Bicyclist Killed on Highway 72 Monday

An Iuka man was killed Monday when the bicycle he was riding on Highway 72 was struck by a vehicle.

According to Tishomingo County Coroner Mack Wilemon, Tracy Switcher, 52, was riding a bicycle eastbound on U.S. Highway 72 near Beecham Road when a 2017 Toyota Highlander driven by Jacob Law, of Birmingham hit him from behind. Switcher died at the scene, said Wilemon.

Curated Cottage Celebrates Three Years

The Curated Cottage was birthed in the hearts and minds of a sisterhood of women with a passion for beautiful things and a need for a creative outlet.

Soon others came along wanting to join in the adventure – women and men who work in wood and clay, and with paint and thread, and various other mediums.

After searching for a building for three months, The Cottage opened its doors in April of 2019 in historic Downtown Iuka - 111 South Fulton Street, among other long-time established retailers: Pray Pottery, Uncle Shirley's Emporium, River Rags, and Hissy Fits, all along South Fulton Street. Soon O'Claire's Boutique opened next door to The Cottage. "SoFul" Street was flourishing. Even through the early days of the pandemic in 2020, Downtown Iuka was supported by folks committed to supporting local, small businesses. In August of 2021, a tornado blew through Iuka proper and many homes and businesses sustained damage.

The Cottage lost its shared awning and it, along with several of the sister businesses in the Downtown area had roof and structural damage. Since those days, new roofs have been put on, walls and windows replaced, and new and improved awnings have been put up. There is (literal) construction in and along the downtown streets with improvements evident. The old town is breathing new life.

In October of 2021, The Cottage expanded into the space next door previously occupied O'Claire's after their move to East Front Street, there joining long-established businesses such as The Friendly Florist, Moore's Jewelry, Front Street Snack Bar and Cream & Sugar Café. The Cottage is currently home to over twenty-five small business vendors offering unique, often one-of-a-kind, vintage finds and collectibles, up-cycled and repurposed furniture, home décor, locally made crafts and wares, gifts, and apparel. Owners Deb Daniel and Jill Malone attribute the success of

The Cottage to the community of small businesses in Downtown Iuka - each offering a unique shopping experience which gives locals and visitors a place to park, get out and walk, and explore historic Downtown Iuka. With the aforementioned businesses, the group of retail businesses on Eastport Streets, a couple of eateries (and potential of more to come), along with Jaybird Park and the historical attractions of the Apron Museum, Old Courthouse Museum and the Church of Our Savior (The Little Church), and the vision of City leaders and economic and community development, Iuka offers that quaint, small town experience that many seek today.

A worker at the Belmont Comfort Revolution plant died as a result of a workplace accident early Tuesday morning.

According to Alcorn County Coroner Jay Jones, Olivia Hernandez, 46, of Belmont, got caught in some machinery around 12:01 Tuesday morning and was transported by ambulance to Magnolia Regional Medical Center where she was pronounced dead in the emergency room.

Absentee Ballots Now Available for June 7th Congressional Primary

Absentee ballots are now available for the June 7th, 2022 Primary Election for United States House of Representatives, 1st Congressional District. You may come to the Circuit Clerk's office to vote by absentee ballot Monday – Friday, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. All voters who vote by absentee in the Clerk's office will be required to show a photo ID. Absentee ballots may also be requested and sent by mail if the voter meets the necessary criteria. Because this is a Primary Election, you will be required to tell the election officials the political party that you wish to vote in. You will choose the Democratic Party ballot or the Republican Party ballot. We encourage those who need to vote absentee by mail to call our office as soon as possible to have sufficient time to go through the absentee process. When an absentee ballot by mail is requested an application for the absentee ballot will first be mailed to the voter. This application shall be completed by the absentee voter and mailed back to the Circuit Clerk's office. When the application is received, the ballot will be mailed to the voter. No absentee ballots may be hand delivered to anyone. Any registered voter is eligible to vote by absentee in the Circuit Clerk's office, but only five groups are allowed to vote absentee by mail.

These five groups are: (1) A registered voter who is 65 years of age or older; (2) A registered voter who is temporarily residing outside the county; (3) A registered voter who is temporarily or permanently physically disabled; and or; (4) A registered voter who is the parent, spouse or dependent of a temporarily or permanently physically disabled person who is hospitalized outside the county or more than 50 miles away from his/her residence and will be with that person on Election

Day. (5) All registered voters who are members of the Armed Services, their spouses, dependents, and overseas citizens who fall under the Uniformed and Overseas Citizens Absentee Voting Act (UOCAVA).

All absentee applications and ballot envelopes must be notarized except for a registered voter who is physically disabled, either permanently or temporarily. The disabled voter's application and ballot envelope must be witnessed and signed by a person 18 years of age

or older. All mailed absentee ballots must be received by 5:00 p.m. on Tuesday, June 14th, 2022 and postmarked on or before election day to be eligible to be counted.

