# Paden Bridges Remain Closed After Four Years

**Closures are** inconvenient for locals, and chasing down federal requirements is a daily chore for supervisor Jeff Holt.

Despite Supervisor Jeff Holt's efforts, unresponsiveness by the Corps of Engineers and Covid complications have stretched out two bridge replacements in Paden to nearly four years.

The two bridges are on County Road 961, the road from Highway 30 to Crow's Neck on Bay Springs Lake, and Holt has taken the blame from locals for the long delays but assures that he is working on the issue weekly or daily to get the project to the point they can take bids to replace the bridges.

Close to \$1 million in funding was approved to

replace the bridges, but now with inflation on the costs of labor, supplies, and materials... some state money will have to supplement the federal grants, said Holt.

Holt explained that state inspectors approved the bridges, specifying reduced load limits, but then a subsequent federal

**Tishomingo Sunflower: Grocery Business is the Family Business**

For 44 years, the Hollingsworth family has been an integral part of Tishomingo life, providing the ultimate service of making groceries available to this small town in the center of Tishomingo County. The small grocery store offers full grocery services – but just as important, it's a hub for the community and contributes to local organizations and causes, because they are just an extension of the Sunflower family, explains owner Lance Hollingsworth. Since before Jerry Hollingsworth and a partner bought the Sunflower in 1978, the grocery business equaled "family business," with everyone in the family playing a part, and that continues to this day as the third generation of the Hollingsworth family now helps their dad run the show. Tishomingo County is uniquely both traditional and modern as exemplified by the multi-generational Hollingsworth family in the town of Tishomingo. When I first met the family, there were two generations of Hollingsworth working at the local Sunflower Grocery Store. Over the next 15 years, the third generation became employed. Now there is a fourth generation waiting in the wings.

#### Family History

In the mid-1900s, Chester Hollingsworth was a bricklayer and dairy farmer living in Newton, Mississippi; however, he was directly responsible for starting several generations of Hollingsworth grocers. Of Chester's eight children, two sons, Robert and Jerry, worked in the Newton Sunflower Grocery right out of high school.

Robert Hollingsworth worked at

Ackerman Sunflowers, asked Jerry to move to Ackerman as manager of that store

When Jerry's butcher resigned, Jerry asked his brother Robert (who had left the National Guard) to take over as the Ackerman store's butcher. While he was at the Ackerman Sunflower, Robert's children Susan and Randy worked parttime.

Robert tells the story about Jerry's playing jokes on staff and customers. One day "Bobcat" Walden was in the store visiting with Jerry. Having shaken up his soda bottle, Jerry let it spew all

over Bobcat, who in turn paid Jerry back by handing him a very well-used hankie. Jerry's three children, Lee, Lance, and Lisa were born in Ackerman.

When he was very young, Lee would hang out at his father's store. If he could not be found, he was likely sleeping on one of lower grocery shelves. Once at the Ackerman store, young Lee was in the stock room when he yelled out, "It's snowing, it's snowing!"

Jerry ran to the back of the store to see what was happening, and Lee threw a bag of flour on his father. Needless to say, Lee had to pay the price for his "snow," and it was not paying for the flour!

#### **Tishomingo Store**

In 1978, the Sunflower Grocery in Tishomingo came up for sale. Recognizing the opportunity, Jerry and a partner, Robert Chandler, bought the store, and Jerry moved his family to

Tishomingo. Jerry's three children, Lee, Lance, and Lisa were still young when they moved, but as they grew up, each of them went to work in their father's store.

Chandler had owned and managed the Chandler Grocery in Weir,

Mississippi, until it was purchased by Cochran and became a Sunflower. While he was still at the Weir store, Chandler and Robert Hollingsworth attended a convention on the Mississippi gulf coast. They were checking in, and Chandler was asked where he was from. When he told the attendant he was from Weir (pronounced "wear"), she asked "No, where are you from?" That conversation is still a family joke all these years later.

Lee Hollingsworth was ten when the family moved to Tishomingo. He began working in the local Sunflower when he was 14. Lee learned the grocery business by bagging groceries and stocking shelves.

