Local Man Killed in Motorcycle-Truck Crash

An Iuka man was killed Saturday afternoon as the result of a motorcycle-truck collision on Hwy 25 approximately six miles north of Iuka. Thomas Hunter Hobbs, 27, was killed when the southbound Harley-Davidson motorcycle he was riding was struck by a northbound ton truck that was attempting a left turn onto CR 982. Mr. Hobbs died at the scene. MHP investigated remains.

Search continues for missing man

78-year-old Wade Davis is missing since Wednesday, June 22 when he didn't return from his usual morning walk.



Davis lives on Highway 356 just a little east of Jacinto and southeast corner of the Alcorn and Prentiss County line. He was last seen around 9 a.m. walking with his dog, Buddy, on his side. Davis and his dog usually take their morning walk and travel 2 to 5 miles off his property.

After he did not return at his normal time, his wife went looking. Not finding any trace, the wife contacted the Sheriff's Department. Local deputies, investigators, and responders arrived to search and rescue.

The search began Wednesday evening and continued a week later. There has been many community members and out

Family tradition of service continues with fourth generation

If Tishomingo had snow, or apple orchards, or if folks from beyond the region could pronounce Tishomingo... we'd have had a Hallmark Christmas movie for sure featuring our completely authentic, family-owned hometown Fairless Hardware, and the family who has run it for four generations now.

Its original wooden floors and aisles filled floor to pressed-tin ceiling with nearly everything you need to keep house, renovate your home, build an outbuilding, plant a garden, repair an appliance, or buy someone a Christmas gift.

Add to this picture perfect setting that's it's owned by the popular long-time mayor, who is now helped by his 24-year-old daughter, Callie,

who heads up the Tishomingo Chamber of Commerce, and her brother, Jameson, 22. Momma/wife Laura likes to be in the background, but I'm sure there's parts of the place would not run smoothly if it weren't for her regular help there, too.

Thankfully the place is more down to earth than any corny Hallmark movie. It's been a serious business for four generations: an anchor business in a town that has changed much in 112 years. The family and the store have changed just enough to stay vital and future management is taking steps now to make sure they stay that way.

Since 1916

Owner James Fairless Tennyson has been sweeping the floors and hauling out trash in his grandfather's store since he was in 7th grade - 55 years ago, he says. He finished at Mississippi State in 1977 and together with his dad Myrl Tennyson, they opened the "downtown Iuka branch" of Fairless Hardware. They ran it and the Tishomingo store until they sold the Iuka one in 2010.

James learned the business from his father, Myrl Tennyson, and grandfather, William Hafford Fairless who opened it in 1916 to meet the needs of the bustling railroad and lumber town of Tishomingo that officially started in 1908.

In the earliest days, they sold everything from

gasoline to caskets. James tells of a time when a customer came in to buy a casket for himself. He felt the need to make sure it would fit, so he laid down in it. Satisfied it did, he paid in full for the casket, and Mr. Fairless wrote his name in it and stored the casket in his warehouse until it was needed. A customer service tradition that continues to this day.

The Fourth Generation

These days, many customers go straight to the person they know can help them - and it's not always James anymore!

For the past three years, Callie Tennyson has been learning the store and its business at her dad's side, continuing the cycle in so many ways.

She and her brothers Jameson and Branson were raised around the store, and she says she never imagined staying in Tishomingo for the rest of her life, settling down, working at the family business. But after three years of college and no direction becoming apparent, feeling like she was wasting time and money, she decided to stay home and take on the Tennyson family business.

"I knew a lot of the simple stuff, and I know where every single thing is - people know and they ask me - but I started learning the business, the bill paying, the ordering," explained Callie. "There's more than you see."

Customers seem to like

the ongoing transition - they ask for Callie and she knows what they need and how to find it.