Saturday June 4th, 2022 will be the last day to vote an absentee ballot in person at the Circuit Clerk's office for the June 7th Primary. If you have questions about absentee voting, please call the Circuit Clerk's office at (662) 423-7026. We will continue to provide updates about the Primary Election in the coming weeks. 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Take Off Rose-Colored Glasses for a **Different Perspective**

There are a few things about living into your fifth decade and beyond that just aren't funny. It would seem that almost daily some new and unexpected anatomical anomaly or physical challenge presents itself with all the subtlety of a rabid badger. Some days bring both to bear, as was the case when I found myself missing a screw the size of a hydrogen atom from my glasses. The problems presented by such a predicament are layered and not like anything my 25-year-old self would have ever recognized. I never envisioned myself unable to see well enough to put a nearlyinvisible screw into an infinitely small hole with fingers that are too big and arthritic to work on the nano-scale. I literally couldn't see well enough or make my fingers operate delicately enough to put a screw in my own glasses, and it's not a moment of pride. I broke down the next day and took them to the local optometrist's office where the understanding and helpful people there had it fixed before I could focus my eyes enough to know who I was looking at. Like most things, we don't think enough about our vision until it starts to leave us.

Finding myself without an

intact pair of glasses for a few hours made me realize just how important the lenses we look through are to how we see

the world, and just how uncomfortable we get when those lenses are suddenly

damaged or lost. There are no calm 51-year-old people who have lost their glasses. We all see the world through our own set of lenses that are made up of our life experiences and our DNA. Those lenses determine how we view the outside world and our inner selves. I once had a doctor explain the concept of depression to me using the analogy of lenses. He said, "If you look at the world through pink glasses, then you will see a rosecolored world, and you will live in a rose-colored reality. If you put on a pair of glasses with brown lenses you have an entirely different world view, and all you can see is ... " I think you can pretty much imagine how he described the color of those folks' outlook on life from there. His point was that the medications work not necessarily by just making you "feel" better, but by changing

the way you view the world overall. It was like rose-colored glasses in a pill. Looking through another person's glasses changes our perspective.

This world is made up of all kinds of individuals with as many views as there are people. No two of them see the world exactly the same way. Take, for example, the concept of Christianity. There are over two billion Christians in the world. There are around 45,000 distinct Christian denominations in the world. There are multiple (around 50) different versions of the Bible. Quite obviously, the spiritual path one takes in life is very much a product of where they were born and the personal views of those who raised them. It's those lenses again. If you have only ever seen through pink lenses, then everything will look wrong if you take them off. Are they wrong? Or are they just different from what you see looking through your lenses? The mistake we make when judging the views of other people is that we can't see through their glasses. Maybe they are seeing colors that your lenses automatically block out. There's only one way to see those colors. Take your glasses off.



Vacant Homes a Fixable **Problem When We Need More Housing in Tishomingo County**

Everywhere you go in this county there are homes of various sizes that are vacant, and there is a huge need for affordable housing. Housing is in short supply, and many people would like to live in our beautiful county, but there are no available dwellings to be had.

Every time they meet with potential employers wanting to move into or expand existing businesses in Tishomingo County, development officials say that a lack of affordable housing is a major issue. Management people especially say they would like to live near work, but they can find nothing. They end up living in... and spending their money... in Corinth, the Tri-Cities, or even Tennessee.

The high rate of vacant homes in our county is double the national rate, according to reports. One in every four homes is vacant!

A nice apartment complex or development of affordable homes would have a waiting list as soon as they were available, confirmed TCDF Executive Director Gary Mathews.

Building new housing takes time and investment, and some building efforts are starting but many homes are sitting vacant now. There's often a reason, like probating a will or disagreement between heirs. Sometimes it is because a loved one lived there and their survivors just can't bear cleaning it out.

Sometimes it takes years to settle such issues, and in the meantime, an empty home is deteriorating, making any potential renovation more and more costly. Sometimes it never happens and the home just falls in, all monetary or sentimental value gone. Dilapidated old homesites don't help the value of neighboring homes, and they make for an unsightly mess to people who may be considering moving to or investing in our county.

Now is a good time for folks to capitalize on this common resource in our county - unoccupied houses. There's even a new business - Just Get Started - that can help you start organizing and making a plan to make an unoccupied home available for a family, and bring you some income, hopefully.

We need to grow our local economy to survive and for that, we need more taxpayers, more renters, more homeowners, more customers for our businesses - more people to make Tishomingo County successful in the future.

Egg Custard Pie - so simple but so delicious! This recipe is great to have on hand if you need to carry a dish to someone, since you need only make sure you have eggs, pie crust and condensed milk.

Two Old Fashioned Desserts for Appreciative Readers

I so appreciated all the complements on the recipe page as we visited around last Saturday at some of the great events going on throughout the county!

Ya'll really know how to warm the heart of this (admitted) approval addict!

But, at my own home church, more than one friend chastised me for skipping out on including a recipe last week!

Have you ever faced the disappointed face of our dear county tax collector Jena McNatt close up? I just wanted to melt into my pew!

I was also surprised to have a very deep voice approach me asking for a refund for last week's paper since it had no recipe! It's no wonder Brendix Glasgow's girls turned out so well! I'd hate to disappoint him ever again! I'll have to pick up my game to avoid that!

Kidding aside, here's my effort to make it up to all of you who have been so kind with your encouragement: two delicious, simple "old timey" recipes this week!