When I moved to Tishomingo and met the Hollingsworths in 2007, Lee was the store's part-time produce manager. In 1988, he had begun working as a second shift park ranger at Tishomingo State Park, allowing him to continue working at Sunflower in the mornings. Lee was a full-time park ranger from 1990 to 2008 when he went to work for the Mississippi Department of Transportation. Beginning in 2015, Lee was able to spend time at the Tishomingo Sunflower helping his father.

When the Hollingsworths moved to Tishomingo, Jerry's second son, Lance, was six. Tishomingo is Lance's earliest memory of home.

At fourteen, like his older brother Lee had done, Lance began working at his father's Sunflower. In addition to bagging groceries, Lance carried the groceries to the customer's vehicles, a tradition that continues to this day. In 1990, Lance became the store's butcher. His uncle Robert had been the family's other butcher, but he always called himself a "meat cutter."

When Jerry's partner, Robert Chandler, passed away in 2015, Lance bought Chandler's share, and he and his father became full partners. Lance continued as Sunflower's butcher until Jerry's death in 2021. At that time he became both owner and manager, and he hired a replacement butcher.

Lisa Morgan, Jerry's youngest child, followed the family tradition and worked part-time as a cashier while still in high school. Although she now lives in Brandon, but her children, Madison and Mason, were also Tishomingo Sunflower employees during the summers they spent with their grandfather Jerry.

One summer when Lisa's children were four and six, they had spent a week in Tishomingo. Lisa was not in the habit of giving sweets to her children. When she came to pick them up, she found them wired. Asking her father if he had been giving them sweets, Jerry replied that he had given them fruit rollups. Lisa said not to feed them candy, and Jerry said, "But fruit rollups are fruit!"

#### **Third Generation**

The third generation of Hollingsworths started with Lee's son Chase, who worked full time as a cashier but helped in other areas throughout the store. Chase could often be seen stocking shelves.

When your family owns the store, you do everything that needs doing.

In 2020, Chase and his wife Jackie welcomed Paislee, their daughter and fourth-generation Sunflower Hollingsworth. It is almost certain that Paislee will ultimately take her place in the lineup in one capacity or another. Lance's two children, Rory and

One thing is clear when you meet the Hollingsworths: you learn to talk to everyone when you are the grocer! Gregarious only mildly describes Lance, who can stock meat, fetch high items and carry on a conversation at the same time. His children have learned the same, with even quiet Rory and Chloe able to comment on groceries and cooking plans with customers like they have done it all their lives.

#### **Big Changes**

When Jerry died unexpectedly in 2021, Lance and his wife Tina figured out quickly they had a lot to learn.

"Just weeks before he passed, Jerry was back in the back and told Lance, 'You know, if something happened to you, I'd hardly know what to do back here anymore,' said Lance recently. He said he joked back that he could easily fill Jerry's shoes, since he just sat up there in the office all the time.

"Boy, was I wrong!" said Lance. From deciphering the "all still on paper ledger handwritten bookkeeping system," to finding out what deals were in place with what people, it's been a steep learning curve, he laughs. But Lance has plans to computerize everything, and make improvements to the store, like new register lanes and card payment terminals. All this while handling the daily store and maintenance issues of a 50+-year-old building.

Each subsequent generation of Hollingsworth typifies the modern family having just two or three children. However, the three generations working closely together represents the traditional family. Looking at the values of the entire family dynamic, it becomes obvious that the Hollingworths have succeeded in merging the best of both.

# The View from Metairie

As a fourth-generation funeral director, it should come as no surprise to anyone that I have spent quite a bit of my life in cemeteries. I've worked in them, played in them, and found refuge in them. Even to this day when I find myself needing to reflect deeper on a subject, or maybe just kill 15

minutes for the pizza I've ordered to cook, I'll find myself back there, slowly moving down the narrow paths of asphalt that wind through

monuments and memories. Some of the monuments are modern, made of exotic stones of black, pink, and mahogany, and they have been erected to honor the lives of those who lived in more modern times. They are beautiful, artistic, and highly personalized. Other monuments, in the older parts of most cemeteries, are large, ornate, granite monoliths that are designed to be permanent memorials to people who lived many generations ago. For just a few minutes, as I wind through the past and read the names and dates and try to imagine who these people were, and what their life must have been like, I'm suddenly liberated from the stresses of the day. Momentarily, everything is quieter, clearer, less cluttered. I'm able to know what to do next. I either find peace of mind or a piece of pizza at the end, which I consider a win/win situation.

