portuguese, who established a slave trade there, Senegal was a French colony. Bro. Robbie said that all his work will be in English, with Americans living abroad either serving, or having recently served in the mission field.

"Senegal is one of the most stable countries in Africa, and missionaries who have had to leave their posts due to upheaval make up much of the community we will be serving," Bro. Robbie explained. "Some have literally been smuggled out of their countries by friends because their lives became endangered. They have temporarily settled in Senegal to try and determine their

next move."

Since meeting the director of the school in Jordan in 2016, he has been there to lead campus revivals twice, and leaders at the school have been pursuing him to come to serve full time since 2018.

It's very hot and humid, and the food is a lot different, explained Kim and Robbie. A lot of fish and rice, they said.

"And she doesn't like fish," he said.

"So just rice for four years, maybe," quipped Kim.

Pastoring a school, the staff, and community

"As Head Chaplain I'll be responsible for the spiritual health and direction of five Christian school campuses across Senegal and will help launch two new schools in Ghana & Liberia in the future," he explained. "I'll function in a pastoral role to all the faculty, staff, and students on the campuses, while hiring, training, and discipling other campus chaplains and youth pastors. Our aim will be to ensure sound Biblical doctrine flows through the schools. I will also serve as lead pastor of the church that meets on the Central Campus school in Dakar."

For the first year, Kim said she will support Robbie in his ministry, and learn how to live in a foreign country. They like to entertain in their ministry, and she looks forward to learning how to do that with the resources available in the huge metropolitan area with a vastly different culture. Leaving their young adult kids stateside will be a concern, but Kim said they told them, "We wonder why you are not already over there."

During the interview, Crane spoke much of ensuring "harmony" among the students, the staff, and the school in its environment in the middle of a city of

about 4 million in the Muslim country of Senegal. While it is Muslim, Crane explained, it's not the violent extremist kind seen in the Middle East. And local Muslim students make up 10-20 percent of the student body, added to boarding students whose parents serve in the mission field, and students of missionaries who now live in Dakar but who were serving abroad. The Dakar academy, with several campuses and future expansions planned, is a cooperative effort of the Southern Baptist International Mission Board, Church of God organizations, and others, so it's described as inter-denominational.

"We will be working with people from 40 nations, in a predominately Muslim country – it's truly taking the gospel to the nations," said Crane.

"Dakar is "home" to many missionaries out of necessity, crisis, or both. I found missionaries working at the school or living in Dakar as a second option," he explained. "Many were serving in other parts of Africa where war and government takeovers were so extreme, they were run out of their cities and countries, many times in danger of death. They don't feel it's time to return to their countries of origin, yet they can't go back to their country of service. This has led to trauma, burnout, losing a sense of calling.....Because of my pastoral calling and experience, I have a heart for these families," he said. "Kim and I can serve them by shepherding/pastoring them toward spiritual health and healing and be a part of sending them back out on mission for Christ, wherever that may be."

The school provides an apartment and a small monthly stipend, but the Cranes will be raising much of their living expenses themselves, through the support of churches, individuals, and families here in the U.S.

Marry Me Chicken

3 large boneless, skinless chicken breasts, sliced into thin cutlets

1/2 teaspoon salt

1/4 teaspoon black pepper

6 tablespoons all-purpose flour

2 tablespoons olive oil

- 2 tablespoons butter
- 3 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 cup chicken stock
- 1 cup heavy cream
- 1/2 cup parmesan cheese, grated
- 1 teaspoon chili flakes

1/4 teaspoon oregano

1/4 teaspoon thyme

1/3 cup sun-dried tomatoes, chopped

Season chicken with salt and pepper, then dredge in flour and shake off any excess.

In a large skillet, heat olive oil and melt the butter on medium heat. Swirl pan to coat with oil and butter evenly.

Brown the chicken (do not overcrowd and work in batches if needed) for 4-5 minutes on each side or until golden brown and cooked through. Transfer onto a plate, cover, and set aside.

Saute the garlic for a minute or until it's fragrant. Add the chicken stock, and deglaze the pan scraping any bits stuck to the bottom of the pan with a wooden spoon.

Adjust the heat to medium-low, and add the heavy cream and the parmesan cheese to the skillet. Allow the sauce to simmer for a couple of minutes, then season with chili flakes, thyme, and oregano.

Season with salt and pepper to your taste, add the sundried tomatoes then put the chicken back in the sauce and let the sauce simmer and thicken for a few more minutes.

Serve warm over pasta or rice.