Debo's Egg Custard Pie

with us many years ago.

Be sure to follow the directions don't forget the cookie sheet, and you really do just pour in a cup of boiling water, and it all works out!

Old Timey Butter Roll

My second recipe is a another simple country recipe I learned about from some of the older women in my life, and I'm happy to pass it down to all of you.

I heard for years from my longtime colleague Charlotte McVay about her grandmother's butter roll, and my own mother-in-law also claimed her mama made one of the best around. It was so good, reports Nelda, that as a small child, she was often given her favorite "butter roll" or other times, a biscuit with butter which was sprinkled with sugar. When she grew up and learned that all "butter" was not a sweet treat, she was so disappointed.

I searched for a good recipe, and when I found this one and brought it to work years ago, Charlotte declared I was pretty dang close, but you know how hard it is to compete with a childhood memory!



Egg custard pie is an old-fashioned dessert that is so easy, you'd be crazy not to make it, to quote Kirby's uncle Hubert Jourdan.

With just a couple ingredients, you can easily make a pie or two, and carry one to a neighbor, family in mourning, or a church pot luck. This is what was suggested by Deborah Boddiford, another cousin, who shared this recipe

Egg Custard Pie

4 eggs

1 can condensed milk (Eagle Brand) One prepared, uncooked, pie crust 1 cup boiling water nutmeg

Three generations later, my own Emma made a butter roll for her "bigcity" friends in their Dallas apartment, where she makes them have a family (sit-down) supper once a week when she cooks for them. It was a favorite with them, too!

You'll love the simplicity of it, and the creamy sweet sauce that forms is better than any icing!

Preheat oven to 350°.

Combine eggs and milk, stir well. Put your pie crust in its pan on a cookie sheet. Pour egg mixture into pie crust.

Carefully place pie pan on cookie sheet on the oven rack, pour in one cup boiling water. Sprinkle with nutmeg.

Bake about 45 minutes at 350°, or until not jiggly.

Butter Roll - Seems like biscuit dough, just rolled up different, but don't let the simplicity fool you! Let me know if you can resist scooping up all the sauce you can when you eat this sweet treat.

Old Timey Butter Roll

2 cups self-rising flour ¹/₂ cup shortening $\frac{1}{2}$ cup milk 1 stick (1/2 cup) butter, softened ¹/₄ cup sugar 1 teaspoon cinnamon (optional)

Milk Sauce

2 cups milk 2/3 cups sugar 1 teaspoon vanilla

Preheat oven to 350°.

Cut shortening into flour really well with a fork. Stir in milk.

On a floured surface, dump out dough and press together with your hands to form a ball. Roll out into a rectangle (about 7×10" in size). Spread softened

butter over dough and then sprinkle 1/4 cup sugar and cinnamon over top. Roll it up like a jelly roll and press it together lightly.

Cut into nine slices about one inch thick each. Place into a lightly greased 8×8 baking dish.

In medium sauce pot, combine all milk sauce ingredients. Heat over medium heat, stirring constantly, until mixture begins to bubble lightly. Pour over rolls in pan.

Bake at 350° for 30-40 minutes, or until rolls are lightly browned on top.

Allow to sit for a few minutes once it is done for the rolls to soak up more sauce. After you put each roll on a plate, spoon more sauce over it.



Our constant goal is to provide you with a safe and dependable supply of drinking water. We want you to understand the efforts we make to continually improve the water treatment process and protect our water resources. We are committed to ensuring the quality of your water. Our water source is from a natural spring at Jackson Springs in Tishomingo.

The source water assessment has been completed for our public water system to determine the overall susceptibility of its drinking water supply to identified potential sources of contamination. A report containing detailed information on how the susceptibility determinations were made has been furnished to our public water system and is available for viewing upon request. The spring for the town has received a moderate susceptibility ranking to contamination. If you have any questions about this report or concerning your water utility, please contact Kim Daily at 662.438.6402. We want our valued customers to be informed about their water utility. If you want to learn more, please attend the meeting scheduled for the first Tuesday of each month at 6:00 PM at the Tishomingo City Hall. We routinely monitor for contaminants in your drinking water according to Federal and State laws. This table below lists all of the drinking water contaminants that we detected during the period of January 1st to December 31st, 2021. In cases where monitoring wasn't required in 2021, the table reflects the most recent results. As water travels over the surface of land or underground, it dissolves naturally-occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive materials and can pick up substances or contaminants from the presence of animals or from human activity; microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, that may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations, and wildlife; inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally occurring or result from urban storm-water runoff, industrial, or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farming;

We're proud that your drinking water meets or exceeds all Federal and State requirements. We have learned through our monitoring and testing that some constituents have been detected however the EPA has determined that your water IS SAFE at these levels.

We are required to monitor your drinking water for specific contaminants on a monthly basis. Results of regular monitoring are an indicator of whether or not our drinking water meets health standards. We did complete the monitoring requirements for bacteriological sampling that showed no coliform present. In an effort to ensure systems complete all monitoring requirements, MSDH now notifies systems of any missing samples prior to the end of the compliance period. If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. 