Given my interest in old cemeteries, and my wife's interest in author Anne Rice, it seemed only natural that we should visit the old Metairie Cemetery where the Rice family mausoleum is located. We were already in New Orleans attending a previously discussed funeral directors convention, and with our newly-collected pens, pads, highlighters, and brochures we will never read, set off to find the resting place of the recently-entombed Queen of the Vampires. I can't begin to describe the beauty and timeless nature of a place like Metairie Cemetery. Upon entry, it is very obvious that you are in a sacred space. Time stands still, everything feels quiet, almost like the air itself is showing reverence to the lives honored on that hallowed ground. You can feel the generations becoming one, as if you were all there together. Many say that in a place like

Metairie Cemetery, you are. It is of interest to note that the only people buried in the ground in Metairie Cemetery are in the Jewish section, keeping with cultural traditions. Much of New Orleans is below sea level, so things buried in the ground there don't tend to stay that way. This has resulted in the adoption of entombment in above-ground crypts and mausoleums, which, in a place like Metairie, are unbelievably impressive works of art. The dedication to honoring the lives of their ancestors is apparent when looking at the monuments erected. It was their goal to make sure that those who went before them were still a part of their day-to-day lives. They had no interest in denying any part of the living or dying process, including efforts to keep the spirit of their loved one alive through memorialization and celebration.

Fast-forward to a modern cemetery in just about any town in America, and you will find something missing. Sure, there are monuments, crypts, beautiful scenery, and peaceful landscapes. The quiet reverence of a visit will still do you good, but something is not the same.

What you will find missing are people, not only people visiting the monuments to lives lived, but people in general. The values of our modern society have changed. What this means ultimately is that these places will not be the same in the future. With an ongoing trend towards avoiding all things that are unpleasant, the cemeteries will become a relic of the past. As fewer and fewer people make use of cemeteries and generations go by, there will be no one left to care for them. All the cremated remains will be cast to the wind or sea, or inurned on a shelf, and there will be no mark left on the Earth that millions of lives were ever lived.

As we shift into a new era based more on the wants of the individual than what's best for the whole, let's not forget who we really are. We are people who spend the dash between those dates on a monument loving, laughing, crying, growing, and dying together, people who deserve to be remembered and celebrated for longer than a one-day newspaper obituary. If current trends continue, all that will be left of lives lived in the future will be the dash, with no date, name, or even a trace that a life was lived to be found anywhere on the Earth. It is through thinking only of ourselves and not finding value in each other that we truly die.

# **USDA Designates Ten Mississippi Counties** as a Primary Natural Disaster Area

Administrator Zach Ducheneaux designated ten (10) counties in the State of Mississippi as the primary natural disaster area. Producers in Alcorn, Attala, Calhoun, Coahoma, Forrest, Holmes, Leake, Noxubee, Panola, and Yazoo counties who suffered physical damage and losses caused by a tornado and high winds that occurred on March 30, 2022, may be eligible for U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) emergency loans.

Producers in the contiguous Mississippi counties of Bolivar, Carroll, Chickasaw, Choctaw, Covington, Grenada, Hinds, Humphreys, Issaquena, Jones, Kemper, Lafayette, Lamar, Leflore, Lowndes, Madison, Montgomery, Neshoba, Newton, Oktibbeha, Pearl River, Perry, Pontotoc, Prentiss, Quitman, Scott, Sharkey, Stone, Sunflower, Tallahatchie, Tate, Tippah, Tishomingo, Tunica, Warren, Webster, Winston, and Yalobusha are also eligible to apply for emergency loans.

The deadline to apply for these emergency loans is January 25, 2023.

FSA will review the loans based on the extent of losses, security available and repayment ability.

FSA has a variety of additional programs to help farmers recover from the impacts of this disaster. FSA programs that do not require a disaster declaration include:

Emergency Assistance for Livestock, Honeybees and Farm-Raised Fish Program; Emergency Conservation Program; Livestock Forage Disaster Program; Livestock Indemnity Program; Operating and Farm Ownership Loans; and the Tree Assistance Program.

Farmers may contact their local USDA service center for further information on eligibility requirements and application procedures for these and other programs. Additional information is also available online at https:// www.farmers.gov/recover.