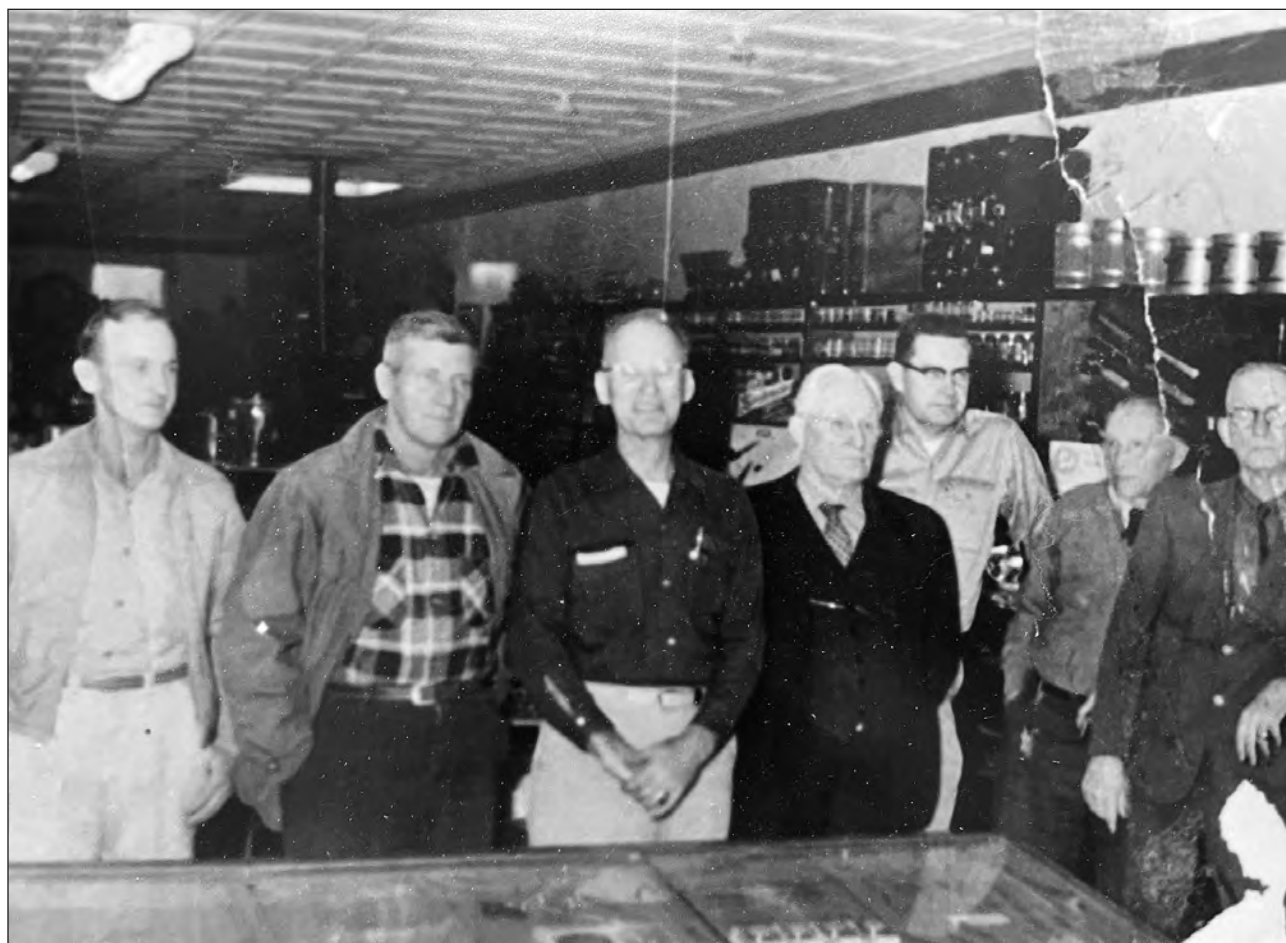
She's made some changes, most notably cleaning out the north section of the building and making it into a cooperative boutique - the Old Corner Market - with about 26 vendors displaying everything from Muck boots and coolers to jewelry, boutique fashions, t-shirts, handmade pottery and more. She manages the customer flow and takes a percentage of the sales.