# The Days After Pearl Harbor Remembered

Yes, I remember December 8, 1941. The student body and faculty of the Tishomingo High School were ordered by principal W.R. Nettles to go to the auditorium. It was an unusually quiet group of students. Those who didn't have radios at home were still unaware of the attack on Pearl Harbor.

Each group sat with their teachers. A radio was brought in and put on the table that was on

the stage. Usually Mr. Nettles or Mr. Edwards prayed before our meeting, but today no time was lost. He said, "Our president of the United States has something to share with the citizens of America," and with that he turned the radio up. We listened. He told us "Yesterday for over an hour Japan bombed Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, and brought devastation

to our fleet of ships."

It hit the island at 7:55 a.m. Sunday morning on December 7, 1941, and the loss of lives was 2.343 sailors, army, and marines; and 1,272 wounded with 960 missing. All the buildup Japan was doing was not a secret anymore. The President told us that Congress had voted to give him power to declare was on Japan. (The vote of Congress was 100% minus one - She also voted against entering World War I).

As F.D. Roosevelt spoke to us it went to the entire world. This became a World War with all the major countries of the world involved. Really it had been going on a couple of years overseas.

After his speech we were dismissed to go back to class. I don't really remember any teaching and learning going on, on that Monday.

It wasn't too long before we had several families move to Oak Ridge, Tennessee to work in a defense plant. Our fleet had been bombed and many ships were beyond repair. Eight battle ships lay anchors and five were sunken in Pearl Harbor, three were finally refloated, and two still lie at the bottom of the ocean with the crew buried there. I remember hearing people tell of the knocking sound but nothing could be done. That has always been a nightmare for the American people but at the time we had nothing that could rescue the ships for the crew

Over country came together and worked while praying for victory. It was a surprise attack. Our reporters and newsmen gave reports of several failures of our own leaders to take warning of

As an active member of the community during the economic explosion of the 1980's, Mack's picture showed up many times in The Vidette. I find them often in the old files; he and my dad (Iuka's Mayor John Biggs) seemed to be everywhere promoting our town and county. I personally think they did a great job representing our small part of this big world. If you met them, you found out real fast they were good ole country boys spreading the good hospitality of Mississippi. There was no pretention to them, lots of genuine love for their fellow men and a touch of humor just to liven up the situation. They didn't meet a stranger and they never forgot where they came from! But as all politicians find out, there comes a time to go home, the people say its time for a change, so these good ole boys go home and live long lives full of great memories and devoted friends and family.

I first got to know Mack as part of H & W Supermarket in Iuka. His father, Mr. Willard Wadkins, and brotherin-law Edgar Hannon operated the store.

what they knew Japan was doing. Mistakes were made in Washington as well as those in command where our fleet lay anchors.

Our churches were packed with "God fearing Christians." They realized that our freedom was at stake and it literally was.

Small country churches had men standing outside listening through the open windows because there was a lack of seating inside.

We have been in other wars and as a Nation, seems to me the average citizen seems unconcerned today. I hope it doesn't take a surprise attack on America to wake us up. God has so blessed America and in my opinion, too many evils abound: Bible reading taken out of school and public meetings, The Ten Commandments removed from schools and public buildings because we don't want to offend anyone.

Let me share an experience I had when I taught at Graceland, Tennessee, Elvis Presley's stomping ground.

I got a letter mailed to the school, very formal, from Dr. Gainor who was president of a huge business in Memphis. I had one of his children in my fifthgrade classroom. The principal and her secretary brought the letter to me. I took it, standing outside my room and read it. The letter was complimenting my teaching Robert, but "I don't want him subjected to the Bible reading every morning."

Miss Dean said "What are we going to do?"

We just looked at each other. I put my thinking cap on and remembered that I sent the attendance card to the office each morning. "I guess I can send Robert." Relief abounded even though I know Robert was smart enough to know something wasn't right.

It wasn't a week until he came to my desk and said, "Mrs. Dawson, I need to talk to you."

He said, "You got a letter from my dad, didn't you?" I felt so sorry for him, but I replied with "Yes

Robert I did, but let's keep that a secret between us. I'd rather your classmates not know about." I was afraid they would be unkind to Robert over a matter he had no control over.

I never had the first student ask me why I was giving this privilege to Robert every day. Robert hurried back and listened as Bible reading was done each morning. I did what Dr. Gainor wanted. All I could do was pray for this young man

I experienced another incident with Robert. The Gideons came every year and gave the little blue New Testaments to all fifth graders. Mrs. Dorothy Dean, the principal, scared of a lawsuit, came into the classroom and I can quote what she said fifty-seven years ago.

"Listen up! The Gideons are here to give Bibles to those who want one, but if you don't want one... don't you take a Bible!" and out the door she went. Guess who got the first Bible? Robert.

the people who helped us make our newspaper a success and the Wadkins family was there from the beginning. They continued to advertise faithfully with us throughout the years. Mack Loyd and his brother Edgar Earl became owners of H & W, which later became Sunflower. Mack was also owner of Iuka's first self service gas station. Mack's Self Service Station and Ran-Ron Car Wash, which was located just past the grocery store on old Highway 25 north in Iuka.

An ad which ran in 1968 in the TCN listed regular gas as 93 cents a gallon and premium \$1 a gallon. The same paper gave prices at H&W as mayonnaise for 39 cents and coffee 49 cents a pound. Lots of changes in 54 years!

While looking through our first editions of The News in 1968, I ran across a photo on the front page of young Mack Loyd in a dunking booth, even before he got in politics!! He and his wife, Jeanette must have been early members of the Jaycee's in Iuka. What a fun couple they were!

Mack loved to write poetry, a talent he got from his mother, and he even made the paper when he and Mike Curtis wrote and produced "Choices" for country music star, George Jones. Now that was BIG news! Mack even wrote two children's books and that was BIG news for the hometown paper too!

We could go on and on about what Mack accomplished, but that is in the obituary. I just wanted to honor him as a good man, who always brought a smile to my face and laughter to my heart. Thanks for all the memories Mack!

# Bassmaster Clean-Up Challenge Volunteers Haul in Nearly 4,500 Pounds of Trash at Pickwick Lake

COUNCE, Tenn. — Before the Semifinal Saturday at the Whataburger Bassmaster Elite at Pickwick Lake, 66 volunteers spread out along the shores and ramps near Pickwick Landing State Park to collect trash as part of the Lake Clean-Up Challenge sponsored by AFTCO and Yamaha Rightwaters<sup>TM</sup>.

The volunteers, who represented organizations from across West Tennessee and North Alabama, gathered 4,476 pounds of garbage, including tires, scrap lumber and even a navigational buoy. Keep the Tennessee River Beautiful along with Aspell Recovery of Hardin County, Belgreen Bass Club, Mount Pleasant Junior Bass Club, the Pickwick ParrotHeads and the Savannah Moose Lodge worked alongside Bassmaster Elite Series pro Chad Pipkens during the Lake Clean-Up Challenge at Pickwick Lake.

Legendary angler and Tennessee native Bill Dance joined the group as they weighed in their haul of debris, pleading with every angler and boater to carry a trash bag with them on outings and pick up whatever trash they find, "Leaving it cleaner than you found it."

According to statistics from Keep the Tennessee River Beautiful, 80% of trash pulled from waterways originated on land, making clean-up efforts at ramps and parks adjacent to waterways even more critical for the long-term health of American fisheries.

"Our mission is to rally communities to keep the river beautiful for generations to come, and the most important part of the goal are the words 'future generations,'" said Kathleen Gibi, executive director of Keep the Tennessee River Beautiful, who was also part of a previous Lake Clean-up Challenge on Chickamauga Lake. "This is a physical example of what can happen when we come together, and we're grateful to AFTCO, Yamaha Rightwaters, B.A.S.S. and all of these people from the community for coming together to clean up the Tennessee River."

Participants received a gift package from AFTCO and Yamaha Rightwaters. Plus, registered volunteer organizations are eligible for conservation grants from AFTCO and Yamaha Rightwaters. The brands will select the conservation grants — totaling over \$25,000 across the 2022 challenges — based on their participation in the Lake Clean-Up Challenges and the group's overall conservation or public service mission.

As the groups brought in trash, their haul was weighed on an industrial scale donated by the Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency Fisheries Division.

The next Lake Clean-Up Challenge will be held July 9 in New York as part of the St. Croix Bassmaster Northern Open at Oneida Lake presented by Mossy Oak Fishing. The final event will be August 27 at the Guaranteed Rate Bassmaster Elite at Mississippi River in La Crosse, Wis.