Her dad, James, threatens to leave any time now, but she says they are still learning from him. Jameson is working on handling the lumber, heavy goods and contractor and industrial needs.

"They are each managing different aspects, and it's good they have each other, there's a lot of jobs to juggle," says James. "It has changed so much since when I started and everything was handwritten. We are computerized now."

But they still have that sense of history and community you just absorb when you come in the door - no big box store can match it. But they can match pretty much everything you could get from the "big box" stores- they will special order whatever they don't have, and you won't have to wait on crazy delivery schedules.

James says he looks forward to a time when he just comes down to the store

to sit and chat with the other customers, like his dad Myrl did for years.

Callie says bring it on, she's ready.

"It's been a good living, if I had to make the choice, I'd choose to do it again," says James. "I might have made more money somewhere else, but I got to be here in my hometown, raise my kids in a good place, be involved in their lives and work to make the place we all live a better place. We are doing more business than we ever have, and I don't see it slowing down."

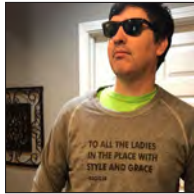
Gone Shrimpin': Navigating family dynamics on the Coast

of county friends gathering to help with the search. Multiple agencies have helped search with drones, detectors, and a helicopter with thermal imaging.

Davis was wearing blue jeans, a shirt with green and white or blue and white check, and tennis shoes. Buddy is a brown and black boxer, with white chest and feet. He was on a leash attached to Davis.

Davis has no major health issue, besides maybe an early stage of dementia.

Although the ground search ended Tuesday evening, the investigation

continues. After covering 2,000 acres and 3,000 foot of land through horse teams, walking by foot, drones, helicopters, and aircraft flights the Alcorn County Sheriff's Department decided to suspend ground search at this time due to no new evidence being found.

Families and friends are prepared to search until Davis is found. Contact Alcorn County Sheriff's Department with any information (662)286-5521.

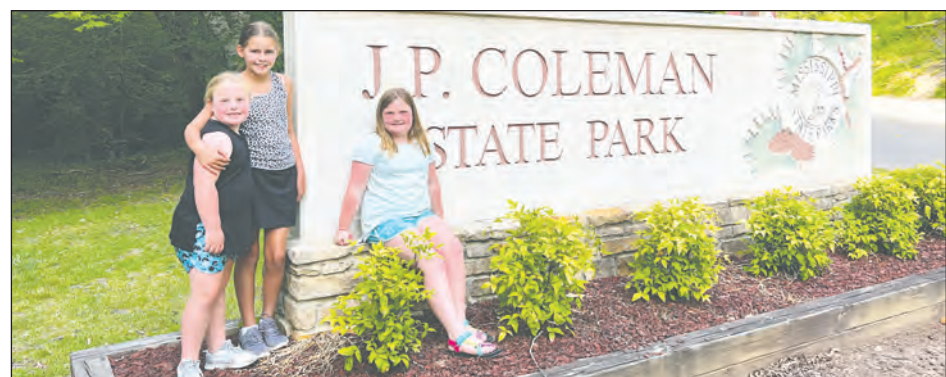
Woodall Mountain

Blueberry Muffins

- 3 cups minus 2 tablespoons flour
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- Heavy pinch of salt
- dash of nutmeg
- 1 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup vegetable oil
- 1 egg
- 1 generous cup plain, unflavored yogurt
- 2 cups fresh blueberries
- vanilla extract
- softened butter, for muffin tins
- Turbinado sugar (optional)

Preheat oven to 385°.

In a large bowl sift flour, baking soda, nutmeg, baking powder, and salt. Set aside.

In another large bowl whisk together sugar, oil, cap-ful of vanilla, egg, and yogurt. Add the dry ingredients and stir to a count of 10.

Add blueberries, reserving 1/2 cup, to mixture and stir 3 times.

Add mixture to well-buttered muffin pans. Sprinkle remaining berries on top and press down lightly. Sprinkle turbinado sugar over top. (Brown sugar can be used

Fresh Blueberry Cobbler

- 1 1/4 cups all-purpose flour
- 1/2 cup, plus 1/3 cup sugar, divided
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
- 3/4 cup whole milk
- 1/3 cup butter, melted
- 2 cups fresh blueberries
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- Vanilla ice cream

Combine flour, 1/2 cup sugar, salt and baking powder in a mixing bowl and stir to combine. Add milk and melted butter and stir to combine.

Spread batter in a greased 8-inch square baking pan (or equivalent). Sprinkle blueberries evenly over batter.

Sprinkle remaining 1/3 cup sugar over

all and drizzle vanilla over top.

Bake at 350 degrees F. for 45-50 minutes until a toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. Serve warm with a scoop of vanilla ice cream on top! Serves 6-8.

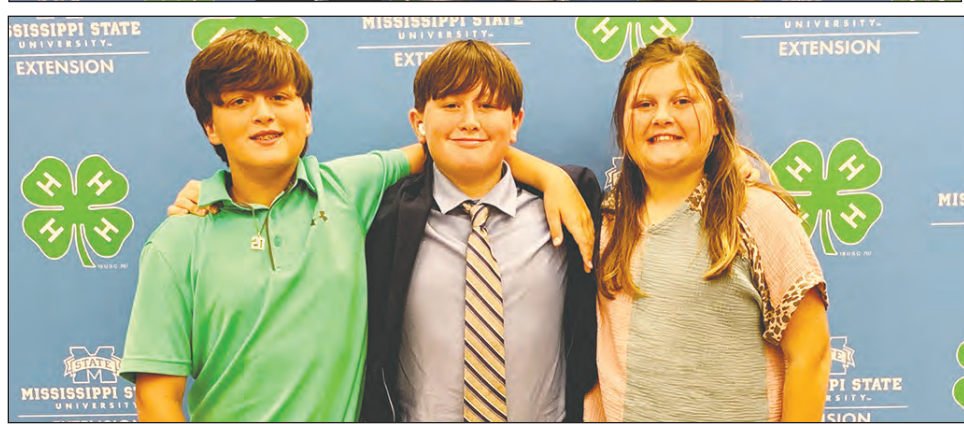

Outstanding students I was proud to teach

I believe I left off last week with Robert getting a Bible from the Gideons. He kept it hidden in the attic of their home where he would go and read. Long after we moved home from Whitehaven, we took the *Commercial Appeal*. On the weekends there was a small magazine with feature stories and sometime pictures on the cover. There was a story of a Robert Gainor, a young man making a trip along down the Mississippi River by boat or canoe. I don't recall which, but that was my Robert!

Digress: no picture of Robert but one on the front cover of my Tommy Edwards. Tommy was a cute, red headed, chubby little fifth grader. He was adopted by Mr. and Mrs. Edwards when they were in their early forties. An only child. His mother was my teacher and friend, and his father worked at the airport. Tommy was a sweetie and so frill of life. He was busy doing something all of the time.

Mr. Edwards would stand outside my door, observing what was going on in my room; I never saw him looking through the glass windows in the door.

When he'd see me, he'd say Mrs. Dawson, what are we going to do with Tommy? I stood and observed your classroom and everyone in it was working except Tommy."

Knowing how smart that kid was I'd assure him that Tommy was going to be okay. Here he was on the cover of the *Commercial Appeal Magazine*.

Sometimes we parents want to stereotype our children and don't let them be themselves. Sometimes we as teachers don't challenge the smartest students, and I've had many - they are bored.

While teaching English at Tishomingo High School I have seen a few of my brightest students with a novel in front of the English book reading while I was teaching. Many throughout the years! If one could make all A's and enjoy a good book while the teacher meets the needs of those who need a little help... then why not? I've had fun discussing the things I saw and knew, but didn't let them know until many years later.

Before I get away from Graceland I want to share about the yearly science projects. We have them here too. Sometimes the best illustrated project never gets out of the classroom. The topic just didn't interest the judges. This happened to me. One of my students, Martha, did her project on, "The man-prod-section of hogs." Her father was a banker but they owned a big farm and topped fed-out hogs. This was an unusual topic for a city project, but to this country lady? It fascinated me. We had topped-out small litters for the market but the Lennox Farm topped out 500 at a time!

Three judges went to each room and chose the top three to be carried to the cafeteria for school judging. Martha's did not get chosen. I just couldn't stand it and took action.

I went to the chairman of their rule committee and asked if there was any way a teacher might have set up four projects? He looked at me and said, "If you'll provide the card table?"

I thanked him and got the word to Mrs. Lennox. I knew she would take care of everything - She did.

This project won first place at Graceland and took top honors at Memphis State University. I had already moved home but you can bet I got the news as soon as it happened.

Digress: Martha's dad owned also "Carbon Copy" the World's Champion quarter horse stallion! Several years after we had moved to Mississippi we read where Mr. Lennox was shot and killed sitting in his car on the bridge on Byhalia Road near where he lived. As far as I know the assassin was never found. The Mafia was suspected but no motive was ever given.

I lost track of Martha probably fifty or more years ago. Teachers love and appreciate the friendship of all their students. Mrs. Lennox was so helpful to me furnishing everything the project needed, and the one at Memphis State University sample pieces of the different kinds of meats were required. I have known of projects that weren't chosen, and when carried to another school won first place. It's subjective, as well as how the message is presented.

How about us returning to Mississippi next week to the publication that is most interested in Tishomingo.

Gas Prices Making Boaters Save Up for July Fourth Holiday

A 'tsunami' of boats on the water is anticipated; boaters should be ready.

Record-high gas prices have many boaters throughout the country saving and waiting for Independence Day to get out on the water, which could result in one of the busiest on-water holidays in decades. Boat Owners Association of The United States (BoatUS), the nation's largest advocacy, services and safety group with more than 800,000 dues-paying members, is advising boaters to be prepared and boat safely.

"We are anticipating a tsunami of boaters like never before seen," said John Condon,

vice president of towing services for BoatUS, which operates the nation's largest on-water towing fleet, TowBoatUS. "While trends showed a steep decline in our service calls for assistance since Memorial Day, our members are telling us that they're waiting until the July Fourth holiday weekend to take their boats out." The number of requests the on-water towing service receives from boaters can be a barometer of boating traffic, indicating peak boating periods.

Boaters waiting until key holidays to get out on the water

due to gas prices is a trend this year. As gas prices started to rapidly increase during the second quarter of 2022, TowBoatUS's 24-hour call centers experienced a 22% increase in calls for on-water assistance during Memorial Day weekend, but then dropped 30%. The most common requests for on-water assistance from recreational boaters included engine breakdowns, running aground in a shallow area, needing a jumpstart, and running out of fuel. TowBoatUS 24/7 call centers typically receive more than 80,000 calls annually for routine assistance.

"We have decades of experience and statistics that

point to things being different this year, and we're contributing that to high gas prices, which are now above \$5 a gallon in most parts of the country," Condon added. "If you're going to be on the water this Independence Day, it's going to be busy, but there are still plenty of ways to be prepared, stay safe and have fun."

"In these situations, when there are a record number of boats on the water, it's important to slow down and be patient, whether you are on the water or preparing to launch from a boat ramp," Ticean said. "We know from experience that boaters run into problems when they try to go too fast."

Capt. Travis Coleman, owner of TowBoatUS Lake of the Ozarks, Missouri, is also anticipating a record number of boaters this year and makes the point that boaters should prepare before they even leave for the lake.

"There are some essential steps boaters should take before they launch a boat at the ramp or from a slip," Coleman noted. "Make sure your boat is safe for you and any passengers by inspecting your bilge pump, control cables, electrical components, fluids, and safety gear, to include properly sized life jackets for the operator and all passengers."
